East Jordan reviews presentation of wastewater plant

BOYNE CITY – In the middle of the golden triangle, midway between Boyne City, Charlevoix, and Petoskey, is where you will find this quaint home that has been completely remodeled including windows, siding, flooring, drywall, new roof and furnace to name a few. EAST JORDAN - The meeting started off with an update on the county-wide EMS service. The service that seemed like it had a lot of support, even just a month ago, is now looking like it may never happen. The conversations are starting to stall and Charlevoix is looking toward making their own authority with the surrounding townships. As mentioned two weeks ago, in the commission meeting, things started to go south over how the financial aspect of the authority was going to work. The commission then saw

a presentation about the East Jordan Wastewater Plant. The plant saw a 3.6 percent decrease from last year in the amount of raw sewage that came through in 2020. The plant saw an average of 202,500 gallons a day. The plant saw an above-average of its designed flow of 239,000 gallons per day for a total of 35 days in 2020. Which is down 50 percent from 2019. The plant did see three sanitary sewer overflows, which was two more than in 2019. There were 35 discharge permit violations, for a variety of reasons such as 1 for pH at monitoring well, 13 for exceeding the number of gallons allowed to be

discharged, 8 were for exceeding mg/l of total inorganic nitrogen allowed to be discharged, 1 for a testing lab not being completed and 12 were not technically violation but were reported in the wrong month. This was 17 percent fewer permit violations compared to 2019. They also saw 45 percent of the sewage coming in was nonrevenue water from rain and snowmelt entering the system. The total came to a loss of \$313,080 for treating the water but not being able to charge anybody for it. This was a 1.9 percent increase from last year. The plant did not receive any walleye fingerlings to raise in pond 2

due to COVID interrupting egg collection. They do expect to receive some fingerlings in 2021.

The Commission would then pass a resolution for the support of Sportsman's Park river access site. The resolution requests \$10,000 from the Charlevoix County Board of Commissioners for the city to meet the needs of users of the park in Charlevoix County. This includes construction, operation and maintenance of the park.

The City Commission would go on to introduce four new ordinances that would change the zoning on 15 properties from professional office to single-family residential, 20 properties from single-family to single-family residential, 5 properties from waterfront to the central business district and 28 properties from single-family residential to single-family properties.

Finally, City Manager Tom Cannon gave an update on the boat launch site, as phase II of the environmental review has been completed. The city is currently working with MDOT as an easement swap is being surveyed for a development site that makes sense for everyone.

The next City Commission meeting will be held on February 16, 2021, at seven o'clock on Zoom.



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



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COVID variant case reported in Charlevoix County

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan was notified late Sunday, Feb. 7, of the first identified case of the new COVID-19 variant. B.1.1.7 in our area, in an adult male in Charlevoix County. The case was identified through active surveillance by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. Case investigation and contract tracing have been completed and no new cases of the variant have been identified in the northern Michigan region at this time.

According to health officials, it appears the adult male was contagious while traveling out of state and was tested upon returning to the region. The individual is past the contagious period and has since recovered.

"The identification of this variant strain in northern Michigan reminds us that we must continue to take steps to slow the spread of COVID-19 by wearing a mask, staying six feet apart, and avoiding indoor gatherings," said Dr. Josh Meyerson, Medical Director for the health department. "Anyone who has any symptoms or may have been exposed to the COVID-19 virus, either here or during travel, should get tested and quarantine themselves," he added.

The B.1.1.7 variant was first identified in Great Britain and is the result of mutations to the SARS-CoV-2 virus, the virus that causes COVID-19. The first case of the variant in Michigan was discovered downstate in January. Several other cases have been identified in Michigan since then. According to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, early findings show that the B.1.1.7 variant may be associated with an increased risk of death, but more research needs to be done. Research also shows that the B.1.1.7 variant is more easily spread

than other variants. Based on current evidence, current tests and vaccines for COVID-19 work against this new variant.

Important precautions to protect against COVID include: Get vaccinated for

COVID-19 when available and eligible. • Wear a mask covering

your nose and mouth when around others.

Stay six feet apart from others.

-Wash hands often. \cdot Ventilate indoor spaces. Anyone in the community who needs a COVID test should know that COVID-19

testing is available weekly at the health department. No doctor's order or symptoms are necessary to get tested. To locate the testing site closest to you, call the health department at 1-800-432-4121.

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan continues to distribute COVID-19 vaccine to eligible individuals who work or live in Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego counties. The supply of vaccine is limited, and it will take time to vaccinate everyone. The health department encourages individuals to be patient during this challenging time.

Great Lakes Energy Board appoints new Director

The Great Lakes Energy (GLE) board of directors at their January 27, 2021 meeting appointed Shelly Pinkelman of Frederic to fill a board seat vacated by Larry Monshor of Gaylord who passed away in December. She will fill the remainder of Monshor's term, which ends Aug. 23, 2023.

Pinkelman was the challenger in the 2020 GLE board of director election against incumbent Monshor, Pinkelman resides in GLE voting district 4 which includes Crawford, Montmorency, Oscoda, and Otsego counties.

Pinkelman has a long history of community and board service including founding Friends of Frederic, a 501c(3) organization, service as a Crawford County Commissioner for 22 years, including board chair, as well as involvement in the Michigan Association of Counties Board of Directors, the National Association of Counties Board of Directors, the **District Health Department** #10 Board, the Camp Grayling Restoration Advisory Board, and Crawford County Emergency Management. She also owns and op-

erates her own construction company and is the Building and Zoning Administrator for Frederic Township.

Pinkelman will have the opportunity to run for the board again in 2023, as do other qualified members of GLE who return a valid petition signed by 50 members of the cooperative utility in their district.

Unlike investor-owned utilities, GLE is a not-for-profit business owned by its consumer-members. Board members are elected by members, with each member's vote carrying equal

weight. GLE provides electricity to roughly 120,000 members in 26 counties along the west side of the lower peninsula. Visit gtlakes.com/board-of-directors for more information.

MDHHS to provide weekly COVID tests to educators

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) is moving forward with plans to offer a voluntary COVID-19 testing program that will provide weekly tests to educators. The MI Safe Schools Testing Program will help achieve Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's goal of having all Michigan school districts offer an inperson learning option for students by March 1.

The COVID-19 rapid antigen testing program began in early February. The program is for Michigan educators from both public and private schools. MDHHS is providing testing supplies to schools at no cost. Approximately 300 schools

and 9,000 staff have signed up for testing so far.

'Voluntary testing of educators is part of the larger state strategy of keeping students, staff and communities safe while giving children the in-person instruction that they need to learn, develop and grow," said MDHHS Director Elizabeth Hertel. "Our dedicated teachers are among the frontline workers who have stepped up during this pandemic. Giving them an opportunity to be regularly tested recognizes their sacrifices and keeps everyone safer."

The rapid antigen testing program is modeled after Michigan's successful pilot project that tested studentathletes and coaches who were participating in playoffs for high school fall sports such as football. In that program more than 8,300 people were tested. The rigorous testing program resulted in the detection of 69 asymptomatic COVID-19 cases that otherwise could have been missed.

On Jan. 8 MDHHS announced COVID-19 guidance for schools that went along with the goal of an in-person instruction option in all school districts by March 1. The guidance included availability of testing for educators.

Hertel and Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, chief medical executive and MDHHS chief deputy director for health, signed orders authorizing testing in non-health-care settings such as schools.

"Testing is the way we are going to be able to identify cases of COVID-19 and reduce the spread of this virus. Signing this order today helps make sure we are eliminating as many barriers to testing as possible," Khaldun said. "We encourage everyone who has symptoms of COVID-19, or who has been exposed, to be tested. Everyone has a role to play in ending this pandemic."

MDHHS and the CDC continue to emphasize the use of scientifically proven methods of reducing the risk of COVID-19 spread, include wearing masks, ventilation improvements in schools, frequent hand washing and social distancing.

In November, MDHHS paused in-person learning in high schools as part of an order to limit indoor gatherings to address an alarming increase in COVID-19 cases and deaths and in hospital occupancy rates.

After case numbers de-

creased, high schools were permitted to resume in-person classes effective Dec. 21.

News A guide to getting a COVID-19 vaccine in Antrim, **Charlevoix, Emmet, Otsego counties**

Many residents are wondering: "When am I going to be able to get a coronavirus vaccine?" Here's a guide to help you understand who's eligible for a shot now, and the different ways to sign up to get one if you work or live in Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet or Otsego counties.

The supply of vaccine is limited, and it will take time to vaccinate everyone," said Lisa Peacock, Health Officer with the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. "We recognize that it is very difficult to wait and be patient during this challenging time," she said.

Who is eligible for a COVID-19 vaccine in the health department's four-county jurisdiction?

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan follows the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Michigan guidelines for priority groups, which determines the order of who receives vaccinations and currently only these groups are eligible to be vaccinated:

PHASE 1A: Paid and unpaid persons serving in healthcare settings who have the potential for direct or indirect exposure to patients or infectious materials as well as residents in long term care facilities.

Approved segments of PHASE 1B: some frontline essential workers including: child care and pre-K through high school staff, workers in

congregate care facilities (homeless shelter, juvenile justice, child care staff), firefighters, law enforcement, corrections workers and inspectors.

Currently approved segment of PHASE 1C: Individuals 65 and older.

How do I register for a shot? What if I'm a senior?

There are several ways to register for vaccination through the Health Department of Northwest Michigan.

Pre-registration form: Anyone with access to a computer and internet should complete the COVID-19 online pre-registration form on the health department's website. Please double-check that all information is accurate, especially your email address as this is how we will contact you to make an appointment. After clicking submit, you will receive a confirmation email notifying you that your pre-registration form has been received.

Phone: Seniors who are unable to access the form or have any other barriers to receiving the vaccination should call the senior hotline at 231-715-5557. This hotline is experiencing extremely high call volume, so when prompted, you may request a call back instead of staying on the line. Seniors may also call their local Council on Aging or senior citizen center for assistance in signing up. Staff there will assist seniors in registering.

I'm registered at several locations. Is this OK?

Yes. It is very acceptable for you to pre-register with the health department, and your local hospital and pharmacy.

I've pre-registered with the health department. How do I find out where I am on the list?

The health department is currently scheduling appointments for eligible individuals that pre-registered in early to mid-January. More than 29,000 people have preregistered. Individuals who pre-registered later still need to be patient as we work with the vaccine supply available to schedule appointments.

I already got my shot somewhere else, but pre-registered with the health department. What should I do?

Anyone receiving a vaccination at a provider other than the health department, but pre-registered with us, should email COVID19vaccination@nwhealth.org to inform us that you have received the vaccine and can be taken off our list. Doing so will allow health department staff to more quickly reach the individuals who still need to be vaccinated.

May I get a COVID-19 vaccine in a county where I don't live? Or if

I live in a county only part-time?

Yes. The Health Department of Northwest Michigan encourages you to register for a vaccine in the county where vou work or live even on a part-time basis.

How do I sign up for my second COVID-19 dose?

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is registering individuals for their second dose at the time of their first vaccination. If you received your vaccination with another provider (hospital/health care providers/pharmacy), please ask at the time you receive

I registered for a vaccine, now what?

your first dose.

We understand your frustration in the process and ask for your patience. You

will be contacted when a vaccine is available for you. The number of people who have registered and are requesting a vaccine far exceeds the supply we have received at the health department. It could be weeks or months before an appointment is available for you.

Today, February 9, the health department is reporting 8 new cases: Antrim (1), Charlevoix (1), Emmet (6), and Otsego (0) counties. One new death was reported in Antrim County. As of 4 p.m. today, the Health Department of Northwest Michigan is reporting:

Total COVID-19 cases in the following counties: Antrim (882), Charlevoix (1,017), Emmet (1,447), and Otsego (1,126).

Recovered COVID-19 cases in the following counties: Antrim (734), Charlevoix (862), Emmet (1.190) and Otsego (957).

Confirmed COVID-19 associated deaths in the following counties: Antrim (19), Charlevoix (11), Emmet (35), and Otsego (25).

The State of Michigan is reporting 569,980 cases and 14,965 deaths. As of February 5, 2021, cumulative recovered cases statewide are 498,495.

WEEK IN REVIEW

After a great week at home in the western UP, I was busy in Washington this week voting, working on new legislation, and reintroducing bills we had begun working on in the 116th Congress. Yesterday, I was joined by my Democrat colleague Rep. Ed Case and 32 other Members, to send a letter to President Biden asking him to address the growing national debt by establishing a modern-day Grace Commission, which would root out government waste and inefficiencies. Americans deserve a government that can multitask. We can address both the economic issues brought on by the coronavirus and

our mounting national debt. I've worked on legislation that focuses on our debt over the past few years in Congress - requesting a reconvening of the Grace Commission can be a much needed additional step for Congress and the Executive Branch to find a path forward to end government waste and address our looming debt problem.

This is irresponsible and reckless governing, and Americans deserve a far better plan from Congress that provides targeted relief and bipartisan agreement.

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

MDDHS Order allows contact sports to resume as of Monday, Feb. 8, provided masks are worn during practices and competition

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) updated its current epidemic order to allow contact sports to resume as of Monday, Feb. 8, provided masks are worn during practices and competition. If masks cannot be worn, participants must be regularly tested for COVID-19 consistent with guidelines issued by MDHHS. Safety protocols like wearing masks and testing will help keep kids, coaches and families safe and allow our schools to remain open for in-person instruction. The order remains in effect through Monday, March 29.

"We continue to make progress in reducing cases and hospitalizations, helping protect our families and frontline workers and saving lives. Now, starting February 8, contact sports can resume with safety measures in place," said Gov. Gretchen Whitmer. "Michigan continues to be a national leader in fighting this virus, and we must continue using a fact-based approach so we can return to a strong economy and normal day-to-day activities. One of the most important things Michiganders can do is to make a plan to get the safe and effective vaccine when it's available to you. And as always, mask up and maintain six feet of social distancing. We all have a personal responsibility to slow the spread of the virus so we can end this pandemic to-

gether.'

"We are pleased at our continued progress in Michigan that has allowed us to take this step forward in a phased approach," said Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, chief medical executive and chief deputy for health at MDHHS. "As a parent and former student-athlete myself, I get how important athletics are to our children's physical and mental health.

However, parents and athletes need to understand the risk involved with contact sports if they choose to participate. Sports that require frequent closeness between players make it more difficult to prevent disease transmission even when

mitigation measures are in place, including masks. Even when not required, we urge teams to implement a testing program to protect athletes, coaches and their families." MDHHS had been closely monitoring three metrics for stabilization or declines over the past several weeks, and Michigan continues to see improvements . In recent days:

Hospital capacity dedicated to COVID-19 patients has been in 10week decline, with current capacity at 6.6% for beds with COVID-19 patients. Peaked at 19.6% on Tuesday, Dec. 4.

Overall case rates: Currently at 159 cases per million after peaking at 740 cases per million on Saturday, Nov. 14. Rate has been in solid decline for 24 days. Three MERC regions in the state are now below 150 cases per million people: the Detroit, Traverse City and Upper Peninsula regions.

Positivity rate: currently at 4.9% and declining. This is the first time positivity has been this low since mid-October

Contact sports are allowed as long as participants are masked during play or practice. For sports where masks cannot be worn and social distancing cannot be maintained all participants must be tested consistent with the program specified in the Testing and Additional Mitigation Measures for Athletic Practice and Play section of MDHHS's Interim Guidance for Athletics which will be available online at Michigan.gov/coronavirus on

Sunday, Feb. 7. Sports organizers are encouraged to administer a testing program even if it is not required.

Participants need to maintain six feet of distance when not actively engaged in play and wear face masks at all times. Spectators are allowed with up to 250 people in stadiums that seat less than 10,000 and up 500 people at venues that seat over 10,000 people.

"Today's announcement is possible because of our progress over the last two months," said Elizabeth Her-

tel, MDHHS director. "Michiganders need to remain vigilant, however, as we now have a new more easily transmitted variant of this virus present in our state. All Michigan residents need to minimize their risk by avoiding gatherings, wearing masks properly, social distancing, and making a plan to get the safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine when it is their turn."

"I want to thank Governor Whitmer and her administration for the decision to begin winter contact sports competition," said Dr. Michael Shibler, superintendent of Rockford Public Schools. "I applaud their priority to keep students and adults safe during the pandemic and for the decision to provide student-athletes the opportunity to compete."

Indoor residential and non-residential gatherings are limited to 10 people and two households. MDHHS continues to urge families to avoid indoor gatherings or to pick a single other household to interact with consistent with guidance already released by the department. Families are encouraged to stay home as much as possible to maintain momentum and to protect loved ones. Families are also encouraged to Mask Up, Mask Right, using guidance for what masks to wear and how to wear them.

The epidemic order continues to temporarily pause other venues and activities where participants have close physical contacts and are not consistently masked, like water parks.

As before, employees who work in jobs that cannot be performed from home can continue to go to work, while employees who can work from home should continue to do so.

Start Dates and Precautions

Last week the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), Michigan High School Athletic Association member schools may begin full practice activities in the Winter contact sports of girls and boys basketball, competitive cheer, ice hockey and wrestling on Monday, Feb. 8, with some precautions to continue limiting the spread of COVID-19.

Competition in those four sports also will begin next week, with basketball and hockey able to play Feb. 8 and cheer and wrestling able to compete starting Feb. 12.

Those four Winter contact sports have been able to practice since Jan. 16, but only with non-contact activities. MHSAA Tournament dates for all four sports previously were rescheduled into late March and early April to accommodate a later start to the regular season, and those dates appear below. All four Winter contact sports also must participate with some level of masking and/or rapid testing, also detailed sport-bysport below.

All testing will be coordinated between schools and MDHHS or their local health departments. Following are specific precautions and key dates for those contact sports at the high school level. Participants are defined as athletes, coaches and other team personnel active in practice and competition. For the sports detailed below, regular-season contests may be played up until the date of the MHSAA Finals in that sport.

GIRLS BASKETBALL

Masking/testing: All participants must wear face coverings at all times – during all practices and non-game activities, and during games. A testing requirement may

allow participants to remove masks while in active participation on the floor if they test negative that game day; more details will be provided to schools when confirmed.

Competition limit: Teams may play up to three games per week, Monday through Sunday.

First contest: Feb. 8 Districts: March 22, 24, 26 Regionals: March 29, 31 Quarterfinals: April 5 Semifinals: April 7 Finals: April 9

BOYS BASKETBALL

Masking/testing: All participants must wear face coverings at all times – during all practices and non-game activities, and during games. A testing requirement may allow participants to remove masks while in active participation on the floor if they test negative that game day; more details will be provided to schools when confirmed.

Competition limit: Teams may play up to three games per week, Monday through Sunday.

First contest: Feb. 8 Districts: March 23, 25, 27 Regionals: March 30, April

Quarterfinals: April 6 Semifinals: April 8 Finals: April 10

Masking/testing: Teams may compete without testing or face coverings, but must wear masks at all times outside of active competition or stunting/tumbling practice.

Competition limit: Teams may participate in 12 days of competition, not counting MHSAA Tournament events. First contest: Feb. 12 Districts: March 17-20 Regionals: March 23-24 Finals: March 26-27

ICE HOCKEY

Masking/testing: All participants must wear face coverings at all times – during all practices and non-game activities, and during games. A testing requirement may allow participants to remove masks while in active participation on the ice if they test negative that game day: more details will be provided to schools when confirmed.

Competition limit: Teams may play up to three games per week. Monday through Sunday. Teams also may play two games on one non-school day twice; during those two weeks, teams are allowed up to four games Monday through Sunday.

First contest: Feb. 8 Regionals: March 15-20 Quarterfinals: March 23-24 Semifinals: March 25-26 Finals: March 27

WRESTLING

Masking/testing: Testing is required for wrestling, but competitors will not be required to wear face coverings.

Competition limit: Teams may compete two days per week, Monday through Sunday, with no more than four teams at a site (with each individual competing in up to three matches per day.) First contest: Feb. 12

Team Districts: March 17-18 Individual Districts: March 20

BUYING A HOME WITH A VIEW

Homes with a pleasant view of the horizon often sell at a premium above similar homes without the view. However, if a view is important to you, buy it mostly for your own pleasure and not as an investment. Though you may place a considerable dollar value on the view, future buyers may not be so like-minded. It may take you longer to find a buyer when it comes time to resell the house. Or you may end up dropping your price to more nearly match other sales prices in the neighborhood.

In short, if you are buying a house with a view, try to pay as little extra as possible. Otherwise, you might not get your money back.

LOT AND LANDSCAPING

Even though most real estate value is usually concentrated in the building, the lot is important, too. Obviously, it should be as level as possible. Assuming the property is in a typical neighborhood, the lot should be rectangular - no odd shaped lots or oddly situated lots.

Yard sizes are smaller in modern homes than in older homes, but there should still be a decently sized front and back yard. Do not buy a house

where the entire back yard is taken up by a swimming pool, for example.

Do not purchase an over-landscaped property, either. You would normally pay a premium for that, which you may not be able to recover when you sell. You will get your best value if the house is moderately landscaped or under-landscaped for the area. You can always improve the landscaping during your ownership by improving the grass and adding bushes and trees. Just do not spend too much.

HOUSE SIZE

In each residential neighborhood, houses will vary in size and rooms, but they should not be too different. If resale value is an important consideration, you should not buy the largest model in the neighborhood. When determining market value, the homes nearest to yours are most important. If most of the nearby houses are smaller than your house, they can act as a drag on appreciation.

On the other hand, if you buy a small or medium house for the neighborhood, the larger homes can help pull up your value. This is one of those times where determining your "wants" versus your "needs" can be extremely important. Buying what you need in a more prestigious neighborhood may provide more financial reward than getting what you want in a less desirable neighborhood.

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
