**SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE AT 30TH ANNUAL FLYWHEELERS SHOW**

Several new offerings will be added to celebrate the 30th show of the Northern Michigan Antique-Flywheelers Club this coming weekend, July 27-30. A tractor drive-in movie, a weekend pass, and a rare 105-year-old tractor will be available to enjoy along with tractor parades, a flea market, arts and crafts, and demonstrations.

For the first time this year, a free outdoor "tractor drive-in movie" will be showing "The Little Rascals" at dusk on Thursday, July 27. For those without a tractor to drive, blanket and lawn chair seating will be welcomed. Hailey Vollmer, 18, Carrie Butka, 17, and Courtney Cole, 19, a few younger members of the club, came up with the idea for the movie.

"We thought it would be a fun addition to the show to have an outdoor movie," explained Vollmer. "There will be snacks for sale during the movie and there is food available to purchase if people want to arrive early and have dinner but the movie is free. We thought this would be a great family event to add for our 30th show."

An exhibit of a restored 1912 Twin City 40-65 will be another highlight of this year's show. This 105-year-old tractor is one of only a handful still in existence and is owned by Dr. Mike Harmeling of Boyne City. Tractors manufactured by Twin City and Minneapolis Moline are featured at this year's show.

Some favorite demonstrations and displays will include blacksmithing, a sawmill, a shingle mill, a gristmill, antique automobiles, and the veneer mill and basket factory. Branding, thresh-

ing, museums, and a working barber-shop are available also.

Located on US 131 between Boyne Falls and Walloon Lake, the club hosts the annual event to show visitors a glimpse of life in rural northern Michigan as it was in the early part of the last century. The show runs daily from 9am to 5pm with an all-you-can-eat breakfast starting at 7 AM. Seniors' Day will return for the second year on Thursday with senior admission discounted from \$7 to \$5 and a new Weekend Pass will be available that provides all four days of admission for only \$20.

The Northern Michigan Antique-

Flywheelers Club, an educational non-profit organization, uses demonstrations and displays to showcase "Life in the Past Lane." It holds an annual show the last full weekend of July and hosts more than a thousand area fourth graders in September for Student Harvest Days. ## Northern Homes receives grant to help families buy homes

Northern Homes CDC has received a \$120,000 HOME grant from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority, MSDHA, to help 3 local families become homeowners. The grant is part of MSDHA's Homebuyer Purchase Rehab, HPR, program.

The HPR grant was awarded by MSDHA's Housing Initiatives Division using HUD HOME funds. To qualify, families must earn less than 80% of the area median income, based on family size and be able to qualify for a mortgage. For example, to be eligible for this program a family of 4 people purchasing a home in Emmet County can have an income no greater than \$50,800. The grant funds can help a family with closing costs on the purchase of a home and up to \$25,000 in rehabilitation costs on the home they purchase.

Jane MacKenzie, Executive Director of Northern Homes, said "With this grant we can help 3 families purchase a home with up to \$10,000 in down payment and closing cost assistance and up to \$20,000 in rehabilitation costs on the home they want to buy. The home they buy must be in the city limits of Alanson, Petoskey, Boyne City, East Jordan or Charlevoix."

In 2016 Northern Homes helped Robert Merrill buy a home in Boyne City using the HPR program.

He states, "Being a first time home buyer I was a little apprehensive of what I could actually afford, including the upkeep, and all the bills to follow. Talking to Gail Greenwell from Real Estate One, she suggested I talk with Northern Homes and maybe they could help me. She explained they had a great class where I would learn important home-ownership information. Northern Homes also had a little money to assist in the down payment, along with paying for some of the major rehab expenses of this particular home I was looking at."

Merrill continues. "I couldn't wait. I signed up for their class, which opened my eyes on some things I hadn't thought about, and proceeded to watch my new investment grow even better than planned. The builder, Thor Contracting, did a great job in a timely fashion. Northern Homes kept a close eye over all the renovations throughout the whole process. This program not only helped me, but also helped update a tired house of our great town. A win-win for everyone (especially me). What a great way for a first time buyer to experience this big event."

## Musical tribute to lumberjacks at Hartwick Pines

GRAYLING – Escanaba-based singer and storyteller Bill Jamerson will present an hour-long musical tribute to Michigan lumberjacks Saturday, July 29, at 6:30 p.m. at Hartwick Pines State Park in Grayling.

The program will be performed outside in the amphitheater near the Logging Museum, or inside the visitor center in the event of rain. The program is free and open to the public, but a Recreation Passport is required to enter Hartwick Pines State Park.

With guitar in hand and dressed in costume, Jamerson sings traditional lumberjack songs and tells stories about life in the lumber camps. He takes his audience on a musical journey with songs about working in the woods, living in a bunkhouse, the hardships of river drives, the importance of camp food and going into town in the spring.

Most of the lumberjacks were newly arrived immigrants who brought a zest for living and a hunger for the American dream. The majority came

to America to become homesteaders. Many lumberjacks who acquired property for farming continued to spend their winters working in the logging camps for extra income. Jamerson shares many stories he has learned firsthand from the men who worked in the woods and from family members.

The program features traditional lumberjack songs that were passed from camp to camp. Some of the songs include "A Lumberjack's Life," which tells of the hardships of working in the cold; "Jack Haggerty," the story of a broken-hearted river man; and "Jolly Shanty Boy," which explores the revelry when lumberjacks blew into town. "A Shanty Boy in the Pines" tells of the many jobs in the woods, while "Shanty Boy Wins" tells of the rivalry between farmers and lumberjacks. The songs range from foot-stomping jigs to soulful ballads.

The presentation also will include entertaining and educational stories of lumberjacks' strength, wit and charm.

Jamerson – who has produced 11 documentaries for public television and CDs of his songs and authored a historical novel about the Civilian Conservation Corps – also presents musical programs about iron miners, the CCC and ski jumpers. ## Hemingway statue unveiled in Pennsylvania Park in Petoskey

Dozens of Ernest Hemingway fans gathered in downtown Petoskey's Pennsylvania Park on Friday, July 21 to witness the unveiling of a new statue in honor of the well-known author's famous ties to this city. The statue was commissioned several years ago by late local businessman and Bay View resident Robert Jensen "Jack" Dau, former president of Wood-Welded International, the marketing arm of Michigan Maple Block and Bally Block Companies, based in Petoskey and Pennsylvania, respectively.

Dau's daughter, Fernanda Dau Fisher, said her father, an acclaimed art collector who was especially fond of sculptures, commissioned and offered to pay for a life-sized bronze sculpture of Ernest Hemingway to be placed somewhere in Petoskey in honor of his early days spent in the city writing some of his first works. Although the Hem-

ingway family's primary residence was in Oak Park, Illinois in the early 1900s, they also owned-and the family continues to maintain-a cottage on nearby Walloon Lake, where every summer was spent.

As a young man in his early 20s, Ernest Hemingway went off to serve in World War I but when he returned, he came to live briefly in downtown Petoskey at a home on State Street where it's thought that his life's calling as a writer evolved and he started to pen some of his earliest literary works.

Hemingway made the most out of Petoskey while he lived downtown; speaking about his war experience at the Carnegie Library and frequenting the city's bars and restaurants as well.

Although her father passed away in November, 2015 at age 84 and did not live to see the Hemingway sculpture he commissioned unveiled, his daughter said he knew it was nearing completion before he died and she believes he was smiling over

last week's ceremony in spirit.

"He knew it was close...My dad didn't get a chance to see him, but I know he would have loved him," Dau Fisher said of the statue.

Artist Andy Sacksteder said he sculpted a younger image of Hemingway since that's when he surfaced and by all accounts started his writing career in Petoskey, which is unique since most people tend to recognize him "as the older bearded, 'Papa' version of Ernest Hemingway."

"My hope is that the viewers' curiosity will draw them to the statue, first of all, and then to learning about young Ernest and his ties to the beautiful region around Petoskey," Sacksteder said.

The sculpture was unveiled in downtown Petoskey's Pennsylvania Park on Friday, July 21st in honor of the anniversary of Hemingway's 118th Birthday. Petoskey Mayor John Murphy officially declared July 21st "Young Ernest Hemingway Day".

Here in Northern Michigan, Goodwill opened their doors at Asgard Enterprises in 1972, and today the non-profit organization offers vocational, housing, transportation, nutritional and family strengthening programs across the region.

### What not to eat when you're flying

In the often-hilarious 2006 movie "Snakes on a Plane" you discover just how tough it is to get rid of a load of poisonous snakes during a commercial flight. However, there is one moment when a male flight attendant finds a possible solution: He puts a menacing reptile in a microwave and is very thankful to discover that there's a preset button on the machine marked "Snake."

Unfortunately, if you're on a plane and are the source of menace to those around you because your digestive tract is acting up, there's no push-button solution. So, to avoid flatulence and other such problems, here's what NOT to eat before you board:

To spare your fellow passengers, ditch foods that expand your intestines, leading to bloat and gas. Lower cabin pressures mean the gases in your body are already expanding; don't egg them on by eating onions, cauliflower, cabbage or beans, or by drinking soda.

Avoid foods packed with sodium and saturated fat. Fast and fried foods are hard to digest, especially at high altitudes, and that can cause cramping and smells. Plus, there's a risk for you: Saturated fat contributes to constricted blood flow in a matter of hours, which can lead to swollen feet and can increase the risk of a blood clot.

Skip alcohol: It's easy to get woozy at 35,000 feet, and the dry, recirculating air in the cabin can dehydrate you. Don't be a sloppy seatmate; avoid a hangover! Stick with 12 ounces of water per hour.

### Yoga for back pain

In one episode of the TV show "Louie," comedian Louis C.K.'s character is suffering from back pain. His doctor says there's nothing he can do to ease the discomfort, because "the back isn't done evolving yet... it's gonna take another, I'd say, 20,000 years to get straightened out." The only thing the doc suggests is that Louie try "walking" on all fours.

Wrong! There's a lot you can do to feel better! Ninety percent of low-back pain can be eased or banished completely using stress management, exercise and meds, such as nonsteroidal anti-inflammatories and/or muscle relaxers.

Your first move: Stress management, followed by physical therapy. But don't worry if your insurance doesn't cover it. You may pay for one session out-of-pocket (\$75 to \$125) to learn basic stretches you can do at home, or you can try yoga. According to a study in the Annals of Internal Medicine, yoga, which combines stress management and physical activity, is just as effective as physical therapy for easing back pain, improving movement and reducing use of

pain medications. Researchers followed 320 people with back pain for 12 weeks. The participants received PT, weekly yoga classes or educational materials on back pain. By the end, both the yoga and PT groups had equally beneficial outcomes - and benefits lasted for a year after the study!

Tip: If you decide to try yoga, tell your instructor about your back problems, and discuss what you can/should or can't/shouldn't do. You also can find online videos with yoga routines tailored to back pain.

Protect yourself from damaging personal care products!

In the 1998 comedy "There's Something About Mary," Chris Elliot's character, Woogie, breaks out in "love blisters" (hives) every time he encounters Mary (Cameron Diaz). But for most folks it's much harder to predict what will trigger an unpleasant skin reaction, especially when it comes to encounters with personal hygiene products and makeup.

According to a new report in Jama Internal Medicine online, adverse reactions to personal care products are underreported, and the industry is underregulated. Dr. Steve Xu, the study's lead author, said that in Europe they've banned 1,000 chemicals from personal care products; in the U.S. only 10 are forbidden. The most common troublemakers (we know about) are hair and skin care products - triggering rashes, hair loss and other dermatological problems.

A recent Food and Drug Administration statement illustrates this point: "As of November 15, 2016, the FDA had received 1,386 adverse event reports directly from consumers about WEN by Chaz Dean Cleansing Conditioner products... We also are investigating more than 21,000 complaints reported directly to Chaz Dean, Inc., and Guthy Renker, LLC..." The company hadn't voluntarily informed the FDA, and the product is still being

sold. The FDA cannot order a mandatory recall of a harmful cosmetic product!

So how can you know if a personal care product is safe for you? Try an at-home patch test before using it. Apply and leave the product on the inside of your forearm for 24 hours. It's not an overly sensitive area, so if the product triggers a reaction there, chances are you're at risk for a true allergic reaction.

### Venturing for more veggies

We could make this week's nutritional tip "Venturing for More Veggies" sound like a pronunciation from "The Big Bang Theory's" Dr. Sheldon Cooper (Jim Parsons): "Are you aware that on Mars, as on Earth, eating five to nine servings of fruits and vegetables a day can reduce your risk of cardiovascular disease by up to 40 percent? Well it caaan." But just knowing that may not be enough to get your kids (or you) to eat life-extending, delicious produce.

Well, a highly effective strategy was recently uncovered by scientists at Stanford University. They figured out how to get students, teachers and staff at one of the undergrad dining halls to pile more veggies on their plates:

Get Decadent. For their study, they labeled vegetables at the self-serve food stations with: 1. just their names (carrots, broccoli, etc.); 2. info on what they didn't contain (e.g. sugar-free, low-fat); 3. what they contained that was good for you (lots of antioxidants and vitamins); and 4. what they called "decadent" names, such as Twisted Citrus Glazed Carrots. Guess what? The foods with the decadent labels were gobbled up; they "outperformed all others."

So if you have picky eaters, take a page from this marketing study and serve your family clearly labeled Rambunctious Rutabaga or Boisterous Broccoli - and don't stop with the veggies. Offer Colin, your picky eater, Colin's Crazy Cod and/or fish-averse Suzie a Superstar Salmon. You may find that you and your family get a big bang out of eating such tasty, body-lovin' foods.





Use your imagination and pretend that you are your favorite player and talk a little smack when you score on your opponent, but be careful, that can work the other way as well.


### Wiffle Ball
