15 year old girl hit by car in downtown Charlevoix

CHARLEVOIX—A 15-year-old local high school student is recovering from surgery this week after being hit by a car in downtown Charlevoix after school last Friday.

Charlevoix Police Chief Gerard Doan said the girl was struck by a car at the intersection of Bridge Street (U.S. 31) and W. Upright Street around 3:20 pm on October 6.

The girl has been identified 15-year-old Morgan Daley, who lives in

Charlevoix and is a freshman at Charlevoix High School.

Doan said the teen was returning from Round Lake Education Center where she'd been dropped off that morning when she tried to cross Bridge Street between two stopped cars near the intersection of W. Upright Street.

"Northbound traffic was stopped and she attempted to cross between two northbound vehicles that were stopped when she walked out in front of southbound traffic and was hit by a ve-

hicle headed south on Bridge Street," Doan said.

He said the teen was taken to McClaren Northern Michigan Hospital in Petoskey and that it was believed she was transferred to a downstate hospital for further treatment. However, reports from Daley's family indicate she remained at the Petoskey hospital where she underwent pelvic surgery for injuries she suffered in the accident.

Doan said he understands that the girl is reportedly recovering from her surgery.

"We've heard she's in good condition and doing well," he said.

Doan noted that the intersection of Bridge Street (U.S. 31) and W. Upright Street is not considered especially accident prone compared to other intersections along that downtown stretch-like at Bridge Street and Garfield where such accidents occur more frequently.

He said Friday's accident is still "under review" and that no citations have been issued.

This year 4th grade students at Concord Academy Boyne are participating in the Global Read Aloud project.

GRA sends out a survey asking teachers to vote on a read aloud for the new year; grades 3-5 are reading *The Wild Robot*. During a set 6-week period classes, October through November, around the world (yes, WORLD) read the book and try to make as many global connections as possible, sharing their ideas from the book, answering questions,

making predictions, etc. Some teachers decide to connect with one class, while some connect with multiple classrooms through technology. Tips for safe bow hunting experience

Michigan's bow hunting season opened Oct. 1, and Department of Natural Resources conservation officers are sharing tips for a safe hunting experience.

"Bow hunting is enjoyed by thousands of hunters every year in Michigan, and we want to ensure everyone has a safe and enjoyable hunting season," said Sgt. Steve Orange, supervisor of the DNR's hunter education program. "With the season upon us, every hunter should follow some common sense safety tips before heading to or being in the woods."

Top safety tips for bow hunting include:
Before going out, inspect equipment, including tree

stand or other raised platform. If anything is worn, frayed, cracked or peeling, replace it or get it fixed. If using a compound bow or crossbow, make sure the cables and pulleys are in good working order.

When sharpening broadheads, be careful and take your time.

Practice tree-stand safety. The DNR recommends using a full-body safety harness to get into and out of a tree stand.

If using a raised platform, always use a haul-line to raise and lower gear.

Keep arrows in the quiver until ready to use. A common injury is to stab or injure yourself or a hunting companion while carrying

arrows in your hand or nocked on your bow.

When heading out to the woods, hunt with a friend or family member or make sure you tell someone reliable where you are going and what time you expect to be back. This information is valuable in helping conservation officers or other law enforcement officers and search-and-rescue teams find you if you are lost.

Also, think about carrying a cell phone, a compass, a flashlight and other small safety items when in the woods.

Other important reminders include:

Obtain permission from a landowner before hunting on his or her land or using

their land to access public land.

Never take a shot at a deer that is beyond the maximum effective range of your equipment and your shooting ability.

If you are successful, field dress your deer and cool its meat immediately. Michigan's unpredictable weather means we sometimes have warm October days. Warm temperatures can cause the meat to spoil quickly.

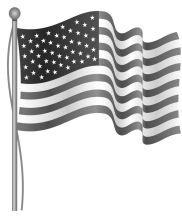

U. S. MILITARY VETERAN OF THE MONTH



Veteran of the Month for October 2017 is Elmer Ellwood Poole Jr. Born on June 4th, 1924 in Lake County, Ellsworth Township, Baldwin, Michigan, Poole worked as a painter with his father, completing the 10th grade, and left school signing up for the military draft. On August 16th, 1942 Poole married Emily Florentina Gunther and on August 3rd, 1943 Poole was inducted into the Army Air Force entering into active service on August 24th, 1943 in Detroit, Michigan. Following Basic Training Poole was reassigned and attended a service school for an Airplane Armorer at Lowry Field, Colorado and a service school for Aerial Gunnery at Las Vegas, Nevada. On October 13th, 1944 Poole departed the USA arriving in Italy on October 29th, 1944 and was assigned to the 15th Air Force, 5th Wing, 301st Group, 353rd Squadron, and due to his small stature, Poole was assigned to serve as a ball-turret gunner aboard a B-17 Bomber flying missions over Italy, Africa and Germany. On June 25th, 1945 Poole departed the European Theater of Operations arriving in the USA on June 30th, 1945 and on October 23rd, 1945 at the 1040th Army Air Force Separation Base Unit, Santa Ana, California, Poole received an Honorable Discharge having attained the noncommissioned officer rank of Staff Sergeant and received the following decorations and awards: The European Theater Medal, The

Air Medal with One Cluster and The Good Conduct Medal.

Returning home to Michigan, Poole worked for A&P grocery stores as a meat cutter for many years and owned a grocery store on the west side of East Jordan, Michigan. Poole enjoyed hunting, fishing, telling stories, spending time at his cabin in the Upper Peninsula and spending winters in Florida. Health Department hosts Youth Mental Health First Aid Training

Youth Mental Health First Aid teaches about warning signs of mental health problems and how to support adolescents in crisis or experiencing mental health challenges. The Health Department will host the next training on Tuesday, October 17 at Char-Em Intermediate School District in Charlevoix. The training is free and open to the public, but registration is required.

Youth Mental Health First Aid uses role-playing and simulations to demonstrate how to assess a mental health crisis, provide initial help, and connect young people to professional, peer, social, and self-help care. Tiffany Moore-Corteville, a mental health professional and community health coordinator for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, says this training is critical for any adult who regularly interacts with adolescents.

"It is so important for the adults in a student's life to be able to recognize when that student is struggling, and know the right way to respond. Teachers, coaches, parents, and youth group leaders would greatly benefit from this training. I highly recommend it," she said.

According to Moore-Corteville, early intervention is vital when an adolescent begins to display symptoms of a mental health challenge.

"With the right support at the right time, adolescents can overcome these challenges. Without it, untreated mental health problems can become devastating. This course really is as important as learning CPR or First Aid for injuries," she explained.

The course teaches participants the risk factors and warning signs of a variety of mental health challenges common among adolescents, including anxiety, depression, psychosis, eating disorders, attention deficit disorder, disruptive behavior disorders, and substance use disorders. Participants do not learn to diagnose, nor how to provide any therapy or counseling - rather, participants learn to support a youth developing signs and symptoms of a mental illness or in an emotional crisis by series of defined steps. More Mental Health First Aid trainings will be offered on future dates - see www.charemid.org for details.

Since 2008, the core Mental Health First Aid course has been successfully offered to hundreds of thousands of people across the USA, including hospital staff, employers and business leaders, faith communities, law enforcement, and the general public. Mental Health First Aid USA is coordinated by the National Council for Behavioral Health, the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, and the Missouri Department of Mental Health. Mental Health First Aid USA worked with experts at the National Technical Assistance Center for Children's Mental Health at the Georgetown University Center for Child and Human Development to develop the youth program.

After the scheduled date, citizens will be responsible for their own leaves. Please set bagged leaves curbside any time after the first day of pickup, in biodegradable paper bags. City crews will pick up bags as time allows. If your bags have been out for an extended period of time and have not been collected, please notify City Hall at 582-6597. Biodegradable paper bags are available at Boyne City Ace Hardware and Boyne Co-op or can be purchased from any other source. Please put only leaves in bags as they are not strong enough to hold sticks, sand, or stones and will tear upon lifting. Brush will not be picked up; however, residents may take their brush and leaves, either bagged in biodegradable bags or unbagged, up to the North Boyne Compost Site at the end of Robinson Street, which is open seven days a week for your convenience. Commercial businesses may also utilize the compost area with their city issued permit. City Ordinance prohibits depositing leaves or other yard waste in the street.

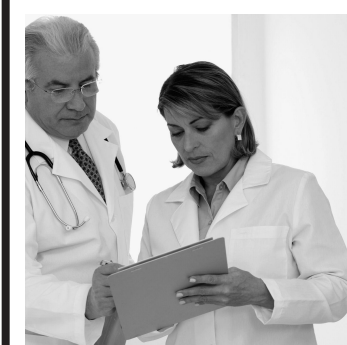
