While working in Allegan Ms. King-Duff helped double the size of their Farmers Market and oversaw the operation of the City's two theaters, one showing first run movies and the other serving as a venue

for community functions and live performances. She also helped re-launch Allegan's long dormant Bridgefest community festival which attracted thousands of participants.

Ms. King-Duff said: "I look forward to many collaborations in the Boyne City community, and am excited to get started."

She and her husband are looking forward to moving to Boyne City and enjoying the Northern Michigan lifestyle. "In my free time I enjoy ski-

ing, hiking, kayaking, and just being outside in general," she added.

Ms. King-Duff participated in three interviews as part of the hiring process and was unanimously recommended by the program's four-person executive search panel and unanimously approved by the Main Street Board at a Special Meeting on December 29th. Ms. King-Duff becomes the Boyne City Main Street program's fourth Executive Director since its establishment in 2003.

Main Street Board Chairperson Pat O'Brien expressed his, and the entire board's, pleasure with Ms. King-Duff's hiring and looks forward to her becoming an important part of the Boyne City community and building on the ongoing successes and important work of the Boyne City Main Street program.

Grant for almost One Million dollars awarded to Hayes Township for park

CHARLEVOIX-What local officials believe will soon become another gleaming "gem" to enjoy in northern Michigan is one step closer to becoming a reality in Charlevoix County's Hayes Township.

Township supervisor Ron Vanzee reported that grant funding totaling \$912,400 was recently awarded to the township to put towards completion of its multi-million dollar Park Camp Sea-Gull project.

Once complete, the project is expected to cost about \$12 million and will bring a new public boat launch, fishing pier, pavilion, archery range and many other amenities to the 20-acre parcel of land situated along Lake Charlevoix.

While about six different agencies overall contributed to this most recent grant total, VanZee said the bulk of the funding came from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Great Lakes Fishery Trust.

Vanzee noted the project has relied on grant and donation funding from the get-go when Hayes Township acquired the Camp Sea-Gull property for about \$3.4 million back in 2013.

The property, which features some 1,400 feet of Lake Charlevoix frontage, had functioned as a camp since it opened in 1922, when it was an all girls camp called Camp Kare-free.

Years later, it was renamed Camp Sea-Gull and

purchased in 1955 by Lew and Regene Shulman, whose children continued to operate the camp from 1972 until it closed in 2012.

Because of its highly sought-after Lake Charlevoix frontage, Vanzee said when the camp first went on the market, some local residents advocated the property be sold to a developer to construct houses or condominiums in order to boost property tax

revenue in the township.

However, Vanzee said township officials soon decided it was in the best interests of the community to acquire the property and preserve and enhance its natural beauty for long-term public use. And that has been and will continue to be a grand effort, Vanzee explained, which is reliant upon finding a balance among a wide variety of funding streams, from grants and matching funds to general contributions.

"Along with each grant comes a responsibility from the township," he added, noting the township has to routinely prove the project remains worthy and is meeting all requirements and strict standards.

Some funding is also contributed by the township and the Charlevoix County Community Foundation is among those agencies who have donated to the project.

Vanzee said he anticipates many more years of

finding funds until the Park Camp Sea-Gull project is complete, which he estimates could take up to 12 years.

The Hayes Township Board this week, in fact, approved moving forward with application of two additional grants to further the project along even more, he said.

But while finding funding can be a years-long and tedious road, the good news, he said, is the number of agencies who already have demonstrated strong support. "It's really a plus to have so many agencies willing to give us grants," Vanzee said, "That tells us we have a good project for the public."

Vanzee said while not many amenities are available there right now, Park Camp Sea-Gull is currently open to the public for those who might enjoy using the property for hiking, snowshoeing or cross country skiing.

Fire Chief defends actions in Downtown Charlevoix Fires

CHARLEVOIX - How Charlevoix's fire department handled two major downtown fires in recent weeks has some city council members wondering if it lacks the capability to effectively fight future fires in the city.

Charlevoix Police and Fire Chief Gerard Doan was called before city council earlier this month to explain how his department dealt with two major fires in the city's downtown district that destroyed three businesses in the past two months.

City council members said questions surfaced after two serious fires occurred along a stretch of Bridge Street since last November, the first of which gutted Johan's Cafe at 327 Bridge Street and destroyed the neighboring Round Lake Gallery at 325 Bridge Street.

The second fire broke out a few weeks later just one block south on Christmas Eve at the Trademark Properties Building, located at 221 Bridge Street, which had been home to Cherry Republic. That fire re-ignited on Christmas Day, requiring crews to remain on standby throughout the day to assure the blaze was thoroughly extinguished.

But since those fires, city council members said questions have evolved about decisions Doan made and actions that were taken or not taken in the fire-fighting efforts.

City councilor Shirley Gibson questioned in particular why Doan opted not to utilize the city's aerial truck during the fire at Cherry Republic on Christmas Eve while such trucks from three other nearby fire departments were on hand at the scene and why only three of ten Charlevoix volunteer fire fighters had air packs to enter the Trademark Properties Building as it burned.

"We need to explain to our constituents why city assets are not being used to fight these fires," Gibson said.

Doan went on to detail the events as they occurred during the Christmas Eve fire, noting his team was on the scene with the first fire engine within four minutes of being called.

He added that he did not have the

manpower available at the time to leave the scene to get the city's aerial truck. His top priority and major concern at the onset of the fire, Doan said, was extinguishing a gas meter fire before DTE Energy was able to shut down the line, as the meter line had melted and a "high intensity flame" was shooting up the rear of the building.

He said he was concerned the downtown would fill up with natural gas if the flame was extinguished. "City manpower had to remain there until the line was off," he explained.

City council member Janet Kalbfell also asked Doan to detail the chain of command and respond to reports that he and assistant fire chief Bob Roloff did not leave their vehicle during the Christmas Eve

fire to help. But Doan assured the council that was not the case and that he and Roloff both were out walking around, fully assessing and assisting at the scene that night.

Kalbfell said she was satisfied at Doan's explanation and thanked him on behalf of the city council for the service of his department and other first responders who worked together countless hours to extinguish both fires.

Firefighters from Charlevoix were assisted at the scene of both fires by crews from Charlevoix Township, Boyne City, East Jordan, Petoskey, Resort/Bear Creek Township and Banks Township.

VETERAN OF THE MONTH



LOREN EARL "BUD" BELL SR.

The "Veteran of the Month" for January 2017 is Loren Earl "Bud" Bell Sr. Born on October 1st, 1926 in Flint, Michigan he attended school near Ewart, Michigan, completing the 8th grade. Leaving school, Bell worked on the family farm until September 22nd, 1944 when he enlisted in the Navy entering into active service on November 11th, 1944 in Ewart. Bell was sent to the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois for basic training and then to the Additional Training Base at Camp Bradford, Virginia. Bell was assigned to the USS Landing Ship Transport #286 serving as a Seaman 2nd class and Fireman 2nd class and later he was reassigned to USS Landing Ship Transport #791 serving as Seaman 2nd class and Seaman 1st class. His ships were deployed to the Asiatic Pacific Theater of Operations and on July 22nd, 1946, at the US Naval Personal Separation Center, Great Lakes, Illinois, Bell received an Honorable Discharge and was awarded the following awards: The Asiatic Pacific Area Campaign Medal, The American Area Campaign Medal and The Victory Medal. While Bell was in the Navy his parents moved to Boyne Falls, Michigan so when Bell returned home it was to Boyne Falls and on November 12th, 1946 he married Virginia Mae McCary in Harbor Springs, Michigan. Bell became a truck driver for a while and then joined the Ironworkers Union Local 340 in Battle Creek, Michi-

gan and worked on the building of the Mackinaw Bridge connecting the upper and lower peninsulas of Michigan, Penn-Dixie Cement Plant near Petoskey, Michigan, the Big Rock Nuclear Plant and the Medusa Cement Plant near Charlevoix, Michigan. He also worked in Kansas, South Dakota, Colorado and California before retiring in 1988. Bell and his wife traveled every winter to warmer climates settling in Quartzsite, Arizona for the last 25 years where he played golf almost every day. On October 19th, 2016 Loren Earl "Bud" Bell Sr. answered the final call and is being honored by his wife Virginia, his daughter Dianna, his sons Gary and Loren Jr. and their extended families.

Martin Luther King Jr. Day commemoration at Boyne District Library

On January 16 the Boyne District Library will celebrate the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. with a day of service, stories, poetry, and community engagement. Activities are planned for all ages and groups: toddlers, preschoolers, students, adults, and families.

Throughout the Day of Service, the library will serve as the hub for service projects in the Boyne City community with organizations such as the Boyne City Food Pantry and the Challenge Mountain Resale Shop. Patrons interested in volunteering for these projects can sign up ahead of time at the library, or stop in on January 16th for an assignment.

A poetry contest titled, "Peace Is..." open to adults and children, will run through January 16th. A special mobile craft celebrating Dr. King's "I Have a Dream"

speech, and inspiring artists to consider their own dreams for themselves, the community, and the world will be available for all patrons to create. A special storytime for the youngest patrons will focus on Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the concept of service in our communities, with a showing of the short animated video, "MLK - The King and His Dream" in the Children's Area.

Special videos about Dr. King's work and his legacy will be shown in the Community Room multiple times over the course of the day (see below for times and subjects). A community recitation of Dr. King's "I Have a Dream" speech will be the culminating event of the day, with poetry contest winners recognized and a display of poetry and I Have a Dream mobiles beginning at 6:00pm in the main library by the

fireplace.

The Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service is a national observation honoring Dr. King's legacy by bringing people of all ages and backgrounds together to engage in acts of service in their local communities. Established as a national day of volunteer service by Congress in 1994, participation in the MLK Day of Service has grown steadily in the last decade. As a participant in the service holiday, the Boyne District Library looks to involve our patrons in volunteer opportunities not just for the day, but to encourage them to continue to work together in acts of service throughout the year.

8.8 million Americans signed up for HealthCare.gov coverage

8.8 million Americans have signed up for coverage through HealthCare.gov since Open Enrollment began on November 1st. This compares to about 8.6 million plan selections last year at this time, demonstrating Americans' strong and growing demand for affordable, quality coverage. Total plan selections as of December 31st, which include auto renewals, consist of 2.2 million new consumers and 6.6 million returning consumers. Among returning consumers, two thirds, or 4.4 million, actively selected a plan, an increase from last year's already high levels of consumer engagement.

"With 8.8 million Ameri-

cans signed up for coverage through HealthCare.gov, more than last year at this time, it is clear that Americans want and need this vital coverage," said U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Sylvia M. Burwell. "As we enter the New Year, Americans who are still uninsured should sign up by January 15th to have coverage starting February 1."

The most recent report covers the period from December 18 through December 31, 2016. This snapshot does not include plan selections from the 12 State-Based Marketplaces that use their own enrollment platforms. Those numbers will be included in

the upcoming Mid-Open Enrollment report.

As in past years, enrollment weeks are measured Sunday through Saturday. Since this year Open Enrollment began on a Tuesday, the totals reported in this snapshot reflect two fewer days than last year's Week 9 snapshot, yet still enrollment exceeds last year's total.

Every two weeks during Open Enrollment, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) will release enrollment snapshots for the HealthCare.gov platform, which is used by the Federally-facilitated Marketplaces and State Partnership Marketplaces, as well as some State-based Market-

places. These snapshots provide point-in-time estimates of biweekly plan selections, call center activity, and visits to HealthCare.gov or CuidadoDeSalud.gov. The final number of plan selections associated with enrollment activity during a reporting period may change as plan modifications or cancellations occur, such as due to life changes like starting a new job or getting married. In addition, as in previous years, the biweekly snapshot does not report the number of consumers who have paid premiums to effectuate their enrollment.

HIDDEN TREASURES: Good Samaritan Resale Shop & Food Pantry

Serving families in need for 26 years

Back in 1990, Ellsworth resident Mary Peterson had an idea...or perhaps it was more of a calling.

"I was visiting a local resale shop and I saw people searching through the trash for something they could use," she recalls. "I just knew there had to be a way to set up a new system for distributing goods to those in need, so I began looking for people who could pursue that idea."

Over twenty-five years later, the result of that inspiration; Good Samaritan Family Services, continues following a mission statement of "servicing the Lord by reaching out to those in need," providing food and outreach programs to local families who could use a little help.

Petersen recalls, "When we began our mission, it was located in the old fire hall in town, we re-

ceived support from local churches and it was ran by a small group of volunteers." At that time, about 30 families visited the facility each month.

Today, approximately 700 families visit Good Samaritan's Food

Pantry each month, primarily from Antrim County though about a quarter of those families are from Charlevoix County. A crew of some 90 volunteers helps to stock and distribute the food supplies, oversee the non-profit organization's Resale

Shop, Good Samaritan Furniture & More Store, and assist new mothers at their affiliated Moms & Tots Center.

"The need has grown over the years," Mary relates. "People's stories tug at your heart. Our senior

population has grown and we are seeing more seniors seeking assistance here, though they can be reluctant to ask for help."

She adds, "Everyone who gets food also gets free clothing. People can visit once a month, and we try to give them enough to last a bit longer. A lot of our food comes from the Manna Food Project, which we receive at a very good discount, so we can really stretch dollars that are donated."

Good Samaritan Family Services also offers "Sammy's Shoes" at the Resale Shop, which has a huge assortment of new shoes in virtually every size, style and color. Families in need can pick up a brand new pair of shoe for a small donation or even for free if they are unable to afford the donation.

Good Samaritan's hours of operation are Tuesdays, 10am to 7pm, Wednesdays through Fridays from 10am to 4pm, and Saturdays from 10am to 2pm. They are located at 9746 Main Street in Ellsworth and can be reached at (231) 588-2208 or on the web at www.thegoodsam.com

Communities invited to apply for Greenspace Improvement Dollars

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan invites local communities to apply for funds to implement infrastructure, policy, and educational enhancements to public greenspaces. of Community Health Services at the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. "These investments will be coupled with our continued work in health education and policy, systems, and environmental changes across the Northern Michigan region."

My nine-month-old sister talks to everything, and I mean everything. She converses with her hands, the Christmas tree, her bottle, paper scraps, socks, the envelopes in the pews at church, the dog's tail, and the bracelet on my left wrist with equal and indiscriminate affection.

However, although my baby sister is on speaking terms with almost every inanimate object in the house, she has a special smile and a special squeak that she saves only for other human beings.

At only nine months old, my baby sister is onto something. She knows that, although the Christmas tree might be a good friend, it's not another person. At nine months old, she already knows that

I am, and you are, another person.

What is the difference between a person and a Christmas tree? The fundamental difference between a person and anything else is the human soul. And what is the human soul? I am not a philosopher or a theologian, but I think that we can imagine the soul as the part of God's heart that He puts into each of His children when He creates them, at the moment of conception.

Yes, from the very moment of conception, God invests His loving heart into each of His children. Yes, from the very moment of conception, God has loved you with all His heart, called you by name, and dreamed of spending eternity with you. And yes, from the very moment of conception, He loves and gives His heart to every child, no matter what;

God loves every part of every one of us with a love so strong and so unconditional that we can't even begin to comprehend it.

Sunday, January 15th, is Sanctity of Life Sunday. Take a few moments on this day to delight in human life, as my baby sister does, and to rejoice in God's love for you. While you're at it, reflect on what you can do to protect human life, from the moment of conception until natural death. MEDC approves tax break for forthcoming manufacturing facility in Antrim County

LANSING — State Sen. Wayne Schmidt applauded recent action by the Michigan Economic Development Corporation that will aid in the construction of a planned, state-of-the-art manufacturing facility in Antrim County's Warner Township.

EJ USA, Inc., known for its manhole covers and other iron works, through its affiliate East Jordan Foundry LLC, will construct the new facility. The plant will feature a high tech, more environmentally friendly molding line that will use fewer fossil fuels.

"This is great news for EJ USA, its employees and customers, and for the region's economy," said Schmidt, R-Traverse City. "My thanks to the MEDC for supporting this project that will help support more than 400 jobs and generate \$125 million in capital investment."

Additionally, the company will take down an existing foundry near Lake Charlevoix to allow for redevelopment of the site.

The Michigan Strategic Fund approved a five-year Alternative State Essential Services Agreement valued at \$408,535 that will support the project.

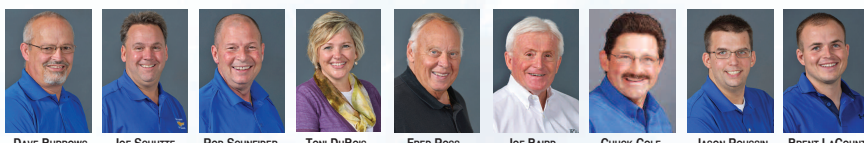

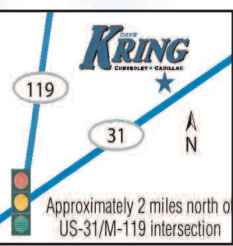
