The session is set for 7pm at the temporary Boyne City Hall at 364 North Lake Street. It will be hosted by

the steering committee appointed to oversee construction of the new history museum, which is currently ongoing just across Lake Street from the temporary city hall.

The new history museum being built is part of a larger project that once complete, will emerge as the city's new municipal complex and home to the new Boyne City Hall, the history museum the city's emergency service departments. City officials say construction of the new municipal complex is on track for completion sometime by summer, 2017.

As the construction of the new history museum has progressed, the Boyne City Commission moved to seek both professional and public input in terms of its ultimate presentation and appointed a steering committee to help guide the





In Michigan, more than 800,000 men, women and children gained access to quality health coverage thanks to the Affordable Care Act. The majority of those are thanks to a tremendous bi-partisan effort led by Gov. Rick Snyder to expand Medicaid in a manner made possible by ACA funds. Our United Ways were proud to stand in support of that effort which protected both the health of our people, and the financial stability of our state. As the governor noted in his State of the State address, the number of uninsured in Michigan is now at an all-time low and unpaid medical costs

News 100 Men Campaign: helping end violence against women

The Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan (WRCNM) is in its seventh year of inviting local men to become part of the solution in ending violence against women and girls by joining the 100 Men Campaign. The campaign was initiated by the local non-profit to provide a way for men to take a public stand against the violence that impacts one in four U.S. women; mothers, sisters, daughters, granddaughters, aunts, friends and coworkers

Since joining the 100 Men Campaign, Ben and Steve Van Dam say they have a greater understanding of the issue of violence against women through events, lectures and film screenings supported by campaign funds. After viewing one of the documentaries focused on misogyny and sexism in mainstream American media, the Van Dam's decided to discontinue playing music derogatory to women at their Boyne City business, Van Dam Custom Boats.

"I really became aware of some of those subtle things in our culture and in our business that I could have an impact on-that I could make a statement here," said Steve Van Dam. "I met with shop personnel and said that we were not going to have that kind of culture.'

Ben Van Dam said he believes it is extremely important for men to speak out and take positive action to effect change in ending violence against women. "I think that one of the powerful parts about the 100 Men Campaign is just the act of making the pledge to not be silent about the issue of violence against

women and girls; to say I'm not going to sit on the sidelines while this happens," said Ben Van Dam.

The World Health Organization considers violence against women, particularly intimate partner violence and sexual violence, a major public health problem and a violation of women's human rights affecting more than one third of all women.

"Because domestic abuse and sexual assault are so pervasive it may seem difficult for men and other community members to believe they can have any impact in helping end it," said Gail Kloss, WRCNM executive director. "We strongly believe one person's actions can effect change and that men play a critical role."

"It is men's responsibility to end violence against women and girls,"

said Ben Van Dam. "I think that the actions one person can take, or the words that they say, or the way they conduct themselves will impact the person next to them and then that person will go forward and start to build a wave impacting and ending violence against women and girls."



School Group Lessons teach kids to be safe in water

School group lessons are underway at the Charlevoix Area Community Pool with over 500 kids going through the program during the months of March and April. The iSwim Safe program offers a few different options to area schools. The four-week group lesson is geared toward younger children and helps build confidence and swim skills in the water.

"This program is great for 2nd Graders. We break the kids up into different groups based on their current skill levels and their instructor helps them work on kicking, strokes, breathing, floating, diving, and more," says Chelsea Biddick, Program Coordinator. "Many have never had a lesson before, and it is perfect timing as

The Pool also provides a one time, 2-hour training on water safety and boater safety instruction. This program lends itself well to kids that already have some exposure to being in the water, and focuses on what to do if you are in open water, or if someone you know is drowning.

"We tend to have our 3rd, 4th or 5th Graders take part in this program," says Biddick. "Kids at that age often have more independence in the water, so we want to make sure they are prepared on how to be safe.

This year, the Chicago Club Fund supported the iSwim Safe program, covering all costs for 2nd Graders at Charlevoix Elementary, Charlevoix St. Mary and Charlevoix Montessori Academy for the Arts.

The Charlevoix County Community Foundation also awarded the Pool a grant to cover costs for 5th Graders at Charlevoix, Bovne Falls and Boyne City schools.

"We have several other schools participating including Ellsworth Elementary and Petoskey's Central, Ottawa and Lincoln schools. Each year we look at ways to seek additional funds for this program as it is part of our mission. We want all area kids to learn how to swim and be safe in the water."

garding the ambulance authority lease agreement that is to end in 2018 Housed in a shared space with the cityoperated fire department at 555 Maple Street, the authority leases a portion of the building for one dollar per year. The authority is responsible to cover half of all maintenance and repairs of the building, in addition to 50% of the common area, with the city's fire department fund covering the other 50%

At original negotiations in 2015, the city tossed around the idea of charging rent to the authority based on the depreciation of the building, which would amount to approximately \$1,300 per month. The authority would remain responsible for covering their share of maintenance and repairs of the building.

City Attorney Scott Beatty helped guide the commission into deciding what they thought was fair in regard to a process, rather than focusing on the detailed dollar and cents of

a city-owned building." All commissioners present voted in agreement that the city should create a long-term maintenance fund for the emergency services building; any rent charged to the authority would be put into this fund, and the city also plans to put an equal amount as the

fire department. The commission has yet to decide the details concerning rent that may be charged to the authority or what sort of cap might be put in place concerning a maintenance fund.

Through proper colorectal cancer screening, doctors can find and remove hidden growths (called "polyps") in the colon before they become cancerous. Removing polyps can prevent cancer altogether.


