Governor Gretchen Whitmer signed Executive Order 2020-77 to extend Michigan's Stay Home, Stay Safe order to May 28. The governor's order will allow manufactur ing workers, including those at Michigan's Big 3 auto com panies, to resume work on Monday, May 11 as part of her MI Safe Start Plan.

"This is good news for our state, our businesses, and our working families," said Governor Whitmer. "We're not out of the woods yet, but this is an important step forward on our MI Safe Start plan to re-engage our economy safely and responsibly. As we continue to phase in sectors of our economy, I wi keep working around the clock to ensure our businesses adopt best practices to protect workers from the spread of COVID-19. When we all keep doing our part, we can reduce the risk of a second wave and re-engage our economy safely and responsibly."

This year. National Police Week is being recognized the week of May 10 through 16 across the nation. Law enforcement officers, government officials, and citizens will pay tribute to those officers who have paid the ultimate sacrifice by losing their lives in the line of duty while protecting and serving the public. During a virtual Candlelight Vigil that was held on May 13, the names of each of the 307 men and women that will be added to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial this vear were read aloud in memory of their sacrifice. The 307 names being engraved on the Memorial's walls this year will be added to the 21,910 fallen officers already there, representing 50 states, the District of Columbia, U.S. territories, federal law enforcement, and military police agencies. The virtual broadcast re-

placed the traditional Candlelight Vigil ceremony held on the National Mall, which has drawn more than 30,000 first responders, surviving families, and law enforcement supporters annually. The virtual ceremony included special remarks by

more than 50 guests, including the Honorable Chad Wolf, Acting Secretary, U.S. Department of Homeland Security; the Honorable Steny Hoyer, Majority Leader, U.S. House of Representatives; Dermot Shea, New York Police Commissioner; Cerelyn J. Davis, National President, National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives: Patrick Yoes, National President, Fraternal Order of Police; Tom Selleck, Joe Mantegna, and John Walsh. and the chief executives of some of the nation's Fortune 500 corporations, all paving tribute to the fallen U.S. law enforcement officers.

The roots of National Police Week reach back to 1962, when President John F. Kennedy signed a proclamation that designated May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week following as Police Week. In August 1981, the Fraternal Order of Police National Auxiliary Board voted to hold the first National Peace Officers' Memorial Day Service on Capitol Hill at Senate Park the following May.

### East Jordan High School plans graduation ceremony



# **Charlevoix Community Foundation grant cycle announced**

The Charlevoix County Community Foundation is announcing changes to the upcoming grant cycle in response to changing needs in our communities. Formerly called Community Project Support, the cycle was originally scheduled to have an application due date of May 1, 2020 and was intended to provide support for community projects and programs in several focus areas including arts & culture, veterans assistance, health and wellness, urgent needs, and more. However, due to the current COVID-19 crisis our communities are facing, the Community Foundation has moved the grant cycle deadline to June 1, 2020. The cycle will now be called Organizational Support and will provide opportunities for eligible nonprofits to apply for support for not only community projects but also for general operating

support. The Community Foundation conducted a survey in late April with more than 55 nonprofit partners weighing in. Overwhelmingly, the need for general operational support for nonprofits rose to the top, resulting in the addition of an option to request operational support in the upcoming cycle. "Community foundations are well-positioned to respond to changing needs in the community," said Chip

Hansen, President of the Charlevoix County Community Foundation, "and the creation of this new grant cycle is a great example of how we can continue to be there for our community in times of change and crisis.'

The Organizational Support cycle is the latest effort by the Community Foundation to respond to changing needs and help local organizations. The new application is now available for eligible nonprofits to apply for general support. Since funds are limited and C3F anticipates a large response, one application of up to \$5,000 per organization may be submitted. More information and specifics can be found at c3f.org.

In mid-March the Community Foundation rolled out its first change in grant opportunities by opening a new Urgent Needs grant cycle. This cycle has no deadline; instead, requests are reviewed, and grants are awarded on a weekly basis. The focus of the Urgent Needs grant cycle is to provide support for organizations serving those in need on the front lines of the COVID-19 crisis. Organizations who are providing food, shelter, safety, healthcare, heating and utility assistance, and other basic and urgent needs are prioritized to receive these funds. So far, more than \$86,000 has been granted in Urgent Needs funds to organizations like the Manna Food Project and local food pantries, Good Samaritan Family Services, the Women's Resource Center, and others providing basic needs or connecting local residents to essential services and resources. This grant cycle is ongoing, and organizations can learn more about how to apply at c3f.org.

All of this work and more is made possible by the generous donors who have contributed to the Community Foundation's funds over the years and in recent weeks. The Community Endowment is the Community Foundation's tool for responding to needs and moving promising opportunities forward; nonprofit partners currently need general operations support as performances, services, and fundraisers are cancelled. The Community Endowment is available to

respond. The Urgent Needs Fund supports individuals and families in need throughout Charlevoix County with grants to nonprofit partners and is currently supporting the ongoing Urgent Needs Cycle.

The Community Foundation anticipates that needs will continue for some time and may even increase before things start to get better. People who are interested in helping friends and neighbors in need through the Community Foundation can make a gift to these funds at c3f.org.

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan wants to thank our communities and residents for taking the necessary precautions to protect one another during this time. We know this has been difficult for our community and residents in a variety of ways, however, we also know that lives have been saved. These necessary steps taken to reduce the spread of COVID-19 continue to allow specific industries

to safely re-engage and resume in-person work.

As detailed in the MI Safe Start Plan, the following are six phases to re-engaging Michigan's economy: Uncontrolled Growth, Persistent Spread, Flattening, Improving, Containing and Post-Pandemic. According to the State of Michigan's press release, we are currently in the flattening phase, "in the Flattening phase, the epidemic is no longer increasing and the health- system's capacity is sufficient for current needs.'

Lisa Peacock, Health Officer, shares, "the MI Safe Start Plan helps us to understand not only where we are now, but also provides direction for future planning. Although Michigan is currently in phase 3, we know that things change quickly, and we should continue working to prepare for subsequent phases as re-en-

gagement expands. This is very encouraging for all!"

As of May 11, under the Governor's Executive Order 2020-77, the manufacturing industry is able to resume in-person work. Those who are returning to in-person work must follow the protocols outlined in this Executive Order. Industry specific toolkits to support employers and employees returning to work can be found on our website.

On May 11, the Health Department of Northwest Michigan is reporting: Positive COVID-19 cases in the following counties: Antrim – 10, Charlevoix - 13, Emmet -21, Otsego – 98. Recovered COVID-19 cases in the following counties: Antrim - 8, Charlevoix - 11, Emmet - 19, Otsego-45. Confirmed COVID-19 deaths in the following counties: Charlevoix 1, Emmet – 2, Otsego – 10. The State of Michigan has reported 47,138 cases and 4,551 deaths; and as of May 8, cumulative recovered cases: 22,686.

# EDUCATION NEWS Bond will fund improvements and additions to Boyne City School facilities

#### **BY KAREN WALKER**

The Boyne City School Board moved their last regular meeting forward from May 11th to May 7th to authorize the sale of \$18 million in bonds. The bond money will be used to finance the first of two phases of improvements and additions to school facilities. Bovne School Superintendent Patrick Little explained the bond market has been very stable recently and current interest rates are lower than what he had projected. However, he noted, "The longer we wait, the greater the odds of something changing, that's one of the reasons we want to get going."

Some of the initial construction goals for 2021 include: Boyne City Middle School improvements, including major science room

renovations; an extension to the Middle School cafeteria; and replacement of auditorium stage lights, sound, and curtains. Some repairs to the performing arts center have already been approved and will start soon. Construction of the new field house and connector between the middle and high schools is also

expected to start next year. Mr. Little informed the Board the main part of the construction will not start for about a year, but design work for the new facility will start immediately. An ad-hoc committee will be assembled to help steer decision making of the final design. During the meeting,

School Board member Ross McLane voiced his concern for project costs if the building design needs to be changed. McLane remarked, "we've been directed to ramp up our off-campus learning infrastructure and my fear is that we're committed to a building that maybe (worse case) is obsolete because everything is off-campus all of a sudden."

Voters narrowly approved the bond proposal at the May 5th election with 1,236 voting yes and 1,127 voting no. In a letter to Boyne area parents, students, staff, and community members, Superintendent Little thanked voters stating, "The outcome of this vote is a confirmation of the Boyne community's legacy of promoting education and building opportunities.'



Voters in the Charlevoix Public School District approved a \$4 million bond proposal in the May 5th election with a total of 1,545 voting ves, and 1,065 opposed.

In an email to the Charlevoix County News, Charlevoix Public School Superintendent Michael Ritter explained, "The school bond will allow our district to continue to make needed improvements to our facilities. while supporting our transportation department with a new bus each school year." He added, "It will also provide dollars to support instructional technology

updates and MacBook and iPad device rotations, which have been critical supports during this time of remote

learning in particular." Also passed in the last election was a school operational millage, approved with 1,912 yes votes, 697 no. Mr. Ritter noted, "The operating millage will allow us to continue to levy 18 mills on all of our non-homestead property, which is approximately 70% of our district's annual budget." # Charlevoix and Antrim Counties are lagging behind on census count

#### **BY TINA SUNDELIUS**

There's no doubt that so far 2020 has been a journey through untraveled waters and we have all been distracted, worried and out of sorts as a result. However. things will eventually go back into a current of normalcy and policies that are already in place will be enacted. I'm talking about those things affected by the 2020 census survey. \$675 Billion will be distributed through 55 federal programs and it would be a grievous mistake if Antrim



County doesn't end up with enough funding because we are under reported. If we are not counted now, we will be undercounted for the next 10 years.

Under counted means our roads, schools and medical facilities all get less money. Getting an accurate count has a huge impact on communities, The funds support vital programs. In 2016, Michigan received \$29 billion distributed based on data derived from the 2010 Census. For every resident not counted, Michigan stands to lose an estimated \$3,000 per person per year in federal funds. That adds up quickly.

Census results affect planning and funding for programs such as Head Start, Pell Grants, school lunches, rural education, adult education, and grants for preschool special education. As well as, Medicaid, Medicare Part B, State Children's Health Insurance, and the prevention and treatment of substance abuse. Highway planning and construction, Section 8 housing, federal transit, community development, and rural water and waste disposal systems are also financed guided by data derived from the Census.

Nationwide 56.8% of the population has responded, statewide we are ahead with 63.5% having already responded but here in Charlevoix County only 45.2%

and Antrim County only 37.4% have responded. In the 2010 Census the Village of Ellsworth was reported to have a higher median income than the cities of East Jordan and Charlevoix. This inaccurate information has cause delays and denials for needed funding for multiple much necessary projects. The most recent is the waste water system. A needed step into the 20th (yes, not the 21st Century). In order to secure needed grants and financing the village spent nearly 3

years sorting out the misinformation and re-surveying the community.

The Census is easy and safe. It has been pared down to 9 questions and it takes less than 10 minutes for most households to complete. There are laws in place protecting personal information. Because of COVID-19 the deadline to respond has been extended to October 31, 2020. This is something small we can all do that can have a big impact on our community. www.my2020census.gov

Under Executive Order 2020-77, manufacturing facilities must adopt measures to protect their workers from the spread of COVID-19. All of us know the importance of getting people back to work and the economy moving again. We've already reopened lower-risk sectors like construction, manufacturing, and lawn care.

"The worst thing we can do is open up in a way that causes a second wave of infections and death, puts health care workers at further risk, and wipes out all the progress we've made. That's why we will continue to monitor the spread of this virus, hospital capacity, testing rates, and more as we work toward reaching the 'improving' phase."

The governor's Stay Home, Stay Safe order remains in effect until May 28, 2020. Under this order, Michiganders still must not leave their homes except to run critical errands, to engage in safe outdoor activities, or to go to specified jobs. keep serving the people of Charlevoix and Emmet counties" said Judge Lasher. ### Health Department resuming some environmental health services

On May 1, 2020 the Governor signed Executive Order 2020-70, lifting previous restrictions and allowing work to resume on May 7 for residential and commercial construction, as well as other work traditionally performed outdoors. As a result, the Health Department of Northwest Michigan is able to resume some environmental health permitting and evaluation services.

Under the Stay Home, Stay Safe Executive Order, the health department was restricted to providing critical services which were necessary to protect or prolong life. In compliance with these orders, our environmental health division has been conducting only emergency land use services, while also prioritizing our COVID-19 response.

Scott Kendzierski, Health Department of Northwest Michigan Environmental Health Director shared, "several weeks ago, many of our services were scaled back to minimize the risks to our staff and the community. Our mission, as a public health agency, shifted to focus our efforts to stopping the transmission of this deadly disease."

During the COVID-19 response, the environmental health division reduced its land use programs to addressing failed water and wastewater systems, complaint investigations due to imminent public health threats, and communicable disease response and services necessary to support critical infrastructure workers. Throughout the COVID-19 response, land use sanitarians assumed roles in the areas of both logistics and enforcement throughout the emergency response supporting operations through activities such as facilitating

the opening of local drivethrough testing facilities and lab operations, local distribution of Personal Protective Equipment, as well as providing education and support for compliance with state and local orders.

Executive Order 2020-70 allows construction to resume, we intend to support the work of this industry with the necessary precautions to ensure the health and safety of our employees as well as the construction sector and the public. The physical health department windows will remain closed to the public and all services will require heightened safety measures, including: online application submission, scheduled appointments, client screening, adherence to social distancing practices, and routine use of Personal Protection Equipment (PPE).

"Things will look signifi-

cantly different than they did before COVID-19," Scott Kendzierski, Environmental Health Director said. "These challenges may result in delayed services, however, we ask for the public's patience as we strive to protect everyone involved through the implementation of these new processes."

In order to receive quick service, applicants are asked to submit a complete application. This includes all required fields filled out, a clear description of the project being applied for, and a detailed site plan. This will allow for the least amount of delays in processing the application and service completion.

### Public tree-planting grants available via partnership

Awards will be announced in August and projects must be completed by May 31, 2021.

# East Jordan Family Health Center to offer Drive Thru Covid-19 testing by appointment

The East Jordan and Bellaire Family Health Centers continues to work daily to help mitigate the spread of COVID-19 and are proud of the hard work that our staff has put into protecting our community and developing a plan for future care. East Jordan Family Health Center will be offering Drive-Thru COVID testing based on MDHHS and CDC guidelines and priorities in addition to the Bellaire Family Health Center drive thru testing location.

East Jordan and Bellaire Family Health Centers will offer drive thru testing for individuals on Monday, Wednesday, and Fridays from 12 pm – 4 pm. Testing will be available by appointment only and for those have been referred by their primary care provider. Individuals do not need to be a current patient of the East Jordan & Bellaire Family Health Center to receive testing but will need a provider's order or undergo a prescreening prior to testing.

If you feel you are displaying symptoms or fall within the MDHHS testing priorities, contact the health center's COVID Drive Thru Testing Line at 231-222-2320 to be prescreened and/or schedule an appointment.

Testing is a self-administered Nasal Swab test. The process allows the patient to swirl the swab inside their own nose and then the swab is placed in a container and sent to a lab for testing.

"Testing remains critical to our efforts to slow the spread of the virus," said Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, MDHHS chief medical executive and chief deputy for health. "Increased testing helps us understand where this disease is so we can identify people at highest risk and make sure we are quickly implementing best practices for preventing further cases and deaths."

As a reminder, please contact the health center to discuss the need to be seen in person, as we continue to consider our responsibility to protect you and our staff from COVID-19. # Michigan Department of Transportation lifts remaining spring weight restrictions on state highways

As of 6 a.m. Friday, May 8, the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) lifted remaining spring weight restrictions on all state trunkline highways in the entire state of Michigan. State routes typically carry M, I, or US designations. This spring weight restriction update does not alter or affect the direction given in Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's Executive Order 2020-44 (COVID-19). Permits will still be required for loads exceeding the normal legal limits.

County road commissions and city

public works departments put in place their own seasonal weight restrictions, which usually, but not always, coincide with state highway weight restrictions. Signs are generally posted to indicate which routes have weight restrictions in effect.

Weight restrictions on state highways are implemented during the spring frost thaw period and are now completed for the 2020 season. A typical timeframe for these restrictions is from February to May, with specific dates determined by weather and road conditions. They will be posted again when the 2021 season starts.

www.michigan.gov/truckers, under "Restrictions." All-season routes are designated in green and gold on the MDOT Truck Operators Map, which is available online. # Most MDOT roadside parks reopening May 15

Most roadside parks operated by the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) will reopen for the season Friday, May 15. However, the Lake Michigan Shores Roadside Park on US-31 in Charlevoix County will remain closed for a few more weeks until shoreline repairs are made. MDOT maintains 85 roadside parks around the state. Parks in the Upper Peninsula and northern Lower Peninsula operate seasonally, usually closing in late October and reopening in the spring.

While most parks are scheduled to be open May 15, motorists should not expect drinking water to be turned on until sometime later in May, after annual testing and treatment of the park water systems is completed.
