In 2008, Charlevoix Circle of Arts, a nonprofit organization, was established through the volunteer efforts of local artists and community members who had a vision to create a cultural center in the Charlevoix area to promote the arts in northern Michi-

Sarah Matye is Executive Director. She grew up in Charlevoix, attended our schools, North Central Michigan College in Petoskey, graduated from Western Michigan University, then began her nonprofit career. Subsequently, Sarah earned her Graduate Certificate in Nonprofit Leadership at Grand Valley State University.

While working at a nonprofit in California, Sarah began dating a long-time friend, also from Charlevoix, and they soon married. They both loved Up North Michigan, wanted to raise their children, now two boys, here and they moved back.

Prior to her role at the Circle of Arts, Sarah worked at the Charlevoix County Community Foundation and Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan, which were wonderful and enjoyable experi-

Sarah has always loved the arts, but up until the Charlevoix Circle of Arts, there really was little here.

The Charlevoix Circle of Arts is quite active, sponsoring numerous exhibits and classes. The exhibits emphasize local artists, including from Petoskey, Harbor Springs, Boyne City, other nearby areas, and typically 99% of works featured are from Michigan artists.

There is strong desire to give opportunities for people in our area to participate, to learn and enjoy. Classes including painting, drawing, dance, yoga, weaving, creation of jewelry, and numerous other offerings for children, after school students, and adults of all ages, beginners and experienced and skilled.

While the art exhibits are year-round, they are continuous during the summer when our area is crowded and busy. Classes too are year-round, though there are more during the off-season. Note: there is a need for more volunteers to instruct/teach during the winter months.

A challenge is providing the exhibits and classes during the slower months, and thankfully, Sarah and her team have been successful in keeping the center ac-

tive and, of course, another ongoing challenge is the development/fund raising.

Fortunately, the center is not solely reliable on fundraising, as there is a wonderful gift shop with unique paintings, prints, cards, and jewelry, and also annual memberships, grants, and some events like the upcoming recognition dinner of the patrons of the year and artist of the

Goals include expanding a ceramic studio, and fortunately they have received a grant to purchase equipment, have received a donated kiln, are getting closer to making this a reality, and are excited about this. Another goal is to expand after school offerings for students and the need is more instructors.

While Sarah loves the arts, she herself is not an artist and is fortunate to have a talented a dedicated team. She appreciates and loves her team members, volunteers, local artists, and community members who help make the Circle the wonderful community arts hub that it is.

Key team members are Erika Kilkenny, Administrative Assistant, Laura Kelly, Exhibit Coordinator, and Mary Duggan, Gallery & Office Assistant.

PLEASE TELL ME SOMETHING I DO **NOT WANT TO HEAR**

I wish I could remember who wrote the article suggesting leaders ask this question. "Please tell me something I do not want to hear." I

would certainly credit the author. When I read this, I immediately took note, and am totally in agreement with the value of this re-

We want to lead with humility and empathy, and it takes humility to want to hear how we and our team may improve. This signals our strength. We all, every one of us, have areas of potential improvement, and allowing ourselves to be

vulnerable and sincerely wanting to learn how we may be more effective is very important. It's a path to success. Generally, as a

boss or a manager,

the less honest feedback we receive. People tend to tell us what they think we want to hear.

Sheila Heen, co-author of Thanks for the Feedback, offers an idea. Knowing that people are hesitant to deliver unfavorable feedback, and especially to those who may have positions above theirs, she suggests an approach. She suggests sharing with peo-

ple with whom we work

and trust that we are trying

to improve, as we all should, and to ask them "Please tell me two things you feel I am doing well, and also two things you think I could do better."

If they realize we are genuine, that we want their help and will not be defensive or angry, the pressure is off, and we will gain valuable ideas.

Of course, the request "Please tell me something I do not want to hear" will also lead to our gaining rich information, information that could well help us become better, be it our self, our team, business.

The most effective leaders I have been fortunate to work with do not have big egos. They know they may

be good at what they do, and they know they can be even better, and they seek honest and timely feed-

In a conversation with a pastor, he said everyone he greets after church says "Nice homily", and while he certainly loves seeing them, he wishes for feedback that could help him improve. He is genuinely striving to be as effective as he can possibly be as a priest/minister in serving his people.

Let's embody humility, seeking honest and timely ideas for improvement. Let's consider requesting selected people to "Please tell me something I do not want to hear."

Forces receiving basic training at Fort Benjamin Harrison Indiana, qualifying Sharpshooter with the 30. Cal. Carbine. He then was sent for schooling in Aircraft Sheet Metal repair at Chanute Field, Illinois, then Fuel Tank Repair at the Goodyear Rubber and Tire Company in Akron Ohio. Richard was then assigned to the 99th Depot Repair Squadron in the South Pacific Theater, serving on Guam and the Marianna Islands. He would be repair-



ing Aircraft that sustained combat damage. For his exceptional service Richard received a personal letter of Appreciation from Commanding General of the **United States Air Forces**

Arnold. On March 3,1946 at Camp Atterbury, Indiana, Richard received an Honorable Discharge and was awarded these Commendations: American Theater Ribbon; Asiatic Pacific Theater Ribbon; World War II Victory Medal; Good Conduct Medal.

Returning home Richard would open an Electronics Repair Store in LaPorte, and on November 22, 1947, would marry Mildred Emma Killingbeck, making their home there. In 2000 he would retire from Horizon Bank. Richard enjoyed traveling, visiting with friends, and taking his wife garage saleing. On July 4, 2007, Richard Joseph Carr answered the final call and is being honored by his son Dave and family.

WHY ISN'T MY HOME SELLING?

Part 2 of 3

Price based on greed

Even if it's been shown that your house will likely sell for around \$250,000, you insist on listing it for \$275,000 because "you never know, someone could come along who just has to have it. Besides, if we don't get any bites we can always lower the price later." The problem is it won't take long for buyers to realize your price is unrealistic and think you are, too, and won't want to deal with you unless the house is "a steal." The listing languishes, so you drop the price, but not enough, it sits even longer and pretty soon you have a listing that's been on the market so long buyers decide there is something wrong and steer clear.

The solution is to get the price right. This is done by using what is called a Competitive Market Analysis (CMA). If you've hired the right agent, this is the first folder out of their briefcase when you meet to list your home. A CMA breaks down the sales price of homes that are similar to yours in location, size, age and condi-

Your agent will also

consider the listing prices of homes on the market, but these are used more to identify the competition. Even with a strong agent and CMA, your price may not be on target. That's because the market is always changing and your agent should be updating your CMA whenever anything comparable to your property sells.

Not every reason your home isn't selling will be the price, although they will be related to it. Here we have that value vs. price issue. If buyers perceive imperfections in your listing, they will want a discount, so if they're not buying, your price is not discounted enough for buyers to believe the value to them at least equals that of your

For example, if your lawn is brown and the landscaping worn, buyers will want a discount. The problem is that a seller will not consider this a major issue and attach a much lower discount than a buyer will accept.

This is why it is imperative that sellers do everything they can to eliminate any issues buyers may have with their house before listing. Obviously, you can't do anything about a bad location, such as being near railroad tracks, or that you have just one bathroom. But you and your agent should have factored these drawbacks into the listing price.

PA Telgenhof Statement on abortion law in Michigan

On June 27, 2022, I issued a statement regarding the US Supreme Court decision in Dobbs v Jackson Women's Health Organization in response to media inquiries. Today, I again had multiple inquiries following the Michigan Court of Appeals decision in Planned Parenthood of Michigan v Atty Gen of the State of Michigan holding that the injunction issued by the Court of Claims does not apply to county prose-

Nothing in this decision changes the substance of my earlier statement.

The oath that I took as prosecuting attorney was to support the Constitution of the United States and the Michigan Constitutions. As

I understand these constitutions, it is for the legislature to pass laws, for the judiciary to interpret laws, and it is for the prosecuting attorneys to enforce those laws that are adjudged to be constitutional.

It is not my place to substitute my judgment for that of the legislature, or of the judiciary.

I did not agree with counties that proclaimed that they would not enforce lawful COVID restrictions due to political disagreement. Similarly, at this time I will not issue a blanket statement that I will not enforce laws that have been passed by the legislature. I do not believe that it is my place to override the decisions of duly elected members of the legislature.

Every prosecutor has the

right, and I believe, the duty, to take into account the specific circumstances of each case when deciding when to charge a crime or in deciding how to proceed in a case after a crime is charged. For example, we do not treat the teenager who assaults their parent because of an untreated mental health issue the same as we treat the spouse who batters their spouse, even though both crimes constitute domestic violence.

1 pelieve, however, that this exercise of discretion is different than announcing that a certain law will not be enforced in a county. Thus I will not make such an announcement regarding MCL 750.14, the law banning abortion, or any other law.

The Court of Appeals ruling is not the final word on this issue, obviously. I still anticipate that the issue of whether there exists a right to an abortion under our existing state constitution may be decided by the Michigan Supreme Court.

The issue will also be on the ballot this November when voters will have an opportunity to decide whether to amend the Michigan Constitution to expressly provide for the right to an abortion.

My personal belief is that if people do not like the law banning abortion, they should vote to change it. It is not an option to simply ignore it, or for prosecutors to refuse to enforce

State Rep. Ken Borton today praised new relief funding to aid tornado recovery efforts in the Gay-

lord area. To help pay for emergency expenses, such as for damage repairs, resulting from the EF3 tornado that touched down in Otsego County in May, the county and other local governments will receive a total of more than \$500,000 from Michigan's Disaster and **Emergency Contingency** Fund, which provides resources to local governments to help manage

disasters and emergencies.

"After the tornado hit our community, the people of Gaylord have grown closer together, and our work to rebuild damaged homes and local businesses — and help people get back on their feet — continues," said Borton, R-Gaylord. "In the Legislature, I've supported investments into our Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund to help communities across Michigan recover from catastrophes and crises. Now, these critical resources will aid Otsego County in our

hour of need."

Borton, who serves on the House Appropriations Committee, highlighted his work in the Legislature to support disaster relief throughout the state. A \$6 million deposit into the Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund was included in the state's newest balanced budget, which became law earlier this month. The fund is administered by the Michigan State Police.

The newly approved relief includes \$90,954.13 for Otsego County, \$250,000 for

the city of Gaylord, \$45,058.16 for Hayes Township, \$50,509.08 for Livingston Township, and \$73,085.50 for Bagley Township.

The new relief follows the recent announcement of low-interest loans that will be available from the U.S. Small Business Administration to help residents, businesses, and nonprofit organizations repair and replace property damaged by the tornado.

TRACKING FISH MOVEMENTS

Acoustic telemetry is valuable tool for researchers

If you've ever been fishing, you know fish can be hard to locate. Many anglers have marked a high-quality fishing spot with a GPS coordinate, only to return the next day to find that all the fish have left. Fish movements can be influenced by many factors, including location of desirable habitat, water temperature and the seasons.

In addition to helping anglers target their catch, understanding fish movement can help develop more effective strategies for managing fish populations. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources employs a multitude of tools to study these movements. One method involves marking fish by clipping off a portion of one fin on fish reared in DNR hatcheries, like salmon or trout. This fin clip indicates that an internal coded-wire tag has been inserted into the fish's head. This tag is microscopic and contains information that DNR staff can read with a microscope. When anglers catch a marked fish, they are encouraged to report information about the catch online or in person at DNR customer service centers. In some cases the DNR will reward anglers for submitting information about the catch. This mark-and-recapture method helps generate data based on how far the fish moved from where it was last observed. The drawbacks to this method are that researchers don't know how or when the fish traveled between two points and it is dependent on catching the fish multiple times – a challenging task in a body of water the size of the Great Lakes. To gain greater insight into fish movement, researchers have been turning to acoustic telemetry. Acoustic telemetry is the process of using sound and distance to

has two main components: a transmitter and a receiver. Each transmitter emits a unique series of sound pulses that can be detected on a stationary receiver. The receiver decodes this unique sound and logs the transmitter number, date and time of the detection.Researchers can surgically implant a transmitter in the fish's body cavity and release the fish into a body of water where receivers have been deployed. As the fish swims, movements can be tracked from receiver to receiver, showing the amount of time a fish spends in one area. Some tags also have environmental sensors that provide clues on the fish's depth, swim speed and water temperature.Researchers at the Lake St. Clair Fisheries Research Station use acoustic telemetry to study muskellunge movements in the St. Clair-Detroit River system to better understand spawning areas for habitat restoration and conservation."The ability of acoustic telemetry to provide finescale data across all seasons and across huge areas is a game changer, especially for species like muskellunge that are commonly low density," Dr. Jan-Michael Hessenauer, a DNR fisheries research biologist, said.Since 2016, more than 130 muskellunge have been tagged with transmitters. One unique aspect of this project is involving muskellunge angling groups in the tagging process."Members of these groups have participated in special fishing events where they have collected fish for tagging and contributed funds to purchase tags and other equipment needed to sustain the project," Hessenauer said. Acoustic telemetry can yield surprising results. According to Hessenauer, one male muskellunge "has made two

tant to stress that he's the only fish that has moved at that scale."The Detroit River to the Buffalo area is roughly 500 miles roundtrip, so a muskellunge making this trip twice would have to swim about 1,000 miles. Acoustic telemetry can have different applications for DNR staff involved in native and invasive species management. Staffers at the DNR's Waterford Fish Station in Oakland County collaborate with researchers at Michigan State University to track movements of grass carp in Lake Erie. Grass carp are an invasive species the DNR and regional partners are working to eradicate from the Great Lakes. The primary goal of their

field work is to remove as many grass carp as possible.agging a small number of fish with acoustic transmitters and releasing them back into Lake Erie has helped locate grass carp across the vast expanse of the lake and its tributaries."Having seasonal movement information for these fish helps response crews better target high-use areas for control efforts," said John Buszkiewicz, a grass carp biologist at the Waterford Fish Station. One noteworthy application of this technology is the "real-time rapid response" project. When a tagged grass carp comes into a specific area, a real-time receiver sends out an email alerting the response crews. A team can

mobilize quickly by deploying gear to capture any other grass carp in the area. This technology has revealed specific timing of spawning activity and shown seasonality of grass carp movements, which has helped improve capture rates. Telemetry continues to be a major component of grass carp eradication efforts in Lake Erie. One special aspect of acoustic telemetry research in the Great Lakes region is that data downloaded from receivers is published on GLATOS – the Great Lakes Acoustic Telemetry Observation System. It's a great example of researchers working together to share equipment and information to advance knowledge of

fish movement patterns. "GLATOS provides fishery managers with information concerning fish movement and behavior that traditional fishery assessments were unable to," said Dr. Chris Vandergoot, GLATOS director.

environment over both the short and long term."Data sharing is imperative ... because without it, individual projects wouldn't be successful," Vandergoot said. "Since fish don't recognize state or international boundaries, individual researchers are able to follow their fish even if they leave their study area."The next time you plan a fishing trip on the Great Lakes, consider exploring information on fish movement through GLATOS or at Michigan.gov/TaggedFish. It may make you a wiser, less frustrated angler. If you believe you have caught a tagged fish, consider taking the time to report it to the DNR. Visible tags can be reported online through the DNR's Eyes in the Field reporting system. For adipose fin-clipped fish with codedwire tags, heads can be submitted at a local drop-off station.Collaborative science makes Michigan's world-class fisheries even more exceptional.




