

Michigan will also participate in the Stop.Think.Connect. Campaign, a national awareness effort from the National Cyber Security Alliance that aims to increase the understanding of cyber threats and how the American public can be safe and secure online. The theme for this year's campaign, which

was announced earlier this year, is Do Your Part. #BeCyberSmart.

"With society's reliance on connected devices in nearly every aspect of our daily lives, cybercrime can pose a very real threat to us all," said Col. Joe Gasper, director of the MSP. "It's important that individuals and businesses take measures to protect themselves and that law enforcement remains committed to staying current on this ever-evolving criminal

landscape."

Lisa Peacock, Health Officer for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, acknowledged today that there is a lot of uncertainty in the face of the last week's Michigan Supreme Court ruling that Governor Gretchen Whitmer exceeded her powers during the coronavirus pandemic. "We want to remind residents that the underlying issues to containing the spread of COVD-19 haven't changed. This public health emergency continues to exist even without an official declaration in place. We are still living in the midst of a global pandemic which has

taken the lives of over 1 million people worldwide. In Michigan we have seen over 127,000 cases and over 6,800 deaths", she said.

There are many legal complexities related to the Governor's Executive Orders and the ruling of the Michigan Supreme Court but while those are being sorted out, we want to implore our businesses and residents to continue to protect the community through the mitigation measures that continue to be in place," she said. "For example, masking protects those around us from our respiratory droplets, distancing of 6 feet or more protects us from close contact with someone who might not know they are infected, screening customers and employees serves to provide the safest environment for work and commerce, and adhering to gathering limits prevents rapid spread of the virus through multiple people into the community."

She added, "Without a vaccine or a cure, COVID-19 continues to be a threat to our health and well-being and the only tools we have to fight it are isolation, quarantine, and these safety precautions we all can take Although we know that the confusion around these complicated legal matters poses a risk to continued protection, we believe in the people of Northern Michigan. We have learned so much and we have come so far together, now is the time to continue on and protect each other whether it is required by orders or

Because of the recent Michigan Supreme Court ruling on the Governors executive order authority, Charlevoix County Sheriff Chuck Vondra would also like to remind people of the law, stating "Private business owners have the authority to choose to ask people to continue to wear masks while patronizing their businesses. If someone is asked to wear a mask or to leave, they must do one or the other. If the person chooses not to comply, they are subject to criminal trespass and will be prosecuted as such".

"Combatting the effects of climate in Michigan is a team effort. MDHHS has made this effort easier by developing this guide for Michiganders across the state," said Governor Whitmer. "The health and safety of our families is directly related to the health

of our climate. This guide will help us implement the MI Healthy Climate Plan I announced last week and improve our overall public health."

"While climate change is recognized as one of the greatest threats to public health, few models of climate and health planning currently exist," said Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, chief medical executive and chief deputy for health. "This guide uses a health in all policies approach to help communities in Michigan develop a climate and health adaptation plan or to integrate climate and health concepts into existing planning and decision making"

Michigan is getting measurably warmer and wetter due to climate change. Those changing conditions result in more extreme weather including heat, heavy rain and

winter storm events. Major climate-related health impacts in Michigan include heat-related illness, water-borne diseases, mental stress, respiratory illnesses, vector-borne diseases and physical injury from extreme weather events.

As communities are unique in their makeup, systems and needs, planning for climate and health adaptation can be complex. The guide focuses on core principles upon which each community can build.

Those include:
-Centering on health and equity.

-Engaging diverse partners reflective of the community, especially vulnerable and marginalized populations, along with technical stakeholders and decision makers.

-Incorporating locally relevant climate and health data in decision making.

-Establishing a shared vision for what successful climate adaptation means to the community.

The process was piloted in Marquette starting in 2017. Marquette was chosen as the pilot site due to the community's demonstrated capacity for climate planning with existing assessments of the environment and infrastructure completed, and access to local expertise. The project brought together stakeholders from across 1,873 square miles representing nearly 30 local units of government, agencies and organizations to address climate and health adaptation.

The pilot resulted in more than 100 potential recommendations and metrics for enacting adaptive planning and environment changes, and prioritization of the recommendations for short- and long-term planning.

"Using Marquette County as the pilot for this guide, gave us an opportunity to bring together stakeholders including, local government agencies and non-profit organizations, the resources of MSU Extension and expertise from the MSII School of Planning, Design and Construction. Local leaders are passionate about improving the quality of life and addressing the climate and health challenges for future generations," said Wayne Beyea, senior outreach specialist, MSU School of Planning Design and Construction. "We know that other Michigan communities are just as passionate, and look forward to expanding

work with MSU to develop a plan for testing the guide-book in other communities across Michigan. MICHAP will work with partners to promote the guide and, as MICHAP capacity allows, provide technical assistance to communities wishing to implement climate and health adaptation plans or best practices.

MICHAP will also work with the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy Office of Climate and Energy to integrate the guidebook's lessons into the Catalyst Communities program which seeks to provide

education, training, planning and technical resources to local public officials as they prepare for climate impacts on emergency response and public health.

Health Dept #10 responds to MI Supreme Court ruling

In response to the Michigan Supreme Court ruling on October 2, regarding Governor Whitmer's State of Emergency declaration and subsequent executive orders, Kevin Hughes, Health Officer for District Health Department #10 (DHD#10), issued the following statement:

While we process the rulings from Michigan's Supreme Court, DHD#10's leadership team is in consultation with our legal team, our Board of Health, the Michigan Association of Public Health, and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services to determine next steps for our 10county jurisdiction. We ask for your patience as we work to interpret the rulings and establish the best course of action to protect the health of the public.

In the meantime, we stand behind the mitigation measures given since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic to prevent spreading the virus, including:

-Wear a mask to protect others from you in the event you are unknowingly conta-Social distance by 6 feet or more from others

-Wash or sanitize your hands frequently -Stay home if you are ill or

have flu-like symptoms
- Avoid large gatherings,
especially if you are at high

risk for contracting the virus

Our role in public health is to promote and protect the health of people and the communities where they live, learn, work and play. Preventing and controlling the spread of infectious diseases is at the heart of what we do. Just like influenza and other infectious diseases, COVID-19 can have a devastating impact on human health. Until there is a vaccine and effective treatment to prevent further spread, DHD#10 will continue to promote prevention strategies that will lessen the impact on our communities. We will remain focused on our public health efforts of encouraging testing, case investigation and contact tracing, and promoting compliance with safety precautions. We will share additional information as it becomes available.

spread of COVID-19 in nursing homes. I signed an order months ago requiring testing for all residents and staff and new residents, and my administration has helped get nursing homes thousands of tests. Federal leadership on this issue has been absent, which is why I created a nursing home task force to ensure Michigan at least has

coordinated and steady leadership on this critical issue. We still need the president to do the right thing and develop a national strategy to protect our families, frontline workers, and our most vulnerable populations from COVID-19."

Executive Order 2020-191 maintains the strong infection control protocols in nursing homes the governor put in place at the outset of this crisis, and protects residents from eviction and employees from retaliatory action for staying home

when exhibiting symptoms. Following recommenda-

tions from the Nursing
Home Task Force, the order,
along with a DHHS policy
bulletin released today, establishes Care and Recovery
Centers to help patients requiring a skilled nursing
level of care rehabilitate
from COVID-19. Care and Recovery Centers will be care
units dedicated exclusively
to caring for and isolating
COVID-19-affected residents.

Executive Order 2020-191 also requires enhanced transparency and communications from nursing homes, expanding notification requirements for positive cases to include legal guardians, health proxies, prospective staff and residents.

In order to improve resident well-being, the order lifts the previous prohibition on communal dining and instead requires both communal dining and group activities to be conducted consistent with CMS and DHHS guidance.

Charlevoix completes comeback over Ramblers

BOYNE CITY – When Boyne City and Charlevoix meet up, it's always a treat for those in attendance.

In another physical, down to the last play, classic contest, the Rayders trailed by six points entering the fourth quarter and pulled out a 28-20 victory over the Ramblers.

This game had it all, starting with homecoming festivities for Boyne City, cool fall weather, trading scores, big plays, bigger hits, and key turnovers.

The Rayder victory, their third of the season, was the second consecutive win over the Ramblers (1-2) and third in the last five seasons.

Boyne got into the scoring column first as junior running back, Bobby Hoth crossed the goal line on a 3-yard run and following a successful Allie Herrick extra point, it was 7-0 Ramblers, a lead they would maintain throughout the opening quarter.

The Rayders would get on the scoreboard in the second as junior quarterback, Caleb Stuck took off on a designed play and would rumble nearly untouched for a 45-yard touchdown. The conversion attempt would fail, and Boyne led 7-6.

Charlevoix would stay on the offense, pulling ahead as Stuck completed a 30-yard pass to Evan Solomon for the score, before adding the conversion as Stuck found an open Luke Snyder to make it 14-7.

With time ticking away in the half, the Ramblers knotted things up at 14-14 as sophomore quarterback, Jack Neer found Aidan Brehm for a 27-yard scoring strike. The extra point was not successful.

Following the halftime break, the Ramblers added to their lead as Hoth scored once again from 3-yards out and another failed extra point would make it 20-14 BC, a score that would stay until the fourth.

Charlevoix would not go away and with Stuck under center, there is always a chance for a big play either through the air or on the ground and he would find Solomon for a 40-yard gain and then the duo connected for an 8-yard score. Stuck and Snyder would again hook up for the conversion, pushing the Rayders in front 22-20, just minutes into the final quarter.

Most of the remaining quarter, the two teams took turns giving the ball back and forth before Stuck plowed his way in from 5-yards out for a 28-20 lead. Trying to put the game out of reach, the Rayders went for two and were unsuccessful with just over one minutes and 30 seconds remaining in the contest.

The Ramblers took over, moving onto the Rayder side of the field before Ethan Putman picked off Neer to seal the deal, as Charlevoix ran out the clock.

Stuck had a great allaround game for Charlevoix, going 10-of-17 for 170 yards and two scores and an interception through the air and added 59 yards and a touchdown on 14 carries.

Snyder added five receptions for 79 yards and picked up another 55 on the ground on 11 carries and a score and Solomon hauled in three passes for 81 yards and two touchdowns.

On the defensive side, Snyder hit early and often, racking up 14 total tackles, Dimitrii Bell-Chavez added 12 tackles and three sacks, Patrick Sterrett and Putman each picked off a pass.

For the Ramblers, Bobby Hoth ran all over the Rayder defense, racking up 195 yards

on 22 carries and two scores.

Neer finished 6-of-19 passing for 106 yards and a TD and two interceptions,

Brehm hauled in the score on a 27-yard strike, Kaden Jewett had two receptions for 21 yards and Aaron Bess caught a pass for 48 yards.



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
