Boyer Mountain has been an institution in lift innovations going back to the day it opened with the Midwest’s first chairlift, the original first chairlift in the world that traveled by flatbed rail car from Sun Valley for the opening of Boyer Ski Club (aka Boyer Mountain Resort) in 1948. From there,

Boyer Mountain introduced the world’s first four-place in 1964, and installed America’s first high-speed six-person chairlift in 1992. The next evolution of lift technology is coming to Boyer Mountain with the Midwest’s first Doppelmayr D-Line, a high-speed, eight-person lift. Coined the “D8,” the new lift is replacing Disciples I and II, and will transform up-hill capacity in the Disciple’s Ridge area with an approximate 3 minute ride to the top. Additional features include auto-locking safety bars, a child-friendly raisable loading carpet and whisper quiet ride. D8 is scheduled to begin operations for the 2022/23 winter season.

Projects included in the full ten-year plan include an impressive roster of new chairlifts; slope upgrades from snowmaking to lighting and signage; redefined and expanded village spaces; the addition of a major Avalanche Bay outdoor waterpark complex; airport improvements, expanded trail systems, Deer Lake and Beach House facility enhancements; sports complex upgrades; and more. ## Gov. Whitmer on efforts to protect the Great Lakes from Line 5 Oil Spill after Canada invokes treaty with United States

LANSING, Mich. – Governor Gretchen Whitmer today released the following statement after Canada filed a letter in the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Michigan indicating that it had formally requested negotiations with the United States under Article IX of the 1977 Transit Pipelines Treaty in connection with Michigan's actions with respect to Line 5.

"I am profoundly disappointed that today the Government of Canada chose to invoke Article IX of the 1977 Transit Pipelines Treaty in a bid to help Enbridge, a private oil company, keep crude oil running indefinitely through Michigan's Straits of Mackinac," said Governor Whitmer. "So long as oil is flowing through the pipelines, there is a very real threat of a catastrophic oil spill in the Great Lakes. I have made clear to Enbridge that it cannot use our state-owned lakebed for these pipelines, but Enbridge has refused to stop. Moreover, rather than taking steps to diversify energy supply and ensure resilience, Canada has channeled its efforts into defending an oil company with an abysmal environmental track record."

"Michigan is, and will remain, a strong partner with

Canada on a range of issues," continued Whitmer. "However, I will not remain silent when the fate of the Great Lakes and Michigan hangs in the balance. I had expected that Canada, a nation that prides itself on its commitment to environmental protection, would share my interest in protecting the Great Lakes. Instead, the Government of Canada has chosen to do the bidding of the very oil company responsible for the 2010 Kalamazoo River Oil Spill – one of the largest inland oil spills in the history of the nation that happened right here in Michigan. At the same time, Canada is proposing to store nuclear waste in the Great Lakes Basin, adding even more risk to our waters. I remain confident that Michigan will prevail in its legal efforts with respect to Line 5, regardless of today's action, and I will continue to fight to get the pipelines out of the water. I call on Prime Minister Trudeau to reverse his decision."

The Great Lakes are home to 21% of the world's fresh surface water. The lakes supply drinking water for 48 million people, including 5 million here in Michigan, and support 1.3 million jobs that generate \$82 billion in wages annually across the



United States. In Michigan, the Great Lakes support over 350,000 jobs. The Line 5 pipeline is a ticking time bomb that could lead to an oil spill in the Great Lakes, which would put families and small businesses across the region at risk.

Enbridge has a troubling environmental record, most notably when an Enbridge pipeline ruptured in 2010, causing one of the worst inland oil spills in U.S. history and dumping one million gallons of oil into a tributary of the Kalamazoo River. And Canada's push to store high-level radioactive nuclear waste near Lake Huron has shown that Canada is unwilling to prioritize the Great Lakes over their own energy interests.

In November of 2020, Governor Whitmer and Department of Natural Resources Director Dan Eichinger notified Enbridge that the 1953 easement allowing it to operate dual pipelines in the Straits of Mackinac to transport petroleum and other products was being revoked and terminated. The notice required Enbridge to cease operations of the dual pipelines in the Straits by May of 2021, allowing for an orderly transition that protects Michigan's energy needs.

Governor Whitmer and Director Eichinger also filed a lawsuit asking the Ingham County Circuit Court to recognize the validity of the revocation and termination of the easement. Enbridge subsequently removed this case to federal court, and the State of Michigan has filed a motion to remand the case

back to state court. Twenty-eight entities, including sixteen states and the District of Columbia, four Native American Tribes, six environmental organizations and the Great Lakes Business Network have filed an amicus briefs in support of this motion to remand.

To ensure Michigan's energy needs are met, Governor Whitmer and the Michigan Public Service

Commission launched the MI Propane Security Plan to protect jobs and diversify and expand our renewable energy resources. Since early in 2019, the Whitmer Administration has been preparing for potential alternatives to ensure energy security for both of Michigan's peninsulas in the event of a Line 5 closure.

As of May 12, Enbridge has been unlawfully tres-

passing on state land as it continues to pump oil under the Straits of Mackinac beyond the deadline to cease operations. If successful in its action to enforce its revocation and termination of the easement, the administration will seek disgorgement of Enbridge's profits derived from its wrongful use of the easement lands after May 12.

In addition to invoking Article IX of the Treaty, which provides a process for the resolution of Treaty disputes between the United States and Canada, Canada has asked the Court to hold its proceedings in abeyance while this Treaty process is ongoing. The first step in this process is formal negotiations, which Canada has now requested.

Michigan has made clear in its filings that there is no legal reason that the Court should wait to rule in our case, and this remains true, even in light of Canada's action today. Each day that Line 5 continues operating increases the risk of a catastrophic oil spill in the Great Lakes. Michigan's actions have been fully consistent with the Treaty and Michigan's authority with respect to environmental protection.

### Great Lakes Business Leaders condemn Canadian delay tactic on Line 5

Today, the Canadian Government invoked a 1977 treaty requiring continued negotiations on Enbridge's Line 5 oil pipeline now with the U.S. State Department. The move comes after the end of lengthy failed negotiations between the company and the State of Michigan which have delayed action on the risky pipeline for over 5 months. Co-chairs speaking on behalf of the Great Lakes Business Network have decried the move as a continued delay tactic on behalf of the Canadian oil giant, Enbridge.

"This action on behalf of the Canadian Government is unconscionable following the tragic oil spill this weekend which has devastated the southern California coast," remarked GLBN Co-Chair, Juliette King McAvoy, of King Orchards. "Canada should

be proactively planning for a just transition away from fossil fuels rather than investing their resources to prolong risky and antiquated infrastructure. Each day that Line 5 operates represents a direct threat to our precious freshwater resources."

"As we watch yet another devastating oil spill destroy critical water and wildlife, Canada is increasing the risk of an oil spill in the Great Lakes by attempting to delay the shutdown of Line 5," GLBN Co-Chair Larry Bell of Bell's Brewery stated. "Michigan has a right and duty to protect our Great Lakes. Canada should be working with Michigan and the United States to transition away from this 70-year-old oil pipeline instead of creating legal delays that only benefit Enbridge."

### Canada invokes treaty to bar Michigan from shutting down Line 5

The government of Canada has formally invoked a 1977 treaty with the U.S. government that it says bars Michigan from forcing Enbridge Inc. to close its controversial aging Line 5 oil pipeline under the Straits of Mackinac.

Gordon Griffin, attorney for the Canadian government, notified a federal judge in Grand Rapids of the treaty invocation in a Monday, Oct. 4, court filing, which requests that litigation between Enbridge and Michigan be paused while the two governments

resolve the dispute.

The formal request for negotiations under Article 9 of the 1977 Transit Pipelines Treaty was delivered to the U.S. through diplomatic channels on Monday.

The treaty stipulates that "no public authority" in either the U.S. or Canada shall take measures that would "have the effect of, impeding, diverting, redirecting, or interfering with in any way the transmission of hydrocarbons in transit," Griffin wrote.

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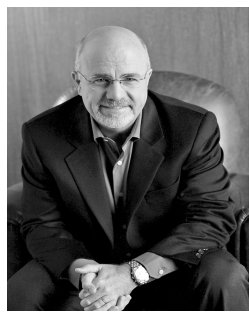
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## DAVE Says

Dear Dave,  
What is the main difference between people who follow your plan, stick with it and succeed, and those who fall off along the way?

Dear Damon,  
I've walked with thousands of families through financial problems. Some of them were speedbumps that just needed to be smoothed out, while others seemed like mountains. The biggest factor I've noticed separating those who stick with it and gain control of their finances, from those who give up and go back to their old ways, can be boiled down to one simple word—hope.

Hope is stolen when we misunderstand failure and believe lies. One of the biggest lies that robs people of hope is the one that says failure is permanent. The moment we start seeing failures of the past as predictors of our futures, it extinguishes that ember of hope. Failure happens to all of us at times. It's natural, and it is normal. The way to reach your goals, though, is to keep failure in its cage. And failure is caged when we begin to understand it isn't permanent.

said, "Success is going from failure to failure without loss of enthusiasm." If we believe failure is here to stay, we lose enthusiasm. And that leads to an inability to re-focus on success. People often make dumb, short-term decisions when they're in financial difficulty. If you talk yourself into believing you'll never be able to save enough money to pay cash for a car, you'll lose hope and borrow the money. Debt not only robs you of the ability to build wealth, but it's also usually the result of losing hope.

Have you done something stupid or wrong in the past that you are still reliving daily? Is that memory haunting you, and stealing your hope? Remember, the past only has power over you if you let it have that power. Don't get me wrong. The past can hurt, and it can be disappointing. But you can either give in to it and let it control you, or you can learn from it and make a conscious decision to keep moving forward.

## Rep. Borton plan to protect recreational animal feeding headed to governor's desk

The Michigan Senate today approved state Rep. Ken Borton's plan to allow recreational wildlife and bird feeding at Michigan homes.

"In beautiful Northern Michigan, we love the open air and the great outdoors, including the deer, elk, bears and birds that make their homes in the region,"

said Borton, of Gaylord. "People should be able to do something as simple as feeding animals without retaliation from the government, and my plan will protect residents just hoping to enjoy nature."

Borton's House Bill 4088 would let residents feed wild animals recreationally regardless of any policy is-

sued by the Natural Resources Commission. Under the plan, wildlife and bird feeding would be allowed under three conditions:

- Feed must be placed either to view animals recreationally or to prevent them from starvation;
- The feed must be located within 300 feet of a residence; and

- Not more than 2 gallons of feed may be placed, scattered or distributed at one time.

HB 4088 earned bipartisan support in the House of Representatives in May, and now advances to the governor for her consideration.

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## Top 6 Reasons Mortgage Applications are Rejected

Part 2 of 2

Half of refinance applications are abandoned or rejected, as are 30 percent of purchase mortgage applications, according to the Mortgage Bankers Association. All told, the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council (FFIEC) says that well over 2 million mortgage applications were rejected last year.

Want to avoid falling into that number? It's tough — especially in light of the fact that mortgage lenders have become increasingly restrictive in terms of their lending guidelines since the housing market crash.

Here, as a cautionary tale and primer on what to expect, are the reasons 4-6 mortgage lenders reject applications.

4. Property didn't appraise. Since the whole industry had its hand (among other things) smacked for allowing home values to skyrocket in a very short time, appraisal guidelines have tightened up — some would say, even more than overall mortgage guidelines. So, it is increasingly common to have the property appraise for a price lower than the sale price negotiated between the buyer and seller.

This is especially common in the refinance realm, as well over a quarter of U.S. homes are now upside-down, meaning the mort-

gage balance owed is greater than the value of the home. (If you're trying to refinance an upside-down mortgage, consider the FHA Short Refi program — contact your lender or get referrals to any mortgage broker who makes FHA details to apply.)

5. Condition problems. With all the distressed properties on the market, and with most non-distressed sellers barely breaking even, more home-sale transactions than ever are falling apart due to condition problems with the property. Many lenders will not extend financing on homes where the appraiser points out problems like cracked or broken windows, missing

kitchen appliances, electrical problems, or wood rot.

And in the world of condos and other units that belong to a homeowners association, if more than 25 percent of units are rented (rather than owner-occupied) or more than 15 percent are delinquent on their HOA dues, new applications for refinance or purchase mortgages on units in the development are likely to be rejected.

6. Technical difficulties with application. The days when lenders just took your word for it are long, long gone. Applications with incomplete or unverifiable information are doomed.

If any of these mortgage loan application glitches arise in your home-buying or refinancing process, it's critical that you connect with your mortgage professional, be it your banker or mortgage broker, to determine what course of action to take.

In some cases, it might be as simple as buying a stove you find at Craigslist and installing it before escrow closes; but with income issues your mortgage pro will need to help you determine whether it makes sense to pay some bills down, get a co-signer, or even wait six months so your income documentation will qualify.

"We are very pleased with the increased interest in getting vaccinated against the coronavirus – either due to the more rapidly spreading Delta variant or to receive a booster or third shot – and we are no longer able to accommodate walk-ins at our clinics," said Lisa Peacock, Health Officer. "To assure we have the right balance of staff and vaccines to accommodate our clients, we are asking everyone to schedule a clinic appointment by either visiting our website or calling our

office," she added.

To schedule an appointment in a COVID-19 clinic that offers Pfizer, Moderna or the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, visit the health department website at [www.nwhealth.org](http://www.nwhealth.org) or call 1-800-432-4121 to speak to a staff member to answer any questions and schedule an appointment.

Questions have been asked regarding the difference between a third dose and a booster dose of COVID-19 vaccine, and how to obtain the additional dose. To clarify the latest recommendations, the health department is providing the following information.

- **Booster dose:** a single booster dose, to be administered at least six months after completion of the primary series for individuals that have received the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccination only.

- **Third dose:** an additional dose administered to persons who are immunosuppressed due to underlying medical conditions or immune-suppressing medications. For immunocompromised individuals a third dose of an mRNA vaccine should be given anytime 28 days after

## Postcard from Vienna

Vienna, Austria – the City of Music.

Franz Schubert was born there, just like Johann Strauss I and II.

Beethoven and Mozart came to live and work in Austria, as did other giants of classical music. Composers such as Joseph Haydn, Franz Liszt, Johannes Brahms, Antonio Salieri and a host of others were all drawn to Vienna's storied quality of life, Baroque architecture, and old-world charm.

"Postcard from Vienna" is the title of the Great Lakes Chamber Orchestra's (GLCO) concert on Saturday, Oct. 30, at 7 p.m. at Great Lakes Center for the Arts (GLCFA), 800 Bay Harbor Dr., Petoskey.

According to GLCO Music Director Libor Ondras, the performance will reflect the visual image of a typical postcard – pictures of characteristic/dominant sites of Vienna. "One can hardly fit all of the city's iconic pictures on one postcard!" he explained. "Alas, the concert's three featured pieces offer but a glimpse of Vienna's Classical period."

Beethoven's 7th Symphony is the concert's focal point. "This symphony is one of the composer's most optimistic works," Ondras explained. "Richard Wagner thought the piece was perfect dance music, calling it 'the apotheosis of the dance.' The First and Third movements shine with brilliant colors, dotted rhythms, and allusions to country dances."

Ondras said the symphony's famous second movement (Allegretto) is a funeral march in all but name. "Beethoven was at work on this symphony during the years of the Napoleonic Wars, imagining processions converging upon the cemetery; an experience that permeates the entire movement," Ondras said.

Cello soloist Helen LaGrand, a University of Michigan student, will perform during the Beethoven segment.

The concert will also fea-

ture Gioachino Rossini's "Il Barbiere de Siviglia Overture" (The Barber of Seville) and Joseph Haydn's "Cello Concerto in C Major".

## Health Dept. of NW Michigan issues statement on mask mandate

### Statement Regarding Public Health Order Issued August 27, 2021, Regarding the Prevention of COVID-19 Transmission in Educational Settings within Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego Counties

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan has been receiving inquiries regarding the Fiscal Year 2022 budget bill signed by Gov.

Gretchen Whitmer this week, specifically pertaining to the legality of the Public Health Order issued August 27, 2021, requiring universal masking by children and adults indoors in K-12 educational settings.

Officials from the Health Department of Northwest Michigan are sharing the following statement:

The Health Department remains committed to protecting the public's health. The Michigan Public Health Code, MCL 333.2451 and MCL 333.2453, as well as State Administrative Rule R325.175(4), promulgated by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services pur-

suant to MCL 333.2226(d), authorize local health departments to issue orders in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Health Department issued the Public Health Order for K-12 educational settings within Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego Counties (issued 8/27/2021) pursuant to this statutory and regulatory authority. The recently enacted state budget for Fiscal Year 2021-2022 contains language addressing the effect that an emergency order may have on appropriated funds. Based on multiple legal opinions including statements from the Governor's legal team regarding

the unconstitutionality and unenforceability of the budget language, the Health Department has been informed that it retains the authority to issue and enforce its emergency orders and for the purpose of continuing to protect the public health has made the decision to keep the mask order in place.

The Public Health Order issued August 27, 2021, remains in effect until it has been determined by the Health Department that the risk trends have consistently improved using such indicators as transmission levels, vaccination coverage, hospital capacity, and public health capacity AND/OR

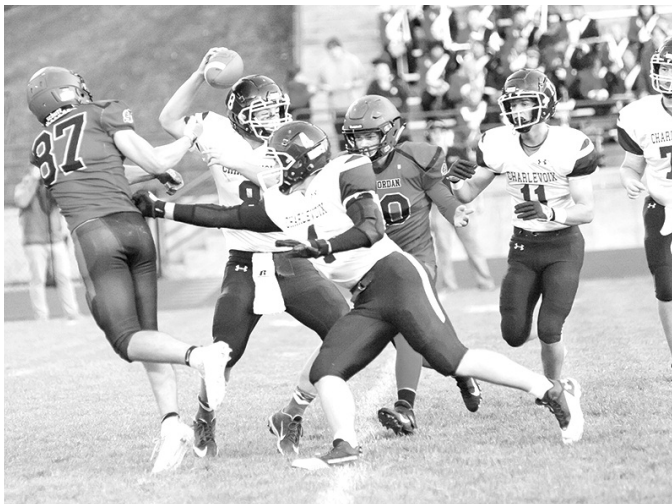

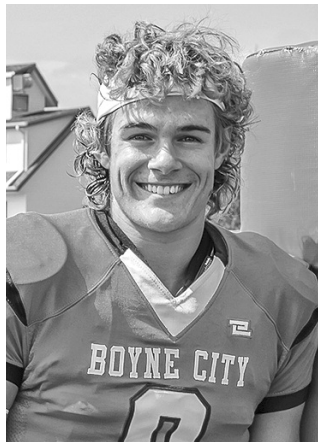
# Ramblers get back on track against Blazers

## Ramblers beat Charlevoix and fall to TC Christian and Elk Rapids in tough week

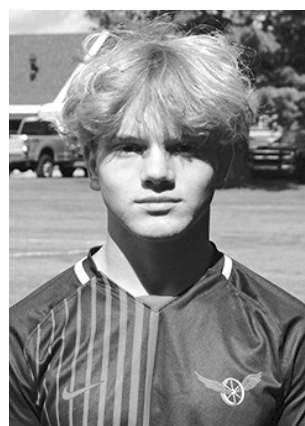

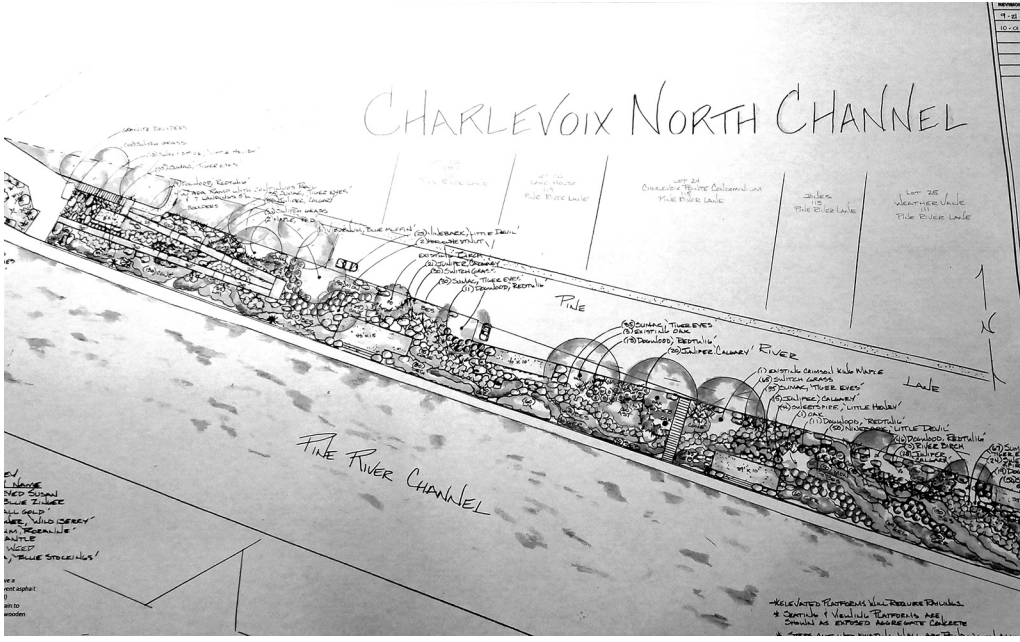

# Best summer season ever for city recreation dept.

Charlevoix - On October 4, at a sparsely attended and relatively short City Council meeting, a new harbor fee scale was approved and the Charlevoix City Council heard two presentations: A planting donation proposition and an overview of the City Parks and Recreation programs.

Recreation Director, Kent Knorr recommended a change in the marina's transient rate system that optimizes rates based on anticipated usage. He noted that the marina was recognized by USHarbors.com as Americas Best Marina in 2021 and that rates should be set based on demand. "We don't want to gouge our users but I think we have to recognize our demand." He said. Knorr noted the changes in demand throughout the year, "From late June until mid-August we are near capacity nightly, during the month of July we have additional demand due to major events such as Boyne Thunder and Charlevoix's Venetian Festival." Currently transient boaters are charged \$70 a day for a 40 foot boat any given day. Under the newly approved rates pre (May 9- May 26) and post (September 6- October 9) season rates for a 40 foot boat are \$36, shoulder season rates (August 12- September 5) stays at the current rate, prime season (June 24- August 11) has been set at \$76 per day and during special events the same size boat will pay \$82 per day. No change was made to seasonal boat slip rates. A slip for a 40 foot boat is and will remain at

\$8,424. Burns Street Dock rate is \$50 per foot and the Dingy Rate was set at \$75 per foot. Rates are set by boat size. All rate change recommendations were approved.

A proposition to plant native flowers, shrubs and prune trees along the northern slope lining the Pine River Channel was presented to the council by Leilani

Durbain of Silver Linings Charlevoix and Scott Philp of Landscape Logic. Silver Linings Charlevoix was created in 2017 in memory of resident Paul Belding. The 501c3

initiative is responsible for the lighting of the bridge and has other projects in process including the Brookside Chapel Renovation project, the Charlevoix Zoo project and the Food Academy. The stated mission of the organization is to continue "to identify other projects and/or causes that will benefit the well-being of our community for generations to come," as stated on their website. Public comment at the meeting raised a lot of questions and encouraged council to approach the project with caution. The presentation was intended to inform the council of the proposed donation before taking it to the Planning Commission who has the responsibility of thoroughly researching for possible adverse consequences and will then send a recommendation to the Council.

In the bi-annual Recreation Department Update, Knorr highlighted this summer's Mt McSauba Day Camp, Golf Club, the Marina,

Skate Park, Dog Park the new Kayak Launch and the girls' softball field renovation project. "We were busy this summer at all our beaches and parks," he began. He reported that Mt McSauba Day Camp had the highest attendance in recorded history. "We had the highest attendance numbers we were able to find in our records," he said. 528 children attended over 8 weeks of camp with a weekly cap of 70 per week. Past years average attendance for the day camp has been 420. He reported that the City's Golf Club saw an increase in play and he anticipates that trend to continue. The marina hired six new dock hands and fully implemented a new reservation system. Unstaffed Skate Park hours have not proved to be an issue as some feared they would. The park is open 9am to dusk but staffed noon to 5pm. "We didn't have any graffiti, we didn't have any injuries," he said. The Dog Park has received \$95,425 in donations to date. The department is meeting with vendors and putting quotes in place. "All the pieces (to create the dog park) will be easily covered by those donations," said Knorr. The kayak launch is fully installed and active at Ferry Beach. The department is gearing up for winter activities with the usual programs in place and two new ideas on the burner, Winter Golf and Crokiure. "We love to see people getting out in the winter," he said. Knorr will be presenting a draft of the updated Recreation Master Plan at the next council meeting.

## City moving forward on grant for marina expansion

Boyne City - At a standing-room-only Boyne City September 28 City Commission meeting, commissioners voted to go forward with pursuing a grant for the controversial marina expansion proposal.

Harbor Master, Barb Brooks addressed a full house Tuesday evening with details on an Economic Development Administration Grant made possible through the American Rescue Plan under the category of Travel, Tourism and Outdoor Recreation. "Community members have been asking for a plan, a solution; if successful, this could provide the solution," she said. The grant could provide 67% of the funding for construction costs to expand and reconstruct the 40 year old municipal marina in the amount of \$3,210,043. "In addition to covering a percentage of the cost of new dock structures, it will also include a percentage of funds needed to replace all existing dock structures," she said. The \$392,440 State Waterways Grant awarded to the city earlier this year

may be used towards the local match of 33% or \$1,930,993. The grant is categorized as a Rolling Competitive Tourism Grant, meaning that the sooner it is submitted the more likely it will be approved. "We could have the best application with the best project out there and they might love it, but if they're out of money, they're out of money," she said.

The EDA has \$3 billion in supplemental funding available in this grant cycle nationwide. Public comment continued for two hours after Brooks gave her presentation with City Manager Cain assisting her in answering questions. Comments were a mix of pro and con marina expansion. Many present asked the commission to put the matter to a vote and were informed that they legally could not but that there may be a way for residents to get the issue on a ballot. Commissioners voted unanimously to pursue the grant opportunity noting that it didn't mean anything was set in stone. Discussion on marina expansion has been going on since 2003.

## U. S. MILITARY VETERAN OF THE MONTH



The Veteran of the month of October 2021 is Leo "Bruce" Lacy.

Born February 20, 1934 in Dearborn Michigan to parents Loren and Mary Gowdy Lacy. He grew up in southern Michigan and at the age of 11 years, joined the Boy Scouts of America in 1945. Moving to Bellaire Michigan with his family in 1946, Bruce would continue Scouting and at-

tended the National Camporee in Valley Forge Pennsylvania in 1950. He enjoyed boating, spending time with family and friends, and relaxing at the family cabin in the Upper Peninsula. ## Michigan teen safe driving program empowers students to share life-saving traffic safety messages with peers, community

Applications being accepted for teen-led traffic safety awareness campaign

Students at every Michigan high school have a chance to make a difference in their communities and help their fellow teens become better drivers by participating in this year's Strive for a Safer Drive (S4SD) campaign.

Entering its 11th year, S4SD is a joint effort between the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning and Ford Motor Company Fund, the philanthropic arm of Ford. The goal of the cam-

paign is to reduce the leading cause of death for teens: traffic crashes. In 2020, teens and young adults age 15 to 20 accounted for 7.3 percent (79) of all traffic deaths in Michigan, with 51.9 percent (41) of those deaths being the driver.

Risky and dangerous behavior — such as speeding or distracted driving — and inexperience are the primary factors contributing to teen driver fatalities.

The S4SD campaign encourages teens to talk to other teens and community members about making safe driving choices. Schools will develop and implement a student-led, peer-to-peer traffic safety awareness campaign. Campaign topics may in-

clude speeding, seat belts, pedestrian, bicyclist and passenger safety as well as impaired, distracted, night-time and winter driving.

Participating schools will each receive \$1,000 to conduct their campaign. Once the projects are completed, student teams at each school will submit a video or PowerPoint outlining their campaign. Schools with the top-five winning campaigns will receive cash prizes ranging from \$500 to \$1,500.

As part of Ford Fund's commitment to the campaign, all participating schools will have the opportunity to send students to a free Ford Driving Skills for Life hands-on driving clinic next spring. Professional

driving instructors from across the country will teach teens key skills such as hazard recognition, speed and space management, and vehicle handling with hands-on instruction. A station highlighting the dangers of distracted and impaired driving also will be taught.

Since the 2011 creation of S4SD, 173 different Michigan high schools have participated in the program. The OHSP has partnered with the Transportation Improvement Association to coordinate activities of the S4SD program. 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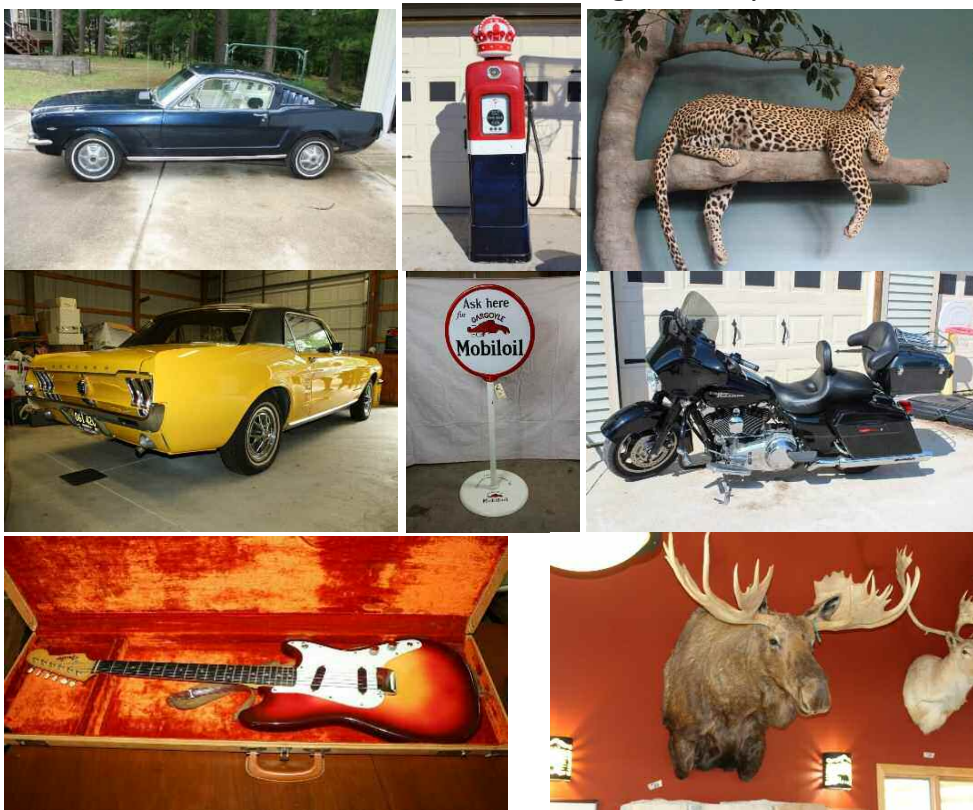
