Signs of the times: East Jordan to pursue wayfinding project

EAST JORDAN - The city of East Jordan is making plans to update signage that will help visitors find their destinations more easily. The city commission received a wayfinding presentation about possible signage updates and changes for the community at their Tuesday, February 2 meeting. Commissioners also had discussions related to an irrigation well for East Jordan Public Schools and a new vehicle for the

police department.

The future wayfinding project of East Jordan is more about the visitors and tourists. Those who have lived in East Jordan many years do not rely on signs to navigate their way through town; however, many others do. Those attending sporting events, a school function, or looking to visit someone at Grandvue Medical Care Facility may not be able to find their destination easily with the city's current signage.

The city's existing system was

inventoried and recommendations were given.

"We can't afford to do this (project) all in one year or two years," City Administrator Tom Cannon said Tuesday night.

No decisions were made about the wayfinding signage at the commission meeting, but Cannon said the next phase of the project will be to pursue funding for construction.

Superintendent of East Jordan Schools, Matt Stevenson, was present at the Tuesday meeting, as an irrigation well for the school system was a topic of discussion. The issue was brought up a few years back when Jon Hoover was superintendent, but the topic died over time.

"I think the ordinance is fairly clear in prohibiting private wells unless it's permitted by the administrator," City Attorney Scott Beatty said. "However, Tom indicated to me that the school has been a good partner in a variety of things with the city. Two other communities in the county use ir-

rigation wells to do their football fields. It would be helpful to the school, and it's a political decision. I wouldn't see any reason why the administrator wouldn't approve it."

The school spends just under \$10K approximately each year for minimal irrigation to keep the football field green and the baseball and softball fields watered during season play.

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County Prosecuting Attorney Telgenhof running for re-election

CHARLEVOIX - Charlevoix County Prosecuting Attorney Allen Telgenhof is not going to leave voters guessing whether he plans to seek a second term as prosecutor. In a media release last week, Tel-

genhof, a Republican, announced more than two months before deadline that that he has filed the required paperwork with the county clerk's office to seek re-election in November 2016.

The first term prosecutor said his office is proud of all that has been accomplished and how cases were handled in the past 37 months since he took the helm, especially in the wake of numerous serious crimes committed in Charlevoix County during that time.

"We have effectively prosecuted cases in the county in a very difficult period which has included an alleged murder, manslaughter, an attempted murder, the shooting of a police officer, several sex crimes, including those against children, a "shaken baby case," embezzlements, strings of break-in thefts, arson, rape and armed robbery," Telgenhof stated, "These have all been cases that I have personally handled."

He also pointed to numerous initiatives he's launched as prosecutor that were targeted to specific criminal issues that have emerged or become more pronounced in Charlevoix County in recent years.

"A primary initiative during my first term was the area of domestic violence. The law enforcement community, with my leadership, adopted county-wide policies on the investigation and prosecution of domestic violence cases, Telgenhof said.

He added that he and victim advocate, Libby Mikulski, also started the Charlevoix County Domestic Violence Sexual Assault Task Force which regularly meets to discuss so-

lutions for problems related to domestic violence in this area.

Telgenhof noted he also hired an assistant prosecuting attorney especially dedicated to focus on cases where domestic violence is involved, a move which was supported both by county law enforcement officials and county commissioners.

Another initiative set forth during his term is his Teen Sex Deferral Program initiative offering teens who are low risk re-offenders a chance to rehabilitate through counseling and education instead of criminal punishment.

Telgenhof, who spent 23 years as a private practice trial attorney before being elected County Prosecutor in November, 2012, said since then he has also handled the majority of all felony cases in the county and obtained convictions in dozens of those cases.

He said he and his staff have furthermore succeeded in opening doors of communication among the prosecuting attorney's office, police officers, victims, others in the criminal justice system and general public.

"Whether it is office newsletters, creation of office Facebook and Twitter accounts, monthly meetings with police chiefs or just an open door policy with the public, we have greatly increased the communication out of this office," Telgenhof said.

Married to wife, Judy, for 29 years and father of four, Telgenhof said he believes in light of all the progress made during his first term, a second one will only keep the momentum going.

"Simply put, we have accomplished a lot and it is important that Charlevoix County and the Prosecuting Attorney's Office keep moving forward," he said.

When she lived in Spring Arbor, she organized the "Arts Go To School" program at Ella Sharp Museum in Jackson. Along the way she wrote numerous informational and educational books on Native American culture and history and Michigan botany and geology. As an expert in Native basketry and art, she was a popular lecturer for adult organizations and school groups alike, dragging along hands-on materials and unique artifacts for the enjoyment and educa-

tion of others. VETERAN OF THE MONTH

The "Veteran of the Month" for February 2016 is Lloyd Joseph Prevo. Born on April 23rd, 1922 in the village of Sheldrick, Sheldrick Township, Chippawa County in Michigans' Eastern Upper Peninsula. Prevo spent his younger years in the Upper Peninsula during the lumber era and then moved with his family to the Green River area south of East Jordan, Mich. in Antrim County. For a short time Prevo attended the Bush Country School and following another family move, to the Hogs Back Hill area, where he attended the Bennett School, completing the 8th grade. Prevo helped with the farming chores and later moved down state seeking work while living with his half sister. He registered with the Selective Service on June 30, 1942 in Detroit, Mich. and shortly after was inducted into the Army receiving Basic and Advanced Training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Prevo was assigned to the 601st Tank Destroyer Battalion and sent to North Africa and following the North African Campaign, the 601st was reequipped with M-10 Wolverine Tank Destroyers, loaded aboard ships and landed at Salerno, Italy with Operation Avalanche in Sept. of 1943. This unit was an Elite Special Unit, formed with the intent to stop Hitlers Panzer Tanks, and was involved in 10 Campaigns and 546 days of lethal combat. During combat operations, on October

21st, 1943, Private Lloyd Joseph Prevo died in action when his tank took a direct hit and exploded. One month prior to Prevo being killed in action, his father Joseph Prevo passed away from cancer. A telegram was sent to notify him, however he never received the notification. On Nov. 8th, 1943 his mother was notified by Military Personnel that her son had been killed in action. The Department of the Army told her that she could have him buried in the American Cemetery in Nettuno, Italy or could have him flown back to the states, however it may take up to five years for his return.

Making a very hard decision, she asked that he be buried over there. As funds would allow, flowers were sent every Memorial Day to decorate his grave. At the age of 84, in 1984, when asked by her children what she wanted for her birthday, she said she would like to visit her sons' grave, as his final resting place was always on her mind. Mrs. Alena Prevo Stenke got her wish, and with her son Herman and daughter Etla accompanying her, they made her wish come true. Mrs. Stenke was always present as a Gold Star Mother during Memorial Day Services in East Jordan and was very proud of the sacrifice her son Lloyd Joseph made for his country, and also proud of her other three sons Miles, Ervin and Herman for their Military Service. Alena was presented with her sons' Purple Heart Medal that she always cherished. On October 21st, 1943 Private Lloyd Joseph Prevo answered the final call and is being honored by the Prevo family.

What more appropriate way to celebrate Valentine's Day than being serenaded by the area's finest musicians playing some of the music world's great masterpieces? Please join The Great Lakes Chamber Orchestra at Emmanual Episcopal Church in Petoskey at 4:00pm on Sunday, February 14th for their classic offering. The Sunday Series Recitals are free, thanks to the support of Board Member Carolyn Klender.

For the first presentation, Music Director, Libor Ondras will present Bach's Partita in D Minor consisting of a suite of five movements for solo violin. This suite is based on dance forms from the early 18th

The next segment is from Telemann. family friend and godfather to one of Bach's sons. Telemann was also Bach's predecessor as organist in Leipzig, and one of the most prolific composers of the late Baroque period. His Sonata for Violin and Continuo in G Minor is composed of a bass line for cello and harmonic addition improvised on the keyboard over that bass line. Dr. Pattengale's performance on harpsichord will feature that harmonization, with Libor Ondras on violin and Maxwell Ondras on cello.

Finally, Fritz Kreisler's Opus 15 and 18 demonstrate his remarkable talent and command of large-scale compositions. As a child prodigy, he had won the gold medal at the Vienna Conservatory when he was ten years old, yet abandoned his formal music training a few years later. He went on to study medicine then serve in the military before returning to his love of music in the late nineteenth century. Beethoven's Sonata for Violin and Piano, Opus 24 (Spring) is one of the compositions that show his experimentation with the formal structures he had inherited from the classic era. Libor Ondras and Viola Michelle Mitchum will bring this to

Hope candle fundraiser helps women locally, nationally

Selling candles to help women locally and beyond northern Michigan was the goal of a fundraiser initiated by the Episcopal Church Women (ECW) of Christ Episcopal Church in Charlevoix. The 'Hope' candles they sold this holiday season were manufactured by survivors of trafficking, prostitution and abuse employed at Thistle Farms in Nashville, Tennessee.

ECW committee members decided to also support local survivors of domestic abuse and sexual assault by donating dollars raised from the Hope candle sale to the Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan.

According to Thistle Farms executive director, Becca Stevens, they do not make the Hope candles because candles are their passion. They make candles to give women who have survived violence, prostitution and trafficking an opportunity for healing and economic freedom. Staff members symbolically light a candle at the start of every day for other women who are still being impacted by violence and abuse and who are trying to find their way home.

Thistle Farms is a social enterprise nonprofit that includes a two-year residential program and advocacy services for up to 700 women yearly. They provide education and training annually through speaking events and workshops. Stevens has been featured on many national news programs, such as The Today Show, PBS, ABC World News with Diane Sawyer and NPR.

Christ Episcopal Church and the ECW committee plans to host a program this fall featuring Becca Stevens of Thistle Farms as the speaker.
