more popular world-wide. And it caught the eve of Charlevoix residents Paul and Linda Weston when they were traveling in Europe not long ago and saw Dragon Boats races on the Rhine River.

Paul Weston said his wife immediately envisioned bringing Dragon Boat races to northern Michigan, and she pitched the idea of utilizing that concept as a fundraiser for the Charlevoix Circle of Arts.

Her idea flew, and she was suddenly tasked with bringing it to fruition.

Weston, who now identifies himself as "the husband of one of the pioneering organizers" of the Charlevoix Dragon



Boat festival, said his wife began working to pull this festival together last fall and winter. "Can you imagine putting something like this together in Charlevoix that time of year?" Weston chuckled, "It's just amazing how they pulled this off.'

Weston noted he suspected city officials were also likely surprised that his wife and her crew could get the Dragon Boat races organized in such short order and would see such a terrific and enthusiastic turnout for a firsttime event.

But Charlevoix City Manager Mark Heydlauff begged to differ. "I'm not

year felony, and presenting false evidence, a four-year felony. Blackwell will also be subject to a sentencing enhancement as a three-time felon which will change the breaking and entering charge to a twenty-year maximum.

Blackwell was set to go to trial on Wednesday, August 8 on these charges as well as additional charges of larcenv greater than \$20,000 and witness intimidation. Those charges were dismissed as part of a plea agreement as was a charge of home invasion.

According to the affidavits of probable cause filed in the cases, Blackwell and three other men, all of whom have already pleaded guilty in connection with the events, broke into two area medical marijuana grow operations and stole medical marijuana.

After the four were charged, Blackwell asked one of his co-defendants to lie for him and to create a letter stating that Blackwell was not involved in the robberies. Text messages between Blackwell and the co-defendant revealed that Blackwell told the co-defendant what to say and sought to have them to lie under oath.

The letter created by the co-defendant at Blackwell's urging was introduced at Blackwell's preliminary examination in the 90th District Court and formed the basis for the false evidence charge. The false evidence charged may be served consecutively to the breaking and entering charge as it was committed while Blackwell was on bond.



surprised at all because I know his wife (Linda) and if anybody could pull something like this off, it would be her," Heydlauff said, "This turned out to be a really great event and it happened because of so many great volunteers. It really shows what the people of Charlevoix are all about and what they can do."

Eleven teams paddled in this year's first Dragon Boat Races, which started bright and early Saturday morning along the shores of Lake Charlevoix's Ferry Beach. The dragon boats were provided by Dynamic Dragon Boat Racing of Knoxville, Tennessee, which brings the sport to myriad nationwide venues, primarily for fundraising and team-building purposes.

The typical dragon boat is 46 feet-long and features 20 paddlers, one drummer and one experienced steersman, who is provided by the dragon boat service. During the race, the drummer is charged with keeping "an effective beat in order to synchronize the paddlers, according to the Charlevoix Circle of Arts website. The organization noted it sponsored the event "to help support its mission to cultivate a more inspired and educated community through the arts.'

"The boats are truly works of art. They are colorful crafts with dragon scales in-

cluding a dragon head and tail. The Opening Ceremony began with a practice known as "Awakening the Dragon", in which the dragon's eyes are dotted just prior to the race to symbolize the dragon coming to life," the website stated. Lynne and Mason Rosenthal joined Mike and

Rhea Dow for the honor of awaking the dragons for Charlevoix's first Dragon Boat Festival this year.

Among the fun names some of the teams adopted for their dragon boats last weekend included the racers from Charlevoix State Bank calling themselves "Hawaii

Five Row". alluding to the number of paddlers required to crew their craft, and the "Boat Load of Scrubs" from Munson Healthcare Charlevoix Hospital.

In the end, the "Hawaii Five Row" team from Charlevoix State Bank paddled its way to the top and

won the Grand Champion trophy at the 2018 Charlevoix Dragon Boat Festival.

Weston said that he was delighted to see such a fun event come to life in Charlevoix and raise funds to support the arts in the community. "These dragon boat races are becoming a

world-wide phenomenon, but to my knowledge, this is the first dragon boat race here in Michigan, and look how many people came out!" said Weston, "We're hoping it will only get bigger next year."



East Jordan man sentenced for computer crimes

Tambling hacked into personal data, social media and captured nude images

PETOSKEY - A Charlevoix County man who moved to northern Michigan from the United Kingdom was sentenced to prison last week for computer-related crimes that impacted countless victims and divided a devout church community in neighboring Emmet County.

Wayne Victor William Tambling, 31, of East Jordan, was sentenced by Emmet County Circuit Court Judge Charles W. Johnson to serve at least six years and up to 12 years in prison with concurrent terms on charges of using a computer to commit a crime, capturing an image of an unclothed person and unauthorized use of a computer.

Police arrested 30-year-old Wayne Tambling last December 20 under a 45-count felony warrant issued on suspicions that he remotely accessed several victims' computers without their knowledge and not only hacked into their personal data, social media accounts and text messages, but that he also secretly took nude photos of some of them.

Tambling, who worked as an IT/computer technician at Wojan Window and Door in Charlevoix, pleaded guilty in June to charges of remotely accessing several victims' computers without their knowledge and capturing their images, which he then transferred to his own computer.

Many of his victims were his friends and fellow worshipers at Landmark Baptist Church in Petoskey, where he often volunteered his computer skills to help them with their personal computer issues. In doing so, it was later discovered he clandestinely

installed software and programming that allowed him remote access to their computers without their knowledge.

His scheme unraveled after three victims came to police with suspicions and reports of what Michigan State Trooper Jeff Mercer described as "some strange things, some coincidences that led them to believe someone was spying on them."

Police said a four-monthlong investigation of Tambling ensued and included search warrants and the seizure of several computers and forensic examination by the Michigan State Police Computer Crimes Unit in Traverse City. Investigators found numerous nude photos of the victims on Tambling's computer, which led to charges against him being filed and his arrest.

Several of Tambling's victim's testified at his sentencing, describing the impact his actions have had on their lives; how it feels to have had their personal information, text messages and social media posts hacked; how it felt to have been unknowingly photographed while undressed; and how it feels not knowing if all of those images and that hacked information is still out there and may resurface someday after Tambling gets out of prison. "How do you describe the hell that my family has endured in the past two years?" one victim told the

court. Others pointed to how Tambling divided their church family when he first came under investigation by making a concerted effort to convince his fellow church members and friends that he had been framed by his accusers. They said Tambling went so far as to create fake messages on social media that appeared to have been exchanged between himself and one victim in effort to prove his innocence-and that some church members believed him.

Judge Johnson called that an "elaborate scheme" and part of Tambling's "calculated efforts to deny responsibility."

"How or why all these people would want to frame him is his fantasy," Johnson said.

Emmet County Chief Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Stuart Fenton said authorities estimate Tambling had up to 1 million images he secretly snapped of unknowing victims. But Judge Johnson was quick to note that the true long-term impact and scope of his computer crimes and the actual number of his victims may never really be known. Johnson added in his sentencing how Tambling "has not shown...genuine remorse," Johnson said.

A crowd of victims, their family, friends-most all of them members of Landmark Baptist Church-gathered outside the Emmet County Courthouse after Tambling's sentencing where Fenton joined them to explain the concurrent sentencing and what the future holds for the victims once he's released and allowed back at the keyboard.

Overall, Fenton assured the crowd that at least they are safe for several years while Tambling is serving his time in prison and forbidden access to computers, but after that, he said, it's hard to predict what can happen.

Most all church membersincluding many of Tambling's victims-said they were satisfied with his sentence, and in fact were happy to see he got more time than they expected.

One church member, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Tambling came to the United States from the United Kingdom after marrying one of their church members. She said initially he was a warmly welcomed congregant who was eager to volunteer in various capacities, even manning the puppet tent with kids. She said his assault on their church family as it has unfolded over the past couple years has been frightening, confusing, heart-wrenching and divisive.

But now that he's off to prison, she said the congregation at Landmark Baptist Church is looking forward to healing and feels galvanized. "I love this church so muchwe all do," she said, "This was a terrible thing to happen to us, but we are moving on. We are strong."


