Gov. Whitmer Lifts Mask Requirement for Fully Vaccinated Michiganders

LANSING, Mich. - Governor Gretchen Whitmer today announced the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) is updating the Gatherings and Mask Order to align with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's latest guidance on face coverings. The new order will effect on Saturday, May 15 at 9AM.

"For more than a year, we've been following the best data and science to slow the spread of COVID-19 and save lives," said Gover-

"It's critical that eligible Michigan residents who have not yet been vaccinated schedule their appointments as soon as they can," said Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, chief medical executive and MDHHS chief deputy director for health. "Getting shots in arms is the best way to end the pandemic. If you have not yet been vaccinated, it is important to continue to mask up to protect yourself and others from COVID-19."

CITY OF CHARLEVOIX CITY COUN-CIL MEETING, MAY 17, 2021

City council agrees to pedestrian friendly requests

CHARLEVOIX - The first issue on the docket would be the 229 stover and Ferry Avenue Corridor proposal. The proposal from Edgewater Resources gives the public an opportunity to help plan for the future of the site. The proposal aims to look at housing as an option along with opportunities to expand boat launch and recreation areas. The Commission would approve the Corridor Study Proposal.

Already in the 2021/2022 budget, they have allocated funds for the purchase of two 3/4 ton pickup trucks and a one-ton dump truck. They will be used by the Electric Department and the Public Works Department. The previous vehicle's purchasing plan is to buy them, run them until they do not have much value left and then auction them off. The City staff has met with a consultant from Enterprise Fleet Management to look at different options. They are offering the option to lease the vehicles and sell them at the highest retail value. This is typically a 3-5 year cycle compared to a 10-15 year cycle. The plan is to start out slowly and work into the program. The plan for the first year is to get the three trucks mentioned earlier.

The City has received a request from two businesses located in Van Pelt Alley, BLOOM and The Cantina. They want to block off the space between their two buildings between their two build-

Health Department strives to make area safe for residents, visitors: Vaccine locator window decals distributed, 50,000th dose administered soon

Many businesses in the Health Department of Northwest Michigan's four-county jurisdiction of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego counties may soon be displaying health department vaccine locator window clings (decal stickers) for customers and staff

tomers and staff. "We are more than happy to be partnering with Chambers of Commerce and area businesses, giving them a direct route to information and resources related to COVID-19 and the available vaccines," stated Lisa Peacock, Health Officer. "Within the coming weeks our area population will expand exponentially and although resident vaccinations need to continue, we know that visitors may also need assistance locating a first or second dose," she added.

The health department provided area Chambers of Commerce with the window clings free of charge to distribute to their members. Businesses that choose to take the stickers are encouraged to display them in highly visible locations. Along with a QR code - a scannable barcode directing individuals to the health department clinic listings - the window clings present a clear

message: Stay safe. Stay healthy. Get vaccinated!

"We are so excited here at

the Petoskey Chamber to see businesses re-opening! We are welcoming everyone back into our offices and we could not be happier. We have all worked very hard to get here and we've done that through getting our community vaccinated," said Nikki Devitt, Petoskey Regional Chamber of Commerce President. "That immunity in the community means so much because now we can come back into our businesses, welcome residents and visitors just like we want to and need to. We know how important it is to get our community vaccinated, and it is super easy now - as simple as scanning a code to locate a vaccination

clinic." Window clings can be picked up at no charge from area Chambers of Commerce. The window clings are recommended to be displayed in the front window or door to businesses, in staff breakrooms, restrooms, or at the cash register where individuals can view and scan the QR code to access the health departments website and list of clinics. The health department strives to make northern Michigan safe for

residents and visitors alike.

"We will be hitting a very exciting milestone of 50,000 total doses administered by the health department this week and we know our efforts must not stop here!" Peacock said. "Our staff is hard at work locating and planning unique opportunities for vaccination across our four-county jurisdiction," Peacock said, citing the health department is hosting multiple pop-up clinics, offering homebound vaccinations, and planning clinics where 100-200 vaccinations will be administered.

Within the health department's four-county jurisdiction, 52,862 residents have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine and 46,968 residents have completed their COVID-19 vaccine series. As of May 16, the health department vaccination status is as follows:

· Since December 2020, when COVID-19 vaccination clinics began, the health department has administered 49,417 total doses of COVID-19 vaccines.

· Number of vaccine doses administered last week (May 10-16): 1,641 doses.

· Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego county vaccination status: 59.1% of residents 16 and older with first or initial dose.

U. S. MILITARY **VETERAN** OF THE MONTH



The Veteran of the month of May 2021 is Melvin Clifford Howard. Born January 17, 1933 at his Grandparents home on Deer Lake , Boyne Valley Township to parents Harold and Helen Reinhart Howard. He grew up in the area and attended Boyne City Schools graduating from Boyne City High School in 1951. Mel worked for Boyne Area Dairy Company delivering milk and working at the dairy then he attended a Flint area Trade School prior to his enlistment into the United States Navy on 4 November, 1952. After completion of Naval Basic Seamanship Training which was at Camp Elliott, California in the middle of a desert, he received Advanced Schooling at the United States Naval School. Great Lakes Illinois becoming a First Class Boilerman, and was assigned to the USS Dixie AD-14, serving in the Korean Theater of operations during the Korean conflict. The USS Dixie was a World War II era ship built for the United States Navy as a destroyer tender, providing the ships with supplies and maintenance support services in battle areas to keep them fit for duty. CITY OF BOYNE CITY COMMISSION MEETING, MAY 11, 2021

City contracting with Baumann as social media director

BOYNE CITY - The Boyne City Commission would get back to in person meetings for the first time since the pandemic hit. The first topic of business would be to evaluate the decision to hire a Social Media Independent Contractor. The hiring of a contractor would further the City's goal of better engaging with the citizens and other parties interested in Boyne

The Commission would look to hire Jim Baumann, who has a strong journalism background and was a former Chamber of Commerce Executive Director. The role of his position will continue to be developed throughout the next year. Baumann will help with content and management of the Facebook page and possible content for Instagram and Twitter. The cost will be \$30 per hour for

about 6-8 hours per week. The money for the budget is planned for in the new yearly budget. The item would pass unanimously

The next thing to be passed by the Commission was a recommendation to approve the contract 2021 BC HR between the City and Housing North for the provision of staff services for one year of a cost to not exceed \$9,250. This contract continues to all the basic framework and necessary funding for the continuation of Housing Ready Program Director Steve Schneel to help address the housing shortage in Charlevoix County.

The Commission would then also approve the purchase of a 2022 Ford F-550 from CSI Emergency Apparatus of Grayling for a cost not to exceed \$120,000. This truck will replace an almost 34 year old equipment truck commonly known as 5121. The equipment truck hauls not

only personnel but life and property saving gear. With the microchip shortage, if they did not commit to purchasing the truck now, most likely a chassis may not be available for more than a year. The funds for this truck are included in the fiscal year budget.

The Commission would then approve the recommendation from Police Chief Kevin Spate to sign a contract with Common Angle for Gold Level IT support with the cost not to exceed \$10,176 per year. In 2019, the state required the City to improve their computer security to include a threat monitoring and detection program. The gold level package includes monitoring and detection along with any remote work performed. The funds for this contract are included in the fiscal year budget.

The Commission's spending would continue as they would approve another recommendation from Spate about signing a contract with Lexipool for policy management, supplemental manuals and procedures to not exceed \$5,453. The Commission would also then go on to approve a third recommendation from Spate to purchase and install a new server for the Police Department. The Department has had a stand alone server that was separate from all the others the City uses. The server was purchased in 2012 and the expected service life has expired. So, the Commission approved a quote from Common Angle to purchase and reinstall the new server for \$10,641. This also was planned for in the fiscal year budget.

The next City Commission meeting will be held on May 25 at 12:00.

OK2SAY Continues to Contribute to Safer Environments for Students

Annual Report Highlights Outcomes

LANSING, MICH. Nearly all school and law enforcement personnel using the confidential reporting system OK2SAY indicate it is useful and helpful in stopping harm before it occurs. Seventythree percent report they were unaware of the problem before the tip was submitted.

OK2SAY empowers Michigan students to help prevent violence and make their schools safe by confidentially reporting threatening behavior. Anyone can report tips on criminal activities or potential harm directed at students, school employees or schools. Tips can be submitted 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The program's 2020 Annual Report shows that OK2SAY received 3,743 tips spanning 31 categories, with the top three types of tips being:

☑ Suicide threats - 896 tips ☑ Drugs – 456 tips Other (e.g., anxiety, stress, depression, harass-

ment) - 436 tips "Students know what's troubling their peers because they're paying attention, especially on social media where young people tend to openly share on platforms

that may not be regularly monitored by parents and guardians," said Nancy Becker Bennett, director of the MSP Grants and Community Service Division.

'They're reaching out to get help for their friends and we're encouraged to see they trust us."

Other findings from the 2020 annual report include that 10 tips involved the confiscation of weapons and 42 tips involved the seizure of drugs or alcohol. In 2020, at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the program experienced a 42 percent decrease in tip volume as students transitioned to a virtual

East Jordan group team up to form non-profit childcare center

When Danielle Poindexter of East Jordan saw her number of grandchildren go from zero to ten in just 4 1/2 years, she quickly discovered that helping her family with childcare was not going to be enough to fill the need. And when the Stay Home, Stay Safe orders were put in place, she realized the need for childcare increased, not only in her own family, but across the country.

Poindexter explained that recently, East Jordan area families have found it nearly impossible to locate available, high-quality, affordable daycare. With only a few inhome daycares available, many parents have been forced to leave or change employment, rely on family and friends for their children's care or commute to other cities to secure their daycare

When Danielle realized that other families were struggling to find daycare solutions, she put her thoughts into action and began investigating opening a childcare center, a place that would provide structure and love for the children, and peace of mind for the parents.

With the help of some talented individuals from the East Jordan community, Danielle formed a board of directors for a new, nonprofit childcare center named Training Wheels Childcare Center. Her team includes Mary Anderson, a kindergarten teacher who serves as board chair; Lindsey Malpass-Skop is vicechair bringing with her a background in human resources; Rhonda Brennan-Buckholz has an accounting background and serves as treasurer; Kristi Nowka is board secretary and Crystal Hass, member. Program Di-

rector is Heather Moore. In addition to a grant from the Charlevoix County Community Foundation to purchase classroom equipment, the newly formed board reached out to service groups and the town's three main employers, as well as individuals, local businesses, churches, and clubs to help fund the center. The group also posted a request for gently used items on their Facebook page. Danielle said, "The number of quality items donated astounded me. We live in an incredibly supportive community that rec-

Stevenson commented that the childcare center is a perfect fit for the former middle school facility. The center occupies three classrooms with an additional room that serves as a lunchroom. There is also an outdoor playground area. The center currently serves 18 children from infant through kindergarten age, but when fully operational, the center will be able to accommodate 25-30 children, nearly doubling the current number of daycare openings in the community. With so much need for childcare, it comes as no surprise there is already a waiting list. Rates run \$32-\$35 per day, \$28 per day for an additional child in the same family. Training Wheels Childcare Center is open 6:30 a.m. to 5:45 p.m. Monday

through Friday.


portunity to get on rides after not having the festival last

ings for pedestrian use only. With the limited operating capacity that the businesses must adhere to for proper social distancing which has increased more pedestrians populating the alley. and regulations, including local business and workplace guidance."

"It's critical that eligible Michigan residents who have not yet been vaccinated schedule their appointments as soon as they can," said Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, chief medical executive and MDHHS chief deputy director for health. "Getting shots in arms is the best way to end the pandemic. If you have not yet been vaccinated, it is important to continue to mask up to protect yourself and others from COVID-19.3

'The safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine and all the hard work that Michiganders have done allows us to take a big step in returning to normal," said MDHHS Director Elizabeth Hertel. "This updated order keeps Michigan in alignment with CDC guidance that is based on the knowledge of health experts. I urge our residents to continue to be respectful of each other as we move for-

ward.' Under the updated MDHHS Gatherings and Mask Order, Michiganders who are outdoors will no longer need to wear a mask regardless of vaccination status. While indoors, fully vaccinated Michiganders will no longer need to wear a mask, but residents who are not vaccinated, or have not completed their vaccinations, must continue to wear a mask or face covering to protect themselves and others. After July 1, the broad indoor mask mandate will expire.

Atlanta Man Charged With First Degree Criminal Sexual Conduct

The investigation led to a four-count arrest warrant being authorized for an Atlanta, MI man.

May 13, 2021. He was arraigned today in the 90th District Court in Charlevoix on three counts Criminal Sexual Conduct First Degree Victim Under 13 and one count Domestic Violence. His bond was set at \$25,000 cash surety. His next scheduled court appearance is on June

Charlevoix Man Gets Prison for Possessing Child Sexually Abusive Material

Gaugi Leston Holm, 51, Charlevoix was scheduled to prison this morning in the 33rd Circuit Court following his convictions for possessing child sexually abusive material and using a computer to commit a crime.

The defendant was sentenced by Judge Roy C. Hayes III to serve 36 to 84 months for using a computer to commit a crime and 24 to 48 months for possessing the material. The sentences will run concurrently.

Holm pleaded guilty to both charges on April 9, admitting that he accessed and possessed images of children engaged in sexual activities.

According to a police affi-

davit filed in the case, this investigation began when the Internet crimes Against Children Task Force received a cyber tip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children indicating that Holm had downloaded the

materials. The tips were followed up by the Michigan State Police and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security who located the images on the Defendant's Google drive and accessed them from his com-

charges of criminal sexual conduct involving victims under the age of 13 and was sentenced to serve 8 to 40 years in prison at that time.

At the sentencing, Charlevoix

County Prosecuting Attorney Allen Telgenhof said that the defendant is a predator who has had the opportunities to change his behavior, through programming both while he was in prison and after his release, but he has failed to

do so, continuing to seek sexual satisfaction from children, this time through images.

Telgenhof also stressed that this is not a victimless crime, since actual children were victimized in creating the images and that a market exists for these materials due to people like Holm.

'The court focused on safety of the public in fashioning this sentence," Telgenhof stated. "This person has shown they cannot stop this type of behavior and the only way we can be sure the public is protected is if they are imprisoned."

Charlevoix County Transit & the COA has a Senior and Emergency grocery ordering delivery service as part of the services offered by the County's Transit. While delivery of items such as food pantry boxes, prescriptions and senior meals was well received, the grocery delivery was not widely used during the early months of the pandemic. One of the drawbacks that transit officials noticed was that for curbside pickup available for groceries an individual needed to place their order via a smartphone or web-based application.

The expansion of the Transit's delivery program will provide assistance to those needing help with ordering their groceries. County residents who would like to use the Grocery Ordering/Delivery Program can call Program Coordinator at 231-497-1430 on designated shopping days to place their grocery order. The program coordinator will then input the order

with the caller, take payment information (credit/debit card) and then place the order as well as scheduling the grocery delivery in transit's scheduling system. This program is currently limited to in-county grocery stores utilizing the store shopping app.

MHSAA Update on Face Masks

The Michigan High School Athletic Associuation is sharing the following updated guidance based on the latest MDHHS Epidemic Order issued on May 14, effective at 9am on Saturday, May 15:

• Face masks are no longer required for any outdoor activity, including the outdoor contact spring sports of soccer and lacrosse. While individuals may opt to wear a face mask, there is no longer a requirement that face masks be worn outdoors by any player, coach, team personnel, official or spectators.

ersonnel, official or spectators.
• For fully vaccinated individuals,

face masks are no longer required during indoor activity. MDHHS is defining "fully vaccinated" as 14 days after the second dose of Pfizer or Moderna or 14 days after the single dose of Johnson & Johnson. For all individuals not fully vaccinated, all indoor activity continues to require a face mask. From the May 15 order, the indoor face mask requirement for non-vaccinated individuals is set to expire on July 1.

• There is no change in the May 15 order to the weekly testing requirement. Weekly testing of non-fully vaccinated spring sport student-athletes must continue through the expiration

of the order on May 31.

• There is no change to the outdoor spectator limits from previous orders (1,000 spectators in many cases) other than the fact that face masks are no longer required for anyone outdoors, spectators included.

The MHSAA will continue to communicate with all schools as updated and ongoing MDHHS guidance and orders continue to be issued.




Terry Ronald Wakeley, 77, of Grayling, passed away on May



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WHAT YOU SHOULD LOOK FOR WHEN HOUSE HUNTING

If you're shopping for a home and can afford to buy one, you couldn't be in a better position right now. In many parts of the country, housing inventory is high and both home prices and interest rates are low and as a buyer, you can take advantage of

With so many properties on the market, you can probably take a more leisurely approach to house hunting without getting into a fast-paced bidding war. There is a caveat, however. The best homes priced properly for the market conditions will always be in higher demand.

BATHROOMS

Following kitchens, bathrooms are also expensive rooms to remodel at a 2009 national average of more than \$16,000 because of the fixtures and plumbing. Make sure you see no leaks or evidence of leaks in tubs, toilets and flooring. Sharing bathrooms can be one of those pain points for families so make sure you get what you need.

ROOF

A roof is a big-ticket item with an average 2009 replacement cost of more than \$19,000 although adding a

second layer to a roof is not nearly as expensive as replacing the entire thing. You may need to replace the heat pump or air conditioner if it's older than 10 years and a furnace or boiler if it's more than 15 years old.

BASEMENT

The extra room you gain may be a huge headache if the basement floods. Look for water marks and find out if the house has a system for removing water.

Other areas of concern that might cost money down the line are the driveways and sidewalks, chimneys, insulation and windows.

If you find a house and your offer is accepted, you'll be dealing with a home inspector who can fill in the gaps with a professional's eye. The thing is, if you really want the home, you don't have to let problems deter you. You are in position to negotiate a price reduction with the seller or insist repairs be made to the property before your offer is finalized.

If you can afford a house, you can afford the luxury of taking your time to find the right one for you.

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

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






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
