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**Boyne City Hall complex opens**

BOYNE CITY - It was a picture-perfect beginning on a picture-perfect summer evening for the dozens of area residents and city officials who turned out last Friday to celebrate the opening of Boyne City's picture-perfect new \$7 million city hall facility.

State Senator Wayne Schmidt (-R) and State Representative Triston Cole (-R) also attended the open house ceremony and spoke in tribute to the completion of the new city hall complex, which took just more than a year to build but years longer to orchestrate.

Schmidt and Cole both lauded the community for joining forces in getting the project done-from approving its funding to hiring locally to get it built. From start to finish, Schmidt described the new city hall as, "another great example of northwest Michigan coming together."

Cole listed the number of local workers, contractors and suppliers who worked on the project and pointed to how the building's completion "accents all the good things" Boyne City represents.

Schmidt also noted the "million dollar view" from the new city commissioner's meeting room on the fac-

ility's second floor and its adjacent outdoor public patio overlooking Lake Charlevoix.

"I know where I'm going to be having my coffee hours from now on..." he laughed.

Boyne City Mayor Tom Neidhamer explained to the crowd how the new city hall complex-which now houses the city's administrative offices, police, fire and EMS staff, the MSU extension of-

fice and the city museum-was a "much needed facility" which will now compliment the professionalism of those who serve under its roof.

Neidhamer called the new

city hall "an asset for generations to come."

"It is truly a testament to Boyne City-a beautiful place to live, work and play," Neid-

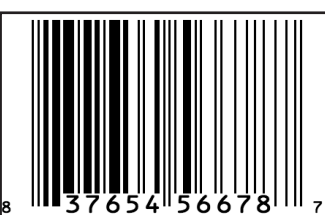

## Votorantim Cimentos and St Marys Cement executives tour Charlevoix Hospital

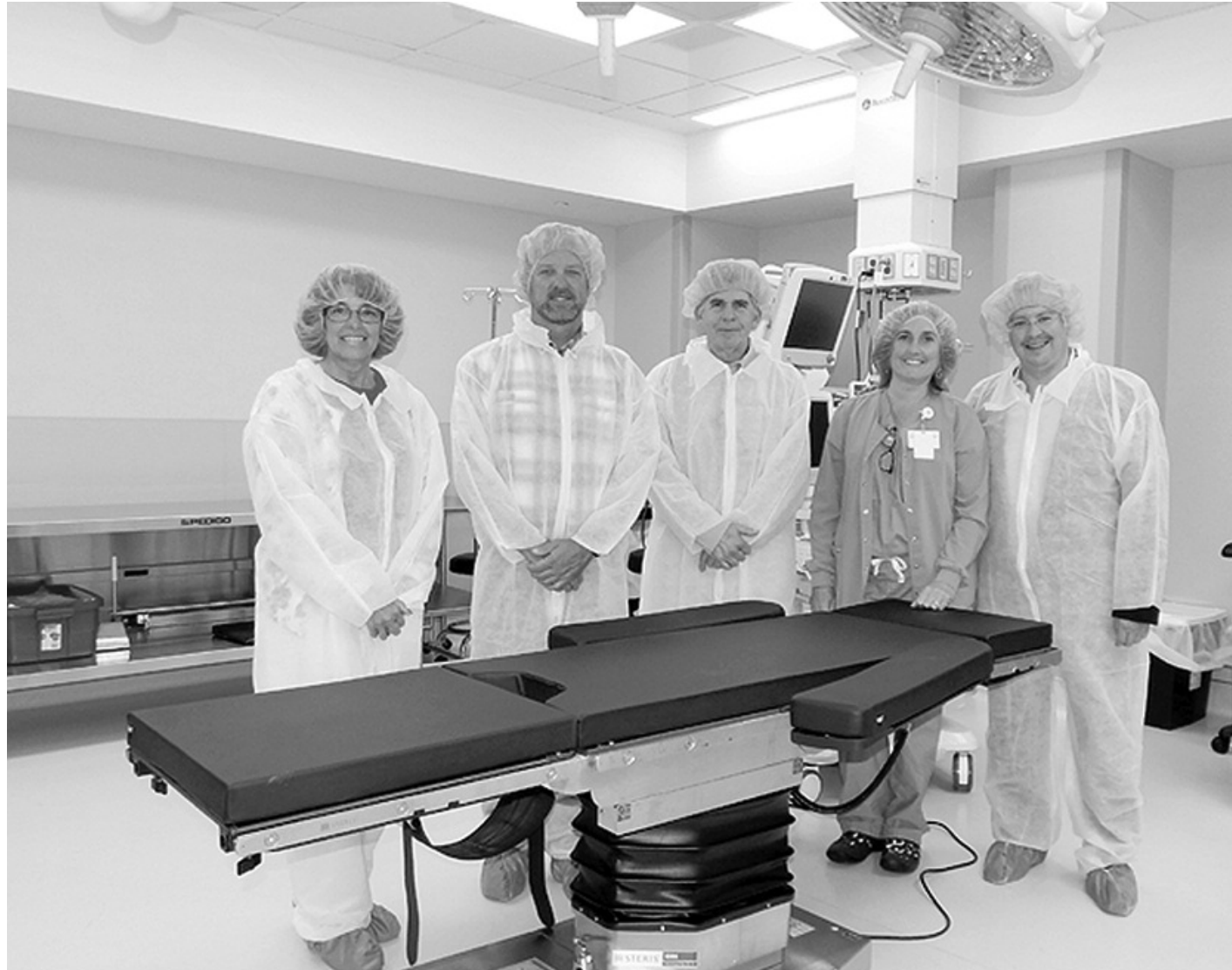

"Without the support of the hospital's friends and neighbors such as Votorantim Cimentos and the St Marys Cement plant, this wonderful expansion would not have been possible."

The visiting executives were given a tour of the lab, new operating room and surgical suite and chemotherapy infusion center, seeing first-hand the results of their donation. Before leaving, they shared a celebratory toast with hospital staff members and physicians who expressed deep gratitude for the generous gift.

Alan survived because Keith huddled with him and kept him awake until they were pulled from the lake. Alan Vicstein's vessel was a 12.6 foot Mistral sailboat.

# Protecting consumers at the pump

Numerous law enforcement agencies, along with the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD), are ramping up inspections and warning drivers statewide after credit card skimmers were found at a mid-Michigan gas station in recent months.

According to MDARD, approximately 70 credit card skimmers have been found and removed from gas pumps in Michigan since 2015.

Criminals typically hide these devices inside of gas pumps and use them to scan and copy the customer's credit and debit information. Most pumps have a universal master key that criminals can easily obtain, allowing them entry to install the device. Electronic skimmers can be installed in a matter of seconds, allowing criminals to get in and out quickly, then return later to retrieve the stolen information.

Thieves also use plastic covers that resemble the credit card slot on a gas pump. They are designed to fit over the credit card machine and read a user's card information as the card is scanned. Law enforcement agencies have grown wise to this and have developed a series of preemptive actions that can protect consumers.

To decrease the odds of becoming a victim

to this scam, police recommend customers use a pump in plain view, or near the entrance of the gas station, as those pumps are less likely to be tampered with. Police also recommend patrons give the card reader a firm pull before inserting their card. Many in the industry consider this to be the best way to determine if a pump has been tampered with because if a pump has been hacked, you will likely be able to pull the whole unit out. If not, you will do no damage to the reader by pulling on it.

Technology is a good thing, as it often allows better management of our time and resources. However, as this issue is showing us, it can also be harmful. The state Senate is working to keep up with the ever-growing technological advances and the related schemes that thieves are using. In an effort to decrease the threat posed by credit card skimming devices, the state Senate recently approved legislation that would require all filling stations in Michigan to improve security measures at the pump.

Senate Bill 415 would allow filling stations the option of installing any of the following on individual pumps: tamper proof security tape with logo; a device to render the pump or scanning device inoperable with unauthorized access; encryption of credit card information; a new lock to replace the manufacturer's lock; or any other security measure approved by MDARD.



In this day and age, consumers can never be too careful about protecting their identity. Many stations already have protective measures in place, but this bill would create uniform guidelines that filling stations across the state must adhere to.

SB 415 is currently before the Michigan

House Commerce and Trade Committee. Sen. Wayne Schmidt, R-Traverse City, represents the 37th state Senate District, which includes Antrim, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Chippewa, Emmet, Grand Traverse, Luce and Mackinac counties.

Worldwide, vegetarians overwhelmingly outnumber meat-eaters! According to a study in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition, around 4 billion folks eat a mostly plant-based diet; 2 billion are mostly meat-eaters. But in America, only around 4.7 million folks are complete vegetarians, according to the Vegetarian Resource Group. Another 1.6 million or more are vegans who never eat any animal-related products.

However, 22 million of your friends and neighbors are flexitarians; that is, they eat meat, fish and/or poultry occasionally, but their diet is plant-centered. So, if YOU don't want to give up all animal products (salmon, skinless poultry, low-fat dairy), well, they're a group who can teach you a thing or two about maximizing your health and satisfying your

occasional desire to enjoy animal protein.

What's wrong with eating meat? If you're talking about red meat (beef, veal, pork, lamb, mutton and goat) or processed meats (salted, cured, fermented, smoked or otherwise processed to enhance flavor and act as a preservative), plenty. Not only are they loaded with heart-clogging, brain-dimming, wrinkle-inducing, sex-life-stalling, inflammation-promoting saturated fat, they are, according to the World Health Organization, linked to cancer.

WHO classifies red meat as probably linked to cancer and processed meats as definitely linked to colorectal cancer - and studies show the incidence in the U.S. among Caucasians under age 50 is rising significantly. In addition, processed meats have been linked to everything from high blood pressure, coronary heart disease, diabetes and stroke to worsening of COPD.

Are You Typical?

Unfortunately, the typical American is what we might call an anti-vegetarian. They've never met a vegetable... Well, that's it; they've never met a vegetable - or a fruit.

From ages 14 to 70, 80 to 90 percent of guys are not getting the recommended intake of fruit. For women the same ages, 70 to 80 percent are also missing out on the benefits, in-

cluding gastrointestinal health and weight control.

The stats on veggie consumption are just as bad: Men and women ages 50 to 71 eat more veggies than other age groups, but 78 and 68 percent of them respectively still miss out on the minimum daily recommended intake. And many age groups in this country come perilously close to having 100 percent of their population miss the recommended levels of intake. Yikes!

Flex Those Flexitarian Muscles!

If you're interested in trying out a less-animal-based diet, there's lots of help around. The Monday Campaigns' Meatless Monday (meatlessmonday.org) suggests declaring one day a week meat-free, and offers free, downloadable meatless cookbooks.

And we have a great five-step plan to get you started!

1. Turn fish and skinless poultry into side dishes, not the main course. Limit your serving size to 3-6 ounces per meal.
2. Adopt smart plate geometry when eating animal protein: Make half of your plate veggies and fruits, a quarter of your plate 100 percent whole grains, and a quarter of it animal-based proteins.
3. Always get between 5 and 9 servings of fresh veggies and fruit daily. One serving of

fresh fruit equals 1 apple or 1 cup of cut-up fresh fruit; a serving of 100 percent whole grain equals 1/2 cup cooked brown rice, whole-wheat pasta or cooked oatmeal, 1 ounce dry pasta or brown rice; a serving of veggies equals 1 cup raw vegetable or 2 cups leafy salad greens.

4. Explore the world of vegetable and mainly vegetable entrees your family will love. Check out the Cleveland Clinic's online treasure trove (the Heart Healthy Recipe Center). Some great main course salad choices: Bean and Artichoke Salad, Cold Asian Salad with Salmon, Quinoa and Apple Salad with Almonds and Mint, Tuna and Avocado Cobb Salad!

5. For end-of-summer fun: Explore the goodness of grilled tofu (marinated of course), corn, root veggies, even romaine lettuce! Concoct a veggie burger from chickpeas, lentils, shredded zucchini, carrots (blanched), mushrooms, onions and herbs and spices. Bye, bye beef burger.
