
November 11th is Veteran's Day; a date designated each vear for honoring those who have served and who are serving our country in the military. It is not a date that was arbitrarily set; rather, it marks the occasion of an armistice that was called on November 11 at 11 am in 1918, ending hostilities between Allied nations and Germany during World War I. The following June, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the 11th day of the 11 month to be Armistice Day, and many communities hold memorial ceremonies at the 11th hour on this holiday.

Armistice Day became an official holiday in 1938, was given the name Veteran's Day in 1954, and while the date moved around a bit during the early 1970's, it was re-anchored to the 11th day of the 11th month by a law signed by President Gerald Ford in

U. S. MILITARY **VETERAN** OF THE MONTH



The Veteran of the Month of November, 2018 is Robert "Bob" Duff. Born March 4, 1931 in Petoskey, Michigan. The son of Martin J., and Alice Bunn Duff, Bob attended Boyne Falls Schools until the 8th grade, then having to help his parents on the family farm. He also worked at the Boyne City Tannery, and as a General Farm Hand at the Buel Farm in Elmira, Michigan. Duff enlisted into the United States Army on October 31, 1949, in Traverse City, Michigan. After basic and advanced training, he was assigned to C Company, 5th Cavalry, 2nd Battalion, 5th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division, and was sent to the Korean Conflict. Having been in country for a short time, on August 17, 1950, during operations on Hill 303, Duff received severe gunshot wounds to his left arm. Being overrun by the enemy, Duff and his Platoon Lieutenant escaped. During this move, Duff came upon a huge rock wall, of which he could not climb because of his wounds. He credited his life to Lieutenant Bell, who helped him over the wall. and to safety. Later, after retaking the hill, troops found 47 comrades who had been gunned down by the North Koreans. This would be forever known as The Massacre on Hill 303. After initial treatment for the wounds, Duff was sent back to the U.S., and was reassigned to the 8th Infantry Division Ft. Benning, Georgia, receiving special training in basic supply from May to July, 1951, to finish out his Military commitment. On November 3rd, 1952, at Ft. Benning Georgia, Duff was given an Honorable Discharge, and received the following decorations: The Combat Infantry-

man Badge; The Korean Service Medal with one Bronze Service Star; The United Nations Service Medal; The Purple Heart Medal.

Returning back home, on November 14, 1953, Bob met and married Wiliminta "Billie Jo" Howie. They were married for 61 years. Bob worked for Consumers Power Company in Flint, Michigan for a short time. Then, transferred to the Bovne City location with his family. He retired after 32 years of service to the company. Bob was proud of his service to his country during the Korean Conflict. He was a devoted husband, father, and grandfather, and always put his family first. On June 17, 2018, Robert "BOB" Duff, answered the final call, and is being honored by his three brothers, his children, and their families.

The Harvest Food and Supply Drive is an annual appeal to support women and children at the Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan's (WRCNM) Safe Home who are seeking safety from domestic abuse. Health Department of **NW MI celebrates Great** American Smokeout

The American Cancer Society marks the Great American Smokeout on the third Thursday of November each year by encouraging smokers to quit that day or to develop a plan to quit smoking. By doing so, smokers will be taking an important step towards a healthier life. This year's **Great American Smokeout** will be observed on Thursday November 15th.

Tobacco use remains the single largest preventable cause of disease and premature death in Michigan, killing more than 16,200 residents each year. 20.4% of Michigan adults smoke cigarettes, 10.5% of Michigan high school students smoke cigarettes, and another 14.8% of these kids use e-cigarettes. Each vear. 4.400 Michigan kids become new, daily smokers. Thirty percent (30%) of cancer deaths in Michigan are attributable to cigarette smoking. Tobacco products are highly addictive. Therefore, most users make several quit attempts before they are successful. However. there are proven resources available to help tobacco users quit. Quitters are most successful when using a combination of therapies, including resources such as nicotine replacement, counseling, self-help materials, and a strong support network of family and friends. "The Great American Smokeout is an opportunity to remind tobacco users that they can succeed, and to support tobacco users in their efforts to quit," stated Katie Joyce, Community Health Coordinator for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. "This year, the American Cancer Society reminds tobacco users that you don't have to quit in one day. Start with day one." Quitting tobacco use is the single best thing you can do for your health. The positive effects on health are both short and long term, and quitting benefits everyone, regardless of age. According to the American Cancer Society, the body begins to recover within minutes of quitting smoking. Heart rate and blood pressure drops, and within 12 hours carbon monoxide levels in blood return to normal. Benefits continue over time, including improved circulation and lung function, reduced risk of coronary heart disease and reduced risk of cancer. To celebrate the Great American Smokeout, Health

Department of Northwest Michigan is encouraging health care providers to ask their patients about tobacco use at every visit, provide advice to tobacco users about the benefits of quitting, and refer clients to the Michigan Tobacco Quitline (1-800-784-8669). In addition, HDNWM encourages policymakers to adopt evidencebased polices that help current tobacco users quit, and prevent kids from starting to smoke. Comprehensive 24/7 tobacco-free school policies, raising the price of tobacco, raising the minimum legal age of sale of tobacco products to 21 years of age, and funding tobacco prevention and control programming at levels recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are proven, effective methods for reducing the health and economic burden of tobacco use and secondhand smoke exposure. The Michigan Tobacco Quitline is an evidencebased service that continues to provide free telephone coaching for the uninsured, pregnant women, residents enrolled in Medicaid and Medicare, veterans, cancer patients, and American Indians, and free nicotine replacement therapy to those who qualify. The Quitline provides services including materials, text messaging, and referral to all Michigan residents. New this year is an online, interactive coaching program option. The same program that is available on the phone can now be done online with the Quitline's specially trained web coaches. Providers can refer their patients and clients to the Quitline, and individual tobacco users can contact the Quitline directly at 1-800-784-8669, or enroll online at https://michigan.quitlogix.o rg/. Additional information, including a fax referral form for providers, is available at the website. Staff and providers in all health care settings can refer patients and clients to the Michigan Tobacco Quitline.
