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# Fire Ordinances under review following fire

# The Harbor View Café fire was the third fire in the past 15 months in Downtown Charlevoix

CHARLEVOIX - A fire that destroyed two businesses and seriously damaged sev-

eral others in downtown Charlevoix last week is raising red flags, not only about how it started, but about the city's fire ordinances - or lack thereof.

Just before 8 p.m. Wednesday, January 3, firefighters from the Charlevoix Township Fire Department responded to a call of a fire at the Harbor View Cafe in Ole-

son's Plaza at 100 Antrim Street at the corner of Bridge Street.

Charlevoix Township Fire Chief Dan Thorp said that upon arriving at the scene,

black smoke billowing from the roof and the cafe itself fully engulfed in flames. Charlevoix firefighters were assisted by East Jordan

firefighters found heavy,

ments, which worked together to get the fire fully extinguished by around midnight, but remained on the scene until about 2:30 a.m. January 4 to make sure it did not re-ignite.

The restaurant was deemed a total loss, as was the business next door, The Spa Charlevoix.

Four other businesses in the strip mall known as Oleson's Plaza were forced to close after the fire until further notice due to serious smoke and water damage, including Picture This, Pizza Girl and the Charlevoix Barber Shop.

Oleson's grocery store was also forced to close temporarily due to water and smoke damage and the Michigan Department of Agriculture seized its inventory of food products for investigation, later determining most of it

# MDOT installs new web cam in Melrose Twp.

CHARLEVOIX COUNTY -Mountains of blowing, drifting snow and seemingly endless days of sub-zero temperatures can mean different things to northern Michiganders. For some, it's time to get out and enjoy the slopes or snowmobile trails, for others, it's time to stay indoors and keep warm by the fire and for still others the elements signal it's time to leave for a warmer clime.

If you do live or travel anywhere up north during the winter months, however, you know for sure all that ice and wind and snow mean just one thing: hazardous road conditions. And those conditions can vary wildly even within a short distance depending on numerous factors, including whether you're traveling along city or country roads and the geography of the road and its surrounding terrain.

But thanks to two new strategies recently implemented by the Michigan Department of

Transportation, motorists in Charlevoix County and elsewhere throughout the state will find new methods evolving to help them more safely maneuver through those most slippery and hazardous stretches of road in their counties for years to

come.

The pair of MDOT initiatives include continuing installation of "weather sensing stations" and planting of evergreen trees to serve as natural barriers to wind and snow along especially hazardous stretches of roadway throughout the

Two of those weather sensing stations went up in Charlevoix County just before the holidays, said Charlevoix County Road Commission Manager Pat Harmon.

The weather stations monitor temperature, relative humidity, dew point, precipitation in the past hour and visibility. All of the information is posted online so it's easily accessible to road and law enforcement officials as well as travelers. The weather stations are also are equipped with has a webcam that features a routinely updated still photo of the stretch of road where they are posted.

Harmon said the weather stations also feature a "frost tube" indicator which his department will utilize every spring to determine how deeply the ground is frozen to figure what road weight restrictions apply.

One of the newest weather sensing stations recently went into action

that's locally known as "Short's Hill", which sits at a higher elevation and lacks natural protection from wind and is therefore prone to heavy icing, low visibility and overall hazardous driving conditions, Harmon ex-

plained. The weather station on Short's Hill is situated on the west side of U.S. 131 with its webcam aimed north towards Bear River Road.

The other station in Charlevoix County went into operation just down the road south of Boye Falls at U.S. 131 and the junction of M-32 at what Harmon said is known as "Elmira Hill", also

a stretch that's extra vulnerable to high winds, poor visibility and icy driving conditions.

He said there's already been one MDOT weather sensing station in Charlevoix County at the intersection of U.S. 31 and Burgess Road between Bay Shore and Charlevoix for about two

The other MDOT initiative to help motorists navigate wintry roads has been the planting of evergreen trees in areas where there is little or no natural barrier between the blowing snow and open fields and the open road.

It may take a few years to vield results, but the long term impact of the trees when they get bigger will be quite noticeable, Harmon He said dozens of young

evergreen trees, all about 3-4

fall along the high risk stretches of road, like at Short's Hill and Elmira Hill. "Just give those trees another five years to grow, and they are going to make a huge difference during the winter," Harmon said, "Huge."

He said despite the heavy snow and freezing temperatures all over northern Michigan during the holidays, so far the going has been pretty typical for this time of year when it comes to road conditions throughout Charlevoix County.

It is, however, the first year in his 32 years at the county road commission that Harmon said he's seen such cold temperatures hang on for so long so early in the season. "It's just really cold out there," he laughed. The most treacherous

winter roads in the county

tend to be those that run between farm fields, Harmon noted, like some in southern parts of the county and throughout Hayes Township, where there are stretches of road with little or no natural barrier to winds and blowing snow.

Other MDOT weather sensing stations have been placed at the U.S. 31/M-88 intersection in Eastport I-75 at Exit 337 south of Mackinaw City, I-75 at Levering Road exit, I-75 at Exit 301 in Wolverine and I-75 at Exit 270 in Waters.

# Ellsworth students complete "Life Skills" course first semester

Ellsworth Community School high school students have just completed the first semester of a new elective course geared towards the teaching of essential real world skills. The new elective class, "Life Skills," comes as a direct request from students for having more elective opportunities built into the high school

At the end of the previous school year ECS superintendent/principal, Aaron Gaffney, met with every student in grades 6-12 to gather input and suggestions for improving the school experience in Ellsworth.

"Among many suggestions for improvements was the expressed desire for more elective opportunities," said Gaffney. "One of the specific requests students made was for a class that taught them daily living skills such as bal-

ancing a checkbook, changing the oil in a car, cooking, and basic sewing skills." As a result of the students' request, ECS built a new elective course option for high school students called Life

The new class is being taught by English teacher and ECS alum, Amanda Terrvberry.

"It has been eye opening to teach a Life Skills class," said Mrs. Terryberry. "At the beginning of the semester, I had a list of ideas that I thought were skills that the students would want to learn. I was surprised to find out that some of the skills they wanted to learn were quite different from what I planned to cover."

According to Mrs. Terryberry, the high school students wanted to learn skills such as how to make an appointment, remove a stain,

read a contract, and dress professionally. "With the help of the community, I've been able to chip away at their list and hopefully we will have a chance to learn all of the things they asked

Students have been extremely appreciative of the skills and lessons being taught in the class.

"I've learned so much already," said ECS junior, Ana Oviedo. "From how to pay my bills to everything that comes with saving."

Fellow ECS junior Atlas Marlatt echoed Ana's feelings. "This year 'Life Skills' has taught me, and is continuing to teach me, about real world situations."

In addition to student requests, students have spent time in the bus garage learning to change the oil in a car under the guidance of ECS Transportation Director,

Larry Essenberg, learned to can jam and salsa at the Banks Township Hall, and observed the voting process on election day.

"This class would not be successful without the assistance of the community,' stressed Mrs. Terryberry. "Larry Essenberg shared his knowledge on how to change the oil in a car. Rose McPherson gave the students the opportunity to make salsa and use a canner to preserve it. Louise Alfred has worked with the students on goal setting and preparing for life after high school. Not only are the students learning valuable skills, they are also making connections with people from the community."

One of the main projects and experiences planned for the second semester involves childcare. Thanks to a previous grant received by Mrs. Terryberry the class was

able to purchase a "real-care baby" from Realityworks, a company that specializes in creating innovative learning tools for teaching real world skills. The real-care baby is a life-like infant simulator. The baby is programmed to cry, need it's diaper changed, and be fed, in addition to many other infant activities. Each student in the class will have the opportunity to take the baby home, and carry it with them in school, for three days during the second

"Mr. Gaffney and I are excited students will have the opportunity to interact with the real-care baby as a part of the Life Skills curriculum," indicated Mrs. Terryberry. "It represents another great opportunity for students to learn some of the many skills needed to be an

semester.

In regards to the overall

curriculum, Gaffney shared that Life Skills has been an extremely positive addition to the school's offerings.

'Often because of state and national curriculum requirements we as educators become too focused on college prep types of classes. I'm thankful that students expressed their desire for elective opportunities that focus more on real-world skills."

The class is already starting to pay dividends for the students of ECS. "I felt very unprepared for the real world, but now I feel more confident in my future," said Ana Oviedo. ECS is hopeful that it will be able to continue even more student generated elective opportunities in the future.


