World class art on display at Jordan River Art Center

Jordan River Arts Council's current exhibit, "Fantasy Figures" includes work by internationally acclaimed artists Brian and Wendy Froud, their son Toby Froud and a dozen other artists from around Northwest Michigan.

The Frouds have ties to East Jordan through Wendy's parents, the late Peggy and Walter Midener.

Peggy was a collage artist whose grandfather, D.C. Loveday built East Jordan's Loveday Opera House in 1899. Wendy's father, Walter Midener was President of Detroit Society of Arts and Crafts (now College for Creative Studies). The Mideners played an active role in both the Detroit and Northern Michigan area arts communities.

In addition to her work as a writer, Wendy is probably best known for her part in creating Yoda for the 1980 film "Star Wars: The Empire Strikes Back". Wendy's hus-

band Brian Froud is a fantasy illustrator from Devon, England. When Jim Henson (creator of the Muppets) saw Brian's drawings of faeries, he knew he had found the characters for what would later become the basis for the 1982 movie "The Dark Crystal". Brian's almost three dimensional drawings transferred easily to the life-like puppets that performed for the cameras. Together with his wife Wendy, Brian worked with the famous puppeteer and filmmaker for

Exciting events over the next few days will include Kids Day on Thursday at Lake Michigan Beach, Charlevoix Farmers Market in Bridge Park, the Drenth Memorial Footrace and Ryan ShayMile on Saturday. Saturday also brings the much anticipated Street Parade on Bridge Street starting at 11am, and the Bridge Street Block Party in the afternoon through early evening.

The lighted boat parade remains an anchor event of the Venetian Festival, taking place this year on July 27 at dusk on Round Lake. Fireworks displays will take place on Friday, July 26 over Lake Charlevoix, and again on Saturday, July 27 at dusk over Round Lake.

Kids of every age will enjoy the thrills of riding the rides at the Arnold Carnival. It is taking place downtown on Thursday from Noon – 11pm, Friday from 1-11pm and Saturday from 11am – 11pm. Tickets are \$1.25 each or 18 for \$20, Carnival Arm-bands are \$17 (Good All Day)

Live Venetian Rhythms musical performances at this year's Venetian Festival will include Drake White, Union Guns, Alex Schofield, the Dueling Pianos Show, a Prince Tribute Band, the Up North Big Band, the Jill Jack Band and Intrigue. During the Bridge Street Block Party downtown on Saturday, enjoy music by the Sault Ste. Marie Pipe Band, the Plymouth Fife & Drum Corps, the Petoskey Steel Drum Band, the Upper Deck Barber Shop Quartet and more.

New Pickleball Courts in Boyne City

Boyne City will soon have two new pickleball courts. At last Tuesday's Commission meeting, Boyne City Commissioners voted to convert one of Rotary Park's four tennis courts into two dedicated pickleball courts. Tim Paas, Director of Public Works, reached out to the MSU Extension 4-H Program Coordinator who organizes tennis clinics and tournaments, and the Boyne City Schools Athletic Secretary who programs tennis court use, as well as some tennis players at Rotary Park and found there were no major objections to the proposed change.

A small group of local pickleball enthusiasts attended the meeting to show their support for the project. Pickleball is similar to tennis and is becoming ever more popular, especially with older adults. The sport combines elements of tennis, badminton, and table tennis. The game is easy for beginners to learn and is played by all ages and skill levels.

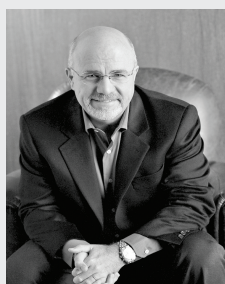

(First, catch up!)

Dear Dave, I've had enough of living paycheck-to-paycheck. I'm going to start following your plan, but I have a question. Should I catch up on my past due bills before beginning Baby Step 1?

Simon

Dear Simon, Go for it! You're sick and tired of being sick and tired, and you're going to get control of your money. I love it!

First, make sure you're up to date with necessities—food, clothing, shelter, transportation, and utilities. Next, get current or make payment arrangements for any other types of debt you have, including credit cards.

You mentioned Baby Step 1, which is getting \$1,000 in the bank for a beginner emergency fund. Baby Step 2, the debt snowball, comes next. Start paying off all debts, except for your home, from smallest to largest. Then, in Baby Step 3 you'll save more and increase your emergency fund to a full three to six months of expenses.

Now, you can really start looking at the future. In Baby Step 4, you'll start investing 15 percent of your household income for retirement. College funding for the kids, if there are any, is Baby Step 5, and Baby Step 6 is a milestone—pay off your house early!

But the real deal is Baby Step 7. This is when all your hard work, sacrifice, and smart financial decisions put you in a place where you can build wealth and give with outrageous generosity. At this point, you're securing your family's future and helping others in a big way!

(Time for fun money?)

Dear Dave, I had about \$12,000 in debt when my husband and I got married three years ago. Since that time,

we've been given cash gifts from my parents from time to time, and we keep having discussions on how to use this kind of money when it is given to us. I'd like to put it toward paying off debt, but he would rather treat it as fun money. What are your thoughts on this, please?

Dear Sara, If there's something you need, and you agree on it together and choose to buy it as a couple, that's cool. I've got no problem with that. But you guys are still just starting out, and you've got debts to pay. I'm sure your husband has a good heart, but I think it's time for him to grow up a little and realize the importance of getting your financial house in order.

Did your parents have specific and reasonable thoughts on how they'd like you to use the money? If so, you should honor their intent. If not, then how it gets used is pretty much up to you guys. But in your situation, life's not a birthday party when this kind of thing happens. You should be making mature, responsible decisions together regarding any money that comes into your household. It's really no different than a paycheck. You take care of obligations and other important things first.

Adults waste money on play things and fun stuff just because it was handed to them by mom and dad. That's how a 10-year-old behaves. Sit down with your husband, and explain how important it is that you guys start making better decisions with your money. If you two start working together, you could knock out this debt in a hurry!

nearly five years, bringing to life the first live-action film without any human beings on screen. The movie was considered a showcase for cutting-edge animatronics.

The family tradition continues with Wendy and Brian's son Toby Froud. Toby got his start in the movie business before he learned to speak. Fans of the 1986 movie "Labyrinth" starring David Bowie will remember Sara's baby brother Toby, stolen by Bowie's character the goblin king. "Baby Toby" is now grown and following in his parent's footsteps as an artist and creator of fantasy characters.

Wendy and Toby's figures on display at JRAC are essentially maquettes; small scale sculptures that might be used to help conceptualize a movie character or for costume design. Wendy and Toby often work from Brian's drawings when crafting their sculptures. Filmmaker George Lucas, creator of the Star Wars and Indiana Jones franchises once said of Brian, "Brian Froud has a limitless imagination: he has a way of

making fantasy seem real and encouraging us to believe that a dream world exists".

Besides the obvious title of "artist", the Frouds consider themselves sculptors, character designers, costume designers, fabricators as well as "world builders" where you invite an audience or the person viewing your art into a larger imaginary world. Wendy says when Brian's work was brought to life in three dimension for the "The Dark Crystal" and later "Labyrinth", those were "world" creations, Wendy explained. "We just re-imagined and expanded the world of the Dark Crystal for an upcoming TV series", Toby said. "The Dark Crystal: Age of Resistance" is a ten part series being released August 30th on Netflix.

Wendy, Toby and local artist Art Curtis of Bellaire are co-curators of JRAC's "Fantasy Figures" exhibit, a collection of two and three dimensional art based on human or animal forms taken into the realm of pure imagination. The free exhibit is open daily, 1 - 4 p.m. through August 9th at Jordan River Art Center, 301 Main Street in East Jordan and includes something for all ages to enjoy.

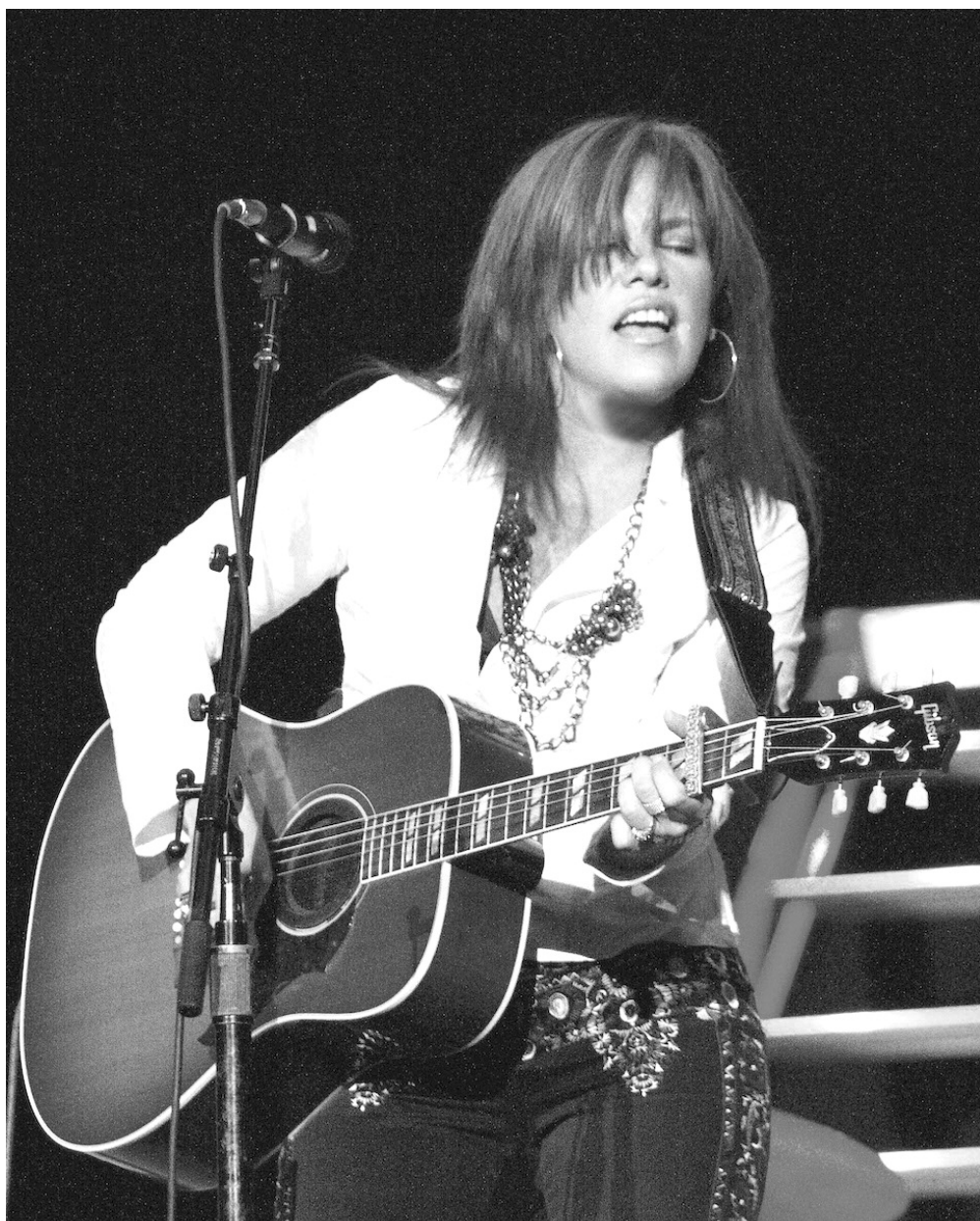

Antique-Tractor Engine & Craft Show

Prepare to step back in time and have some good old-fashioned fun at the Annual Northern Michigan Antique-Tractor Engine and Craft Show from July 25 – 28. The grounds at the Northern Michigan Antique Flywheelers Club will be filled with fine vintage tractors, steam powered engines, antique autos, a huge flea market, live music, an operating grist, saw and shingle mills, a basket shop and veneer mill, lots of activities for the children and much more. This year's event will feature Walk Behind Tractors and Gas and Electric Power Plants.

This year marks the 32nd anniversary for the annual event. Larry Matthew founded the organization and show back in 1988. The Antique Flywheelers Show is a great opportunity for attendees to learn and share knowledge about vintage engines and crafts, and there is a wide range of family-oriented activities taking place

throughout the four-day event.

The Northern Michigan Antique Flywheelers Club is an educational nonprofit organization that uses demonstrations and displays to showcase "Life in the Past Lane" and present many aspects of daily life in rural northern Michigan in the early part of the last century. The club is an all-volunteer group that invites the public to learn about and relive the past at its annual show in July. It also hosts hundreds of area fourth graders over a four-day period in September for Student Harvest Days.

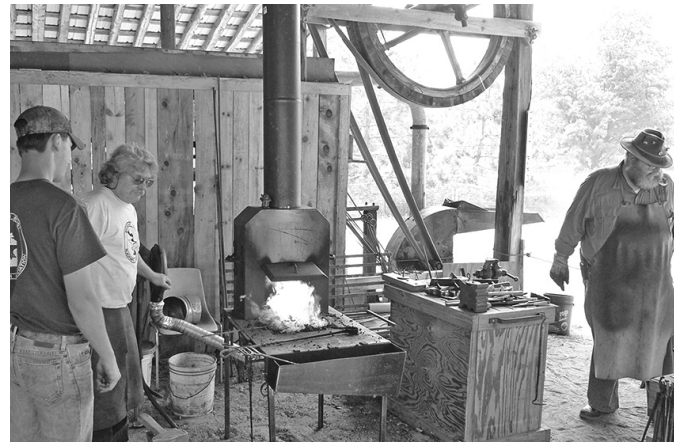
