County law enforcement officials trained to detect drivers under the influence

CHARLEVOIX - Being able to accurately detect whether a driver is impaired has become a vastly more difficult task for law enforcement in recent years in the midst of an ever-growing list of both legal and illegal drugs being used. From heroin and crack

cocaine to legalized medical marijuana and prescription drugs, what seems to be arguably an almost ubiquitous use of drugs has become a nationwide problem, and one that

specific behaviors as they might correspond to the use of different substances, Telgenhof said two members of his county law enforcement team were sent to Lansing where they recently com-

pleted a two week-long course to become a Drug Recognition Expert

Telgenhof said Charlevoix County Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Katrina Martin and Charlevoix County Sheriff's Corporal Nate Kaminski both completed the course this month. The training will enhance the pair's ability to detect and better prosecute drivers under the influence of drugs, he said.

"This has always been an important area, but with medical marijuana growing in popularity, the ability to detect and prosecute drugged drivers is more critical than ever," Telgenhof stated in a media release. He noted that for the first time since 2007, there were 1,000 road deaths in Michigan last year. "Drugs

are a large factor," he said.

While other states offer DRE training programs, Michigan is the only one to allow prosecutors to complete the course, Telgenhof added, noting his assistant prosecutor, Martin, was a perfect candidate to participate since she has handled all cases of impaired or intoxicated driving in Charlevoix County since 2012.

"Katrina is one of the leading prosecutors in the state," Telgenhof said, "Her commitment and knowledge in the area of impaired drivers are exceptional. Our county is very lucky to have her."

During their training, Telgenhof

explained Martin and Kaminski learned how impairment is detected and observed, which will help them to discover and utilize critical information and observations from officers who have not been trained in the DRE method, even when those officers didn't think their information was relevant.

That information might include even subtle changes in a person's attitude, level of consciousness, or their ability to carry on an intelligent conversation, Telgenhof said.

He added that Kaminski's completion of the DRE training course now qualifies him to testify as a drug recognition expert in courts throughout the state of Michigan.

Failure to launch:

East Jordan pursues new boat launch location

EAST JORDAN - East Jordan city commissioners exchanged ideas at the Tuesday, February 7 meeting concerning city property sales, the Old State Bridge project, a conceptual Tourist Park boat launch, and the EMS Authority proposed budget.

Homeowners on Bridge Street recently approached the city about purchasing city-owned property that sits adjacent to their parcel. The vacant land, which sits at the corner of Bridge Street and Jordan Street, is too small to build on and offers no real benefit to the

While commissioners were in favor of selling the property, they agreed a policy concerning the sale of city property may need to be developed in the future. At the request of City Attorney Scott Beatty, the possible property sale has been tabled for a later meeting.

"I have a lot of confidence that the closure of the river will be at a minimal amount that is not going to affect the summer traffic," City Administrator Tom Cannon said. "However, there will be a few days in the spring when there will be heavy equipment."

The Old State Bridge will undergo renovations beginning this spring due to erosion being caused at the access site on the Jordan River from the two cul-

"I have a lot of confidence that the closure of the river will be at a minimal amount that is not going to affect the summer traffic," City Administrator Tom Cannon said. "However, there will be a few days in the spring when there will be heavy equipment."

The city continues to move forward with a conceptual plan for a new boat launch at the Tourist Park. The current boat launch. located downtown on the corner of Mill and Water streets, has not been fully operational due to low

water levels and the sand and silt that is carried into the lake from the Jordan River. Phase one for the prospective launch site would include a near \$377,000 price tag. This cost includes initial dredging of the area, construction of a parking lot and new concrete ramp, wetlands restoration, lighting, land-

scaping and more. Located near softball fields, a playground, campground, basketball and tennis courts, the new launch site would be close to recreational areas and would be less likely to fill with silt from the Jordan River, as the ramp will not sit directly at the mouth of the river. With the state's recent approval to move the launch site, commissioners approved proceeding with

the grant application

Commissioners also briefly discussed the Jordan Valley EMS Authority 2017/18 budget

John Doebel, city representative on the authority board said that the authority hopes to use some of the millage this year to pay for ambulances they have already purchased but have not yet paid off. He also commented that the authority might have the opportunity to purchase a used ambulance with low mileage from Boyne Valley at a good price.

The next regular meeting of the East Jordan City Commission is scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday, February 21, 2017.

East Jordan close schools due to flu outbreak

By Michelle Medjesky

EAST JORDAN - While medical professionals agree the peak of "flu season" is still some weeks away in this region of the country, a flu-like virus has already hit hard in parts of Charlevoix County.

Especially hard-hit was the East Jordan area last week, where so many students called in sick to school with flu-like symptoms on Thursday, February 9 that by late that afternoon, school officials decided to call off school entirely for the following day, Friday, February

East Jordan School District Superintendent Matt Stevenson said 169 East Jordan Middle and High School students called in sick

Thursday, February 10 and a number of others left school during the day. Combined enrollment at both schools stands at 900 students, he noted.

The elementary school saw far fewer number calling in or leaving school early that Thursday due to illness, however, he said.

Stevenson said those numbers don't include the number of staff also impacted by the flu outbreak, including him. "Oh yeah, it was bad. Me, my family-we all had it," he said, "It wasn't fun. I'll tell you that."

Stevenson said considering the large percentage of students and staff who called in sick or left school early that Thursday, the decision was made to call school off

on Friday to allow a 3 day weekend for recovery and for custodial staff to have time to clean and disinfect the schools and prevent further outbreak.

"This (flu) wasn't just a one or two day thing, it was a four or five day thing, so we decided to take advantage of the weekend to give people a chance to rest and recover and also so that we could use the time to really clean and disinfect (the school buildings)," he said.

Those suffering from the flu-like illness that swept through the district typically reported mostly respiratory symptoms of coughing, along with headache, fever, aches and chills.

Another component that factored into making the decision to close

schools last Friday came with how many teachers called in sick, Stevenson explained, because finding qualified substitutes in this and many other school districts in northern Michigan has become an increasingly difficult task in recent

Stevenson said since the outbreak in his district last week, he's talked to other district school superintendents in the area and so far none are seeing higher than average numbers of students and staff calling in sick for a flu-like illness.

Having reported the outbreak in his district to the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, Stevenson said officials there told him it was the first of its kind for this region so far this season.

School was back in session for all schools in the East Jordan district on Monday, February 13 and Stevenson said things were mostly back to normal, with about the usual number of students and staff calling in sick.

Whether it's bad weather or an outbreak of the flu, the superintendent said the decision to cancel classes is never an easy one to make and one that's never made without careful thought and good reason.

"Closing school wasn't the decision we wanted to make but it was the decision that we had to make because it was in the best interests of our kids," Stevenson said, "And that's what we do. We make decisions that are best for our kids."


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
