Along with all of that great team play, there happened to be some outstanding individual play as well. With the respective classes naming their top selections for the 2019-20 season, the Charlevoix County News is proud to announce this year's Boys All-Area "Dream Team."

The 2019-2020 "Dream Team" once again features talent that can play all five positions, along with key floor leaders, high flyers, pure scorers, hardworking rebounders, defensive specialists and a majority of these young men that can do all the above.

After reviewing all the necessary statistical information and each student-athletes importance to their team and what those individuals faced each and every night on the court on both ends of the court, and sacrifices made for a better team result, it was a very difficult decision between many outstanding athletes, and after narrowing it down to three, the selection of Player of the Year goes to Boyne City senior, Pete Calcaterra.

PLAYER OF THE YEAR PETE

CALCATERRA

Boyne City, #11, senior

One of the most exciting players to watch in Northern Michigan. The high flying Calcaterra would electrify crowds (both home and visitors) with his above the rim play, throwing down anything from a one-handed slam to a windmill or something off an alley-oop pass.

Pete, recently committed to take his game to the collegiate level, announcing that he will attend Michigan Tech University to play basketball and receive his education.

"Pete has really blossomed into a great athlete and a very good all around player," Boyne City coach Nick Redman said. "His best basketball is still ahead of him. Pete was a big part of our success this season, his hard work has paid off and I'm happy for him. He has done a tremendous job representing Boyne Basketball."

Calcaterra sacrificed a big part of the offense to help lead a balanced Ramler attack, allowing others to flourish around him as well. He averaged 14.8 points, 7.4 rebounds and 2.6 assists per game.

Oftentimes, Pete would also be matched up with the opponents best offensive threat, no matter if it was

perimeter or post player and he would thrive in that role as well.

"He rebounds well and he is as good as anyone in Northern Michigan when he is aggressive," Redman added. "I can't wait to go watch him play at the next level!"

resulted in a sloppy game that we should have come out on top. It also taught me to never take things for granted, you never know when things will end so you have to take advantage of every moment."

Calcaterra also noted that coach Redman had taught him so much throughout his time on the varsity.

"My prior roles were a lot different than my role this year, at the beginning of this year, he and I had a one-on-one talk about my role on the team and how to be a leader. He said every time I showed up in the gym I had to always go 100 percent. On top of that I had to be a vocal leader and have positive enthusiasm towards the team. Off the court I just have to be a good teammate, have everyone's back and look out for them.

He then had a few comments on committing to Michigan Tech.
"Coming into a great program like MTU means that I am going to have to earn everything," he said. "It is an excellent program so it will take a lot of hard work to earn a significant role. Because I was late to grow, I feel like I still have a lot of developing to do as a player. The coaches and I will have to decide if red-shirting would be a better option for me to allow me time to develop."

At this time, Pete plans to go into general Engineering and from there hopefully he will find a branch that fits him well and pursue that.

Calcaterra also wanted to thank a few people that were with him along his school career. "My parents most of all," he noted. "They have always been there supporting me throughout this journey. From taking me to travel basketball tournaments to my mom helping me recover from injuries, they have always been there for me. Secondly I can't give enough tanks to Coach Redman and the things he has done for this program and me personally. I have learned just as many life lessons as basketball things. And lastly I would like to thank my teammates who came into practice every day and helped me and the team get better. And especially Max (Vondra) and Aidan (Brehm). Max has always been by my side throughout sports since day one. Aidan and I would really push each other in practice this year and I think that really helped us both as basketball players.

Pete was also selected Honorable Mention All-State in Division 2, while also being selected first team All-Lake Michigan Conference.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR JACKSON RAYMOND

East Jordan, #5, senior

This young man literally put the East Jordan basketball team on his shoulders and willed them to victories on both ends of the floor, despite being the focus of opponents upon entering the gym.

While he was another high-flyer that was also the go-to guy when a hoop was needed on the offensive end, Jackson put up some amazing numbers, scoring 18.6 points, grabbing 8.0 rebounds, dishing out 2.4 assists and making 2.0 deflections along with 2.2 steals per game.

He also shot nearly 48 percent from the field and over 37 percent from beyond the arc. In the last week of the regular season, he rattled off 84 points, helping the Red Devils enter the tourney on a hot streak.


"I was shocked when I heard the news and I am very grateful! Raymond said upon learning of his DPOY selection.

In regards to the season, Raymond was happy for the Division 3 All-State Honorable Mention.

"(As an individual) I'm still hungry," he noted. "As a team we aren't happy about our record but we all knew the record doesn't matter in the tournament."

Coach Dzwik had a few things to say about Raymond's work ethic and ability to get the job done.

"The only thing that really stands out about Jackson's defense is that he always wanted to guard the other team's best player," he said. "We would try to start games with him

guarding someone else to save his legs but after a few possessions or if they would score he would come to the bench and get the coaches to switch him onto the guy or in some cases would just talk to the team and get the switch out on his own and we would talk about it later. It was a big part of his leadership on the team! His growth as a player was most evident this year on defense in not only that desire to guard the other teams best player but also in learning to play in good

Dzwik also noted that as a defender who could guard all five spots on the floor with great success, Jackson really allowed EJ to get some positive matchups for everyone else on the team and allowed them to be successful.

position and without fouling.

"It wasn't often that he struggled on offense but the best part of Jackson this year was that he didn't carry that over onto the defensive side, in fact it seemed to drive him to give motivation to give more effort and work harder to get stops."

"Another thing with Jackson that was really impressive this year is that he truly believed that the defensive possession wasn't over until we had the ball rebounded and headed the other direction," the coach added. "He took great pride in getting rebounds and making sure that his man didn't get the rebound. I will say that all of this is really great and for coaches and teams these are things that win games and frustrate the other team, but the most fun part of his defense was that he knew how to play passing lanes and get steals which lead to a bunch of his 13 dunks on the year. While that defense led to loud and fun offense, those dunks would get the crowd into the game and would provide a lot of energy that improved our team defense. It was a lot of fun to watch the crowd stand up and hear them start to cheer when he would anticipate a

passing lane."

"I've learned that the title 'floor general' or 'captain,' isn't just given to players," Jackson said. "You have to earn it just like everything else in the world"

While his time in EJ has some to a close, Raymond will continue his playing days at Alma, where he will suit up for both the football and

basketball teams.

"I'm not too sure if they plan on playing me right away for football or basketball to be honest," he noted. "If they don't, I will be putting in major work in the weight room, field, and court. It sounds like they want me at the WR position in football. For basketball I'll play any position they tell me to."

At this time, Jackson plans to study marketing and pursue his bachelor's degree.

"I would like to thank anyone who has coached me, anyone I've played against and anyone I've played with," Ramond added. "Also I would like to thank the community of East Jordan because they would show out to every game it feels like."

A couple of key highlights on the defensive end for Raymond would be throwing down a huge dunk in the season opener against Bellaire, where the Red Devils were struggling to find energy and tempo, he used his quick hands to make a steal and win the race to the rim, resulting in a helping set the tone for EJ on the season and created a buzz around the school and community.

Jackson limited Mancelona's Jayden Alfed to only four points and 1 rebound in the first half of the Red Devils matchup with the Ironmen.

Against Cheboygan he did a great job of getting a box out on the weak side of a long 3-point attempt, getting the rebound and ran out for a huge dunk that provided a big spark which started a 25-point comeback to win that game.

Against Harbor Springs at home, the Red Devils went full court pressure with three minutes to go and down 10, Raymond made four steals, had one block and three rebounds in that stretch.

Shutting out one of rival Charlevoix's top offensive threats in Jacob Mueller, holding him to 0 points and only five boards in that contest.

He helped EJ to an OT win over Kalkaska, shutting down Nathan Blasco in the last two minutes of regulation and the last three minutes of the extra session, holding him scoreless over that time frame, before knocking down the game winner with 3.5 seconds to

In tournament play, he held
Inland Lakes Nathaniel Wandrie to
10 points and rebounds below his
season averages in the opener, while
in the semifinal, he held Harbor's
David Harrell to only 2 points and 2
boards over the final three quarters
of play.

BOYNE CITY MAX VONDRA

#10, senior

A four-year fixture for the Ramblers, Vondra has been a key leader (both on and off the court) for the program over the past three seasons, especially the last two years.

The vocal team leader would match-up with the opponent's best big man and do his part in shutting him down, while also playing floor general and directing traffic each and every night on the court.

Max's basketball IQ was off the charts, and using his smarts, he would take opponents out of their game and set up teammates for easy scoring opportunities.

"Max was our do-it-all guy, our "Draymond Green," coach Nick Redman said. "He is a great leader, a winner and would have been playing for his 4th district championship."

He averaged 9.6 points, 4.3 rebounds and 2.9 assists per game for the Ramblers.

Vondra was also a first team LMC selection.

AIDAN BREHM #12, junior

One of the best two-way players in the area. The junior

multi-position player could drop a 20 point, 10 rebound game any night, or lockdown an opponent's top offensive threat.

"Aidan played hard on both ends of the floor and will be one of the best in the area next year," coach Redman noted.

Another area player that made a living above the rim, Brehm averaged 10.4 points, 4.3 rebounds and 1.5 assists per game this season and turned in a number of doubledoubles this year.

Brehm was a LMC Honorable Mention selection.

BOYNE FALLS TYLER GELLIS

#3 junior

One of the best scorers in the area, the Logger captain averaged 19.1 points per game (over 20 ppg in Northern Lakes Conference play), increased his productivity by nearly double under the guidance of Frank Hamilla, who returned to coach Boyne Falls after a successful stint on the girls sideline in Gaylord.

He recorded a game his of 35 this season and was the teams leading rebounder at 4.3 per game.

"Tyler was our go to guy this year," coach Hamilla noted. "If we needed a basket we would set up a play for him and most times he would get us the basket. Tyler spends extra time after practice working on his game. He is a good example for our players to follow."

Gellis was also a first team selection in the NLC and received Division 4 All-State Honorable Mention.

CHARLEVOIX EVAN SOLOMON

#12, sophomore

A fixture on the floor for the Rayders, Solomon took the next step in becoming the leader of the team in his second season on the Rayder varsity.

He would light up opponents from well beyond the arc or take them to the rack if they tried to close out on him.

Evan averaged 18.1 points, 5.2 rebounds, 2.5 assists, 1.5 steals per game this season, while shooting 42 from long-range.

Solomon was first team LMC selection and Division 3 All-State Honorable Mention.

JACOB MUELLER

#24, junior

In his third season on the Rayder varsity, the 6-5 post/perimeter player could do damage to opponents no matter where he operated within the offense. He could score inside, outside or off the dribble and above the rim.

Jacob averaged 14.4 points, 7.6 rebounds and 1.6 blocks a game, while shooting 56 percent from the field and 79 percent from the charity stripe

Mueller was a first team LMC selection and Division 3 All-State Honorable Mention.

LUKE STUCK

#50, senior

A fixture in the post for the Rayders, the physical and fundamentally sound Stuck would take opponents to the rack for an easy two points and a trip to the free throw line, or set a key screen to free up one of Charlevoix's longrange threats.

On the defensive end, Luke would not allow anyone to take the position they wanted near the block, and limited opponents to one shot.

In his final season on the varsity, Stuck averaged 7.4 points per game and hauled in 6.5 rebounds each night

COOPER STEVENSON

#54, senior

A three-year starter for East Jordan, Cooper continued to

improve his game.

He would often see double or triple teams in the paint, yet he would establish position and get where he wanted on the court.

The senior averaged 12.9 points, 6.4 rebounds, one assist and one steal per game for the Red Devils, while shooting 45 percent from the floor

"The part of his game that goes unnoticed is that he constantly has a double or triple team when he gets the ball in the paint so he has worked really hard on his shooting and has improved drastically!" coach Nate Dzwik said. "He was voted to be a captain of the team for the second straight year and has done a great job of leading the team and making sure everyone is giving the effort they need as well as speaking up in the locker room and showing guys in the program how hard we need to work."

"He is a leader of the school that all the kids look up to, his work ethic in the weight room has been a difference maker for all of our male programs as it has directly helped him get recruited for football and has made him a much better basketball and baseball player," the coach added. "A great kid that always greets people with a smile."

AJ BARTLETT

#3, senior

Another 3-year starter for the Red Devils. The streak shooter would often keep the Red Devils in the game with his hot shooting, while the team settled into their game plan.

AJ finished his senior campaign dropping 8.9 points per game on 42.6 percent shooting, while also grabbing 3.0 rebounds and dishing out 2.1 assists and making 1.3 steals per game.

"He has been a constant for the team with being a voice that pushes the kids to go harder," coach Nate Dzwik said. "He does a great job of creating offense not only for himself but for also getting his teammates good looks. AJ has a huge basketball IQ and that helps both him and his team out tremendously."

ELLSWORTH ETHAN TORNGA

#25, senior

One of the best big men in the area, the senior helped lead the Lancers to a 20-2 record and were poised to earn a Division 4 district title.

Tornga averaged 20.5 points, 11.2 rebounds (including 4.7 offensive), 3.3 assists, 3 steals and 2.3 blocks per game this year for Ellsworth, while shooting nearly 59 percent from the field.

"He has been on varsity as long as I have been coaching," coach Jarod Steenwyk said. "He is a great player and will be missed next year. He has been a part of three conference championships, finishing second his freshman year, tying his sophomore year and undefeated his junior and senior year. That is tough to do no matter what conference you are in. He was (also) a big part of our run to the district finals last year."

Ethan eclipsed the 1000 point career mark earlier this season and was a first team Northern Lakes Conference selection and Division 4 All-State Honorable Mention.


COACH OF THE YEAR

MATT STUCK

Charlevoix

Going into the season, I think the entire area knew that each respective school had the right coach in place to lead their respective program and while this could have gone to anyone of them, the 2019-2020 honor goes to Charlevoix coach Matt Stuck.

"We knew going into the season that the team was going to have

good senior leadership and depth," Stuck said. "Those are two great pieces any coach would love to have when entering a season. Basketball is a long athletic season and as coaches we need the player leadership to help make sure the team is getting the most out of every practice so they can continue

to improve throughout the year. The team depth allowed our practices to be as intense as some games, which helped us to improve every day. That same depth is what also made us flexible on game nights. We had multiple quality players and that allows coaches to substitute more easily as the game

situations change. It allows a coach to play foul situations and game situations much differently than a coach that doesn't have the same depth of quality players. Our biggest problem might have been finding enough minutes for all the deserving players, but we never had an issue. That circles back to the

senior leadership we had and how much team chemistry this group had. This group of players just wanted to win."

When asked about what were a few key moments throughout the season, he noted a victory in Elk Rapids, a place that the team has struggled to play in previous years, was one.

"However, in my mind the loss at Traverse City St. Francis might have been the turning point to our season," he noted. "We came out and made a lot of early shots, but then got beat handily. I think that game really made us as coaches and players tighten our focus on our goals. The game immediately following the St. Francis loss was against Glen Lake. When the team immediately bounced back and won that game in overtime we knew we had a mentally tough team and it showed the rest of the season as they never lost again."

With this season now closed, Charlevoix will graduate eight

seniors from the program. "We lose eight seniors and great leadership. We will have four returning varsity players that have all played on the varsity the past two seasons. All four of those players will need to continue to work hard as their roles will need to increase. We will need to have players step-up and show the same leadership qualities on and off the court that this year's group showed. Our Junior Varsity team was a very solid team and had quite a few good players and good athletes that could become good players. With the eight seniors that are departing we have a large number of game minutes that are going to be available. Who takes those minutes will be determined by which players are going to be willing to put the hard work in during the off-season.'

Stuck also wanted to say thank you for being chosen Coach of Year. "It is a very nice honor, but anyone who has ever coached knows you can't win without some talent. I would say Charlevoix Basketball and I were fortunate to not only have that talent but also to have good kids, good program coaches, and good parents. It has been a great group to coach."

The Charlevoix County News would like to thank the student-athletes, coaches, administrators, parents and fans for making this another great season of high school basketball. We would also like to thank East Jordan Public School and AD Phyllis Olszewski for opening up the EJ gymnasium and allowing us to gather for the photoshoot.

While this season did not come with the end we all hoped for, we look forward to next year and yet another great group of ball players to cheer on.


