McLaren nurse manager earns Donation Champion award

Gift of Life Michigan honors Charlevoix woman for work with donor families

Petoskey, MI - Kathi St. Pierre does everything in her power to make sure organ and tissue donors are treated with the respect and honor they deserve and their families have plenty of keepsakes to remember these he-

St. Pierre, a clinical nurse manager who works at McLaren Northern Michigan Hospital in Petoskey, has shown she cares deeply for donors and their families through the policies she's helped enact at the hospital and her interactions with patients. She is one of 15 individuals and three hospitals to be honored with a 2020 Do-

nation Champion Award from Gift of Life Michigan.

"I do have a very strong passion for Gift of Life. It

helped me reconnect with why I do what I do," said St. Pierre, who has been a nurse since 1988. "For me it was being able to offer a tiny bit of hope in a tragic situation that you could sometimes offer to a family, or you can give a family a small bit of hope that there could be something good that could come from a horrible situation."

St. Pierre heads a team of SWAT nurses who respond to every critical case in the hospital and the emergency department. They are trained to handle any kind of emergency, from heart attacks to strokes to traumatic injuries - SWAT, in this instance, stands for Skilled With All Things. They also work with and console families if their attempts to save a patient is unsuccessful.

Last year, St. Pierre and

Michelle Rushing, manager of the Intensive Care Unit at McLaren Northern, developed an Honor Walk policy to honor donors; during an Honor Walk, staff members line the hallways while a donor is taken to the operating room where their organs and tissue will be recovered. It's a sign of respect for their ultimate gift, and it helps both the family and staff.

She also creates memory boxes for donor families. These may contain a Gift of Life flag, which is first flown outside to honor the donor, black and white photos of patients' hands entwined with family members' hands, Petoskey stones, locks of hair, tiny glass bottle with a copy of heart rhythm strip printed on it - so they can take their loved one's heartbeat home - and other things that reflect what staff

Charlevoix County Transit received Heros In Motion Award

Like many transit agencies, Charlevoix County Transit adapted quickly and began providing non-traditional transit services such as food and prescription deliveries to our county residents."

Drury thanked CTAA for their work on behalf of rural and small urban transit agencies and Toyota USA for their support of public transit. "So many

transit agencies across our country are working hard during this pandemic and we thank you for being chosen for this award.'

During the award introduction it was noted that Charlevoix County Transit officials noticed that grocery delivery was not being utilized due to consumers having to use a web-based program or app to order

groceries. That observation spearheaded discussions between Transit and Commission on Aging and culminated in a new Grocery Ordering and Delivery Service which will begin in early December. Initially the service will be available to anyone in the community and once we're in a post-pandemic climate. there will likely be eligibility criteria established for

Connections Program Awarded Certification

The Northern Michigan Community Health Innovation (CHIR) Community Connections program was certified by the Pathways Community HUB Institute following a rigorous review of program services, policies and procedures, and evaluation methods.

Community Connections is key to the CHIR's goal to remove barriers to basic needs like healthy food, affordable housing, transportation options, and health insurance and medical referral, among many others. "We help residents find—and use—resources in the community,"



said Jenifer Murray who directs the program, operated in partnership with four local health departments across 21 counties. "These 'social determinants of health' are as important to good health as routine medical care." There is no charge to participate in Community Connections and all are eligible regardless of income or insurance status.

The program uses evi-



dence-based "Pathways" or a step-by-step process for each need families are experiencing. For example, to close the Behavioral Health Pathway, clients must make and keep at least three appointments with a mental health provider because research

shows they are likely to continue treatment. Sometimes a Pathway cannot be closed because the needed resource is not available in the community. "That is important information for community groups in the CHIR working to address social determinants of health at the sector or system level," Murray said.

A University of Michigan evaluation of Community Connections earlier this year reported that families find staff persistent, dedicated, friendly, and accepting. Furthermore, the vast majority of clients felt their experience working with Community Connections had a positive impact on their future, such as their ability to

secure community services themselves and to support their own health.

About 1,200 use Community Connections each year. "It's more important than ever", said Jane Sundmacher, the CHIR's Executive Director. "Since the pandemic began, we've seen marked increase in resident needs for healthy food, health insurance, and financial assistance. Many new clients have never used social services before.


Following tracks in snow is winter challenge

Everything looks a little different with a blanket of freshly fallen snow, and some things – like animal tracks - become even easier to see. It might be challenging to spot Michigan's more elusive critters, but many do leave clues behind. That's one reason winter is a fun time to get out and explore different habitats.

Tracking wildlife can be done at any time of the year, but snow makes a great backdrop for animal tracks. If there's no snow, wet sand, soil or mud works well, too.

"Figuring out which species produced the tracks you find is like solving a puzzle and can be done readily with the right book or tracks chart," said Hannah Schauer, a wildlife communications and education coordinator with the DNR Wildlife Division. She pointed to somes sketches of animal tracks available online to get started.

"Key in on the overall shape and size of the track, if you can, and try to distinguish the number of toes the animal has," Schauer said. "Raccoons show 'fingers' not unlike our own. Beavers have webbed feet. Deer have a familiar twohooved print, while most

birds have three toes pointing forward and one facing backward."

Hopping and walking patterns can help, too. Looking for claw marks also can help you determine whether you're looking at cat tracks (such as bobcat), which lack the claw marks shown by dogs (like fox and coyote).

Other tips: • Take a journal and cam-

era to document tracks and other observations, like

where tracks start or stop. A ruler can help track measurements, which can point to species.

No matter where you search for tracks - there are plenty of wildlife watching opportunities at state wildlife/game areas, in recreation areas or in local communities - grab your skis, snowshoes or muck boots and get out there!

Charlevoix County Transit adds Senior and Emergency Grocery Service

Charlevoix County Transit announced today that a Senior and Emergency Grocery Ordering/Delivery Service is being added to the services offered by the County's Transit. "While delivery of items such as food pantry boxes, prescriptions and senior meals was well received, the grocery delivery was not widely used during the early months of the pandemic", stated Transit Director Jill Drury. One of the drawbacks that transit officials noticed was that for curbside pickup available for groceries an individual needed to place their order via a smartphone or webbased application. During the height of the shutdown, the website and app ordering was time consuming and problematic for many and therefore transit didn't see many requests grocery delivery.

The expansion of the Transit's delivery program will provided assistance to those needing help with ordering their groceries. County residents who would like to use the Grocery Ordering/Delivery Program can call Program Coordinator at 231.497.1430 on designated shopping days to place their grocery order. The program coordinator will then input the order with the caller, take payment information (credit/debit card) and then

place the order as well as scheduling the grocery delivery in transit's scheduling system. This program is currently limited to in-county grocery stores utilizing the store shopping app.

Designated days/times for orders to be placed:

Monday 1:30-3:00pm Tuesday 9:00-10:00am and 1:30-3:00pm 1:30-3:00pm Wednesday Thursday 9:00-10:00am and 1:30-2:30pm

While this program initially focused on helping our county's aging population, with a surge in COVID cases and the flu season upon us, transit officials felt this was a worthwhile community service that should be offered to anyone who is in need of help or worried about going into stores. Charlevoix County's Commission on Aging will assist the Charlevoix County Transit with getting information about this program out to the county's aging population as well as continue to assist those over 60 years old with transit fares for in-county rides as well as out-of-county medical appointments.





EAST JORDAN CITY COMMISSION MEETING, DECEMBER 1, 2020

City moves forward on park expansion

East Jordan - The City Commission started their meeting off by approving a motion for the Parks and Recreation Department to continue forward with the American Legion on working on expanding GAR Park.

The City had done some research about the expansion of the park and who owned the land where the park would be expanded. After looking through deeds and some research was completed, it was found that the land was a part of Williams Street. The width of the road was 66 feet. When you travel towards Main Street, the street gets as wide as 93 feet. The recent findings allow more leeway for plans going forward.

City Administrator Tom Cannon, informed everyone that there was a meeting with C2A about estimates for repairs to the Civic Center. The company provided an estimate at this point for \$125,000 for roof repairs for the whole building. Cannon informed everyone that there would be a report presented sometime in January.

Cannon also presented during his administrative report that the city was awarded \$14,000 as a part of the CARES ACT to help with pandemic reimbursement costs. There was money left over, some of which went to buy extra sanitation supplies. However, it was found that City Hall needed some technological improvements. These improvements would allow staff members to be able to access information from home. The staff has not been able to access any information on their computers when they have had to work

from home during the pandemic. The Commission approved the motion to use the funds to help upgrade some of the technology, so this would be available.

Cannon informed the Commission that a community group has been meeting with the Jordan River Arts Council about a possible Art Walk throughout downtown. The walk would incorporate a few different areas including

some parks. The project is in the early stages but members of the committee will present ideas and ask for support in upcoming Commission meetings

The East Jordan City Commission will meet again virtually on December 15, 2020, on Zoom.

Trade up now for a new MacPass windshield sticker

The old MacPass toll cards are about to be retired but account holders still have a month to trade up for the new windshield-mounted stickers and keep rolling with the quickest and easiest toll payment.

The Mackinac Bridge
Authority (MBA) is urging
MacPass account holders
to get the new stickers before the end of the year, as
the old cards will no longer
work after Dec. 31. The
MBA has been reminding
account holders of the impending switch, but several
have not yet upgraded to
stickers.

"We really encourage account holders not to wait until the last minute to get their stickers," said MBA Executive Secretary Kim Nowack. "We've heard that a few thought they'd need to use up existing account funds before switching but upgrading to a sticker won't affect your account

balance. There's no reason to wait "

The stickers, which are automatically scanned when drivers pull up to the toll booth, were introduced in September 2019 as part of the MBA's new toll software system. MacPass account holders along with new customers have been rapidly switching from the MacPass cards to the new stickers, and more customers are paying with the stickers now than cards.

The stickers, which can be linked to a single account for multiple vehicles, cost \$1 each. Existing customers do not need to open a new account; they can add a sticker tag to their existing MacPass account.

Customers can obtain the sticker tags in the MBA administration building at the north end of the bridge around the clock, seven days a week. They will need to provide the license

plate number, make, model, color, and year of each vehicle that will be linked to the account, though new vehicles can be added later. MacPass account holders can also order new sticker tags online by logging into their account at https://Mac-Pass.MackinacBridge.org (instructions at www.MackinacBridge.org/MacPass).

New passenger vehicle MacPass accounts require an initial deposit of \$80 and a \$7 one-time set-up fee; commercial accounts require a \$200 deposit and the same \$7 one-time set-up fee.

MacPass customers can use toll lanes designated for MacPass by the overhead signs, or any open lane. Drivers should still watch for toll collectors and customers walking across lanes.

Though the MacPass is

not exclusively for commuter customers, MacPass holders with passenger vehicles can still qualify for the commuter discount toll if they make both a northbound and southbound trip within 36 hours. The toll will be \$4 for the first trip but customers will not be charged for the return trip if completed within 36 hours.

MacPass is the only tolling transponder currently in use at the Mackinac Bridge; I-Pass, E-ZPass, SunPass, etc., though similar, are not accepted. Surveys have shown that few Mackinac Bridge customers currently use other tolling transponders.

The MBA still accepts cash, credit and debit cards for tolls. Other payment types on phones, including Google Pay and Apple Pay, also are accepted.

County road agencies balance salt use with environmental, budgetary considerations

Just as it's important to add the correct amount of salt to cookie dough, it's essential that county road agencies apply the right amount of salt to roads. Use the right amount of salt, and it's a recipe for success, including safe winter roads.

But it's not always easy for road agencies. It's a balancing act they face every winter.

"We use as little salt as we can to protect the budget and the environment and make the roads as safe as possible," Craig Bryson, APR, senior manager of communications and public information at Road Commission for Oakland County, said. "We walk a fine line between

those two competing needs of road safety and salt usage. We can't eliminate salt use. Human life is part of this equation as well."

County road agencies use a variety of methods to change salt use, including applying liquid calcium chloride for anti-icing, pretreating roads with brine, calibrating vehicles and using innovative technology.

Additionally, several other factors play into salt application, including timing and weather. According to Mark Christensen, superintendent-manager of Road Commission for Montcalm County, monitoring these factors is crucial to maintaining roads. "We try to salt when the

weather allows us the best value for your dollar," Christensen said. "We really look at environmental factors when we make the decision to salt – what the road temperature's doing, if it's going to be sunny later, etc. It helps us determine the optimal time to salt, so we can do it when it makes sense. Bottom line: Let the environmental fac-

the UIA in an apparent effort to strengthen the credibility of the email.

"There is no government agency, state or federal, that uses Gmail for official purposes," Nessel said, noting the scammer's email address. "Michigan residents should always examine the full email address if the sender is requesting their personal information."

If you received this email,

do not respond. UIA would never ask you to reply to an email with your personal information. Responses to ID verification requests from UIA should only be uploaded through your secure Michigan Web Account Manager (MiWAM) account online at the UIA's website, where you can also learn more about protecting yourself from identity theft.

Anyone who has fallen for this scam should immediately Report Fraud or Identity Theft with the UIA. They should also monitor their banking and account information each time they certify for benefits.

"Bad actors are increasingly sophisticated in their efforts to deceive people into giving away personal information," said Nessel. "This is one of the cruelest scams I've ever seen because it targets vulnerable residents who are desperate to receive their UIA benefits – so desperate that they may not inspect the email address to confirm its validity."

getting, for a moment, the interior improvements that set one home apart from another, there are exterior factors that also influence price. For instance, homes on primary ingress and egress streets-(that is, the main streets that lead in and out of a tract)-generally appreciate more slowly than those within the tract that are not on primary streets.

Primary ingress/egress streets generate more traffic and are therefore, generally less desirable. Thus, they

lower prices.

Within a tract, a home on a cul-desac may generate a higher price for the same reason-less traffic. Cul-desacs are frequently like a maze and they discourage drive-throughs, which is, of course, a definite benefit to residential privacy.

Even properties on one side of a street can be worth more than a similar property across from it. Why? Certain communities, because of their name, are more prestigious than oth-

ers. Beverly Hills, California, of course, is one. It is known worldwide for its high-end shopping, expensive housing and impeccable name. In sections where Beverly Hills is divided from other cities and/or communities by a street, the homes on the Beverly Hills side of the avenue command a higher price than those in the non-Beverly Hills city across from it.

Existing homes may differ radically in price for another reason-one homeowner wants to sell, and the other has to sell. The motivation for each is quite different, and so may be the pricing strategies.

Some other factors that influence price: What commercial developments are adjacent to the tract? How (un)desirable are they? And, don't forget supply and demand.

The wise buyer checks one other thing-a community's master plan. This is a must, especially if a tract (or home) is surrounded by vacant land. Most communities have one. It is usually drawn up by planners within the city of county and approved by a local planning commission. Find out what is going to be built nearby and determine how it might impact the value of the tract. All this, of course, takes time and homework. But, it is well worth it, especially when you consider that the purchase of a home is usually going to be the largest, single financial investment most people make in a lifetime.

Health Department of Northwest Michigan COVID-19 Update

On December 1 The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is reporting 54 new cases in Antrim (4), Charlevoix (24), Emmet (16), and Otsego (10) counties. Case investigation and contact tracing are in progress, and relevant information will be shared when it is available.

Last week we released a new employer toolkit to support local businesses in addressing their needs and questions related to having a COVID-19 positive employee. This new toolkit outlines the requirements of the most recent MDHHS orders for gatherings, masking, facility operational requirements and capacity limits, as well as answers to your frequently asked questions, contact tracing and quarantine information for employers. Within the toolkit we provide the steps employers must take when notified of a positive employee, including a link to notify the health department of the positive employee and the link for the

employee to complete their electronic case investigation survey. These resources are intended to support employers in their efforts to protect their business and employees by preventing ongoing transmission of COVID-19 in the workplace.

"All residents and businesses are urged to follow the safety precautions in our recent public health advisory as we know that failure to do so will perpetuate the spread of COVID-19 and cause prolonged harm to people and businesses,' stated Lisa Peacock, Health Officer. "The resources available on our website are intended to support schools and local businesses in taking all necessary steps to protect their employees, and how to handle a COVID-19 positive employee or exposure. Our hope is that by residents and local businesses continuing to follow the guidelines, and businesses following the proper steps to handle cases in their workforce, the risk for spreading COVID-19 lowers

significantly."

Today we are reporting case investigation information for 263 COVID-19 cases. The following information is from case investigations completed from November 25th-30th.

-Total COVID-19 cases in the following counties: Antrim – 443, Charlevoix – 619, Emmet – 992, Otsego –

-Recovered COVID-19 cases in the following counties: Antrim – 177, Charlevoix – 237, Emmet – 387, Otsego – 301

- Confirmed COVID-19 associated deaths in the following counties: Antrim – 5, Charlevoix – 7, Emmet – 27, Otsego – 18
