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Inside First phase of BC to CHX recreational trail opens ahead of schedule

Ribbon cutting ceremony planned for September 1

BOYNE CITY - Charlevoix County officials are planning a ribbon cutting ceremony September 1 to celebrate the completion and opening of the first section of a non-motorized, recreational trail that will eventually link Boyne City to Charlevoix and beyond.

The 3.2 mile-long stretch of paved trail signals the end of Phase 1 in a five-phase project that will ultimately result in a 13-mile-long stretch of non-motorized trail connecting Boyne City to the ever-growing Little Traverse Wheelway network, which already offers users a scenic route to travel between Charlevoix and Petoskey to Harbor Springs and north to Alanson.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday, September 1 at the Young State Park entrance onto this first completed section of

the trail.

Phase 1 construction of the trail began early last spring at the intersection of West Michigan Avenue and Boyne City Road in Boyne City. It then ran alongside the Lake Charlevoix side of Boyne City Road and through Young State Park via an easement to North Springwater Beach Road at the Evangeline/Bay Township Line.

The cost for this phase is expected to be just more than \$1.1 million, according to county records. Phase 2 of the project will also go

into motion this

month with bids being advertised for the project, which is slated for construction to start in spring 2017. This phase will include a 2.6 mile-long stretch of trail that will begin at the Little Traverse Wheelway in Hayes Township, east of Waller Road, and follow an easement across private property to Boyne City Road, east of the Argonne Supper Club.

It will then run parallel along Boyne City Road to Quarterline Road, south of Susan Lake. Once completed, this section of the trail

will also feature a point where trail users can find a picnic area and public access to a Lake Charlevoix swimming beach.

This section of trail along Boyne City Road just outside Young

State Park has just been completed and is now open.

Cost for Phase 2 is also expected to come in at just over \$1.1 million.

The project is being funded through various streams, including Charlevoix and Hayes Townships, state and local grants, clubs and individual donors and various fundraising efforts.



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BOYNE CITY COMMISSION MEETING, AUGUST 9, 2016 Boyne City plans new fishing pier

BOYNE CITY - Those who like to fish but don't have a boat or easy access to the perfect place to cast their line in the water could soon have an opportunity to do just that next summer and

right in the heart of Boyne City if officials here win grant funding to install a public fishing pier on Lake Charlevoix near the One Water Street development.

The Boyne City commission voted unanimously at its meeting August 9 in favor of moving forward with the city's application to the Great Lakes Fishery Trust "Access to the Great Lakes Fishery" grant and authorizing a letter of support and completion of documents required with its submission.

Assistant city planner Patrick Kilkenny told commissioners that the GLFT grant application will work along with a public fishing pier that was proposed in tandem with the One Water Street development. The grant will provide about a 50 percent match of the \$100,000 estimated total cost of the proposed fishing pier project, he said. This area off the shore of Lake Charlevoix near the One Water Street development is where a new public fishing pier will be going in next summer if Boyne City officials are able to procure grant funding.

Kilkenny said the new public access pier would be 190-feet long and constructed as a "removable floating dock" that will be situated just off One Water Street development and southwest of the mouth of the Boyne River. It would be stored seasonally.

He said it would be easily accessible by existing sidewalks and to public restrooms, parks and parking and will be directly connected to Boyne City's Central Business District. The new pier will furthermore meet ADA standards, affording those with disabilities a chance to fish, too. "The pier will allow anglers of all experience levels and physical abilities to fish safely and conveniently," Kilkenny said.

He said the grant application is due August 23, 2016 and if all goes according to plan and funding is procured, Boyne City could have its new public access fishing pier in the water by early next summer.

Boyne City Mayor pro-tem Gene Towne joined other commissioners in supporting the grant application for the new pier. "I think it's great," Towne said, "Not everybody can afford a boat."

Ethel is a long time resident of Hayes Township who first became involved in township government as a member of the Hayes Township Planning Commission and the Zoning Board of Appeals in 1976 having been appointed by Township Supervisor Bud Sneathen. She served in those positions until being appointed Zoning Administrator in 1982. She continued as zoning administrator

until June 30, 2007. In 1988 while still serving as zoning administrator, Ethel ran for the elected office of Township Clerk, winning the election and serving as Township Clerk until 2005. During her term as township clerk, Ethel appointed Marlene Golovich as Deputy Clerk. When Ethel resigned as clerk, the Township Board appointed Marlene to fill the clerk position. After serving as Zoning Administrator for 25 years, Ethel took a break from elected office and then ran for and won election as Hayes Township Supervisor in 2006. She has served in that position since then and will retire as supervisor when her term of office expires on November 20, 2016.

Ethel said, "I don't know where this past forty years have gone because it sure doesn't feel like it's been that long to me. I have enjoyed every position I've held for the township, because I've had the fortune of working with some wonderful people, on boards, commissions, committees, and administrative duties, who had positive visions for the entire township. I have also met many of the residents throughout the years whom I consider friends."

She adds, "I've been asked several times why I've stuck with the township so long and my only answer is

that I love where I live and have always wanted to be involved in trying to keep the rural nature of the entire township intact. Any decision I've voted on has been based on what is the right thing to do for the entire township.'

Hayes Township Supervisor retires

Ethel believes one of the greatest accomplishments of Hayes Township has been the purchase of the historic girls' camp, Camp Sea-Gull, now re-named Hayes Township Park Camp Sea-Gull. The camp is comprised of twenty acres and 1400 feet of Lake Charlevoix frontage which gives the public access to the lake. This was

made possible by a Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) Trust Fund Grant and a lot of work by the township board and the financial support of individual donors. Hayes Township closed on the purchase in January, 2014.

Ethel has always said the Township Board would have been remiss to squander the opportunity to purchase that much lake front property at a cost to the township of \$500,000 which was only twelve per cent of the purchase price after awarded grant funds and generous donations.

Hayes Township has signed an agreement with the MDNR Waterways Commission for a grant for partial funding of an access road to the waterfront and a boat launch for small boats. The Township Board with the assistance of the Charlevoix County Community Foundation will be seeking donations of \$200,000 through an upcoming fundraising campaign for the matching funds required by the Waterways Commission grant. The Township also expects to receive more grant monies for a fishing pier. The grant monies for the fishing pier are contingent on the construction of the access road and boat launch.

Ethel said, "We need to get the road constructed because everything else depends on the road for access."

Paul Hoadley, Hayes Township Trustee and former Hayes Township Supervisor said, "Ethel prides herself for being a 'straight shooter'. She tells it like it is and doesn't beat around the bush. Ethel believes in grass roots government. She has truly enjoyed her time serving Hayes Township. Those of us who have worked with her through the years can testify to this. She will be missed."

Jim Rudolph, Hayes Township Trustee said, "Ethel has set a very high standard of integrity and dedication to the betterment of Hayes Township that will be difficult for future supervisors to meet." Ethel will be recognized at the Hayes Township Annual Picnic on Sunday August 21 from 1 to 2pm at a cake and ice cream reception at Hayes Township Park Camp Sea-Gull. The Annual Picnic will be held from 1 to 4pm. Hayes Township residents and friends of Ethel are invited. Attendees may purchase food from the Pigs Eatin' Ribs Food Truck, grill their own food on a provided gas grill or bring brown bag snacks.

Transportation will be provided for those who cannot walk up and down the steep road to the picnic location.

Unfortunately, however, MacKenzie noted the need for those services offered through the humane society in Charlevoix County continues to outpace the available funding to provide them.


"Our financial support is down but the demand is not," MacKenzie said.

Armchair Theatre presents Mark Twain's "Diaries of Adam and Eve"

The Archair Theatre at the Charlevoix Circle of Arts presents two performances of the "Diaries of Adam and Eve" on Sunday August 21 at 6:30 pm and Sunday September 4 at 2pm. Mark Twain wrote the diaries in two parts: the first "The Diary of Adam" was written during the 1890s, when he was fifty-five years old and at time when his own fortunes were beginning to fail, and the health of his wife Olivia (Livy) was deteriorating. It was first published under the title of "The First Authentic Mention of Niagara Falls".

"The Diary of Eve" was written almost fifteen years later when Twain was seventy years old. It was written shortly after the death of his beloved Livy. At this point in his life, Twain had outlived three of his four children. As a result, the tone, (its voice), of this diary is completely different from that of Twain's earlier works.

What's been done in this production is to put these two voices from different times (Adam's and Eve's) in Twain's life together. When heard together at the same time, they provide the audience with a remarkable love story, an enduring love that transcends the fragile yearnings of romance, the intimacy of transient

Boyne City scheduled to

upgrade streetlights

Beginning late next week Consumers Energy is scheduled to begin replacing 149 Mercury Vapor (MV) streetlights throughout Boyne City with high efficiency Light Emitting Diode (LED) fixtures. The City contracted to have the work done at a cost of \$12,251 instead of having the streetlights converted to High Pressure Sodium (HPS) fixtures.

While that work would have been done at no initial charge to Boyne City the HPS lights would not have been as energy efficient and would have given off an orange light that Boyne City has been moving away from for over a decade. The LED lights will give off a more natural white light, which is closer to the light quality of the old MV streetlights that are being replaced. Because the new LED lights cost less to operate per month than the ones they are replacing Boyne City will end up saving more money than they are spending on the project in two and half years or less.

The streetlights being replaced are typically mounted to wooden utility poles. Boyne City's decorative streetlights, like those used in its downtown and other areas are not affected. Some of the decorative streetlights are already using LED bulbs while others use similar looking and nonhazardous Metal Halide bulbs, which the City is getting prices to convert to LEDs separately.

The Mercury Vapor lamps are being phased out nationwide to comply with Federal regulations seeking to reduce the use of hazardous mercury materials. The City's existing HPS (orange) streetlights are not being changed at this time due to the much higher cost to do so.

The City is working with Consumers Energy on getting prices to remove another 15 MV streetlights that residents have asked to be removed or are otherwise no longer needed.
