Tommy Tropic Guinness World Record attempt

On Friday, August 7 at 6:30 pm, Tommy Tropic will attempt to break the Guinness Record for "Farthest distance traveled on inline skates whilst juggling three objects" on the Boyne Valley Bike Path, starting near Dam Road and finishing at Boyne Mountain. One mile will break the record, but he will try for 2.

The attempt is part of a fund-raising event for a 501c3 non-profit called ACT Katwe. ACT, or Acrobatics Circus Troupe, fights poverty with acrobatics and juggling. They currently work with around 200 kids in Katwe, the largest slum in Kampala, Uganda. They teach far more than circus arts. They, feed, mentor and sponsor kids for school and keep them out of gangs. They instill pride in these children and give them a sense of hope. They have stepped up their porridge program in these hard times of covid lockdowns. This, along with the cost of school supplies and uniforms, has been a struggle for them and we hope to be able to help them out. https://www.actkatwe.org/

The event starts at 5 pm with a cocktail hour on the lawn of the Mountain Grand Hotel at Boyne Mountain Resort with Master of Ceremonies Scott MacKenzie. Strict COVID 19 guidelines will be in place and tickets limited to 150. We ask all attendees to wear masks and social distance. We will have plenty of room to do so. There will be a silent auction with cool items including some Rolling Stones memorabilia. Also great entertainment with Tommy Tropic, Clark Lewis, and Twisted-Style Freerunning.

At 6 Tommy and his team will head out to the starting point near Dam Road. There is a trail head parking lot there for those wishing to see the start of the record attempt at 6:30 pm. The one-mile mark, and the point at which Tommy will have achieved a record, is near the Boyne Falls School and that parking lot. Tommy will attempt to continue across M-75 to Boyne Mountain Resort, finishing in front of the Mountain Grand Hotel, a total distance of two miles.

COUNTY **PROPOSALS**

- Recycling Millage:

This proposal will permit the County to renew the current levy of .15 mill for recycling purchases and programs. The electors previously approved a similar millage in 2016, which expired in 2019.

Shall the tax limitation on the amount of taxes which may be imposed on taxable property in Charlevoix County, State of Michigan, be increased by .15 mills (15 cents \$.15) per thousand dollars (\$1,000) of taxable value for a period of four (4) years, 2020 through 2023 inclusive, for the purpose of capital purchases and recycling programs? If approved and levied in its entirety, it is estimated that the .15 mill would raise an estimated \$332,014 for the County when first levied in 2020.

- Senior Citizen Millage:

This proposal will permit the County to renew the current levy of .65 mills for senior citizen programs. The electors previously approved .65 mills senior millage in 2016, which expired in 2019.

Shall the tax limitation on general ad valorem taxes within Charlevoix County imposed under Article IX, Sec. 6 of the Michigan Constitution be increased for Charlevoix County Commission on Aging by .65 mills or 0.65 per 1,000.00 of taxable value for a period of four (4) years, 2020 through 2023 inclusive, for the purpose of supporting existing and implementing additional Senior Citizen programs? If approved and levied in its entirety, it is estimated that the .65 (65/100) mill would raise an estimated \$1,438,727 for the County when first levied in 2020.

TOWNSHIP

Boyne Valley

- Proposal For Ambulance Millage:

This proposal will permit the Township to levy up to 1 mill for the purpose of providing funds for equipping, operating, and maintaining an ambulance service within the township.

Shall the limitation on the amount of ad valorem taxes which may be levied by the Township of Boyne Valley, Charlevoix County, Michigan, against taxable property in the Township be increased by up to 1 mill (\$1.00 per \$1,000 of taxable value) for a period of four (4) years, 2020 through 2023, inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for equipping, operating, and maintaining an ambulance service within the township, and shall the Township levy such millage for these purposes? If approved and levied in its entirety, this millage would raise an estimated \$155,278 for the Township in 2020.

Chandler

- Proposal to Renew Fire Millage and provide **Emergency Medical Services:**

This proposal will permit the Township to renew the Township's 1 mill for fire department operations and for the purchase of fire department equipment previously approved by the electors and now expired.

This proposal will also provide funding of 1/4 mill for Emergency Medical Services.

Shall the limitations on the amount of ad valorem taxes which may be levied by the Township of Chandler, Charlevoix County, Michigan, against taxable property in the Township be increased by up to one and one quarter (1-1/4) mills (\$1.25 per \$1,000.00 of taxable value) for a period of four (4) years, 2020 through 2023 inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for fire department operations, purchase of fire department equipment, and for Emergency Medical Services, and shall the Township levy such millage for these purposes? If approved and leviedin its entirety, this millage would raise an estimated \$18,415.00 for the Township when first levied in 2020.

East Jordan City

- Proposal To Renew **Ambulance Operating** Millage:

This proposal will permit the Authority to levy up to .5 mills for the purpose of providing funds for operating and maintaining ambulance services within the territorial limits of the Authority in the years 2020-2023, inclu-

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be imposed on taxable property within the territorial limits of the Jordan Vallev Emergency Medical Service Authority, which is composed of Banks Township, Echo Township, and Jordan Township, Antrim County, Michigan, and the City of East Jordan and South Arm Township, Charlevoix County, Michigan, be increased by up to fifty cents (\$.50) per thousand dollars (\$1,000) (.5 mills) of the taxable value on all taxable property within the territorial limits of the Authority for four (4) years, 2020 through 2023 inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for operating and maintaining ambulance services within the territorial limits of the Authority, and shall the Jordan Valley Emergency Medical Service Authority Board be authorized to levy such millage for these purposes? If approved and levied in its entirety, it is estimated that the .5 mills would raise an estimated \$161,571 for the Authority when first levied in 2020.

Proposal For Fire Millage:

This proposal will permit the Township to levy up to .75 mills for the purpose of providing funds for fire protection.

Shall the limitation on the amount of ad valorem taxes which may be levied by the Township of South Arm, Charlevoix County, Michigan, against taxable property in the Township be increased by up to .75 mills (\$0.75per \$1,000 of taxable value) for a period of four (4) years,

2020 through 2023, inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for fire protection, and shall the Township levy such millage for this purpose? If approved and levied in its entirety, this millage would

raise an estimated\$78,162 for the Township when first levied in 2020.

Evangeline

- Proposal For Fire And **Ambulance Millage:**

This proposal will permit the Township to levy up to .8 mills for the purpose of providing funds for fire protection and ambulance services. The electors previously approved .8 mills for fire protection, which expired after the December, 2019 levy. Specifically, the proposal expands the use of the tax revenue collected to both fire protection and ambulance services.

Shall the limitation on the amount of ad valorem taxes which may be levied by the Township of Evangeline, Charlevoix County, Michigan, against taxable property in the Township be increased by up to .8 mills (\$.80 per \$1,000 of taxable value) for a period of four (4) years, 2020 through 2023, inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for fire protection services, and shall the Township levy such millage for this purpose? If approved and levied in its entirety, this millage would raise an estimated \$65,377 for the Township in

- Proposal To Renew Road Millage:

This proposal reestablishes the 2 mill road millage previously approved by the electors that expired after the December, 2019 levy. Specifically, the proposal renews the previously levied 1.9790 mills and restores the .0210mills previously rolled back by the Headlee Amendment.

East Jordan School district prepares for classes in the fall

Expect a million dollars less in State funding

At their regular monthly board meeting last Monday, the East Jordan School Board reviewed the State's recommendations and mandates for bringing students back to school this fall. School Superintendent Matt Stevenson presented an update on the school's COVID-19 Preparedness & Response Plan. He said the school is planning for three different scenarios based on phase 3, 4, and 5 of Governor Whitmer's Safe Start Plan which outlines how we will re-engage while continuing to keep our communities safe. Northern Michigan is currently in phase 5, although Stevenson

noted the area has recently taken a few steps backward with an increase of COVID-19 cases locally.

Mr. Stevenson explained that if the district is in phase 3 of the Safe Start Plan, the school would be looking at remote learning, with all instruction held online. He said the state has a large number of mandates in place for schools that are in phase 4 including face coverings and keeping groups of students separated. Phase 5 includes fewer mandates and more strong recommendations for school safety protocols. Stevenson noted that the social/emotional well-being of students plays a large part in

the plan. The plan will have to be approved by both the Charlevoix-Emmet Intermediate School District and the State. Stevenson noted that students and parents can expect to see East Jordan School's plan the first week of August.

Stevenson informed the Board that East Jordan School district is looking at a million dollars less in State funding for the 2020/2021 school year then they had last year. He said they have been working really hard the past years to improve the school's finances, and the school's fund balance in particular and have made some necessary tough decisions for

the welfare of the district. Stevenson said they don't want to lose any staff but since 85% of the budget is spent on people, a lot of the cuts have to come from staff. Ultimately, the Board approved placing three full time teachers and one bus driver on layoff. Stevenson noted that even with the layoffs, the school is working to maintain opportunities for students.

East Jordan School's Business Manager, Brian Olszewski pointed out that currently the State is estimating nearly a billion dollars less in school funding to be available statewide for the coming school year. Stevenson said he expects to have

firm numbers from the State by mid-September this year, but current projections are for an estimated decrease of \$650 per pupil, versus the possible \$225 per pupil increase the school was anticipating before the pandemic. East Jordan School currently receives \$8111 per pupil in State funding.

The Board also approved a ten cent increase in school lunch prices. The new lunch charge will be \$3.05 for elementary students and \$3.15 for middle/high school. School officials are concerned about an anticipated increase of food costs in the coming months as well as the need for individual packaging

when serving some food items. Mr. Olszewski noted that even with the increase, he feels it is still a good price for the quality of meal provided.

Last Monday was also the Board's annual organizational meeting. Officers elected to serve this coming year are: Ted Sherman, President; Dan Harris, Vice President; Charlotte Diller, Secretary; Sarah Malpass, Treasurer. Dawn Burks was appointed to the Board to fill a vacancy left by Laura Snyder who is stepping down to coach varsity volleyball.

Energy efficiency & costs-saving tips

- Use shading devices – blinds, curtains, window film and solar screens – on west and south-facing windows to block heat caused by sunlight in the

- Check heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) filters monthly, especially during the summer. A dirty filter will slow down air flow and make the system worker harder to keep you cool, wasting energy.

Most significantly, the order requires any business that is open to the public to refuse entry or service to people who refuse to wear a face covering, with limited exceptions. face covering while inside. Those who are exempt from wearing a mask in Michigan businesses include people younger than five years old, those who cannot medically tolerate a face covering, and those who are eating or drinking while seated at a food service establishment.

On Friday, the Governor issued a press release clarifying exceptions to the order. Although a face covering is strongly encouraged even for people who are not required to wear one, the requirement to wear a face covering does not apply to individuals who, among other things:

- Are younger than five years old;

- Cannot medically tolerate a face covering;

- Are eating or drinking while seated at a food service establishment;

MHSAA says Fall Sports to proceed

Michigan High School Athletic Association member schools will begin the 2020-21 school year playing Fall sports as traditionally scheduled, but with contingency concepts for potential interruptions due to the spread of COVID-19.

The MHSAA Representative Council, the Association, Äôs 19-member legislative body, met virtually with MHSAA staff Wednesday (July 15) to discuss a series of ideas for playing sports beginning in August. The Council will meet again July 29 for further discussion. Currently, high school football practices are scheduled to begin Aug. 10, with all other Fall sports to start practice Aug. 12.

The MHSAA is moving forward with a plan that first

calls for all Fall sports to be started and played as scheduled. However, if the situation deems it necessary, the start of some or all Fall sports practices or competitions could be delayed. The next step in the plan, Äôs progression calls for lower-risk Fall sports that can be played to be completed, with higherrisk Fall sports postponed until later in the school year. If all Fall sports must be suspended, they will be rescheduled during a reconfigured calendar that would see Winter sports begin in November followed by the conclusion of Fall and Spring seasons potentially extending into July

Additionally, the Council considered a concept that would swap traditional Fall and Spring sports, but determined that was not a feasible plan. Football, girls volleyball, girls swimming & diving

and boys soccer during the Fall are considered moderate or high-risk sports because they include athletes in close contact or are played indoors: they were considered the impetus for potentially switching all Fall sports to Spring. But traditional Spring sports Äì girls soccer and girls and boys lacrosse ,Äì carry similar risk, negating the value of making that full season switch. Moving only selected Spring sports, like all lowrisk to Fall, was not considered sound because it would force student-athletes to pick between sports they,Äôve

Plans remain reliant on progression by schools and regions across the state according to Governor Gretchen Whitmer,Äôs MI Safe Start Plan. Currently two regions are in Phase 5, which allow for limited indoor activity, while the rest are in Phase 4 and unable to host indoor training, practice or competition.

"Our student-athletes just want to play, and we,Äôve gone far too long without them playing. But doing so safely, of course, remains the priority," MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl said. "Our plan moving forward is Fall in the Fall, starting on time. We, Äôre excited to continue moving forward to bring back sports safely. It, Äôs important for keeping students in our schools and keeping students in our sports programs.

"We remain grateful to the Governor for the opportunity to build the schedule and policies for returning sports to schools. We will continue to support her directives and those of the state and local health departments as we work to create the safest environment for all involved in our activities."

The MHSAA staff is building COVID-related policies for all Fall sports and will make those guidelines and precautions available to member schools as the season approaches. Those policies will follow up what was presented to schools for summer offseason training, which began June 1 across

the state and has seen thousands of student-athletes participate.

The MHSAA is a private, not-for-profit corporation of voluntary membership by more than 1,500 public and private senior high schools and junior high/middle schools which exists to develop common rules for athletic eligibility and competition. No government funds or tax dollars support the MHSAA, which was the first such association nationally to not accept membership dues or tournament entry fees from schools. Member schools which enforce these rules are permitted to participate in MHSAA tournaments, which attract more than 1.4 million spectators each year.



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Dr. Fauci's Best Pieces Of Advice For Keeping Safe From Covid-19

Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), has been one of the most trusted voices of reason during the coronavirus pandemic. In a recent poll published by The New York Times, at least two thirds of Americans expressed faith in his leadership throughout the COVID crisis. That's why, when Fauci offers advice on how to stay safe from coronavirus, the world would be wise to

AVOID BARS

Fauci has been explicit in his advisory that people should stop frequenting bars. Not only do bars tend to be densely crowded, they're also often poorly ventilated—the perfect conditions for enabling superspreader events. "We need to really take seriously the issue of wearing masks all the time and not congregating in bars," Fauci explained in a recent interview with InStyle. "I think we can stop that by just closing [bars] because they are certainly an important mechanism of this spread." In other words, just because bars in your area are open, it doesn't necessarily mean they're

WEAR A MASK

Fauci urged public officials to be "as forceful as possible" in regards to getting citizens to wear masks, CNN reports. "When you have crowds of people together and you have the lack of wearing a mask, that increases the risk of there being transmissibility. I have no doubt about that," he explained in an interview for CNBC's Halftime Report. Though early on, Fauci advocated leaving masks to medical professionals, for the past several months he has been consistent in his messaging that mask-wearing is an essential line defense against the virus—and some thing we should all do every time we leave the house.

MAINTAIN SOCIAL DISTANCE

Fauci has been very clear in stating the importance of social distancing in response to the pandemic. In an interview for ABC's Powerhouse Politics podcast, Fauci stated that the "best way that you can avoid either acquiring or transmitting infection is to avoid crowded places," in conjunction with wearing a mask.

Additionally, he recently told a Senate committee that new coronavirus cases "could go up to 100,000 a day" if people don't practice social distancing and consistent mask-wearing in public. In response to a question from Senator Elizabeth Warren about the cause for climbing case numbers, Fauci pointed to instances of large gatherings. "Look at some of the film clips you've seen, of people congregating, often without masks," he said. By avoiding these gatherings, you can keep yourself and others safe. Be prepared for situations beyond your con-

Fauci has suggested that people should be prepared to be in a crowd, even if they don't leave the house expecting one. "It's become clear that even when you try to do with certain necessities of life —going out to get food, or going to a pharmacy to get medications—that you may inadvertently come into closer contact," he explained. For that reason, you should never leave the house without a mask and hand sani-

RECOGNIZE YOUR RE-SPONSIBILITY

Fauci hasn't been shy about calling on the American people to recognize their own role in the spread of coronavirus. "You have an individual responsibility to yourself, but you [also] have a societal responsibility," Fauci explained during a recent White House coronavirus task force briefing. "We've got to realize that we are part of the process," he added. Seeing yourself as someone who can help or hinder the crisis will remind you to make safer choices.

REMEMBER THAT **ASYMPTOMATIC PEO-PLE ARE CONTAGIOUS**

Fauci has frequently expressed his belief that the prevalence of asymptomatic cases is why so many people neglect to take the virus seriously, and why it subsequently spreads so easily from one person to the next. As Fauci explained in an interview for ABC Good Morning America, "25 percent [to] 45 percent of the totality of infected people likely are

without symptoms, and we know from epidemiological studies that they can transmit to someone who is uninfected even when they are without symptoms." The key is to act as though everyone has it, and take the necessary precautions.

GET THE VACCINE WHEN IT'S AVAILABLE

After reviewing data from Phase One of coronavirus vaccine trials, Fauci declared the results "very good news." "It's understandable, but unjustified," Fauci said in response to the skepticism. "We're not compromising safety; we're not compromising scientific integrity." In an interview with CNN, he expressed concern that we would fail to reach herd immunity if enough people decided against getting the vaccine. Instead. Fauci advises that once it's available, we should all get vaccinated.

GET TESTED IF YOU FEEL SICK

As far as Fauci is concerned, testing is a key part of the puzzle when it comes to slowing coronavirus. For that reason, he has advocated "flooding the system with testing, so you really get a good handle about what is going on in the community." If you feel symptoms and suspect you might have COVID-19, get tested as soon as possible, and begin isolating even before getting your results. This will stop you from spreading it to your family members and others.

TRUST RESPECTED **MEDICAL PROFES-SIONALS**

"Republican, Democrat, anybody else, we are all in this together," Fauci said in a recent virtual forum at Georgetown University. "I believe for the most part you can trust respected medical authorities. I believe I'm one of them, so I think you can trust me ... [and other experts] who have a track record of telling the truth." In other words, resist the urge to see the pandemic as a partisan issue, and focus on the facts from trusted medical professionals.

TAKE YOUR UNDER-LYING HEALTH CON-**DITIONS SERIOUSLY**

"This will be a recommendation." Fauci said in an interview on Meet the Press. "If you're a person with an underlying condition and you are particularly an elderly person with an underlying condition, you need to think twice about getting on a plane, on a long trip. And not only think twice. Just don't get on a cruise ship." If you have diabetes, hypertension, cancer, or any other co-morbidities, you should plan on exercising extreme caution until the pandemic is under control.

EXPECT PROGRESS TO BE GRADUAL

"We've got to have a delicate balance of carefully and prudently going towards nor-

mality," Fauci said on Friday, talking to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce Foundation in Washington. He has previously warned that having unrealistic expectations could lead people to get discouraged, but throwing up our hands and discontinuing necessary safety measures is simply not an option.

ONLY ALLOW CHIL-DREN TO PLAY IN GROUPS OF 5 TO 10

Fauci has encouraged people to be "realistic" about social distancing with children during these summer months. "A complete lockdown of children is going to be impossible as the summer months come," Fauci acknowledged. "I don't think it's going to be reasonable outside when kids are running around, playing baseball, that they're going to be wearing masks and staying [6 feet apart]." That's why he advocates limiting group gatherings for children to between five and 10 at a time. This is a concrete way to limit potential spread, while still accounting for children's needs.

LET YOUR GROCERIES SIT FOR A DAY

"I go shopping for groceries, or to drugstores," he began. "I don't disinfect the bags. In general, I will take the materials out of the bags, then wash my hands with soap and water, and then use hand sanitizer, and let everything sit for a day."

Governor extends declaration of emergency amid rising COVID-19 cases

After every region in Michigan saw an uptick in new COVID-19 cases over the past three weeks, Governor Gretchen Whitmer took swift action by signing a new executive order to save lives. Executive Order 2020-151 extends the governor's emergency and disaster declaration until August 11, 2020 at 11:59pm.

"COVID-19 has now killed more than 6,000 people in Michigan. That's more than 6,000 of our parents, grandparents, friends, and neighbors. And the rising numbers we've seen over the past few weeks prove that this virus is still a very real threat in our state.' said Governor Whitmer. "Today, I signed new emergency and disaster declarations using independent sources of statutory authority to continue saving lives and ensure that the brave men and women on the front lines of this crisis have

the tools they need." "Throughout this crisis, the vast majority of Michiganders have done their part, but we must remain vigilant and continue to do everything we can to protect our loved ones," said Whitmer. "That means wearing a mask over your mouth and nose and practicing safe physical distancing when going out in public. If we all do our part now, there is a greater chance that schools can resume in-person learning in the fall. Be smart, be safe, and mask up.'

Daily COVID-19 case counts now exceed 20 cases per million in the Detroit, Lansing, Grand Rapids, and Kalamazoo regions. Positiv-



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ity rates are creeping upward. The increase in cases reflects a national trend: COVID-19 cases are growing in 39 states and in some are surging uncontrollably. Two days ago, for example, Florida recorded 15,300 new cases in a single day, the highest one-day total for any state so far during the pandemic.

"COVID-19 still poses a threat to families across Michigan, and it's crucial that Governor Whitmer continue to take swift action to save lives," said Chief Medical Executive and MDHHS Chief Deputy for Health Dr. Joneigh Khaldun. "Michiganders should all continue to do their part by wearing a mask and practicing safe physical distancing. We will get through this when we work together.'

The severe economic toll of the COVID-19 pandemic continues to mount. During this crisis, Michigan has often processed more unemployment claims in a single day than in the most painful week of the Great Recession, and the state already saw its highest unemployment rate since the Great Depression. The Michigan Department of Treasury predicts that this year the state will lose between \$1 and \$3 billion in revenue. At the same time, continued federal support is by no means assured. Unless it is renewed, for example, Congress's emergency infusion of money into the unemployment system will cease at the end of this month. Without that money, many families in Michigan will struggle to pay their bills or even put food on the table.

The health, economic, and social harms of the COVID-19 pandemic remain widespread and severe, and they continue to constitute a statewide emergency and disaster. Though local health departments have some limited capacity to respond to cases as they arise within their jurisdictions, state emergency operations are necessary to bring this pandemic under control in Michigan and to build and maintain infrastructure to stop the spread of COVID-19, trace infections, and quickly direct additional resources to hot-spots as they

Business face mask tips to comply with Federal and State Disability Laws

he Michigan Department of Civil Rights today cautioned Michigan businesses and other public accommodations to make sure they follow state and federal law when enforcing rules on wearing a mask or face covering in their facilities.

"It is important to remember that along with Executive Orders and specific store policies, businesses and other public spaces must continue to follow the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Michigan's Persons with Disabilities Civil Rights Act (PWDCRA) during the COVID-19 pandemic," said Mary Engelman, Interim Director of the Michigan Department of Civil Rights. "We must ensure that people with disabilities are able to access the same goods and services that we all enjoy."

Executive Order No. 2020-153 mandates businesses:

Post notice of the requirement to wear a face covering where all can see; - Enforce this face cover-

ing requirement; and

- Provide for exceptions, including the exception for those who cannot medically tolerate wearing one.

- May not assume that an unmasked customer cannot medically tolerate a face covering, though they may accept a customer's verbal representation to that effect.

With or without a mandate, a business must make choices about how to implement its 'no mask, no service' policy. It must enforce the policy for everyone, while also remaining in compliance with the ADA and PWDCRA. It can do so by doing one of three things:

- Provide anyone who does not wear a face covering, for whatever reason, an alternative to entering without a face covering (examples might include having staff shop for them, providing carryout service, etc.);

- Engage in a dialogue with each individual who is not wearing a face covering to determine if, due to a disability, the business can provide a reasonable accommodation/modifica-

tion of the policy for this individual (this might include allowing a face shield, or any of the examples above);

- Allow entry to anyone who indicates they cannot medically tolerate a face covering, while excluding others whose reasons for not wearing one are not covered in the EO or are not covered under the ADA or PWDCRA.

It is important to remember that under the ADA, if a reasonable accommodation for a person with a disability is available, the business must provide one. If a business or public space offers a reasonable accommodation and the individual rejects it, or if an accommodation is not possible, the business may deny entry to that indi-

"Michigan businesses are facing unprecedented challenges in providing essential goods and services while protecting the health and well-being of both their employees and their customers," said Engelman. "This guidance is designed

to give business owners a simple decision matrix to help them remain in compliance with the Executive Order and all applicable civil rights laws."

The Michigan Civil Rights Commission was created by the Michigan Constitution to safeguard constitutional and legal guarantees against discrimination. The Commission is charged with investigating alleged discrimination against any person because of religion, race, color or national origin, genetic information, sex, age, marital status, height, weight, arrest record, and physical and mental disability. The Michigan Department of Civil Rights serves as the operational arm of the Commis-


