Little did those participants expect that eighty-seven years later that lighted boat parade tradition would continue as the closing ceremony for the annual Charlevoix Venetian Festival. Today, the Venetian Festival has grown to feature just over a week of athletic events, top-notch live entertainment, lots of activities for the kids, a Queen's Coronation, Artisan's Market, a street parade, carnival rides, games at Castle Farms, and more. As might be expected, water celebrations are a huge part of the Festival and in-

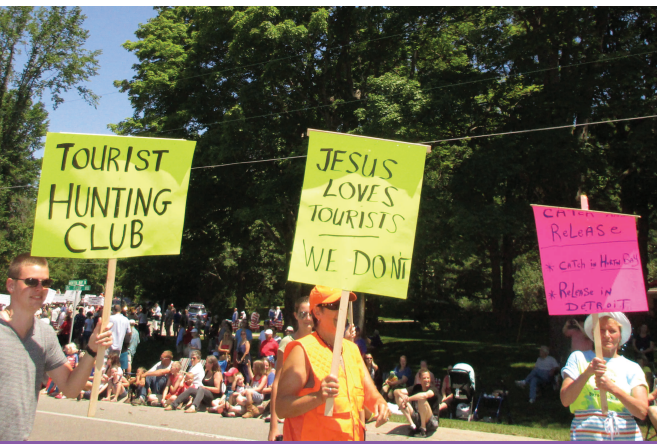

she glowed with joy.

Funny thing, that is precisely what a new study in the journal *Neuron* found when researchers from the University of Colorado, Boulder used functional MRIs to track brain activity in response to alarming events. They saw empathic distress and empathetic care trigger distinct brain patterns.

Empathy-with-distress — you feel terrible for the person(s) going through a negative experience — makes you want to avoid dealing with the situation. Empathy-with-care, on the other hand, is evoked when you act to help the person or situation. In short, no use crying over spilled milk; just help clean it up. You'll feel better, and so will the person in crisis.

The research team is now evaluating a four-week program of meditation to see if such a routine can help caretaking professionals feel less empathy-with-distress and more empathy-with-care. That should help. Regularly meditating also can help you cope with upsetting world events, violence (even at a distance) or strife in your own life or the lives of those close to you. So can volunteering with groups that help others on a daily basis. Research shows that such generosity eases stress, makes you healthier and happier and gives you a younger RealAge.

in a spate of wild mushroom poisonings this year. Seems a bumper crop of the world's deadliest fungus, *Amanita phalloides*, has fooled a lot of people with its "looks like one that's good for you" disguise.

That's why when it comes to YOU wandering into the woods to do some mushroom picking, we think the National Capital Poison Center has got it right:

1. NEVER pick and eat wild mushrooms unless they're identified by an expert in local fungi (even they can get fooled!)

2. Cooking doesn't make a poisonous mushroom safe; even breathing in cooking fumes from some can poison you.

3. Remember: There are old mushroom hunters, and there are bold mushroom hunters. But there are no old, bold mushroom hunters!

But we don't want that to turn you off to the nutrition and flavor packed into safe-eatin' 'shrooms. They're the only vegan source of vitamin D! Plus every cup of chopped mushrooms delivers a slew of polyphenols, B vitamins (riboflavin, folate, thiamine, pantothenic acid and niacin) and some potassium, copper, iron, choline and phosphorus. Reishi, shiitake and maitake mushrooms contain beta-glucan that helps lower insulin resistance and boosts the immune system in fighting cancer.

So pick up some mushrooms in the grocery store. Add them to sauces, every salad (they mix well with walnuts), brown rice or whole-wheat pasta dishes. Go ahead, be bold!

Beware sun poisoning

In the 2007 movie "The Heartbreak Kid," Ben Stiller plays Eddie, a 40-year-old who marries seemingly perfect Lila after dating for only six weeks. On their honeymoon, he discovers that she's impossible to live with. At the beach, as she rubs mineral oil on herself, Eddie tells her she needs sunscreen. "The sun is really different down here," he says. "The sun is the sun, Eddie," Lila retorts. That night Lila is a brutal shade of red.

Sun poisoning is no joke. It starts with a seemingly allergic reaction caused by extended exposure of the skin to strong UV light. That exposure triggers blistering, hives, swelling of the face, fever and chills, nausea, headache, even confusion — and raises your risk of skin cancer. If you have a sunburn and are also having those symptoms, get medical care immediately. Acute sun poisoning (which may be accompanied by heatstroke) can be treated by keeping open blisters and wounds clean and covered and through light therapy (ironic) if needed and medications.

To prevent sun poisoning, use an SPF 30 sunscreen with micronized

zinc oxide and limit sun exposure, especially between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Also find out if any of your meds, such as certain acne drugs, antibiotics, antidepressants, heart meds and some birth control, make your skin more sensitive to UV rays. If you have certain conditions, such as lupus or eczema, be aware that you're at increased risk. Always smart: Drink 8 to 24 ounces of water an hour when in temperatures greater than 84 degrees.

Brave Hearts Bow Bonanza

Public Welcome to Pellston 3-D Archery Course

With a slight stretch of the imagination it's a scene straight out of Jurassic Park. A young boy and his father using the only weapons at their disposal—recurve and compound bows—in an attempt of fend off a charging Velociraptor dinosaur.

This scenario did not occur on a fictitious tropical island where DNA manipulation has recreated the long-lost giant reptiles, but among the rolling hills of the Maple River valley in Pellston.

The father and son are Paul and Cameron Bricker of Petoskey. Their adventure involved target practice at the remarkable 3-D archery course at Brave Hearts Estate. Fortunately, the aforementioned raptor is one of the targets and is made of self-healing foam rather than talons, teeth, and scales.

The course boasts 30 targets and is both creative and challenging. It resulted from a partnership between two veterans-oriented non-profit organizations: Operation Injured Soldiers (OIS) and Camp Cuervo. The generous folks at Camp Cuervo, as well as the Huron Pointe Sportsman's Association, Lapeer Sportsman's Association, and Gilbert's Sportsman Club, have donated the majority of the top-of-the-line targets by Rinehart and Delta Mckenzie. Camp Cuervo—an organization whose mission it is to increase troop morale through archery—has sent archery gear to military bases all over the world and sponsors shooting competitions throughout the U.S. (campcuervo.org).

Camp Cuervo president John Vasos said, "When we went to set up the course the response from local and state sportsmen was incredible. People came together and provided almost \$30,000.00 in materials and labor for the Brave Hearts course. Even the Michigan State Police donated a few targets!"

Vasos added that they hope to bring more disabled soldiers to the facility including those training for Paralympic competitions.

Aaron Keiser, Camp Cuervo pro staffer and course designer said, "This is the second season for the course. We tried to set it up to imitate realistic hunting. We've cleared shooting lanes but the targets are in a natural setting which participants seem to really like."

The variety of targets is impressive and range from a cinnamon bear to a wild boar, and a turkey to a mountain lion. There's even a carp that has apparently evolved from an aquatic to a terrestrial creature. An interesting anecdote is that the morning after placing the black bear target the gentlemen noticed that a tree near the target was laced with

black bear claw marks. Obviously, a resident bear was scoping out the new intruder in his territory!

Eight-year old Cameron said, "I really like walking the trails with my dad. My favorite target I shot was the carp!"

Veterans can shoot the course for free but the public is also very welcome. A \$10.00 donation is suggested that helps maintain the course and for the purchase of new targets. There's a cash box, scoring cards, insurance forms, and other information just inside the office door on the big red barn west of the house. A bonus is that anyone filling out the paperwork is automatically entered in a raffle for a Lonesome Wind longbow courtesy of Camp Cuervo.

The course covers a one mile loop of well groomed trails that meander through lush forests, marsh lands, and high terrain grasslands. The meadows have been planted with acres of crops to attract wildlife by the Tip of the Mitt Quality Deer Management Association.

If you're a veteran, with a 100% disability, become a member of OIS and join them for the Liberty Hunt at Brave Hearts the weekend of September 16-17 (injuredsoldiers.org). The property features 5-easily accessed deer blinds, including a new handicapped-accessible blind crafted by the building-trades students from Petoskey High School. There will be plenty of helpers at the facility during the Liberty Hunt to assist disabled hunters.

Brave Hearts will also serve disabled veterans during the Independence Hunt October 19-22, 2017. Hunter's odds are great as the rarely-hunted property harbors several large bucks and plenty of doe. Contact OIS at (248) 437-3130 with questions or to register for either hunt.

So, if you like to shoot a bow (no crossbows allowed because of the damage they can do to the targets), or need some practice before deer season, mosey on over to Brave Hearts to give it a go. The course is open Thursday through Monday on a self-serve basis for walk-ins. Brave Hearts Estate is located at 4171 Ely Road in Pellston. It's just two miles west of US-31 down from the airport. Park your vehicle in front of the red barn and check in at the office. More information is available at the Brave Hearts 3-D Archery Course Facebook page.

Brave Hearts Estate was donated to OIS by a philanthropic Korean War veteran. Soldiers, and their families, stay completely free and are treated to a relaxing bed-and-breakfast style experience. Caretakers Paula and Mike Brown are two of the nicest and most accommodating folks you will ever come across.

If you decide to shoot the course, or to join Brave Hearts for any of the veteran hunting events, I guarantee it won't be your last time visiting this one-of-a-kind facility!

Martin, 54, is a certified recovery coach, a peer recovery support services speaker and has 29 years of experience in personal recovery. Jennifer will work as an assistant in the office and help with women's support services at BASES.

Currier, 35, comes to BASES after working the last 10 years as a jour-

nalist. Craig moved to northwest Michigan from California in 2014 and was assistant editor at the Petoskey News-Review until joining BASES staff in April.

They join Celia Partida-Kelly, Leah Kelly, Gerry McAvoy and Executive Director, Scott Kelly, who commented "with these additions,

our staff becomes a more highly qualified, caring and supportive staff to meet the changing needs of our local communities."

BASES counseling staff members are also working in local schools—Harbor Springs High School, Boyne City High School and the Morgan Shaw School in Boyne City—as part of the agency's Life Skills Program.

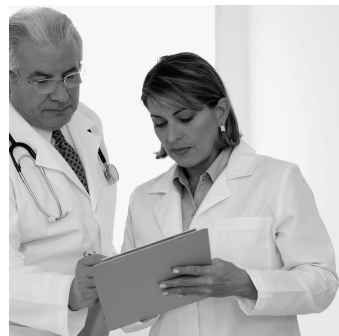
Counseling staff members lead separate weekly groups for men and women in the Charlevoix County Jail, as well.

BASES also offers extensive drug testing services including 10-panel lab tests, 10-panel instant tests, long-term alcohol tests (EtG) and breathalyzers during all hours of operation. Drug testing services are utilized by businesses, families, schools and numerous court systems. For those having to drug test outside of our normal business hours, BASES may be able to accommodate their needs if arrangements are made in advance with BASES staff.

In late August, BASES Recovery Center plans to begin a Domestic Violence Batters Intervention Program with weekly men's group meetings.

BASES is a CARF-accredited facility and has been added to the provider panel for the Northern Michigan Regional Entity. With these changes, BASES is able to accept some publicly funded insurances like Medicaid, Healthy Michigan, MICHild and others.

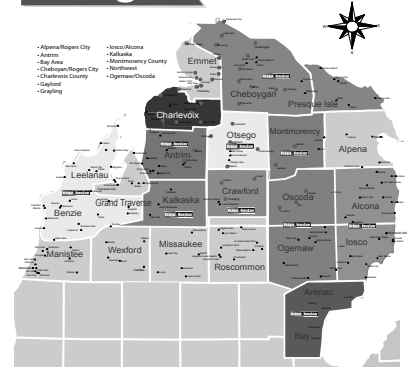

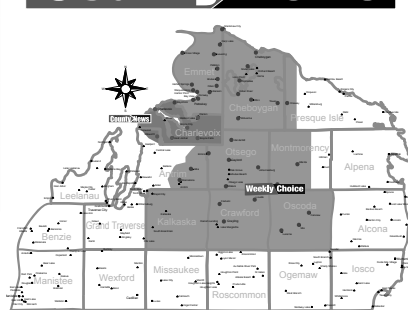

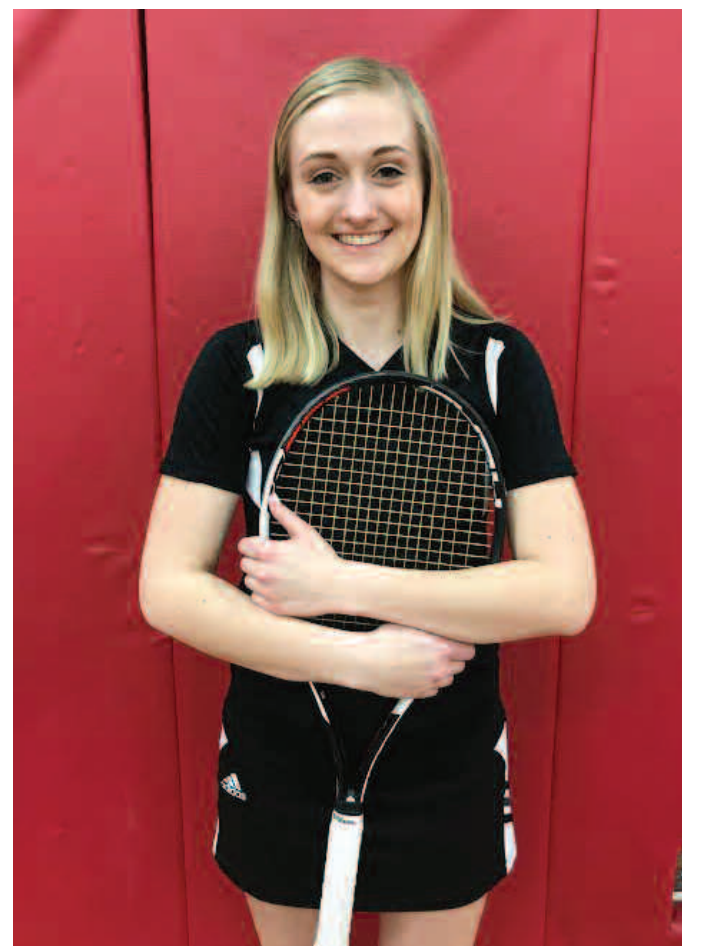
