"I have grown up in this community and am raising my daughter in this community. For me, it's about creating healthy communities and strong families," said Cool. By wrapping around them to share support and resources from the very start so they don't end up in difficult positions or to ease the load when they do face hard times."

The Great Start Collaborative and Parent Coalition has become highly visible in the region with efforts to do just that, including hosting free laundry events at area laundromats, Early Childhood Networking Nights, the FreeCycle book project, and distributing Talking is Teaching materials to encourage parents to talk, read and sing to their children in everyday situations to strengthen relationships and enhance learning.

There have been many years that I have seen classmates and past residents that come back to East Jordan for vacation during the Freedom Festival," said Fender.






#### **FEBRUARY 4**




