Why color and hide eggs each Easter?

White lily is symbol of Christ's resurrection.

For Christians around the world, the two great symbols of Easter are the cross and the white lily. The cross represents the suffering of Jesus on behalf of mankind and the white lily is the symbol of His resurrection from the dead on the first Easter morning.

EASTER FUN FACTS

Other symbols of Easter as a holiday are the bunny and the egg, but these have their roots in the celebration of Christ's resurrection as well. The idea of the bunny – known then as the Easter Hare - stemmed from the German tradition of hiding eggs each Easter as a reminder not only of the resurrection of Jesus and

the promise of new life that is offered through the gospel but also points back to the gospel account of the faithful women coming to the tomb on the first Easter morning only to find it empty.

The first written reference to the Easter Hare was in 1682 in Georg Franck von Franckenau's essay, De ovis paschalibus ('About Easter eggs'). However links between hares and rabbits and Easter go back earlier in central Europe. Hares were associated with fertility and the new birth promised in the gospel.

Custom had it that the hare would bring a basket of

brightly painted eggs for all the children who had been good, and these would be hidden around the house and garden for the children to find.

The tradition of coloring eggs and hiding them at Easter, though it can be





News An incredible national public art project is coming to Petoskey

Petoskey has been chosen as one of three sites across the country for internationally renowned artist London Kaye's next public art installation—a large-scale crochet mural to support peace in Ukraine. The additional two sites are Los Angeles, California and Westminster, Colorado.

The design is based off of a sketch by a 16 -year- old Ukrainian boy, Artem Varakuta, currently living as a refugee in Poland. "When Russia invaded my country, I created this design hoping that peace will come to Ukraine as soon as possible," said Varakuta.

The project will be assembled at Crooked Tree Arts Center by London and a group of local volunteers on Monday, April 11. The temporary art installation will be installed between Crooked Tree Arts Center's Bidwell Plaza and the Carnegie Building on Tuesday, April 12.

Crochet artist London Kaye spearheads the mission of Love Across the USA, founded by OLEK in 2017. Kaye and her team create large, powerful crochet art installations that amplify the voices and visions of women from the past and present that are changing the world.

Kaye added the 7th mural to Love Across the USA with the installation of a 20' x 40' mural of the first female Vice President in the history of



the United States, Kamala Harris, in Washington D.C. for International Women's Day.

Crooked Tree Arts Center Visual Arts Director Liz Erlewine notes, "By using common craft materials like yarn and a crochet hook, Love Across the USA transforms a traditionally quiet, domestic pastime into a powerful vehicle and voice for social equality, peace, and love."

"These projects are particularly impactful because of their reliance on community and the collective. Each crocheted mural takes a team to create and install, and they are designed to be displayed in a public forum on a temporary basis. This format is ideal for creating community engagement and sparking conversations around the important social issues that we face as individuals and as a society," continues Erlewine.

CTAC will be hosting an artist talk with London Kaye on Monday, April 11 from 1-2 p.m. in the theater. Don't miss this once-in-a-lifetime chance to meet this internationally known artist and learn about

her nationwide crochet art installations. This informal artist talk will be available both in person and streamed live on our Facebook page.

This is an incredible opportunity for Petoskey to be chosen as one of three national locations to express support for Ukraine while working side-by-side with an artist of international stature. This is a community project in partnership with Love Across the USA, Beards Brewery, The Petoskey Chamber of Commerce, Petoskey District Library, and Crooked Tree Arts Center.



Charlevoix Man sentenced to prison on weapons charges



Steve A. Martin, 69, Charlevoix, was sentenced to serve a minimum of 39 months in prison April 7 in the 33rd Circuit Court. Martin pleaded guilty on March 4 to possessing a firearm during the commission of a felony and two counts of being a felon in possession of a firearm.

Emmet County Circuit Judge Jennifer Deegan, sitting in Charlevoix County by assignment, sentenced Martin to serve 15 months to five years on the felon in possession charges and two vears on the felony/firearm charge.

The felon in possession of a firearm sentences will run concurrent to each other but consecutive to the felony/firearm charge, meaning Martin's maximum sentence will be seven years in prison, however, he will be eligible for parole after serving

39 months. He received credit for 170 days already served.

According to an affidavit filed in the case, police were informed on October 15, 2021 that Martin had been at the Dunham's Sporting Goods store in Petoskey talking about purchasing a scope for a rifle he owned. In 2016, Martin was convicted of assault with a dangerous weapon and sent to prison for attempting to run over a police officer with his vehicle. Based upon the information, on October 18, police ob-

Martin displayed a disregard for the law that is a threat to society and as such, the sentence focused on punishment and the protection of society.

The case was investigated by the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office and prosecuted by Charlevoix County Prosecuting Attorney Allen Telgenhof.

There are a few popular songs from recent years that depict a seeker-friendly Jesus who embraces everyone for who they are and makes them feel loved and encouraged.

In one of the songs, a country singer discusses his desire to sit at a bar and have a beer with Jesus. They'd enjoy a couple tall ones, lis-

ten to the jukebox and close the place down together. And they would philosophize about heaven while they're drinking. And maybe they'd share a few jokes and a few stories.

In another song, the gal singing says, "Jesus drank wine and I bet we'd get along just fine." She acknowledges she doesn't live a Christian life, far from it, but that's OK because Jesus understands her heart.

The songs portray Jesus the way a lot of people desire Him to be. Someone who's never judgmental and always understanding. Who doesn't condemn your actions or convict vou of sin because he knows deep down that you're really a good person.

The nice thing about this kind of Jesus is that he makes no demands. He might chide you for being dishonest or saying mean things but he knows you're really an OK dude or gal on the inside. You might be engaging in a sinful, self-indulgent lifestyle but,



hey, nobody's perfect. Jesus is smiling down on you and looking forward to spending time with you in heaven after you die.

The problem is that the Jesus of these songs, popular though He may be, has little resemblance to the real Jesus. The greater problem is that the feel-good philosophy presented in these songs, which sadly reflects a general societal view of Jesus, doesn't take into account who Jesus truly is and why He died. Or why the Easter message is so critical.

The real Jesus didn't suffer and die on a cruel cross at Golgotha to give us a license to live however we want to. The real Jesus died to save us from our sins and our sinfulness, not in our sins.

The real Jesus took the sins of all humanity upon himself to pay the penalty that sin requires so we wouldn't have to. All people everywhere are sinners. We all fall short of God's standards. Sin separates us from God and brings death and condemnation. The penalty is eternal separation from God. Jesus suffered and died so we could have our sins forgiven and be in right standing with the Father when we depart from this world.

The real Jesus was and is the Son of God. He came in the flesh to live a sinless life among us and offer His own body in our place so that the wrath of God against my sins and yours could be satisfied.

The real Jesus was condemned because He claimed to be God in the flesh. The real Jesus suffered brutally at the hands of the soldiers of the high priest and the Roman soldiers. The Ramblers will start the season out with a 0-1 record. They would open up conference play with a matchup against Grayling on Thursday, April 7.



ORDINANCE 144E

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING CODE OF THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN

THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN ORDAINS:

The Zoning Code for the City of East Jordan is hereby amended as follows:

(1) Chapter 46 Zoning, *Article 1, In General.* Amend Article 1, Section 46-8 by adding new definitions for "grocery store" and "variety store" to read as follows:

Grocery store: A retail store where a minimum of 50 percent of the floor area or more than 25,000 square feet of floor area is devoted to food items including, but not limited to, fresh produce, fresh meats, fresh dairy products and prepackaged foods.

"Variety store": A retail store that sells a wide variety of relatively small and inexpensive items

(2) Chapter 46 Zoning, Article III, Division 9, C1 Local Commercial District. Amend Section 46-445 to read as follows:

(10) Variety Stores

(3) *Chapter 46 Zoning, Article V, Special Uses*. Amend Article V by adding a new Section 46-798 to read as follows:

Sec. 46-798. - Regulations for variety stores and small box stores.

(a) Variety/small box stores are prohibited unless the proposed use is located more than one mile from another variety/small box store.

(b) If located at least one mile from another variety/small box store, use is permitted by special use permit only.

(c) A nonconforming variety store in existence on August 1, 2021, may relocate on the same parcel or within the same shopping center that it currently exists without obtaining a SUP provided the nonconforming variety store has not been terminated as provided in Section 46-821, Discontinuance or abandonment of the zoning ordinance and the use complies with all other applicable regulations.

(d) When reviewing a request for a special use permit (SUP) for a variety/small box store use, the city shall consider;

(1) Whether the variety/small box store will likely have a detrimental impact on the development of grocery stores and other businesses that sell fresh and healthy food items in the area to be served by the proposed use.

(2) The availability of healthy food options in the area of the proposed use, including the proximity of full-service grocery stores within one half mile of the proposed use, and effect of the use on the retail food environment.

(3) A SUP approved under this section must stipulate that a minimum of 15 percent of the floor area of the variety/small box store must be dedicated to fresh produce, meat, and dairy products.

This Ordinance shall be effective seven (7) days after publication.





Chapter 46 Zoning, Article III District Regulations, Division 6, R-3 **Multiple Family Residential District**

DIVISION 6. - R-3 MULTIPLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

Sec. 46-352. - Purpose.

The purpose of the R-3 Multiple-Family Residential District is to provide for relatively small and less expensive type of housing, as well as a broader range of choice of housing types to people who desire to live in the city in condominium, owner or rental units, and their normal accessory uses which are compatible, supportive or convenient to the residents living within such a district.

Sec. 46-353. - Permitted principal uses.

Permitted principal uses are as follows:

(1) Multiple-family dwelling structures, including duplexes, triplexes, quadraplexes, housing, garden apartments, row townhouses, and other similar types of multifamily dwelling unit buildings.

(2) Single-family residences provided that all dimensional requirements of the R-1 zoning district, (sections 46-261 and 46-265) are met.

Sec. 46-354. - Permitted principal special uses with conditions.

The following special uses of land, buildings and structures are permitted subject to the provisions of article V of this chapter:

The following shall be permitted special uses:

(1) Boarding, Rooming, Single Room Occupancy homes

(2) Religious institutions as regulated by supplemental regulations Sec 46-743.

State-licensed residential facilities (3)

The permitted uses in this section are sub ject to the following requirements:

a. The proposed site for any of the uses permitted herein shall have at least one property line abutting a major public street, and the site shall be so planned as to provide all access directly to said major street. Vehicular access to minor public streets shall not be permitted.

Sec. 46-355. - Permitted accessory uses.

Permitted accessory uses are as follows:

(1) Normal existing accessory uses and structures to multi-family housing

(2) Accessory dwelling units that are clearly incidental to the principle dwelling unit and the structures' exterior appear to be single family.

a. Exterior stairs shall not be allowed

b. An accessory dwelling unit shall not exceed 800 square feet or exceed the size of the principle dwelling unit.

c. At least one owner of record shall occupy either principle or accessory dwelling unit.

d. The principle or accessory dwelling unit shall not be leased for less than 30 days at a time unless the owner has a current City Short Term Rental license

(3) Short Term Rentals maintaining a City STR license

(4) Private swimming pools and other types of pools as a part of the multiplefamily housing development for use in common by all residents in conformance with the provisions of Sec. 46-717.

(5) Solar and wind conversion systems, single accessory Sec. 46-735 and Sec. 46-736

(6) Nine or more units at least one common open space recreation area with facilities equal to at least 10 percent of the total area of the lot or parcel shall be set aside and developed as a part of the multiplefamily housing development for use in common by all residents.

Sec. 46-357. - Dimensional requirements except as otherwise specified in this chapter.

Dimensional requirements (except as otherwise specified in this chapter) are as fol(2) Lot width. Minimum of 60 feet.

(3) Lot coverage. Maximum of 50 percent.

(4) Number of dwelling units per gross acre. Fifteen (15).

Yard and setback requirements. (5)

a. Front vard. Minimum of 15 feet from the street right-of-way line or within the average setback of principle buildings on the same side of the street in the same block, but no closer than 10 feet from the property line

b. Side yards. Minimum distance six feet with an aggregate of 15 feet.

c. Rear yard. Minimum of 25

d. Parking area. Minimum of 5 feet except 10 feet if adjacent to R-1 District

Height limitations. Maximum of (6) three stories or 35 feet, except that detached accessory structures shall not exceed 16 feet.

Spacing between buildings. 10 (7) feet

(8) Parking. Minimum parking space requirement of one per dwelling unit. Maximum of two per unit. No parking shall be allowed in the front yard. Properties with access to an alley shall not have vehicle access to the street.

(8)Floor area requirements. Minimum standards for total floor area for each type of multiple- family dwelling unit shall be 250 square feet

(9) Number of multiple-family dwelling units per building. To promote the safety of residents of multiple-family residences, in terms of fire protection, no multiple-family residential structure shall contain more than eight dwelling units. More units per building must go through the Special Use application process, Article V Sec. 46-799

Sec. 46-358. - Location and site development requirements.

Location and site development requirements are as follows:

(1) All multiple-family dwelling units shall be connected to the public water supply system and public wastewater sanitary sewer system on a permanent basis.

(2) Open spaces comprising at least 25 percent of the total gross area of the projers and financed by means of a monthly or annual assessment.

(3) Ingress and egress of driveways shall be provided from an impervious hard surstreet. Drives shall be loface paved cated at least 5 feet from any building and an 18-foot-wide, shall have at least two-lane traveled surface and meet Sec. 46-722.

(4) Shall meet all off-street parking requirements specified for each use in article VII of this chapter and other applicable requirements of this chapter. Off-street parking shall be provided in accordance with article VII of this chapter with parking spaces located within 200 feet of an entrance to the building for which the parking is designated. Each dwelling unit shall be provided with at least 1 hard surfaced parking.

(5) Shall meet all landscaping requirements specified for each use in article X of this chapter. When an R-3 multiple-family residential lot or parcel abuts single family parcels other than those located in an R-3 Multiple-Family Residential District, a 5foot wide buffer shall be provided within the R-3 lot or parcel area. The buffer area shall be bermed and landscaped with trees, shrubs and grass. All such landscaping shall be maintained in a healthy condition. There shall be no parking or other structures permitted in buffer areas, except required entrance drives and those walls, fences, berms or plantings necessary to screen the R-3 use from abutting single-family residential used lots and parcels.

(6) The outdoor storage of goods, materials, trash or garbage is not permitted, except as provided in Sec. 46-719.

This Ordinance shall be effective seven (7) days after publication.
