



Schubert's "Unfinished" is one of the most popular of all symphonies and is one of the works that ushered in the Romantic era of Western classical music. It is considered "unfinished" as he only wrote the first two movements of the traditional four.

Historians aren't sure why Schubert never finished this work, as he lived another six years before dying of disease at the age of 31. Later composers have created completed versions of the symphony by adding two additional movements in the style of Schubert, but most orchestras perform the original work in its two-movement format. The GCO will perform the symphony in its original version.

The GCO's spring concert will take place on May 14 at Gaylord High School's Gornick Auditorium. The concert begins at 7:30pm, with a pre-concert talk with conductor Jim Van Eizenga at 7:00pm. Tickets are available at the door, and are \$10 for adults, free for students.

Mother's Day is often a time of mixed emotions, as some people struggle with loss while others are fortunate enough to be still celebrating with loved ones.

This Mother's Day we sat down with a couple of local mothers to find out what influenced them to become the women that they are, and to share some advice with others.

"First and foremost, if I had to write one thing down for my children to read twenty years from now, I would want them to know that their mother tried," said Meagan Rincke." I didn't always succeed, but if I failed I just tried again, and even if they don't succeed, it's ok to fail too.'

Rincke said that the person who influenced her most historically was Jesus Christ.

"Christ taught us to love unconditionally, and speaking your truth, and not backing away from that."

**Rincke's grandparents** played a large part in her life, influencing her during her formative years. "My grandpa Allen and my Opa taught me how to be an independent woman and how to live life," said Rincke. "My parents showed me



# Great Lake Energy's People Fund awards more than \$144,000 in grants to local groups

In its first round of grants for 2022, Great Lakes Energy's People Fund has awarded more than \$144,000 to 61 local nonprofit organizations across the cooperative's 26county service area, which stretches from Kalamazoo to the Mackinac Straits.

Last year the People Fund surpassed the \$4 million mark in grants awarded since the program's inception in 1999.

"It's exciting to see the People Fund continue to build on its past success in supporting the many organizations who are making a real difference in their communities," Great Lakes Energy President/CEO Shaun Lamp said. "The People Fund owes this success to the outstanding support and generosity of our members spanning more than 20 years."

Funding for the program comes from members of the electric cooperative who agree to have their monthly bills rounded up to the next whole dollar. Members are encouraged to enroll in the People Fund online at gtlakes.com or by contacting Great Lakes Energy's office.

Cooperative members also have the opportunity to increase their contributions to the People Fund through People Fund PLUS. The People Fund PLUS program allows members to choose an amount, in addition to the monthly bill round-up, to contribute to the program.

Grants are awarded twice each year by three independent regional boards representing the cooperative's north, central, and south regions.

Lamp added: "We are grateful for our members' longstanding support for the People Fund and encourage nonprofit groups in our service area to apply for the fund's next round of grants in the fall."

# Housing Legislation led by Housing North Gains State House Hearing

A legislative package aimed at jump-starting attainable housing development across the state gained a critical first hearing in front of house lawmakers this week with support from Housing North and other partners in the Housing Michigan Coalition.

The state House Local Government and Municipal Finance Committee reviewed a series of four bills to address various obstacles to workforce and affordable housing development in the areas of financing, taxation and land-use. The bills now move on to the full House for anticipated action this spring.

"These bills came from years of feedback from stakeholders and people struggling to develop missing middle homes and attainable housing for Northwest Michigan's workforce," said Yarrow Brown, Executive Director of Housing North, in her testimony to the House committee this week. "These bills are designed to bring much sought-after local control to local units of government and needed tools to stimulate workforce housing development."

Brown noted that many small and rural communities most impacted by Michigan's housing crisis lack the tools available in more populated communities utilized for housing development, including the utilization of Neighborhood Enterprise Zones, or the resources needed to become Redevelopment Ready Communities.

"These are great programs, but we need these bills in order to make progress in our rural communities around housing, which is now at the crisis point," Brown told legislators.

Specifically, the proposed legislation is drafted to overcome various bottlenecks to workforce housing development, including: • Establishment of At-

tainable Housing Districts offering tax incentives for housing developments that target income-qualified households, including dormant properties previously used as commercial or industrial sites.

• Creating Residential Facility Exemptions offering specific tax exemptions for income-eligible housing projects.

• Expanding PILOT - or Payment in Lieu of Taxes agreements with local governments for projects dedicated to workforce housing opportunities on a longterm basis.

• Expansion of the state's Neighborhood Enterprise Zone legislation offering financial incentives for workforce housing development

"The housing shortage crisis is real in Michigan, and something that is really impacting us here in northern Michigan. These bills would give us a few more tools in our toolbox to make housing development more feasible for the missing middle," said Carlin Smith, co-founder of the Little Traverse Bay Housing Partnership based in Petoskey.

"One of these bills in particular is something we could put to use right away in the City of Petoskey," Smith continued. "It would allow us to create a publicprivate-philanthropic partnership that could bring 60 much-needed housing units to our community."

Josh Mills, City Superintendent in Frankfort expressed: "We are hopeful that our state legislators will consider and approve these critical bills that have been introduced to significantly enhance opportunities for local units of government to partner with developers for the creation of sustainable workforce housing. It is essential for our overall social and economic wellbeing that our state legislators take action to provide the necessary tools enabling Michigan to become a leader in solving our workforce housing needs.'

Housing North is among the executive committee

members and partner of the Housing Michigan Coalition, a group of more than 20 organizations across the state including the Home Builders Association of Michigan, the Grand Rapids Chamber and the Michigan Municipal League. The Coalition launched its housing legislation initiative just over a year ago and partners are encouraged by the bi-partisan support and the growing momentum for the legislation. Housing North works to help communities across Northwest Michigan tackle various economic challenges stemming from housing shortages that serve a wide range of income levels. Its research shows that more than 15,600 housing units are needed in the region to meet existing demand, most for homes priced below \$200,000 or rental units costing under \$800 per month. Available housing stock also remains stagnant while the number of seasonal housing units and those converted to short-term rentals continues to grow, further limiting housing options for the region's workforce. # **'Through Our Eyes'** Photovoice Project showcases teen views on youth mental health

When youth from 10 regional counties talk about the stigma of mental health, they use words like "messy, "alone," "unworthy," and "discrimination." Their inspiring insights are shared in "Through Our Eyes: A Photovoice Project on the Stigma Around Youth Mental Health & Wellness," a project premiered in April during the Celebration and Action Summit hosted by the Northwest Michigan Community Health Innovation Region (CHIR).

The summit and the photovoice project are part of a Behavioral Health Initiative launched in June 2021 by the CHIR in response to a spiraling behavioral health crisis in the region. The group's youth task force used photovoice to share their perspectives and experiences related to mental health, the stigma surrounding it, and recommended actions to address these issues A creative tool and research method, photovoice uses photography to capture an individual's perspective and to tell their story. It is used to encourage positive change within communities and to educate decision-makers. In this use, students were given three framing questions to help launch their creative process: What does the stigma around youth mental health look like? What is the impact of this stigma on youth?

What in your community or school increases the stigma around youth mental health? What decreases the stigma around youth mental health?

What actions can your school or community take to reduce stigma around youth mental health?

Each student submitted one photo per framing question.

"As submissions were coming in, it was surprising to see the diversity among the students' depictions of mental health, stigma, and perspectives on how student mental health could be betwithin schools and communities to improve their wellbeing.

Summit attendees called the outcome, "inspiring," "eye-opening," "thought-provoking," and "courageous" while virtually applauding students for their dedication, openness, and professionalism throughout their project and presentation.

"The Photovoice project with the kids was simply amazing, and I am so glad to have seen their work and heard their perspectives," one summit participant said.

Taking next steps The Northwest Michigan using the photovoice project and the wise words of youth to promote change. Student recommendations to reduce the stigma include providing youth with education on mental health to change attitudes and behaviors, encouraging more face-to-face and less social media interactions, scheduling group conversations to promote openness and access to mental health assistance, supporting sports and other activities that alleviate stress, and more.

"We can ensure our communities are a safe space by encouraging empathy and

ter supported," said Amy Horstman, community health coordinator at the Health Department of Northwest Michigan and Northwest Michigan CHIR staff. "It was exciting to see their photos and hear from their perspective what could be done moving forward to support student mental health. This was something students truly cared about, and you could see the passion, drive, and excitement for the project with each submission."

A youth driven and youth led initiative – the students reviewed their peers' photovoice submissions and selected the photos and stories to share with over 150 crosssector partners during the summit. The youth define the stigma and recommend actions that can be taken CHIR includes the 10-county region of Antrim, Benzie, Charlevoix, Emmet, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, Leelanau, Manistee, Missaukee, and Wexford counties. Each CHIR region utilizes action teams, comprised of crosssector leaders and staff, to achieve goals related to access to care, and well-being and resiliency.

Of the 12 action teams formed in the CHIR region, one team's focus was to reduce stigma towards youth mental illness. This action team, informally called the youth task force, was led by five young adults and two adult advisors, Hannah Rodriguez (Manistee County Community Foundation) and Mishelle Shooks (Charlevoix County Community Foundation). support of others; and most of all, respect for each person," said one youth participant in her photovoice submission.

"What can we learn from our kids about the stigma around youth mental health? How can we help our kids feel less alone?" asked Ty Schmidt, founder of Good Works Lab, a Traverse Citybased team tasked with solving complex community problems. "It starts with listening to our kids. It's time."

# Remember fire safety again this spring

It has been a cool, damp spring, but the nice weather will inevitably come and will beckon many Michiganders to get outside and clean up the yard, break out the ORVs for a ride or build a fire for marshmallow roasting and relaxing.

But the combination of warm, dry weather and dry grasses and leaves left over from winter means people need to keep fire safety front and center.

"Nine out of 10 wildfires in

Michigan are caused by people, but following a few simple fire safety tips can reduce the risk for everyone," said Paul Rogers, fire prevention specialist with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Among his recommendations for a safe outdoor weekend:

· Always check for permission to burn before lighting a fire. In the southern Lower Peninsula, check with your local fire authorities. For the northern Lower and Upper peninsulas, go online at or call 866-922-BURN (866-922-2876) to make sure conditions are appropriate for safe burning. When you do burn, clear the area of dry grass and leaves down to mineral soil. Keep your fire at least 10 feet away from any logs, stumps or other debris.

 Never leave any fire unattended, even for a moment.
 Keep a hose or other

water source nearby. • When you're finished burning, douse your fire with water, stir the ashes and douse again before leaving the site.


• If you are operating an ORV, power tools or other machinery, remember that a hot muffler or engine can ignite dry leaves or grass, so keep machines away from those and other potential fuel sources. Trailer chains dragging on pavement can also cause sparks that could start a fire.

They're found in every county in our state, but you still might be tempted to go full cloak-and-dagger or blindfold your friends before heading out to your favorite spot – it's that time of year, the annual Michigan treasure hunt that is morel month!

Morel mushrooms are a beloved forest treat that emerge in springtime, usually when warm weather arrives following a good rain. Look for their pitted, bumpy profiles near hilly areas with hardwood trees and around burn scars where a wildfire or prescribed burn has happened.

Before you head into the forest to search for a patch, make sure you know how to properly identify morels for safety; there are wild

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mushrooms in Michigan that can make you seriously ill. All wild mushrooms should be cleaned and fully cooked before enjoying.

Learn the basics about morel mushrooms from the DNR at Michigan.gov/Mi-Morels. You'll find a map of last year's prescribed burn and wildfire areas on public lands to point you in the direction of locations where morels could grow. Find more advanced mushroom information from the Midwest American Mycological Information website.

Be aware that morels and other foraged finds on state-managed lands are for personal use only and not for resale.

Want to sell morels or other foraged mushrooms? Michigan's food code requires certification to lawfully sell wild mushrooms. Get certified through a partner program offered by MAMI.
