## City to replace tennis courts at Rotary Park

BOYNE CITY - Those who enjoy playing tennis or pickleball at the tennis courts in Boyne City's Rotary Park will be playing on a brand new surface by the time next summer rolls around.

The Boyne City commission at its meeting August 23 voted unanimously in favor of authorizing a contract request from Harbor Springs Excavating in the amount of \$105,870 so the company can move forward with replacing the city's deteriorating tennis courts at Rotary Park.

The request for funding to fix the tennis courts was submitted by Andrew Kovolski, Boyne City's superintendent of public facilities, streets, parks and

Kovolski said complaints have been ongoing about the deteriorating condition of the current four tennis courts at Rotary Park, which are believed to have been constructed some 30 years ago. "They've been going downhill for many years," Kovolski told the commission.

Despite the many visible patched and

Once complete, the new tennis courts will feature painted markings to accommodate both tennis and pickleball players.

emerging cracks in the courts, however, Kovolski noted they nevertheless continue to be well-used by both tennis players and those who enjoy playing pickleball, which is a tennis-like, racquet sport that has grown increasingly popular in recent years. The courts are

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also regularly used by Boyne City High

Now that the commission has approved funding for replacing the current tennis courts, Kovolski said Harbor Springs Excavating is expected to get to work right away in order to complete as much as possible before cold weather ends the construction season. He said the courts won't likely be ready for painted markings until warm weather returns next year and they will be painted to accommodate both tennis and pickleball players.

Whatever their game, city manager Michael Cain said players of both sports are sure to enjoy bouncing their balls on courts that are totally new and haven't been patched and repaired. "When these are done, they will be a new-use facility," Cain said.

Kovolski said with routine good care and maintenance, he expects the new tennis courts to last 50-60 years before needing replaced again. He noted that Harbor Springs Excavating recently



# Problems with road condition on Lakeshore Drive continue

ELLSWORTH - Continuing dissatisfaction with the condition of Lakeshore Drive in spite of efforts by the township to address the roads issues was expressed at the August 22 Banks Township Board meeting.

Residents of Lakeshore Drive attended the meeting in response to a letter sent out by Supervisor Thomas Mann as he said he would at last month's meeting. The letter acknowledged the need for something more to be done about the road which has been deteriorating even after multiple attempts to correct the problems have been made. Gravel added in 2004, \$31,080 in resurfacing improvements were completed in the spring of 2012, a process to mix the surface afton

stone with the underlying gravel last year and ditching completed this year

The letter outlined four possible solutions for the estimated quarter of a million dollar road project, none of the options are either financially feasible for the township or will fix the problems. "It's so tense and when did it become us against them," said Treasurer Katy Postmus who presented the idea of getting a third party decision on the road that has been brought to the board's attention periodically for the last 10 years. Because of the swampy nature of the area, the **Antrim County Road Commission** has stated that the road cannot be improved without paving and widening which is not only very expensive but will trespass deeply into some of the resident's front

yards. A motion to hire a third party engineer to evaluate the road and present options was passed. "We don't want full scale drawings. We want someone to come out and tell us what we're doing right or what we need to do to make it better," said Postmus. "We have to do something to fix this problem."

C2AE engineer Kevin Makarewicz presented the final plans for upgrades to the Banks Township Day Park made possible by a \$60,000 Recreation Passport Grant. The upgrades will make the park ADA accessible but because the park is in a high risk erosion area the process which includes getting permits from the DNR, Army Corps of Engineers and EPA has taken longer than expected. As a result, the engineering process has taken more time than originally bid. Makarewicz stated he would email the plans to the DNR for approval immediately and that once the project begins it will be completed in 60 days. The board ap-

proved the plans and another \$3,500 in engineering fees.

As reported by Village President Hugh Campbell at last month's meeting, the Summer Recreation Program was a huge success which resulted in a small deficit in the program budget. The township already contributes \$3,500 each year for the program and approved a one-time additional \$400. "Suggest to Hugh that they raise the participation fees five or ten dollars, my kids play and I'm so glad for the program I'd pay it," said Postmus.

The board approved bids to have the township hall windows and ducts cleaned.

The next meeting is scheduled for Monday, September 19 at 6 p.m. at the Banks Township Hall.



## **US Senate Committee Votes to Eliminate MMAP**

The Congressional Senate Appropriations Committee recently voted to eliminate funding for the State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) for the year that begins October 1, 2016. The Michigan SHIP is called the Medicare/Medicaid Assistance Program, often referred to as MMAP.

If the funding is ended, Michigan

MMAP, as well as similar programs in all other states would not be able to continue the free services they provide to seniors. Jim Verville, Regional Coordinator for the 10 North-west Lower Michigan counties, said that his organization helped over 7,000 beneficiaries this past year. The myriad of Medicare and Medicaid plans along with all of the associated requirements and rules can be very daunting for seniors. "Beneficiaries come to us with a lot of anxiety because health insurance is such a huge concern to them", said Verville. Most people served by MMAP are on a fixed income, and want to be sure they have health insurance that has the coverage they want and is affordable. MMAP counselors do a great job explaining the benefits and costs associated with the wide range of plans avail-able.

About half of the Michigan MMAP team are volunteers. The others work for organizations that provide services to seniors including MMAP counseling. Verville indicated that he has 52 counselors in his region. "Each of them are trained and certified to provide free, local, and unbiased help to Medicare beneficiar-ies," he said. The savings that MMAP counselors are able to achieve for seniors is substantial. During the 53 day Annual Medicare Enrollment period last year the Region 10 team was able to save seniors a total of \$1.4 million by helping them switch to another Medicare prescription drug plan. "We need to start documenting the other areas where we help seniors save money", he said MMAP counselors also screen folks for eligibility in the Extra Help program that helps pay for their prescription insurance pre-mium and lower the co-payments for their medications. MMAP counselors also help their clients apply for Medicaid benefits that can pay for their Part B pre-

mium and also help with the co-pay and deductible expenses associated with their health care.

Contrary to the Senate action, the House Appropriations Subcommittee recently voted to continue fund-ing SHIP at the current level for the upcoming program year. The full House budget committee still needs to vote on the program budget. It's not known whether there will be floor debates any time soon. Chances are neither the House nor the Senate funding packages will be approved in their respective chambers until later this year.

If Medicare beneficiaries and others are concerned about the loss of these services, they should contact the Michigan US Congressional delegation. "Personal stories about how MMAP has been able to help can also be important", Verville said.

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

Local kayakers Debbie and Paul Gelderblom, specially trained in safety and rescue, assisted and gave guidance to participants along the course. The DNR, USCG and Sheriff Marine Division also were alerted of the

"We were pleased with the first year turn out and the excitement garnered through volunteers, sponsorships and giveaways. This was a great fundraiser for the Pool and we only expect it to grow as word spreads about how fun it is to participate!" says Mullaney.
