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Health Department Joins Bike Share Charlevoix Program

Creates new public pickup for bikes on the south side

An important part of being healthy is finding convenient ways to eat right and exercise. To assist, the Health Department of Northwest Michigan (HDNW) is a new partner in the Bike Share Charlevoix program. Two new cruisers, owned by the City of Charlevoix, are stationed at a bike rack in front of HDNW's Charlevoix office.

"We are so excited to yet again expand into another area of Charlevoix," said Kent Knorr, City of Charlevoix Recreation Director. "This is a wonderful program and a great way for residents and visitors to get out and enjoy biking in our community. If you haven't seen Charlevoix by bicycle, this is the perfect way to give it a try."

By adding the health department's 220 W. Garfield location, the city has seven

Charlevoix locations that offer the use of cruiser bikes free of charge. Charlevoix is a bike friendly community and has been recognized as a Pure Michigan Trail Town. Bikes are available for check-out at HDNW from 8 a.m.-noon and 1-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. They may be signed out at the front office for short rides or the full day.

"We're happy to join the program as a host," said Dan Thorell, HDNW Interim

Health Officer. "This is natural fit for us as we build on more than 90 years of promoting health. We welcome residents and visitors to stop by and take a ride."

A variety of non-motorized bike trails connect Charlevoix to area lakes and surrounding communities. They include Lake to Lake Trail, Little Traverse Wheelway and Top of Michigan Trails Council Trail Network.

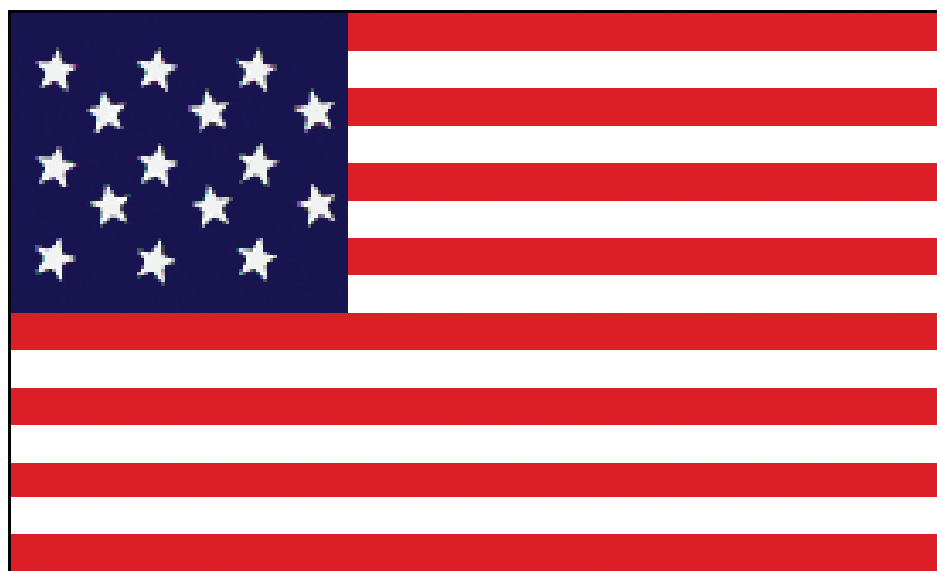

Historic Version of US Flag being flown at the Boyne Area Veteran's Memorial

This Star-Spangled Banner is the featured US Flag now being flown at the Boyne Area Veterans Memorial. This is its Historical background

In "The Reading Eagle", Charles J. Adams III gives more details on the history of the flag:

"...Another [referring to Betsy Ross' story] legendary banner was the star-spangled one that flew over Baltimore's Fort McHenry during the War of 1812. Its creation is rooted not in legend, but in fact. And, its creator was also a Pennsylvania woman a native Pennsylvanian, at least. She was Mary Young, who was born in Philadelphia in 1776. She married John Pickersgill in 1795 and moved with him to Baltimore where she took up what had been her mother's trade. After her husband's untimely death in 1805, Mary set up shop as a signal flag and banner maker for the busy maritime shipping trade in Baltimore harbor. With a respected reputation for her work, Mary Young Pickersgill drew the attention of George Armistead, commander of Fort McHenry. With the threat



of attack imminent in the summer of 1813, Armistead ordered a flag "so large that the British will have no trouble seeing it from a distance." The flag, and the job, was immense. Mary needed the assistance of several family members and hired hands to complete the 30-by-42-foot banner and a smaller garrison flag. The job was completed in six weeks. That attack didn't happen until the summer of 1814, when a young lawyer detained on a British ship watched the siege of Fort McHenry and marveled at

the flag's endurance during the Battle of Baltimore. He was, of course, Francis Scott Key, and was so inspired in the writing of the National Anthem, The Star-Spangled Banner.

The 15-star, 15-stripe flag was authorized by the Flag Act of January 13, 1794, adding two stripes and two stars. "This flag became the Official United States Flag on May 1, 1795. Two stars were added for the admission of Vermont (the 14th State on March 4th, 1791) and Kentucky (the 15th State on June 1st, 1792, and was to last for 23

years. The five Presidents who served under this flag were; George Washington (1789-1797), John Adams (1797-1801), Thomas Jefferson (1801-1809), James Madison (1809-1817), and James Monroe (1817-1825).

This flag was the only U.S. flag to have more than 13 stripes. The original flag is now preserved in the Smithsonian Museum. You can notice the "tilt" in some of the stars just as in the original Star-Spangled Banner.

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TAKING TO THE TRAILS

Discover the joy of Michigan's mountain bike trails

Michigan's non-motorized trails system has more than 3,000 miles dedicated to paved, gravel and off-road single-track trails for bicyclists to enjoy 365 days a year.

These public trails are situated in every region of Michigan at state parks, recreation areas, pathways, forests and rail trails.

Michigan's natural terrain, along with varied seasons and access to public trails, provides a unique experience for all cyclists.

As a Michigan Department of Natural Resources videographer, I have the privilege to help document and promote this recreation activity across the state.

What I've learned is that non-motorized bicycle trails can dramatically influence personal connection to the outdoors, build communities and strengthen local economies.

About three years ago, in August 2019, I was assigned to film a promotional action video of the Waterloo State Recreation Area's DTE Energy Foundation mountain bike trail system in Chelsea, Michigan.

At that time, my knowledge of mountain biking was minimal. I didn't even own a bicycle.

So, what is mountain bik-

ing? It's best described as riding a bicycle off-road, on trails specifically designed for bicycle use, over varied terrain. Two common types of mountain bike trails are flow and cross-country (or backcountry).

The DTE trail is classified as a flow trail – built with a special machine that carved berms, hills and unique features into the pre-existing natural terrain on public land.

Backcountry mountain bike trails feature existing natural terrain, including roots, rocks and other obstacles found in the forest. These trails can sometimes be more technically challenging. Both types of trails are available on Michigan public land.

While I was capturing video clips of mountain bikers at the DTE trail, one rider decided to stop and introduce himself. It was Jason Aric Jones, creator of the trail.

My encounter with Jason was inspiring. He encouraged me to bring a bicycle with me next time I visited the trail. In response to this experience, I went to my local bike shop three days later and purchased my first mountain bike.

I then found myself back at the DTE trail for a follow-up video assignment, recording the trail with a 360-degree video camera mounted to my bike helmet.

Long story short, I discovered the joy of mountain biking through a work assignment and inspiration from the amazing community of Michigan bicyclists.

The bicycle has transformed my life and given me a new appreciation for Michigan trails and the mountain biking community.

Mountain biking in Michigan became an accepted recreation activity in the late 1980s.

A few of Michigan's top destinations for mountain biking include Copper Harbor and Marquette in the Upper Peninsula, the Chelsea/Pinckney area near Detroit, Augusta and Rockford in the western Lower Peninsula and the Traverse City region in the northern Lower Peninsula.

Each of these destinations provides a unique type of terrain and challenges, and they welcome all mountain

bikers, regardless of skill level.

That is the best part about trails in Michigan – they are approachable for novice or less-experienced riders.

And when the snow arrives in Michigan, recent production of fat-tire bicycles enables enthusiasts to experience groomed trails year-round.

A lot of progress has been made in popularizing the sport during the past 40 years with the help of mountain biking advocacy groups, volunteers and the holding of special events. Advocacy groups help influence policies and rules and create or introduce new trail systems in partnership with the DNR.

The Michigan Mountain Biking Association, the state's largest organization dedicated to the pastime, coordinates local and regional groups like the Potawatomi Mountain Biking Association

in southeastern Michigan. Members of these groups provide financial support and volunteer their time to maintain mountain bike trails.

Development, management and maintenance of mountain biking trails on state land is often a partnership between the DNR and mountain biking organizations. The DNR, as the land manager, works to balance use and preservation of public natural resources, while allowing for great trail opportunities.

Local mountain bike groups perform the majority of on the ground trail work and maintenance of the trails with the help of many dedicated volunteers.

In addition to managing the land, the DNR also works with local groups to permit special events hosted at state parks and recreation areas. These events are vital to communities and to introducing the activity to new users. Mountain biking events also strengthen local economies, especially via increased patronage of bike shops and restaurants.

In my personal experience, local bike shops are the heart of every bicycle community. Not only have I purchased all my bikes through a local shop, I've learned about maintenance and other important information, like biking safety and etiquette, from friendly staff. If I have a

question about anything related to the bicycle, I call my local shop for help.

Bike shops also provide jobs and maintenance service to the community by repairing old bikes that have been in storage for years or with monthly tune-ups for avid cyclists.

In my opinion, bike shops provide a product, service and knowledge necessary for mountain biking to flourish in every community in Michigan.

I would encourage all bicyclists to get involved with their local biking community via a trail organization, biking events and bike shops, or to participate in volunteer trail maintenance workdays.

Riders should be good trail stewards and not ride when trails are wet after rains or during muddy spring conditions after the ground thaws.

"Riders should ride safely and respectfully when using trails during the COVID-19 restrictions, including spreading out to observe social distancing and being patient with other riders," said Ron Olson, chief of the DNR Parks and Recreation Division.

Although Michigan is not known for mountainous terrain like the western United States, there is a tremendous wealth of fun to explore while riding a mountain bike in "The Trails State."

Ryder loved watching Paw Patrol, and Co-comelon. He was such a good big brother to Kai. His big smile and little gig-

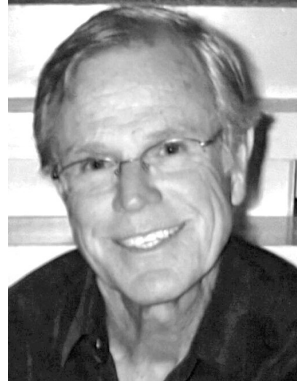
gle will be missed by many. A Memorial Service is planned in the future.

Community Grants, Arts & Culture Grants Awarded

The Charlevoix County Community Foundation, through its Community Priorities grant cycle, recently responded to requests from nonprofit partners in the areas of art, history, culture, health, and broad community needs. Thanks to donors who look to the Community Foundation to make a difference close to home, nearly \$134,000 in grants have been awarded to nonprofits who will work on bringing more art and music to our communities, improving recreation opportunities, caring for our community's youngest members, and much more.

Organizations like the Great Lakes Chamber Orchestra, Crooked Tree Arts Center, Beaver Island Performing Arts Alliance, and Charlevoix Circle of Arts work hard to offer a variety of art, music, and education to our communities. These organizations will receive funding to bring art and cultural experiences to Charlevoix County, including upcoming concerts, lectures, and after school art classes. Additionally, the Beaver Island Historical Society and the Charlevoix Historical Society will work on improvements for storing historic artifacts and documents, safely preserving them for future generations.

Healthy communities require quality care for people of all ages and abilities. The East Jordan Ambulance Association will begin offering advanced EMT training as well as continuing basic EMT and community CPR courses. Munson Healthcare Charlevoix Hospital Foundation will purchase a new video monitor tower, which will improve their ability to do minimally invasive surgeries at the Charlevoix Hospital.

Child and Family Services of Northwestern Michigan will expand their research into Charlevoix County to understand the potential positive impact of a safe facility for separated parents to safely exchange children according to custody agreements. Having a safe place for this exchange reduces trauma on children and families and the center provides

other important services as well. Girl Scouts of Michigan will expand troop leader support in Charlevoix County, helping girls get started in Girl Scouts programming. The Great Start Collaborative program will receive funding to help provide preschool scholarships. All of these efforts help to provide a "great start" for our community's youngest members.

Finally, a few organizations are working on improving recreation and higher education opportunities for Charlevoix County residents. The Charlevoix Area Community Pool will repair and resurface the pool. Lake Charlevoix Mariners will repair their boat dock in time for the popular Sail Charlevoix program this summer. North Central Michigan College will introduce varsity athletics this year, starting with volleyball, cross country, and basketball, which will provide new opportunities for students.

The next grant cycle is called Geographic Enrichment. Applications will be available after August 1, 2022. 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Gov. Whitmer Signs Bill Updating Michigan's Curriculum to Include Financial Literacy Course, Preparing Students for Post-Graduation with Lifelong Skills

LANSING, Mich. — Today, Governor Gretchen Whitmer signed House Bill 5190, a bipartisan bill updating Michigan's high school curriculum to include a financial literacy course for the first time in state history. The bill will prepare young Michiganders for the future and empower them to take control of their finances.

"As a mom, I want every kid who graduates in Michigan to enter the world with a diverse set of skills and knowledge, and that must include financial literacy," said Governor Whitmer. "I am proud to sign this bipartisan bill requiring all public school students to take a personal finance course. Every young Michigander deserves to know how to budget, save, and invest their money wisely so they can get off a great start after high school, whether they go to college, start working, or open a small business. Since I took office, we have worked side by side to put Michigan students first, making historic investments in preK-12 education to improve every kid's in-class experience and school facilities. Today's bill will bolster the state's education curriculum and I look forward to signing another balanced budget so we can build on our bipartisan education investments."

"We must invest in financial literacy early on to set our students up for success later in life," said Lt. Govern-

nor Garlin Gilchrist II. "This bipartisan bill is a critical step forward. It will teach young Michiganders important skills like budgeting and saving and help them make good financial decisions that pay dividends down the road. Governor Whitmer and I are proud of the progress we have made investing in our schools and getting kids the resources they need after a tough few years, and we will continue standing tall for Michigan's students."

"Personal finance education will serve as a launchpad for Michigan graduates lifting off into adulthood, so they won't be caught off guard by the financial decisions that await them," said State Representative Diana Farrington, R-Utica. "The course will teach students how to manage their finances. They'll be prepared to make smart, everyday budget choices — and equipped to handle the challenges that come their way. Establishing a core class dedicated to financial literacy has been a years-long labor of love for me, and I'm truly excited for the students who will fly to new heights through a fuller, richer education."

"Financial education is critical to the success of Michiganders through every stage of life," said Anita Fox, Director of the Michigan Department of Insurance and Financial Services. "You can't start a family or start a business



without thinking about financial services, including how to manage your money, how to take out a loan for a car or home, and how to save for retirement and the unexpected. This bill will help ensure our state gives students the foundation they need to achieve their personal and professional goals."

"Michigan's credit unions have been constant and steadfast advocates for increased financial education opportunities for our Michigan students," said Patty

Corkery, President/CEO Michigan Credit Union League and Affiliates. "As an industry, we see the value and impact knowledge of personal financial basics can have on a future borrower and consumer. Our credit unions have been fully supportive of all the work done to get this very important issue through."

"Students from across Michigan, from every background, will have expanded instruction in financial literacy," said The Michigan

Bankers Association. "We applaud the Governor for signing this legislation, crafted in a bi-partisan manner, with the influence of many stakeholders, into law."

"Financial literacy is a critical skill every student needs in order to be successful, no matter what future career or path they choose," says Alexa Kramer, Director of Government Operations, Small Business Association of Michigan. "SBAM proudly supports this legislation and applauds the bipartisan effort behind this important issue."

"Adding a financial literacy requirement to Michigan's education curriculum makes sense if our goal is to prepare students for success, in both careers and life," said Rick Baker, President & CEO of the Grand Rapids Chamber of Commerce. "Too many young adults are unprepared when it comes to making major financial decisions. This legislation will give students the opportunity to learn and develop these skills early, and hopefully leading to better financial wellbeing for years to come. The legislation would add a half-credit personal finance course as a high

school graduation requirement, starting with ninth-graders in 2024. The course requirement could fulfill a half credit of the four-credit mathematics requirement, the two-credit language other than English requirement, or the one-credit visual, performing, or applied arts requirement. The course could also be completed as part of an approved career and technical education program.

Governor Whitmer's Education Investments

For three years straight, Governor Whitmer has worked across the aisle to make the largest education investments in Michigan history—without raising taxes. Since taking office, she's tripled the number of literacy coaches and last year, she signed an education budget that closed the funding gap between schools, boosted per-student investment to an all-time high, and helped districts hire hundreds of on-campus mental health professionals.

The governor's education budget proposal for this year, includes the highest per-student investment ever, \$1 billion for school construction and renovation, funds to hire and retain 15,000 teachers, and more resources for on-campus mental health support.

House unanimously approves Rep. Borton plan to protect victim privacy

The Michigan House of Representatives on Wednesday unanimously approved a plan by state Rep. Ken Borton to strengthen privacy protections for crime victims.

Borton, R-Gaylord, is the sponsor of House Bill 5680, which would protect privacy rights by ensuring courts may blur a victim's image in any online video recording of a trial or other court proceeding.

"Strong privacy protections for crime victims are critically important — and may even be the difference between someone reporting a crime or staying silent," Borton said. "Of course, victims are often called upon to testify, and evidence may include pictures of them. Blurred images in online court videos will be another important shield of privacy in our state courts."

Michigan law already limits public disclosure of personal information of victims of serious crimes. Pictures and videos of victims are exempt from requests for government records under the Freedom of Information Act

(FOIA). HB 5680 would similarly protect victim privacy in videos of court proceedings that are streamed online or otherwise available to the public by explicitly allowing victims' images to be blurred. The plan would not limit a defendant's constitutional right to be confronted by witnesses in court.

Borton's legislation is part of a broader, bipartisan plan to support victims and protect their privacy, which also passed the House with overwhelming bipartisan support. HB 5679 would expand the list of serious misdemeanors under which certain victim protections apply. HB 5681 would allow victims to provide their oral impact statements for the sentencing process remotely. HB 5680 would maintain privacy protections while clarifying that law enforcement may help connect domestic violence survivors with support services.

The bills now proceed to the Senate for consideration.

Bergman-Supported School Safety Bill Introduced in House

Washington - Rep. Bergman joined Rep. Richard Hudson (NC-8) and 23 other Members of Congress in introducing H.R.

7966, STOP II: The Secure Every School and Protect our Nation's Children Act.

This important bill builds off the work done in the bipartisan STOP School Violence Act, which Rep. Bergman voted in favor of and was signed into law in 2018.

STOP II will provide more than \$7 billion in additional funding to locate gaps in mental health services, assess schools for security weakness, hire Mental Health Guidance Counselors and School Resource Officers, and harden our Nation's schools.

Rep. Bergman stated, "While others are engaging in political theater by pushing bills with

no chance of being signed into law, I am working diligently to improve mental health, make our schools safer, and save lives.

"STOP II will continue the bipartisan work of the original STOP School Violence Act and ensure we can keep our students safe — all without putting additional burden on taxpayers or threatening the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding citizens. I am proud to support this important legislation."

In addition to the \$7 billion in funding, STOP II will require federal agencies to regularly update and share training materials on bullying, mental health, and emergency planning for schools to incorporate into existing violence prevention programs.

Governor Whitmer Seeks Presidential Disaster Declaration to Further Help Residents and Businesses Impacted by Gaylord Tornado

LANSING, Mich. — Governor Gretchen Whitmer today requested that President Joe Biden declare a major disaster for Otsego County following an EF-3 tornado last month. The request comes at the conclusion of an in-depth assessment of damage to the area.

"We are doing everything in our power to secure all available assistance for the people of Gaylord as quickly as possible," said Governor Whitmer. "A presidential declaration would open up additional federal resources necessary to help the Gaylord community recover. Tough times call for tough people, and I know that the Michiganders in Gaylord will get through this. Let's keep working together to support all of the ongoing efforts to recover and rebuild."

Governor Whitmer has

requested supplementary federal aid in the form of Individual Assistance to help eligible residents. If federal aid is granted, assistance can include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property losses and other programs to help people and businesses recover from the effects of the tornado.

"As the tornado broke down buildings in Otsego County, it uprooted families from their homes, disrupted livelihoods of workers at damaged businesses, and, saddest of all, took two lives," said State Representative Ken Borton, R-Gaylord. "The destruction was awful. I've been working closely with others in our community, and we appreciate the support from Governor Whitmer's administration. A major disaster declaration from the federal government

will help us rebuild Gaylord."

At the governor's request, the Michigan State Police's Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (MSP/EMHSD) conducted a joint Preliminary Damage Assessment with federal and local officials to review and assess the scope of the damage to homes and businesses in the Gaylord area.

The teams conducted their assessments on May 25. State officials reviewed the results and determined the extent of damage and the challenges residents and business owners would face in recovery efforts reached the level necessary to apply for federal aid.

Governor Whitmer's request will be reviewed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), which will advise President Biden whether a disaster declaration should

be granted. Ultimately, the President will determine whether to provide federal assistance.

About the Disaster On May 20, an EF-3 tornado touched down in Otsego County, impacting infrastructure, and damaging businesses and private property. That same day, Governor Whitmer declared a state of emergency for Otsego County. By declaring a state of emergency, Governor Whitmer made available all state resources in cooperation with local response and recovery efforts in the designated area.

The declaration authorized the MSP/EMHSD to coordinate state efforts above and beyond what MSP/EMHSD had already been doing in conjunction with local agencies.

Gov. Whitmer Announces Michiganders to Receive Additional Assistance in June to Lower the Cost of Groceries

LANSING, Mich. — Today, Governor Gretchen Whitmer announced all Michigan families who are eligible for food assistance benefits will continue to receive at least an additional \$95 monthly payment in June to help lower the cost of groceries and ensure Michiganders can keep more of their hard-earned money. The additional assistance will help approximately 1.36 million Michiganders in more than 700,000 households.

"Michiganders will continue to be able to put food on the table thanks to our ongoing partnership with the federal government. In addition to helping Michigan families lower their out-of-pocket food costs, this collaboration has helped us continue to grow our economy by returning federal dollars to Michigan," said Governor Whitmer. "I know Michiganders need real relief right now, which is why I have put forward propos-

als to send a \$500 rebate from our additional revenue back to working families and suspend the sales tax on gas to lower prices at the pump. I will work with anyone to lower costs for Michiganders and get things done that make a real difference in their lives."

In April 2020, some Michigan residents began receiving additional food assistance under this program. In May 2021, all eligible households began getting extra monthly benefits. Federal approval is necessary every month.

Eligible clients who receive food assistance are seeing additional benefits on their Bridge Card from June 11-20. These benefits will be loaded onto Bridge Cards as a separate payment from the assistance provided earlier in the month.

All households eligible for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) receive an increase of at least \$95

monthly, even if they are already receiving the maximum payment or are close to that amount. Households that received more than \$95 to bring them to the maximum payment for their group size will continue to receive that larger amount.

Below are the maximum allowable benefits for SNAP customers based on their respective household size:

- One Person: \$250
- Two Persons: \$459
- Three Persons: \$658
- Four Persons: \$835
- Five Persons: \$992
- Six Persons: \$1,190
- Seven Persons: \$1,316
- Eight Persons: \$1,504

Secured by U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow as Chairwoman of the U.S. Senate Agriculture Committee, the federal government is providing additional funding to states for food assistance under House Resolution

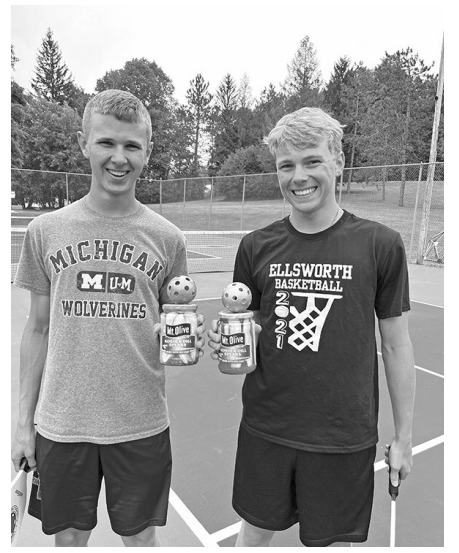
6201, the Families First Coronavirus Response Act.

Eligible families do not need to re-apply to receive the additional benefits. People who receive food assistance can check their benefits balance on their Michigan Bridge Card by going online to www.michigan.gov/MI Bridges or calling a consumer service representative toll-free at 888-678-8914. They can ask questions about the additional benefits by calling or emailing their case-worker.

Customer service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Spanish and Arabic service is available. If you are deaf, deafblind, or hard of hearing or speech-impaired, call the Michigan Relay Center at 7-1-1.

Charlevoix Man Pleads Guilty to Illegal Operation of Charter Business

John Joseph Kalbfell, 73, Charlevoix, pleaded guilty this morning in the 90th District Court in Charlevoix to operating a commercial boat charter without a commercial operational endorsement and without a valid Coast Guard certificate of inspection.

Both crimes are misdemeanors carrying a maximum penalty of one year in jail. Judge Angela J. Lasher sentenced Kalbfell to pay fines and costs totaling \$1,500 in the case.

Kalbfell was also originally charged with false pretenses \$20,000 or more but less than \$50,000, a felony charge, for allegedly obtaining a commercial boat slip through the use of false pretenses. This charge was dismissed upon Kalbfell's payment of \$17,820 to the City of Charlevoix for restitution.

This amount represents the difference between the fees for a commercial charter boat slip and a recreational seasonal boat slip at the City of Charlevoix marina.

According to an affidavit filed in the case by the United States Coast Guard, Kalbfell applied for, and received a commercial boat slip from the City of Charlevoix in 2017 despite the fact that he did not possess a captain's license, a commercial charter endorsement and had registered his boat with the state as a pleasure boat and not commercial.

Kalbfell conducted no commercial charters in 2017, only 3 to 5 in 2018, 8 to 10 in 2019 and 20 to 25 in 2020, ac-

ording to his logbook and the marina harbormaster. "It appears that this individual held himself out as a charter business, while not having a captain's license and not paying the fees nor holding the licenses that a charter company would have to pay, to obtain a lower rental rate for his 41' boat," Charlevoix County Prosecuting Attorney Allen Telgenhof said. "This resolution gets the City of Charlevoix the amount of money they lost as a result of these actions and holds the offender criminally responsible."

"The case was thoroughly investigated by the United States Coast Guard and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. The taxpayers of Charlevoix would not have gotten their money back without the hard work of these investigators. This resolution was approved by the city and I am glad we were able to recoup these funds without the necessity and risk of a trial."

In an action separate from the criminal prosecution, Kalbfell agreed to surrender his commercial slip at the city marina.

Kalbfell's wife, Janet, is a member of the City of Charlevoix City Council. Though she recused herself on all votes regarding the commercial slip, the law enforcement affidavit filed in the case indicates that it was not disclosed that she was both an owner of the boat and the limited liability company that operated the charter.

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HOW TO SCOUT OUT THE BEST PLACE TO CALL HOME

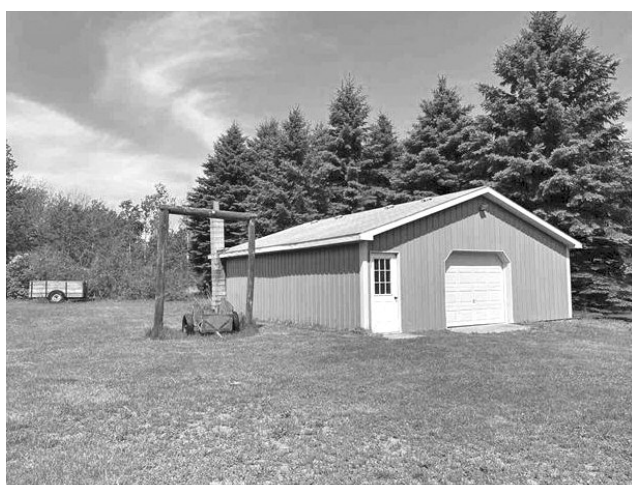

Sharing Our Gift Of Leadership

A number of successful business executives have shared with me the great benefit they received earlier in their careers from a more senior leader who took the time to mentor them. In fact, during my career, I can think of any number of great people who had the benefit of the interest and attention given to them by great people who were virtually all servant leaders and role models. People were succeeding in good part thanks to this mentoring.

Mentoring is a genuine commitment to helping the development of perhaps a less knowledgeable and experienced person. At its best, mentoring is a collaboration that is truly shared, enriching the lives of both. Done well by both the mentor and mentee, the relationship will have an important impact and result in significantly enhancing the mentee's effectiveness in her/his life.

There is no one set approach to mentoring. It works best when mentors feel a strong sense of responsibility and have an attitude of truly wanting to help with another's success. Mentoring works especially well when the relationship is "organic," i.e., when two people naturally form an informal but intentional relationship.

Both parties have an obligation and need to speak up promptly if this is not working as one of us would like.

The tone of the relationship is important. The capacity of the mentor to influence rests heavily on our ability to relate in a non-authoritative way, while guiding the mentee's learning and growth.

It is helpful to begin with an assessment of the mentee's competencies and areas of potential growth, for example:

Readiness to be mentored?

Receptivity to us as a mentor?

Do they have self-awareness and relationship management intelligence? This is important.

Can they articulate their strengths and their vulnerabilities?

Are they receptive to hearing about how they may improve, their blind spots and biases?

Ideally, we and the person we will mentor each

have the humility to be vulnerable and will honestly share thoughts about potential areas of growth. Humility is the foundation of growth!

Mentoring works best when the person is ready, accepts that

seeking continuous improvement is a strength, not a weakness. Seeking continuous improvement is the path to success!

If this works as we intend, and it certainly can if we commit to it and follow through, there should be personal satisfaction and fulfillment for us, as mentor, and of course, as well for the mentee. By helping bring out the best in a person, she/he will have a greater ability to be a leader, a great teammate, and to have a positive effect on others.

Additional guidelines for mentoring:

Set expectations and goals together.

Be open and honest with each other about progress, and how the relationship is working.

Recognize that there must be compatibility, respect, trust and available time.

Trust can be enhanced if both we and our mentee are comfortable allowing ourselves to be vulnerable with one another.

As a mentor, recognize the need to be both challenging and encouraging.

It is certainly true that everyone is already busy. Taking on a mentoring relationship is an added and important responsibility. Yet, even a small time commitment can reap huge rewards. Gaylord Tornado: Michigan Disaster Response & Relief Hiring 2 Case Managers

The Otsego Community Foundation (OCF) and the Otsego County United Way (OCUW) are fortunate to partner with the Michigan Disaster Response and Recovery program who will hire, train, and oversee disaster case managers (DCM) functioning as the primary point of contact to tornado victims. The DCM's will coordinate efforts to re-establish normalcy in victims' lives. This process will include a systematic procedure to help residents recover whether that is through connection to community resources, helping distribute the monies raised by OCF and OCUW and advocating for their clients. "I am so grateful that our peers in Midland from the Community Foundation

and United Way introduced us to the Michigan Disaster Response and Recovery," said Dana Bensinger, Executive Director OCF. "After hearing how their community benefited from case workers, I had a sense of peace and hope for long-term rebuilding." Funding for the DCM's is made possible through a grant from the Tornado Response Fund of the OCF. OCUW is providing the office space for the CM's to work. "We are grateful for the United Way to share their centrally located space and look forward to helping to support the existing community resources as well as provide for the identified unmet needs," said Bensinger. OCF and OCUW have

worked closely together the past two years in response to the pandemic. For both pandemic and tornado relief OCF plays a substantial role in fundraising and the United Way mobilizes to ensure individuals have access to the essentials for survival. These events have highlighted capacity deficits rural nonprofits face. Namely lack of continuity of service when organizations are charged to aid multiple counties that span over hundreds of miles. "The Red Cross and Salvation Army did an excellent job responding to the tornado; however, the Red Cross does not currently have an active office in Otsego County and the Salvation Army has been in the

process of hiring a regional field rep since July of 2021. Not having people that know the community intimately, can create hurdles when navigating client's needs," said Erin Mann, Executive Director of the Otsego County United Way. OCUW and OCF have been behind the scenes tackling immediate requests, while collaborating with state and local government entities, area businesses, and nonprofits examining sustainable solutions for Otsego County's systemic deficiencies. "The tornado brought Otsego County's collective troubles to a head," said Mann, "The lack of affordable housing, high instances of generational poverty and the obstacles people encounter

when seeking physical and mental health care is palpable." Despite these intrinsic struggles, the tornado response is continuing to the next phase of recovery. Habitat for Humanity has initiated home repairs and volunteer groups from all over the state will assist in major and minor repairs of damaged homes. "The triage portion of response is transitioning to creating a secure foundation for our neighbors that have experienced an unimaginable trauma. I believe the case-workers will play a vital role in this phase of healing- while addressing the survivors' financial needs, they will be filling their spirit with faith and resilience," said Bensinger.

We look forward to working alongside Otsego County residents to help restore recovery," said

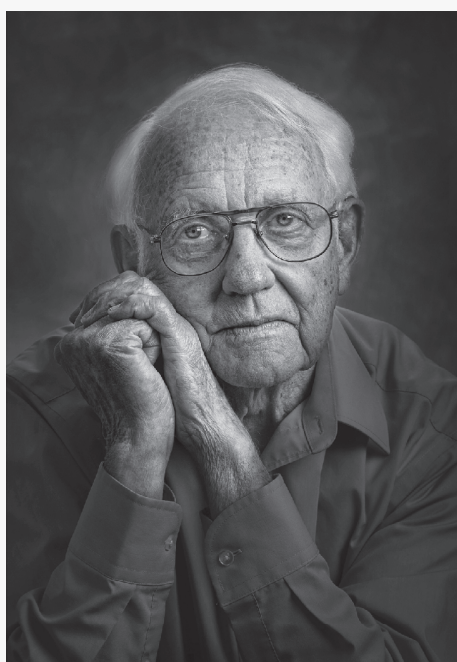

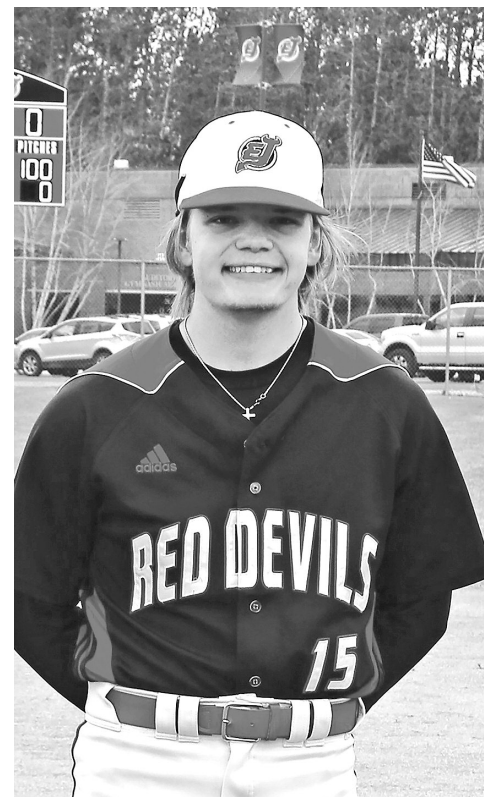

VILLAGE OF BOYNE FALLS Ordinance No. 62

AN ORDINANCE PURSUANT TO ACT 3 OF THE PUBLIC ACTS OF 1895, AS AMENDED, TO PROHIBIT ANY LOUD NOISE OR SOUND THAT ENDANGERS OR INJURES THE PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY, AND WELFARE OF THE RESIDENTS AND VISITORS TO THE VILLAGE OF BOYNE FALLS AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE ORDINANCE.

THE VILLAGE OF BOYNE FALLS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Title.

This Ordinance shall be known as the Village of Boyne Falls Noise Ordinance.

Section 2. Purpose.

The Boyne Falls Village Council hereby finds that noise because of its volume, frequency, or shrillness can unreasonably annoy, disturb, injure or endanger the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of residents and visitors of the Village. Therefore, the purposes of this Ordinance are to protect and promote the public health, safety, and welfare of the residents and visitors of the Village by prohibit any loud noise or sound that disturbs the quiet, comfort or repose of a reasonable person of normal sensitivities.

Section 3. Definitions. As used in this Ordinance,

"Boat" means every description of water craft used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on water, including personal water craft and non-motorized boats such as a canoes, rowboats, and rafts. Boat, however, does not include an air mattress, paddle board, paddle boat, boogie board, or similar device used by one (1) or two (2) persons for floating or paddling.

"Motor vehicle" means any wheeled vehicle in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a highway and which is designed to be self-propelled.

"Person" means an individual, firm, corporation, association, partnership, limited liability company, or other legal entity.

Section 4. Prohibited Activities.

No person shall cause or create and no person shall knowingly allow another person to cause or create on property that is owned or legally occupied by that person any loud noise or sound that annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of any reasonable person of normal sensitivities, including but not limited to:

- Playing or using a radio, phonograph, compact disc player, tape player, television, musical instrument, sound amplifier, or other electronic or mechanical sound-producing device in such a manner or with such volume that it unreasonably annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of any reasonable person of normal sensitivities.
- Yelling, shouting, hooting, singing, or sounding or using any horn, siren, whistle or bell, or making

other noise that because of its volume, frequency, or shrillness unreasonably annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of any reasonable person of normal sensitivities or unreasonably annoys or disturbs the well being of any animal.

- Sounding or using any horn, siren, whistle, bell or other warning device on a boat or motor vehicle in a manner that unreasonably annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of any reasonable person of normal sensitivities, unless the sounding or use of such horn, siren, whistle, bell or other warning device and the manner of such sounding or use is authorized by the state motor vehicle code or other state law.

- Revsing up the engine of a motor vehicle in such a manner or with such volume or frequency or at such time of the day that it unreasonably annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of any reasonable person of normal sensitivities.

Section 5. Exempt Activities.

Section 4 shall not apply to any loud noise or sound generated in connection with parades, musical productions or events authorized by the Boyne Falls Village Council, the local school district, or a civic or community organization and shall not apply to loud noise or sound, including the operation of amplified sound systems, generated by the Boyne Falls Village fire department or any police or fire official when used to disseminate official information or to provide official warnings.

Section 6. Violations and Penalties.

(a). Any person who violates any provision of this Ordinance shall be responsible for a municipal civil infraction as defined in Public Act 12 of 1994, amending Public Act 236 of 1961, being Sections 600.101-600.9939 of Michigan Compiled Laws, and shall be subject to the following fines:

- For a first offense, the offender shall pay a fine of One Hundred and 00/100 (\$100.00) Dollars.
- For a second offense within two (2) years of the date on which the person was found responsible for the first violation, the offender shall pay a fine of Two Hundred Fifty and 00/100 (\$250.00) Dollars.
- For a third or subsequent offense within two (2) years of the date on which the person was found responsible for the first violation, the offender shall pay a fine of Five Hundred and 00/100 (\$500.00) Dollars.

(b). Each day this Ordinance is violated shall be considered a separate violation.

Section 7. Enforcement Officials.

The Village President, the Village Ordinance Enforcement Officer, and deputies of the Charlevoix County Sheriff are hereby designated as the authorized officials to issue municipal civil infraction citations directing alleged violators of this Ordinance to appear in court.

Section 8. Nuisance Per Se.

A violation of this Ordinance is hereby declared to be a nuisance per se and is declared to be offensive to the public health, safety and welfare.

Section 9. Separate Court Action.

In addition to enforcing this Ordinance through the use of a municipal civil infraction proceeding or a criminal prosecution, the Village may initiate proceedings in the Circuit Court to abate or eliminate the nuisance per se or any other violation of this Ordinance.

Section 10. Repeal.

The Village of Boyne Falls Noise Ordinance, being Ordinance 62, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Section 11. Validity.

If any section, provision or clause of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not effect any remaining portions or application of this Ordinance, which can be given effect without the invalid portion or application.

Section 12. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall become effective twenty (20) days after its enactment.
