BOYNE CITY - The Boyne City Commission accepted a donation of a fountain to be placed outside of the Chamber of Commerce building at the June 28 meeting. The locally owned com-

pany, Muddypaw, proposed the donation of one of their sculpted fountains. The LLC owned by David Austin and Kristen David specializes in garden ponds, waterfalls, sculpted fountains and public art and has been in business since 1994. They plan to install the fountain in time for the July 4 holiday at the south side of the Chamber's offices The Chamber board City's Park Board and Garden Club were all asked to give an opinion on the addition before it came to the Commission for a vote. "It'll be a real nice addition to the corner, we're glad to have it," said Chamber of Commerce Director Jim Baumann

Muddypaw will maintain the fountain at no cost and the Chamber has agreed to supply the power necessary to run the pumps and lights. "It's a living entity and we'd like to create this for the city," said Austin who has lived in the city for the last 4 vears.

Commissioner Laura Sansom instigated a discussion on how busy the corner already is and the possibility of the fountain detracting rather than adding to the natural artistic beauty of Sunset Park. "There is so much going on that corner that it almost detracts from what you're trying to accomplish," she said. The possibility of rearranging some

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

Northern Community Mediation (NCM) received a grant from the Charlevoix County Community Foundation (CCCF) for the purpose of comparing the effectiveness of small claims cases using mediation services vs. adjudicated small claims cases. Small claims cases are those in which a defendant allegedly owes money to a plaintiff in the amount of \$5,500 or less and for which there can be no attorneys. Upon completion of the study, NCM Executive Director Jane Millar met with President Chip Hansen and Program Officer Maureen Radke from the CCCF to explain the results of the research.

For mediated cases, 68% of the plaintiffs received payment in full as compared to 22% of the plaintiffs receiving payment in full for adjudicated cases. For mediated cases, 9% of the plaintiffs received no payment, whereas 33% of the plaintiffs received no payment in adjudicated cases. Of the 9%, 2% of nonpayment was the result of death or bankruptcy on the part of the defendant.

Partial payment was received by the plaintiffs in 10% of the cases for both mediated cases and adjudicated cases. In 13% of the mediated cases, NCM was unable to contact the plaintiff in order to determine the status of payment. In 35% of the adjudicated cases, contact could not be made with the plaintiff. Of that 35%, it can be said for certain that payment was not received in full because if it had been, the court records would have shown the case as having been dismissed. Therefore, that 35% represents either no payment or partial payment, the former being more likely


Millar concludes that plaintiffs are far more likely to receive payment in full when small claims cases are mediated rather than adjudicated and far less likely not to receive any payment when mediated as opposed to adjudicated.

Northern Community Mediation is a non-profit organization that provides an alternative means of resolving conflict. Trained mediators, who meet with the parties involved in a dispute, facilitate so that the individuals themselves can resolve the conflict. News Horton Bay 4th of July parade lives again

HORTON BAY-After being "put to sleep" for six long years, The Horton Bay Fourth of July Parade Lives Again! It must be true because it says so on the big banner hanging in front of Chip Lorenger's Horton Bay General Store.

Lorenger confirmed that yes, this weekend the iconic parade that once attracted some 10,000 people to this tiny, historic hamlet along the shores of Lake Charlevoix will once again march along a stretch of Boyne City-Charlevoix Road as it runs directly in front of the General Store.

He's not sure how many to expect at this year's Fourth of July Parade, but every day he hears more folks excited to learn that it's back.

"Word is definitely out and people are getting excited, which is great because it's a wonderful thing to throw a party and somebody comes," Lorenger chuckled.

But that's kind of the reason why Horton Bay stopped having its annual Fourth of July Parade six years ago. While people were always enthused about coming to the parade, each year fewer of them were putting together floats or otherwise participating in it.

Lorenger said eventually the number of parade participants dwindled to the point where spectators would come out early to secure their spots along the route, wait a couple hours for it to start, but then be disappointed when it only lasted 15 minutes. "It got to be stupid," Lorenger said, "So we decided to put it to sleep for a while."

And that's been a mighty disappointment to those who defined

their Fourth of July by the parade which for years had become widely considered one of the most quirky, laughable and politically incorrect parades in the nation.

It's not clear, exactly, when Horton Bay started putting its name on the map because of its Independence Day parade, but Lorenger has a photo of parade-goers in front of his General Store that's dated 1925, so its history goes back at least that far. The parade's popularity swelled in the late 1970s and mid-1980s, when Lorenger said it drew some 10,000 spectators to this blink-andyou'll-miss-it community in Charlevoix County's Bay Township. "That was back in its heyday," Lorenger said, "But the years after that averaged maybe 3,000."

When the Horton Bay Parade Committee decided to resurrect the parade some months ago, Lorenger said support grew quickly and participants were eager to sign up. With this being an election year, it was decided the 2016 Horton Bay Fourth of July Parade theme will be "Political Scandals-Past, Present and Future."

So far, Lorenger said there are about 15 groups and floats already committed with the number growing until parade day.

While its participants are lauded for creating floats and entertaining in ways that maybe "push the envelope" a bit, they won't likely push it too far this year with a trio of trained law enforcement officers sharing duties as Grand Marshal.

Charlevoix County Sheriff Don Schneider, Undersheriff Chuck Vondra and former Charlevoix County Sheriff and county commissioner George T. Lasater will head up the 2016 parade.

Lorenger thanked the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department for their support and assistance as well as the county road commission for their help with the parade.

"We just want everyone to come out and be entertained-just have a good time-and we couldn't do that without their help," he said.

As is its tradition, the Horton Bay Fourth of July Parade will end this year as it always does, quite literally, "when the Fat Lady" sings, only there's something a little off about that "lady", see? What's up with the hairy legs and mustache?

Longest Day event raises awareness of Alzheimer's disease and dementia

PETOSKEY – CHARLEVOIX -The end of each June always brings with it the summer solstice, otherwise known as the longest day of the year. So what better day to set aside to raise awareness about Alzheimer's disease and dementia?

"That's because every day can feel like the longest day if you're a caregiver of someone with Alzheimer's or dementia," said Toni Cone, community liaison for Comfort Keepers, a senior service provider in Petoskey.

Comfort Keepers joined forces with American House Senior Living Communities in Charlevoix and Petoskey to participate in the Alzheimer's Association recent annual "Longest Day" event held to raise funds and awareness about the challenges of Alzheimer's, dementia and other mind-crippling diseases.

Cone said teams from around the world are encouraged to do whatever activity they choose from sunup to sun-down each year on the summer solstice to raise funds to help put an end to Alzheimer's. Teams in Charlevoix and Petoskey decided to spend their longest day this year "Grilling for a Cure."

Teams at both locations kicked off the day offering an early morning breakfast and running through lunch and dinner. Hamburgers and hot dogs were served up by several "Celebrity Grillers", including Petoskey Regional Chamber of Commerce president Carlin Smith,

Enbridge tours Northern Michigan showcasing pipeline safety

PETOSKEY - Teams of officials from Canadian-based Enbridge Energy fanned out across northern Michigan and the Upper Peninsula last week to host community open houses in six cities in order to showcase some of the \$7 million in pipeline safety equipment the company plans to acquire over the next two years.

The community open houses, which Enbridge billed as "public engagement events", allowed visitors to view some of the equipment up close and also offered informational presentations and opportunities to ask company officials and related vendors and contractor's questions.

Enbridge also included a catered barbeque for those who stopped by.

Events were hosted in Traverse City, Gaylord, Petoskey, Cheboygan, Mackinaw City and Manistique.

An increased police and security presence was noted at the Knights of Columbus Hall where the Petoskey event was held, which was not surprising in light of the ever growing and sometimes emotional controversy the Line 5 issue appears to be generating.

Critics fear that the 63-year-old twin pipeline, which carries some 23 million gallons of light crude oil and liquefied natural gas daily from northern Wisconsin to Sarnia, Ontario, might someday rupture where it runs beneath the Straits of Mackinac and leave behind environmental and economic chaos.

Enbridge officials, however, continue to maintain that Line 5 is rigidly monitored and remains in good condition, that it has never leaked and poses no threat to the natural environment or the tourism-based economy.

The company's recent announcement of its plans to purchase \$7 million in additional pipeline safety equipment that can be deployed rapidly should an oil spill occur is an attempt to help assuage the fears of those who are actively working to get Line 5 completely shut down. Enbridge officials, however, insist the odds of such a spill ever happening are slim.

"In the unlikely event of a pipeline incident, this new equipment will help Enbridge and other oil-spill response organizations recover product more quickly in multiple scenarios-rough open waters, thick ice cover and near shore," Enbridge stated in a media release.





Governor Snyder will attend groundbreaking ceremony at Great Lakes Center for the Arts at Bay Harbor

BAY HARBOR - Governor Rick Snyder is expected to spend at least part of his Fourth of July weekend in northern Michigan. But Snyder won't be coming up north just to enjoy the fireworks, parades and countless other festivities in one of the most beautiful spots in the state. He will be among hundreds of those who love and support the performing arts who are expected at the July 2 groundbreaking ceremony to celebrate the soon-to-beconstructed \$25 million Great Lakes Center for the Arts at Bay Harbor.

Fast becoming known as of one of the most ambitious-and profound- non-profit fundraising projects ever in this region, the capital campaign has raised more than \$20 million of the \$25 million needed for the "brick and mortar" construction of the 37,000 square foot center. An additional \$25 million endowment is earmarked for its perpetual support.

The new center is hoped to become a "cultural hub" in Bay Harbor, comparable to Interlochen Center for the Arts, Aspen Institute, Ravinia Festival, Tanglewood Music Center and the Ocean Reef Club.

"The Great Lakes Center for the Arts will be a regional, national and international destination for the cultural arts and intellectual dialogue," states GLCA website.

Calling the building "an architectural landmark," the GLCA provided an artist's rendering of the new center that shows a modern, two story, glass-sided structure built on a choice site overlooking Lake Michigan. Among other amenities, it will house a 500-seat theater with private box areas, an exclusive donor lounge, a rooftop terrace and community engagement rooms.

Programming will be year-round

and will include popular, classical, jazz and country music performances, theatrical productions, music festivals, opera, films, dance, lectures and a children's series.

Construction of the new GLCA is expected to be complete and the curtains to go up for the first performance sometime in 2018. The GLCA cites the new structure as soon becoming well-known as a place that offers, "limitless possibilities for the arts to inspire, entertain and educate within the northern Michigan community."

The groundbreaking ceremony for the new GLCA at Bay Harbor is set for 5pm Saturday, July 2 at the corner of Main Street and Bay Harbor Drive in the Bay Harbor business district. The event is free and the public is invited. Featured entertainment will be provided by Bay View Spectrum Brass and youth performances by members of the Up North Vocal Institute.
