Board of Health Meeting attracts hundreds of people to speak their mind on mask mandate

Charlevoix - At the September 7, 2021 Board of Health meeting the meeting room was filled to capacity as well as the adjoining hallways and foyer with people standing



outside in the rain. The large turnout was in response to a last minute public health order requiring universal masking in grades k-12 for all school districts within the department's four county jurisdiction of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego counties.

At the time this publication went to press, no agenda items had been addressed. In person public comment lasted three hours and forty-five minutes when a short break was called. Upon resuming the meeting, board members were prepared to hear public

comment from the 249 zoom participants, 99 of whom had indicated they wanted to speak.

Most of the public comment was from those against the masking mandate. Speakers presented countless statistics and many gave heartfelt personal experiences as reasons for their request that the mandate be rescinded.

School bus driver Mike Way gave a very descriptive presentation of his experience

Jury convicts Lansing man of multiple felonies

Lansing was
convicted by a

wrapped up Friday. The jury began deliberating around 5:00 p.m. and announced its verdict around 8:30 p.m..

Mullen was convicted of possessing heroin with the intent to deliver, two counts of being a felon in possession of a firearm, two counts of possessing a firearm during the commission of a felony, possessing a silencer, being a felon in possession of ammunition and two counts of resisting and obstructing a police officer.

The jury was unable to reach a verdict on a tenth count of possessing fentanyl with the intent to deliver.

"I want to thank the jurors for their time, attention and of course, the verdict, which I believe was correct," Charlevoix County Prosecuting Attorney Allen Telgenhof said. "They gave the case much consideration. This case ensures that a dangerous drug dealer will be off the streets and out of our county for many years."

Mullen is a habitual offender, having been convicted of multiple felonies, including drug and weapons charges previously, and being previously sentenced to

Mullen was arrested following a drug raid on February 2, 2021, when officers of the Boyne City Police Department and the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office executed a search warrant at the Parkview Apartments in Boyne City.

Police saw Mullen carrying bags to a rental car outside the apartments. A search of the car revealed he had carried an AR-15, a silencer and other parts to the gun to the vehicle. He was searched inside the home and was found in possession of ammunition for the AR-15 as well as ammunition for a pistol which was located, fully loaded, in the bedroom of the apartment.

When police knocked at the door, Mullen locked the deadbolt and headed to the bathroom inside the residence, according to





1914 Winery and Tasting Room opens in East Jordan

East Jordan - The 1914 Winery & Tasting Room has opened a second location in East Jordan. A ribbon cutting was held on Saturday, September 4 to commemorate the event.

1914 owners, Rob and Greg Shooks planted their first crops of cold weather grapes back in 2015, opened their first tasting room on the family farm in 2018 and were surrounded by nearly 40 supporting family members and friends at the ribbon cutting outside of 101 Main Street, their second tasting room. "When we first started this journey our parents thought we were crazy, now they are fully on board," said Rob pointing to his parents, who were waiting for the ribbon cutting to begin.

A fourth generation family business can get a little saturated adding members of the family tree to the payroll, not to mention how difficult it is for the family farm in this economy, but the Shooks brothers found a way to adapt. "The farm needed a change. In today's day in age it's really hard to make a profit on any commodity you can't have your price on," explained Rob. So instead of getting into distribution and fighting for shelf space the pair decided it was best to start something new. "At that point we decided that a winery might be the way to go," he said. "We're still actively farming we just wanted to expand to ag-tourism, have people celebrate our heritage, history and our product," said Greg.

The first 1914 tasting room is located on the family farm in Central Lake on Shooks Road. When it was time to expand, they could have set up shop anywhere. "We looked at different communities and just kept coming back to East Jordan. We like it (here) for the opportunity, the atmosphere, the potential and the people who enjoy good wine and cider," said Greg. "We're excited for the opportunity to be here."

1914's second tasting room has been stocked and ready to open for a long time now. The Shooks have been waiting since March for approval from the liquor licensing agency. As a former member of the Michigan

House of Representatives and aide to Senator Wayne Schmidt, Triston Cole commented on the license delay, "It shows the disconnect. They don't understand the tourist industry and small towns in rural America. They don't understand how important even one weekend is," he said.

Before cutting the ribbon, Greg

thanked the city and the community and after the ribbon was cut the community thanked them by flooding the tasting room and sampling the wine and cider selection at a 19.14% discount to celebrate the day. "This is a fantastic addition to the community," said Cole.

As of August 19, anyone 18 vears or older who has immunization records in the Michigan Care Improvement Registry (MCIR) is able to locate their immunization record in MCIR if a record exists and matches their government issued ID (ex: MI Secretary of State Driver's License or ID card, or USA Passport). The immunization record from MCIR will appear as a .pdf document which can be downloaded, saved, or printed.

To maintain privacy, a citizen MILogin account must be created and used. New users must sign into their MILogin account and upload a valid government issued ID to the Immunization Portal. The portal is only available for those 18 years or older, and parents are not able to download their children's immunization records. If an immunization record cannot be found, or if you would like to request your child's immunization record, the records can be requested from a physician's office or by calling the health department at 800-432-4121.

'The new immunization portal gives adults in Michigan access to their whole immunization record, as entered into the MCIR," said officials with the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. "Residents will be able to see their COVID-19 and other vaccine records, as well as see what immunizations they might be missing. This portal provides easy access to individual's records, with this access we hope it empowers individuals on their own health and records.'

The portal can be found online at www.michigan.gov/immunize or at Michigan.gov/Mi-ImmsPortal, and it is available on computers or smart devices.

If a resident would like their Michigan immunization records updated, they can contact their physician's office or the health department at 800-432-4121.

The health department offers convenient COVID-19 vaccination clinics for all area residents and visitors 12 and older either by appointment ahead of time or simply walking in. Parent consent is required for minors. Anyone may call 800-432-4121 if they have questions or are not able to find a time or date that works for them and/or their child. Clinics offer client choice of Pfizer, Moderna or J&J unless otherwise noted.



witnesses. Police came inside to find Mullen leaving the bathroom and inside the toilet was a plastic baggie containing a mixture of heroin and fentanyl.

The baggie also included a smaller baggie containing what a witness indicated was a sleep aid that Mullen used to mix with his drugs before selling to create more prod-

uct.
"The jury was able to see video created by a police body camera, showing the bravery of the officers as they entered this home, knowing that a convicted felon was behind that door, likely possessing weapons,' Telgenhof said.

"I also want to thank the police officers who conducted this raid, the subsequent investigation and who testified at trial. It was a true team effort."

Mullen will be sentenced October 15 in the 33rd Circuit Court and faces a maximum penalty of life in prison.

with children and masks. "I've seen students' masks totally saturated with saliva and snot flowing from both barrels of the nose. Masks are worn over and over, chewed on, draped around their necks, dropped on the floor, stepped on, and then put back on their face. These dirty masks are not changed regularly with clean ones and end up being a repository of bacterial and viral contamination. The children end up fiddling with their masks and touching their faces more because of this unnatural covering," he said.

Jeff Wieber, President of **Gavlord Community** Schools Board of Education, spoke on behalf of his board. "Gaylord Commu-

nity Schools worked diligently on our emergency Operations Plan, taking into consideration not only the safety of our students and staff as a primary focus, but also the concerns and fears shared by so many staff and parents on both sides of the mask versus no mask debate. We created a plan that was widely accepted, and to the extent possible without jeopardizing safety, met our community where they were at... and no fair reason existed to cause you to act in such a unilateral manner in issuing the mask order," he

"I received no phone call no conaboration, no asking for input," said Antrim County commissioner Jarris Rubingh. "I'm 6 months into it but common sense tells me that if you work for a board you seek information and communicate. There is a sense of working together. An email to them (the board) with no prior knowledge makes you feel

like you don't matter." "I don't believe the man-

constitutionally sound and at this point I will not be voting to support it," said Charlevoix County Commissioner Scott Hankins.

Many of the complaints stemmed from the late issuance of the mandate. It came after business hours on August 27. One speaker accused, "When you read that the school boards went against the recommendations of the CDC you felt you had to intervene." Most speakers stated in one way or another that it was an overreach of authority.

Of the nearly 70 participants that spoke about 10 of them spoke in favor of the mandate. "I would not go to the Board of Health if I wanted to know which social studies curriculum to teach and I would not go to the School Board to understand how to keep the kids safe from COVID," said Larry Sullivan. The crowd did not respond well to anyone voicing a pro-mandate opinion and some members of the audience resorted to bullying tactics.

Gregg Mattson of Charlevoix County notified Health Officer Lisa Peacock that he has filed an indictment against her and invited others to do the same. The Charging Request asks the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department to investigate the legality of the mandate and press charges for any illegal doings. Mattson then read Article 6: section 3 of the Nuremberg code, "In no case should a collective agreement or the consent of a community leader or any other authority, substitute for an individual's informed consent," he read.

Final in-person speaker K. Perry ended his request to have the mandate rescinded by stating, "We aren't conspiracy theorists, we just know what works well for us."


