Blue Lakes Fire 98% contained

Roads reopen but public urged to use caution within fire area

As of Tuesday afternoon, the Blue Lakes Fire in the northeastern Lower Peninsula is now 98% contained. As a result, all road closures in the fire area have been lifted. The stretch of the Black River that was previously closed has also been opened.

However, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources still is working to connect remaining gaps in the containment line and mop up within the fire area, which is northwest of Atlanta and spans Montmorency and Cheboygan counties. People who enter the area are urged to be cautious.

"If you are in the area, stay on roads," said Kerry Heckman, DNR fire public information officer. "There may be hot spots or snags, which are trees that can fall over without warning. There may be smoke, and fire crews will still be working in the area." Seeing smoke within the fire area is not necessarily

The fire, reported at 12:40 p.m. Friday, was caused by a May 11 lightning strike which smoldered for several days before igniting nearby fuels such as leaves, grass and brush.

There is increased fire danger in northern Michigan. Due to increased fire risk, the DNR has not been conducting prescribed burns and has not been issuing burn permits. Before any burning, check Michigan.gov/BurnPermit and get fire safety tips at Michigan.gov/PreventWildfires.

New wave of COVID-19 transmissions prompt personal safety considerations

With proms, band concerts, and graduations happening, the Health Department of Northwest Michigan (HDNW) asks the public to make informed decisions as they celebrate spring, youth, and achievements. The region continues to see high transmission rates with the BA.2 variant.

"Although still much lower than during the fall and winter, our hospital admission rates have also trended up, and thus the CDC Community Levels are now 'medium' and 'high' in our counties," said Dr. Joshua Meyerson, HNDW Medical Director. "This is a good time to remind ourselves and the community of mitigation measures that should be considered.'

CDC recommendations for areas during Medium to High Community levels are:

Stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and

boosters. If you have not had a first booster dose and are eligible, you can greatly reduce your risk of severe illness by getting a booster dose. A second booster dose, for those eligible, can further reduce the risk of infection.

If you are immunocompromised or high risk for severe disease, wear a well-fitting mask or respirator (KN95 or N95) while in indoor public spaces where you could be exposed, or consider avoiding those activities.

If you have someone in your household or have other contact with someone at high risk for severe disease, consider wearing a mask while indoors with them and/or get tested before contact.

Have a plan for rapid testing, such as having home tests on-hand or access to testing.

Talk to your health-

care provider about whether you are a candidate for treatments like oral antivirals and monoclonal antibodies Treatment if initiated soon after infection, can reduce the risk of severe disease

Maintain improved ventilation throughout indoor spaces.

Follow recommendations for isolation and quarantine - stay home if ill, wear a mask if exposed, get tested if symptoms present or after exposure.

"While transmissions are increasing rapidly, it is important to note we are not in the same situation as we were last fall with the Delta variant. The rate of hospitalizations and deaths are not rising at the pace of infections, which follows the pattern of what happened in Europe before the United States," said Dan Thorell, HDNW Interim Health Offi-

VACCINES AND TESTING

HDNW continues to offer free vaccines and tests at its clinics and mobile lab. The mobile laboratory is returning to Emmet County. From 8:15 a.m.-12:15 p.m. Wednesday, May 18, the mobile lab offers free COVID-19 testing at the Emmet County Fairgrounds. The lab is maintaining its schedule at E-Free Church in Gaylord from 8 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Tuesdays and the Krist Gas Station in Charlevoix from 8-12:30 p.m. Thursdays.

According to the CDC, people who are up to date on vaccines have much lower risk of several illness and death from COVID-19 compared with unvaccinated people.



Honoring and helping the military veterans of Charlevoix County

I had the good fortune to meet Josh Galle, who is Associate Director, Accredited County Veteran Service Officer of Charlevoix County Veterans Affairs, which serves the many military veterans who are residents

in Charlevoix County (and there are a great many more than probably most of us realize).

Josh grew up in Atlanta, attended college in both Florida and South Carolina, then enlisted in the Marines, and engaged as a Corporal of Marines in an Infantry combat unit against terrorists centered in primarily in Fallujah, Iraq, in the years following the 9/11 attack on the United States. He was wounded several times, including traumatic brain injury, being stabbed in his abdomen, among a list of other injuries. He was awarded many Military Awards and Decorations, e.g., numerous Medals and Ribbons for his combat service.

Josh knows well how being in combat can have a significant and long-lasting emotional effect, as team members and friends are killed or wounded, and suffering wounds oneself. Many are scarred for years, some for the rest of their

One would think that employers are quick to offer jobs and that significant health care, including the needed therapy, is readily available - but this is not always the case.

As those of us who have not been in combat can only imagine, Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PSTD) is a huge problem that many veterans must continue to fight through over their years. Trauma support therapy and coaching are needed, significantly needed! There are

initiatives to help, but these are not nearly sufficient, and definitely not in Northern Michigan where there is an acute shortage of mental health providers, especially for our veterans.

Seeing the needs of combat veterans, and having a deep desire to serve his community, Josh became an Accredited County Veterans Service Officer, serving Charlevoix County. His office is in Charlevoix at the Shirley Roloff Center Monday - Thursday, and on Fridays he is in Boyne Falls at

the Sheriff's substation. Josh is absolutely committed to helping veterans, discussing their health care options, their claims, the benefits that are available, financial concerns, employment opportunities, their disabilities, often simply listening to their stories and their general needs and hopes. In fact, some are all alone today and cannot afford the medical and mental care they need.

Thankfully, Josh and his family have settled here and this is where they want to be. His wife is from Charlevoix and a graduate of our schools. His children love Northern Michigan. We are blessed to have them here.

Josh is an ardent student of leadership and recently participated in the Leadership Charlevoix County Program, which is all about highly effective leadership skills, the needs and resources of our county and residents, and how to be effectively motivated to "give back". In fact, as I stated in a recent short leadership article, the best leaders are the givers, not the takers.

I should mention that Josh is an Ordained Minis-

The city of Charlevoix is blessed with a very special library. It is a gorgeous historical facility and has excellent resources.

In speaking with Ryan Deery, the Director of the library about how fortunate we in Charlevoix are to have this resource, he spoke about the changes that have evolved here and in virtually all libraries across the world.

Not many years ago, libraries were predominantly used for books, research and materials. Of course, this was before nearly everyone had a computer at home.

How our library serves our community and residents has evolved. We now like to think of it as a "community living room", as we all "own" it. The library is public property, supported by our taxes.....and it remains a source for books, films, and recordings, and, very importantly, for cultural and recreational re-

is a deep depth of historical information about Charlevoix going way back to the time Fr. Charlevoix, a Jesuit priest, arrived, as well as the tribes who were originally here and many of whose ancestors still are.

And now, the library activities include frequent lectures, musical programs, story times for school children, and rooms that may be reserved and are used regularly for community

and other events.

The library is committed to serving our community from both inside and outside the facility. As one great example, the library has brought programs to nursing homes for those who may not be able to visit the facility. The library also visits and serves our surrounding schools and, in addition, recently installed outdoor Wi-Fi hotspots at two surrounding township halls and they hope to expand this service.

I certainly appreciate our library. I often check out books and movies reserve rooms for meetings and events, and even more important to me personally. I use the library to increase my efficiency. Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 Presented by GLCO

One of the world's most beloved works of classical music will be performed at 7 p.m. on Saturday, June 4, at historic John M. Hall Auditorium in Bay View when the Great Lakes Chamber Orchestra (GLCO) and Chorus present Beethoven's 'Symphony No. 9".

GLCO Conductor and Music Director Libor Ondras will present a pre-concert lecture regarding Beethoven and his music at 6 p.m. Tickets for the event are available at www.glcorchestra.org.

"There's something astonishing about a deaf composer choosing to open a

symphony with music that reveals, like no other music before it, the very essence of sound emerging from silence," Ondras explained. "This symphony shows Beethoven using all the subtlety and mastery of his craft, a breakthrough work—music's first crossover composition."

According to Ondras, Beethoven's grandest final symphony and most influential composition was premiered in a concert on May 7, 1824. By that time, Beethoven was almost completely deaf. He had long given up performing on piano in public, withdraw-

ing completely from social life of Viennese society. When, in one of the most famous accounts in all music, the audience burst into applause, Beethoven couldn't hear the ovation. He stood, his back to the crowd, leafing through his score. Only when the contralto soloist, Carolyn Unger, tapped him on the shoulder and turned him around did he see his public applauding wildly.

Also significant, this symphony represents the first by a major composer to include choral music. The 4th movement features the exultant "Ode to Joy"

theme, when the orchestra is joined by a grand chorus and soloists Risa Renae Harman (Soprano), Elise DesChamps (Mezzo-Soprano), John Bragle (Tenor) and William Bokhout (Baritone).

Man Sentenced to Prison for Builder Fraud

Steven Edward Broman, 46, Indian River, was sentenced to serve 28 months to 15 years in prison this afternoon in the 33rd Circuit

According to police affidavits filed in two cases against Broman, in 2019 and 2020, he agreed to perform residential construction work for two Charlevoix County victims.

In one incident, in the City of Charlevoix, he was paid \$13,700 but failed to do any work or to return the money to the victim.

In the other file, Broman agreed to perform work in Hudson Township and was

paid over \$100,000 but failed to properly complete the work. According to the affidavits, rather than remedying that home owner's situation, the work performed actually worsened the situation and forced them to move in with relatives for an extended period.

'This is a situation where the defendant took advantage of people who were really in need," Charlevoix County Prosecuting Attorney Allen Telgenhof said. "He was not a licensed builder or contractor but

took these people's money and left them as well as subcontractors high and dry."

On February 18, 2021, Broman pleaded guilty to false pretenses \$50,000 to \$100,000 and fraudulent use of the building contract fund.

He was sentenced to prison on the first charge and 12 concurrent months in jail on the second. Broman was also ordered to pay \$170,000 in restitution for the victims.

Schmidt supports funding for area recreation projects

LANSING, Mich. — State Sen. Wayne Schmidt on Wednesday joined members of the Senate Committee on Appropriations in approving funds to improve recreation projects across the state — including eight in the 37th Senate Dis-

"Michigan is home to some of the best outdoor opportunities in the country, and we need to make sure we both improve and preserve these resources for future generations," said Schmidt, R-Traverse City. "Completion of these projects will also help improve opportunities in the area for locals to enjoy and for those who travel north to see just how great northern Michigan and the Upper Peninsula really

Senate Bill 1028 would authorize the Natural Resources Trust Fund to use \$45.6 million for 22 land acquisition and 95 recreational development projects throughout Michigan — including projects in Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, Grand Traverse and Mackinac counties. The projects also include a match of local funds, bringing the total combined investment to over \$86

Under the bill, the four counties would receive nearly \$3 million for local outdoor and recreation projects. Brief details can be found below:

 Antrim County: \$300,000 for improvements to Grass River Natural Area river access.

 Charlevoix County: \$300,000 for Boyne City's Open Space Pathway.

County: \$298,000 for the city of Petoskey to make upgrades to the Winter Sports Park Hockey Rink Pavilion.

County: \$865,300 for the Milton Road to Alanson Trail corridor acquisition in Littlefield Township.

County: \$200,300 for the Clark Township Peek-a-Boo

 Mackinac County: \$300,000 to help the Department of Natural Resources make improvements at Straits State

The NRTF is supported by interest earnings from the development of stateowned mineral rights. The fund's dollars are constitutionally restricted to recreation improvements and land acquisitions. The Legislature has no authority in the project selection process, it can only choose to support or deny the full funding recommendations from the board.

"I've long supported the Natural Resources Trust Fund and efforts to improve access to Michigan's one-ofa-kind outdoor opportunities," Schmidt said. "I'm glad to see another round of projects being funded and look forward to the completed improvements throughout 37th District communities."

Since 1976, the Trust Fund had granted more than \$1.3 billion in grants to local governments and state agencies for projects in all 83 counties.

SB 1028 now heads to the full Senate for considera-

People understand we can be in meetings, at appointments, on calls and may not be immediately available and they appreciate a brief message that we are tied up and will be back to them later in the day or the next morning. Such messages honor them and are appreciated.

No matter what we do, we are in a people business. Let's help others feel appreciated, valued, and honor them. This is leadership!

transported to Charlevoix hospital where the boy was pronounced dead about an hour after arriving at the

"It was a middle school track practice," Antrim County Sheriff Daniel Bean said. "Their last meet would of been Friday. They came down here as a last thing for the end of the year. One of them had gone under, a couple people tried to recover and grab him. The water is probably 25 to 30 foot at the drop off and it appears he stepped off that drop off and went under.'

There is a makeshift memorial set up at River Park: just a couple of flowers on the beach in memory of the sixth grader who died. It's the spot where the Ellsworth Middle School track team came to cool off

after a hot day of practice.

Antrim County Sheriff Dan Bean says, "We were at 90° weather which we don't have up here this time of the year. They were out running track. One of those things to cool off and this tragic event happens."

The Ellsworth Police Chief and the Sheriff say the boy stepped past a steep drop-off and went under in a spot that's at least 25 feet deep. Many friends, adults,

and even a sibling were there at the time, but they weren't able to rescue him Sheriff Bean says, "This is a tragedy, nobody ever wants to go through this. But that community really did all they could for this young

Attendance was optional Friday at Ellsworth schools, and counselors are available for any student in need. Students and the community are welcome to leave cards and items by the flagpole as a memorial outside the school. Sheriff Bean says, "I think in this tragic event you have Ellsworth, for the small town that it is, will come together."

The school held a candlelight vigil for their classmate on Sunday. The boy's name has not been released.

Ellsworth School superintendet, Aaron Gaffney said, "In terms of support for students, on Friday we had a dozen-plus counselors and support personnel on hand from VSU, area school counselors. ISD counselors and social workers, and trauma support professionals. On Sunday evening we held a memorial vigil that was organized by ECS senior and student body president, Brayden Steekwyk that was attended by 300+ friends, family, and community members. This week we have continued to provide emotional support to individual students and groups

of students and we will continue to provide whatever support is needed in the days and weeks ahead."

At Sunday'semorial service Gaffney said, "As a school we would like to convey our deepest condolences to family and to the students and staff who are uniquely affected. We'd also like to express that moving forward our goal as a school is to heal and grieve together. The days, weeks, and months ahead will be filled with ups and downs as we all process this loss in our own individual ways. However we're grateful that it's not something we have to do alone. We have an incredibly supportive and close knit school and community. We have absolute faith that together we can walk a road towards healing."

A letter to Ellsworth School families from Superintendent Gaffney follows.

May 13, 2022 Dear ECS Families, I am sad to report that yesterday, at the end of middle school track practice, there was a tragic accident. An ECS sixth grade student drowned while playing in the lake with his track teammates. This very sad event is devastating to the family, friends, teammates, students and ECS staff. This student was a kind soul and an important part of our Lancer family. He was a

beloved member of our school family and will truly be missed by his classmates and ECS staff. Please keep his family and friends in your thoughts and prayers through this difficult time.

Today, we have made attendance at school for all students in grades K-12 optional. As a district, we will continue to provide support to all students and staff that have been impacted by this tragic event. Students in grades K-5 will keep to as normal a schedule and routine as possible. For those in the middle/high school building, counselors and support personnel are on hand to help students and staff to begin processing this loss.

There will be a student led candlelight memorial at 6:00 PM on Sunday, May 15, 2022. The memorial will be held in the yard adjacent to the middle/high school building. Anyone wishing to leave a memorial may place cards and items near the American flag at the middle / high school building.


