Railroad Speeder Cars coming to Northern Michigan

Members of the North American Railcar Operators Association will be paying a visit to northern Michigan soon. Thirty-five "speeder" cars will be making their way north on the rails of the Great Lakes Central Railroad the weekend of June 10 – 12,

A speeder car, also known as a motor-car, is a self-propelled railroad car formerly used by railroad companies to maintain

their tracks. Each speeder car typically holds between two and four occupants, including the operator. Now obsolete by the railroads, these speeder cars are purchased by individuals, restored to operating condition, and taken on excursion trips hosted by various railroads across the country.

The North American Railcar Operator Association (NARCOA), with over coordinates excursion trips with local railroads so that members have several choices throughout the year on which trips they would like to run their speeder cars on.

The excursion to northern Michigan this year begins with an early morning departure from Cadillac on Friday June 10, with stops planned in Manton, Kalkaska, and Boyne Falls, before arriving in Petoskey for an overnight stay. The public is invited to view

George will be remembered as a compassionate and fair lawman who always went out of his way to treat people as he would like to be treated.

He is survived by his children Amii Adams and her husband John, Thomas and Tracy Conti, George and Melissa and his three grandchildren, Nikolas Husak and his wife Marlette, Jillian Husarenko and her husband Joey and Luke Thomas Lasater. I gained a lot from reading one of John Maxwell's books, Everyone Communicates, Few Connect.

This is so true and so important for us to understand.

Business is about relationships. It is imperative that we connect, truly connect, with people-both our external and internal clients, that is, our team members. We must slow down, take the time to connect with our team members and other co-workers. This means starting conversations, consciously listening with a quiet mind and without an agenda, and offering space for understanding, open mindedness and growth.

People flourish when they feel known, affirmed and connected. It is our responsibility as a leader to help others learn, grow and succeed.

Maxwell insightfully observes that "people may hear our words, but they feel our attitude."

Being so eager to learn as much as I could about leadership, I asked if he would allow me to read those personal notes. * "You listened to everyone's suggestions, ideas and goals. You made us into a real team."

* "Your faith in us lifted the spirits of everyone here"

* "Your calm leadership and belief in each person's importance and potential empowered us all."

The Paddle Antrim Festival and the development of Northern Michigan's first water trail, are just a few examples of how Paddle Antrim is leading the charge with promoting Antrim County as an outdoor recreation destination. We're very lucky to



have such a progressive protector and promoter of the nature that surrounds us. That's something I think we can agree to raise a glass to." said Joe Short, founder of Short's Brewing Company.

In addition to this event. Paddle Antrim is thrilled to offer programming all season long. "After a couple years of uncertainty, we are thrilled to bring back our programming in full force this summer," said Deana Jerdee, executive director of Paddle Antrim. "Our classes and community paddles are great ways for paddlers to connect with each other and the water in a fun and educational way."

The non-profit organization will host 7 community paddles, 15 kayaking classes, 4 stewardship classes and the beloved three-day Paddle Antrim

Festival.
Community paddles are free and open to the public. These relaxed hourlong paddles take place along different sections of the Chain of Lakes and all paddlers are welcome – canoes, kayaks, and stand up paddle boards. Paddlers are responsible for bringing their own paddle craft and personal flotation devices (life jackets) must always be worn when out on the water.

Adult classes teach paddlers the basics of paddling all types of kayaks in a fun and safe way.

These classes are great for beginners but anyone

who has never received formal instruction will benefit. Kids' classes are a great way to introduce your child to the sport of kayaking. Designed with fun and water safety as primary goals, these classes teach students through a variety of games and exploration. All classes are taught by American Canoe Association (ACA) certified instructors.

Paddle Antrim has partnered with Grass River Natural Area, Tipp of the Mitt Watershed Council, Little Traverse Conservancy, Kalkaska Conservation District, Walloon Lake Association and Conservancy, and CAKE CISMA to offer four stewardship classes in three different counties in Northern Michigan -Antrim, Charlevoix and Kalkaska. These classes train paddlers to identify and report invasive species while preventing their spread.

The Paddle Antrim Festival will take place September 15 -17, 2022. day off. This said, even more important for Mark is to do his best to assure that our essential needs as a community work.....and when there is a problem, it is fixed.....examples being water, electricity and other power sources, roads, sewer systems and additional similar needs. Most of these are invisible to us. We look at our East Park overlooking Round Lake thinking how beautiful it is and that we are blessed to be here. What we do not see is all the underground infrastructure that enables us to live

and have a business here. We cannot take our city workers for granted. They are not in the limelight. Yet, what they do is vitally important. For example, if a powerline is broken in a storm, our linemen are called upon to fix it, what-

ever the hour, and it can be is to assure these linemen and other city workers feel appreciated and to know that they are valued.

Mark believes it would be especially beneficial to help, affirm and encourage our local business owners to grow their success. We have some great stories. Exam-

Harwood Gold was a maple syrup farm more than 100 years ago,

then had a booth at the famer's market, and now a very popular café at the center of Charlevoix, and they ship more than 75 of their products all over the U.S. This is fifth generation ownership.

The Black Market Café was selling their food out of a truck north of the bridge and just this year now has it's own shop, right in the center of Charlevoix.

The French Place was a booth at the farmer's market a few years ago and now has a popular shop on Bridge Street.

The Clothing Company is now third generation ownership and continues their very fine reputation of quality products and friendly atmosphere.

There are many other very admirable business owners and leaders in Charlevoix.

No wonder Lakeshore Tire and Auto Service has a robust business.

Also, at the top of Mark's agenda are: Assuring that all the em-

ployees of the city, from the linesmen to those who answer the phones and service us all who live here, are affirmed and celebrated.

That we focus even more on how we can improve the lives of the people who live here and are homeless and otherwise struggling.

Electric vehicle charging stations at state parks

Lake Michigan's scenic coastline and other areas throughout northern Lower Michigan will become more accessible for electric vehicle users this summer with the installation of electric vehicle charging stations at select Michigan state parks.

Starting from Warren Dunes State Park in the southwest corner of the Lower Peninsula, north toward beautiful state park destinations at Holland and Grand Haven, Ludington, Orchard Beach, Leelanau and Petoskey on the Lake Michigan shoreline and additional points inland, an estimated total of 30 charging stations are scheduled to be installed beginning in June and continuing throughout the summer.

"This ability to link some of our state parks with electric vehicle travelers will provide a winwin situation for both parties," said Ron Olson, chief of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Parks and Recreation Division. "The enhancement will no doubt increase the number of visitors at these parks, while providing convenience and significantly increasing the range for EV motorists."

The rollout of the accessible stations across the state is being done in phases. State parks in the Upper Peninsula are scheduled to be part of the second phase, ideally to take place next year.

The installation will be the latest EV development after Gov. Gretchen

Thirty stations at select State Parks to be available this summer

Whitmer's administration announced in 2021 the development of a Lake Michigan EV circuit, amid ongoing efforts to employ green technologies throughout the state, including solar-powered amenities, carbon sequestration and numerous efficiencies.

'The DNR continues to look at innovative ways to sustainably manage our public lands and facilities," said Scott Whitcomb the DNR's director of the Office of Public Lands. "Whether it's cultivating public/private partnerships to deploy EV charging at state parks or installing solar panels on our offices, the DNR is committed to being part of the solution that leads to a cleaner environment.'

Installing the EV charging stations will also revisit a historic collaboration between Michigan's state parks and the automobile industry.

Beginning in the 1920s, cars became an increasingly popular form of transportation. This was especially important for park development as people began to travel in their cars to state parks.

After World War II, when car ownership increased further, the interstate highway system brought people, cars and parks closer to each other than ever before. The impact of this accessible road network to parks was significant.

The changes were evident in state road maps. In 1919, the state Legislature authorized the highway department to publish and sell a tourist map. By 1922, that map included state parks. In 1923, the map also contained information on recreational sites, camp sites and ferry schedules.

The popularity of cars and parks grew cooperatively. In 1922, Michigan's state parks saw a total of nearly a quarter-million visitors, but by 1930, a 40-fold increase had taken place with over 8 million people visiting state parks that year.

Michigan was also one of the first states to introduce roadside parks and recreational areas. Electric vehicle charging stations at state parks will help head both partners toward a promising future.

"As the transition to an electrified mobility future continues to accelerate, innovative initiatives like these are vital to ensuring EVs can be more easily incorporated into our everyday lives, regardless of where you are in the state," said Trevor Pawl, chief mobility officer with Michigan's Office of Fu-

ture Mobility and Electrification. "By identifying creative partnerships and opportunities, we are making significant progress in creating a safer, more equitable and environmentally conscious transportation future for all Michiganders."

The tentative list of installations includes two EV charging stations at Warren Dunes (Berrien County), P.J. Hoffmaster (Muskegon County), Charles Mears (Oceana County), Ludington (Mason County), Orchard Beach (Manistee County), Leelanau (Leelanau County), Young (Charlevoix County), Petoskey (Emmet County), Wilderness (Emmet County) and Interlochen (Grand Traverse County) state parks, four stations each at Holland and Grand Haven state parks, both in Ottawa County, and two stations at the Oden State Fish Hatchery in Emmet

As Michigan continues to welcome travelers to the state, increased access to EV charging stations is one way to continue to bring new leisure travelers to the state.

With tourism one of the industries hit hardest by the impacts of COVID-19, the Lake Michigan EV

circuit builds on the continued success of the state's Pure Michigan campaign to help the industry recover by offering an exciting ecotourism attraction and reducing range anxiety for out-of-state visitors from population centers along Lake Michigan, like Chicago

"These EV charging stations are a tremendous way to encourage sustainable travel across our state, while sharing the tremendous beauty and recreation offered by our world-class state parks here in Michigan," said Dave Lorenz, vice president of Travel Michigan, part of the Michigan Economic Development Corporation. U. S. MILITARY VETERAN OF THE MONTH

The Veteran of the month of June 2022 is Francis "Frank" Joseph Whitman.

Frank was born August 14, 1918 in Cook County, Chicago Illinois to parents Jacob Peter and Gertrude Gangolf Whitman. After the death of his father, Frank's mother remarried and moved to Boyne Falls Michigan where Frank grew up. He attended Boyne Falls schools graduating High School in the class of 1937. He was an excellent basketball player, and also recognized as a Michigan Golden Gloves boxing champion. He was selected as first alternate to **Annapolis Point Military** academy.

Following graduation, he was employed for a short time with the CCC, Civilian Conservation Corp, then found employment at a Detroit Block Factory where he saved enough money to build and open a Boyne City restaurant, The Rainbow Gardens. On September 18, 1941, Frank was inducted into the United States Army in Kalamazoo Michigan. After completion of basic and advanced training as a High-Speed Radio Operator, he was awarded Sharpshooter with the 1903 rifle, and Expert with the M1 rifle. Frank was then assigned to the 3rd Infantry Division and left the U.S. on October 24, 1942 arriving in North Africa on November 8, 1942. Shortly after his arrival, he along with 1000 other troops were reassigned to the 1st Infantry

Division, known as the "Big Red One". After the invasion of Sicily, the 1st Division would go to England to train for the upcoming D-Day invasion. He would be assigned to D Company, 1st Battalion. 16th RCT (Regimental Combat Team) and would go ashore in the 3rd wave at Easy Red beach. His unit would see combat in Northern France, Battle of the Bulge, Central Europe, Ardennes, Algeria-French Morocco, Tunisia, and at the end of the war would find them-

selves at the Czechoslova-

kian border. After 2 years, 9 months, 18 days of overseas service, on August 10, 1945, Frank would board an aircraft and fly back to the U.S., arriving August 11, 1945. On August 25, 1945, at Indiantown Gap Military Reservation, Pennsylvania, he would be given an Honorable Discharge and receive the following awards: Combat Infantrymen Badge; Bronze Star Medal; Good Conduct Medal; Distinguished Unit Badge; American Defense Service

Medal; European-African-Middle Eastern Service Medal with 1 Silver Service Star and 3 Bronze Service Stars, and the rank of TECH 4. .

Returning home to Boyne Falls, Frank would marry his High School sweetheart. Margaret Zelinski on October 17, 1945, at the St. Augustine church in Boyne Falls. Together they moved to L'Anse Michigan where Frank managed the Whirl-I-Gig Dance Hall, eventually becoming owner. He also learned the trade of bricklaying, and founded Whitman & Sons Construction Company in 1947, which to his credit many commercial buildings that exist today in L'Anse are known to him. As a stonemason, he built numerous monuments in the Village of L'Anse, one of which is the sandstone welcome sign as you enter the village. At 90 years old, Frank constructed the World War II Veterans Memorial in the downtown waterfront park.

Frank was an avid and accomplished hunter, expert fly fisherman, and trapper. He had an excellent sense of humor and enjoyed telling stories. He particularly enjoyed lively discussions about politics. He served numerous terms on the Village council; Village Building inspector; member of the Ottawa Sportsmen's Club, Bricklayers and Allied Craftworkers Union: and the Upper Peninsula Trappers Association. Frank was the proud father of eight children. On November 27, 2009, in L'Anse Michigan Francis Joseph "Frank" Whitman answered the final call and is being honored by his family and friends.

After tornado, Rep. Borton praises first responders, spotlights recent grant

Otsego County awarded resources for training, recruitment

State Rep. Ken Borton today repeated his praise for the many first responders who saved lives in the lead-up to and aftermath of the tornado that hit Otsego County last week.

A devastating EF3 tornado touched down in Borton's hometown of Gaylord last Friday, tragically taking two lives, inflicting dozens of injuries, and wreaking damage and destruction on homes and businesses in the community.

"Our community is mourning Gaylord neighbors who sadly passed away, and praying for those in recovery," Borton said. "We know the heroic actions of police, firefighters, and emergency medical personnel prevented additional casualties. Amid tornado-caused chaos, first responders saved lives — treating wounds and get-

ting people to safety and shelter."

Borton said he was pleased that Otsego County was recently approved for a grant to bolster recruitment and training for first responders.

"In Gaylord, we have seen our courageous first responders in action," Borton said. "It is so important to have full crews of first responders, ready to get to work in natural disasters and other emergencies. The grant Otsego County recently received will help support, recruit, and train first responders in our community."

The county was awarded \$100,000 last week through

the First Responder Training and Recruitment Grant Program. The program offers funds to local governments for recruiting and training law enforcement and corrections officers, firefighters, and emergency medical services personnel. Grant dollars may also be used for professional development and other support for current first respondance.

Borton, who serves on the House Appropriations Committee, helped create the \$5 million grant program last fall, when the Legislature approved the state's annual budget.



The Red Devils would be able to fight back for a 6-4 victory. The team would then finish up their regular season against Kalkaska on Friday, May 27





Seasonal tick awareness notice

Be watchful and take precautions during and after outdoor activities

As more people head outdoors, the risk of incidental human-tick interactions increases. In the summer, not only adult ticks, but tick larvae and nymphs are most active. Tick larvae and nymphs are difficult to spot because they are smaller than a sesame seed. More tick encounters may lead to tick-borne diseases such as Lyme Disease, Anaplasmosis, Ehrlichiosis, and Babesiosis.

"Northwest Michigan is a recreational wonderland. As our outdoor activities increase, so should our awareness of the possibility of ticks making their way onto ourselves and our pets," said Dan Thorell, Health Department of Northwest Michigan Interim Health Officer. "The following measures are practical steps to remaining safe. It's important to note that ticks must be attached for 36 to 48 hours to transmit Lyme disease."

Take these steps to protect yourself against ticks and the diseases they may

 Use repellent that contains 20% or more DEET, picaridin, or IR3535 on exposed skin for protection

that lasts several hours. Wear clothing treated with permethrin.

Look for ticks on your body, including on your scalp and behind your ears. If you find one, immediately remove it using tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible and pull up.

Put your clothes in the dryer on high heat for 60 minutes to kill any remaining ticks.

· Take a shower as soon as you can after coming indoors.




