A sign posted in the bathrooms at Boyne City's temporary city hall facility on Lake Street warns not to use water for drinking or cooking. The water at the south end of the rented building has tested for elevated levels of lead since city offices temporarily relocated there last year but do not reflect the quality of the city's water.

BOYNE CITY - Signs posted at the temporary city hall building on Lake Street warning of high level of lead found in the water there should not concern residents that the same may be true of the city's water supply.

Boyne City city manager Michael Cain assured that the high level of lead found in water at the temporary city hall building is "a unique situation" that in no way impacts the high quality of the city's drinking water system, which is routinely and rigidly tested.

What makes the situation unique at the temporary city hall, Cain explained, is that only the water at the south side of the building tested high for levels of lead, while elsewhere in the building the range was within acceptable testing range.

Cain said water quality at the building was tested when city offices relocated there last spring, where they remain while a new city hall is constructed across the street.

He said that's when it was discovered that water at the south end of the building contained higher levels of lead than are acceptable. The amount of lead in the water at the south end tested at 31 ppb (parts per billion) or more than twice the 15 ppb Federal action level.

Cain said the pipes at the south end evidently are of a different condition than in the rest of the building. He stressed that water tested nearby and elsewhere in the city does not contain elevated levels of lead and continues to be safe for drinking, cooking and other everyday

In terms of employees and others who use the temporary city hall facility, Cain said signs are posted and other precautionary measures have been taken to alert them to the high lead levels in the water. He said the water pipes are also flushed for 10-15 minutes each morning and handsanitizer is provided. "And we all drink Culligan water," he said.

Cain said since the city does not own the building, it has no plans to try to replace or otherwise repair the pipes at the south end so the water there does not continue to test so high for lead. He noted the city's offices and emergency departments will only be stationed at the building until mid-summer, when the new city hall complex under construction across the street is expected to be complete. Cain said work on that project continues to move on schedule and according

Former youth pastor sentenced to prison

BOYNE CITY - A Boyne City man and former youth pastor has been

sentenced to prison for secretly video recording two teenage sisters while they were showering during a family visit to his home ear lier this year.

Benoni Jonathan Enciso, 49, of Bovne City. was sentenced



sentenced to prison in Charlevoix Court last week.

last week by Charlevoix Circuit Court Judge Roy C. Hayes III to serve 24-48 months in prison for possession of child sexually abusive material. Benoni also was sentenced to serve 12 months concurrently on counts of surveilling an unclothed person, using/installing a device for eavesdropping.

A charge of using a computer to commit a crime was dismissed when Enciso pleaded guilty to the eavesdropping charge in early April as art of a plea agreement reached with the Charlevoix County Prosecuting Attornev's office.

Boyne City police arrested Enciso earlier this year after two teenage sisters reported finding a cellphone video recording of themselves showering at his home where they had been visiting with their family.

According to court documents and testimony, the sisters, ages 18 and 15 and their family met Enciso met about five years ago when he was youth pastor at a church they attended downstate.

The family remained friends with Enciso through the years and were visiting him at his home in Boyne City in February when the incident

Court documents showed one of the sisters stated that after using the shower at Enciso's home during that visit, she found a cellphone inside a glass door in a bathroom cabinet and discovered video recordings of herself and her younger sister showering. The girl alerted her parents who turned the phone's video recordings over to police and Enciso was arrested shortly thereafter.

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

Peer Mentoring Program at Ellsworth Community School

As the 2016/17 school year winds to a close, so does the "Boys Club" peermentoring program at Ellsworth Community School. This mentoring program was established as a pilot program in the fall of 2016.

"The peer mentoring program at ECS started as an idea brought to me by one of our elementary school teachers last spring," said ECS Superintendent, Aaron Gaffney. "It quickly grew from a small pilot program into an unbelievable success story for both the mentors and the mentees alike."

For the 2016/17 school year ECS paired 20 upper elementary boys with 20 boys from the high school. In addition to spending 45 minutes per week interacting on the playground and cafeteria during lunch and recess, the students also participated in several team-building workshops with Camp Daggett Adventure Center staff as well as outings to the movies and bowling alley

"Our initial goal was to provide positive role models for some of our upper elementary boys," Gaffney indicated. "While this certainly happened, what surprised us the most was how much benefit the older boys took from the program."

"My involvement in the Boy's Club Program has been an experience that I wouldn't take back," said ECS Junior Josh Light. "I feel like I have positively helped my mentee by him becoming more social and opening up. And it's even helped myself develop social skills with the younger age group."

Fellow junior Collin Ingalls agrees. "When I started boys club I was just expecting to be a role model for the kid I was paired up with, which sounded pretty cool. What I didn't realize was how much it would affect me. The difference it's made in the feeling of this school year to me has been incredible. It's been awesome opportunity."

The ECS staff has noticed the difference as well. "The Boys Club Mentoring Program has been a great success this year! The mentees in the program look forward to the days their mentors meet with them and as a result look forward to coming to school and seeing

their 'big buddies'," said ECS third grade teacher Christy Griffin. "I have also noticed an increase in the mentees' self-esteem, as they demonstrate an overall sense of belonging. It has been a rewarding experience to be part of and I'm grateful to work for an innovative school district that is willing to implement new programs for our students."

Fifth grade teacher Jessica Vallance has also noticed the positive impacts on both groups of boys. "Our boys club peer mentoring program has been a great benefit to not only the younger boys, but also to the other students that the "bigs" interact with. Our boys are more engaged and are learning skills to better communicate with others when there is a disagreement. The 'bigs' have had a huge positive impact on the 'littles' and are great role models for behaviors and academics."

Junior Ian MacNicol summed up the program by saying, "I've really enjoyed being able to connect with someone younger than me, and seeing their face light up when I walk in the room. I hope to be a good role model for my buddy and teach him important skills that he'll appreciate later in life."

ECS hopes to continue and expand on the program for next school year. "For the current year we really wanted to focus on implementing a quality program and therefore limited the number of students involved," indicated Gaffney. "Our plan for next is to involve more students and also to include a 'Girls Club' in the program's structure."

ECS plans to continue working with Camp Daggett to provide training and support for the mentors as they learn the skills necessary for being a positive mentor and role model.

Ellsworth Community School offers expanded electives

Ellsworth Community School will be offering several new elective opportunities to high school students for the upcoming 2017/18 school year.

At the high school level new elective options will include Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) Aviation, Life Skills, Advanced Physical Fitness, and direct credit college courses through Alpena Community College. These new courses will be offered in addition to the current elective slate that includes Band, Art, Graphic Design, Construction, and Agriscience. The new course offerings come in part from student requests for more variety in the curriculum.

"Earlier this spring I personally met for two to three hours with every grade level from sixth through twelfth grade," said ECS Superintendent, Aaron Gaffney "These 'student feedback forums' were a way to gauge what students liked and didn't like about ECS. One of the themes that was common across all grade levels was an interest in having more elective opportunities during the regular school year."

Students specifically asked about elective options such as physical education, life skills, and expanded access to college

"Thanks to the financial support of our school board, we will be adding a new full-time teacher to our staff next year," Gaffnev stated. "Having another staff member will allow us to offer both middle and high school PE electives."

Other classes being added such as Life Skills and UAV Aviation are being made possible by restructuring schedules using current staff.

"The UAV class is particularly

exciting," Gaffney indicated. "Thanks to a partnership with CharEm ISD we will be able to offer this stand-alone elective class which will lead to students obtaining their commercial unmanned aerial vehicle pilots license."

Middle and high school science teacher, Clayton Faivor, will teach the UAV class. Currently, Mr. Faivor is teaching a drone exploration class during the district's Lancer Leap proj-

"The class next year will be an online curriculum through the Unmanned Safety Institute, where students will complete 155 study hours along with a proctored exam to earn a sUAS safety certificate along with college credit." said Faivor. "We will also be partnering with Northwestern Michigan College so the students will have the chance to get their remote pilots license which allows them to fly a UAV for commercial purposes."

The new Life Skills elective is being added by student request. "One of the most surprising things that came out of our

"One of the most surprising things that came out of our brainstorming sessions with students was their interest in having a life skills class," said Gaffney. "The students wanted a class where they learned how to balance a checkbook, change a tire, and sew on a button. They're all skills that would have been taught in schools before the Michigan Merit Curriculum started placing a majority of the focus on college prep courses."

Finally, students requested increased access to college courses during the school day. In past years high school students have the opportunity to take Baker College classes. However, changes in certification laws have made it difficult for Baker College to find in-

"As a result of the changes to certification rules, we've had to branch out and seek other dual enrollment options for our students," said Gaffney. "After reaching out to several local community colleges, we found that Alpena Community College would offer the most flexible and financially affordable solu-

Students in grades 10-12 who meet established PSAT/SAT score requirements will now have the option to take several online college courses on the ECS campus including English Composition, Psychology, and Sociology. Each of these new electives, along with current offerings, is reflective of the school district's motto "Small School Relationships ... Big School Opportunities!'

"We're always looking for new ways to provide opportunities for students outside of the core areas," Gaffney shared. "Thankfully we've been able to maintain our traditional elective options such as band and art. while adding new programs. In the past few years we've added classes in agriculture and construction. These new classes will only lead to more and better choices for students.'

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Sunset Coast Birding Trail dedication on June 10

The public is invited to the official opening of the Michigan Sunset Coast Birding Trail, on Saturday, June 10 at 11am at the Charlevoix Township Hall, 12491 Waller Rd. There will be a brief presentation, introduction of the team who organized the trail, recognition of trail sponsors and partners and a ribbon cut-

The trail covers Antrim, Charlevoix and Emmet Counties, as they host a wide variety of protected areas and habitats that attract a large number of Michigan's 400-plus bird species. It is not a physical trail, but a collection of local parks, nature preserves, and natural areas where prime birding locations are easily accessible.

The Sunset Coast Birding Trail features 35 primary sites on a website, printed maps, and with signage at location. Many additional secondary sites which offer

great birding opportunities are featured on the website only. A number of birding walks will be offered for a week after the dedication. Visit www.sunsetcoastbirdingtrail.org for details.

Prior to the Trail Dedication, there will be a morning bird walk at nearby Charlevoix Northpoint Nature Area from 8:30am to 10:30am. Experienced bird guides will lead the first official field trip for the Sunset Coast Birding Trail, and will identify numerous bird species and explore coastal wetlands, forested dunes, sand and cobble beach, and cedar swamp.

Wear appropriate apparel for the weather, bring bug spray, water and binoculars. Contact Darrell Lawson at lawsodw@gmail.com for further details. Meet at the parking lot located behind Mt. McSauba.

A number of key organizations sponsored the trail, they include: Petoskey/Har-

bor Springs Community Foundation, Petoskey Area Visitors Bureau, Michigan DNR, Charlevoix Area Visitors Bureau and Petoskey Regional Audubon Society. The trail has a number of partners, including: Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy, Grass River Natural Area, Little Traverse Conservancy, Michigan Audubon and Walloon Lake Land Trust and Conservancy.

Millions of migratory birds pass through the Great Lakes region during their spring and fall migrations, making Michigan uniquely positioned as a birding destination. This trail joins the other seven established birding trails in Michigan: Superior Birding Trail in EUP. Saginaw Bay Birding Trail, Sleeping Bear Birding Trail, Beaver Island Birding Trail, Sunrise Coast Trail, North Huron Birding Trail and Sunset Coast Birding Trail.=

Neither of the victims attended Enciso's sentencing last week, however, their parents told the court about the extensive impact the incident has had on the family.

A tearful Enciso apologized numerous times for his actions prior to sentencing. Judge Hayes said he considered the numerous letters of support he received for Enciso and the positive factors

he has demonstrated in his

In the weeks prior to his sentencing, 20 additional charges against Enciso surfaced in Emmet County alleging he made secretive videos of four teenagers at a home in Bay View in Petoskey in 2015. Two of those teenagers are the same sisters Enciso secretly videotaped in the Boyne City case

If convicted of these most recent charges, Enciso could face even longer maximum time in prison.

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
