Bomb threat temporarily closes downtown bridge in Charlevoix



CHARLEVOIX - State police temporarily closed the double leaf bascule bridge in downtown Charlevoix on Thursday, Aug. 11 because of a bomb threat.

Police about 3 p.m. announced the US 31-Island Lake Outlet Bridge, in downtown Charlevoix, was closed.

"A bomb threat was made and police are taking the necessary precau-

tions to keep the community safe," state police said in a Tweet.

A portion of Charlevoix's downtown business district was evacuated on Thursday afternoon following a bomb threat.

Police called in bomb-detecting dogs to check the bridge and it was reopened just after 5 p.m.

MICHIGAN'S AMAZING ANIMALS

Common Loons

Common loons are one of the most mysterious animals we have in the Wolverine State. To unravel some of the mystery, here are some fascinating, fabulous, and funny facts about these beautiful, bewitching, and boisterous birds:

The Name Game: The scientific name of the common loon is *Gavia immer*. *Gavia* is a Latin term meaning 'seabird' and *immer* is from the Latin "immerses" which translates to 'submerged'. Another moniker for these birds is Great Northern Diver, which acknowledges their amazing underwater skills. There are five species of *Gavia*

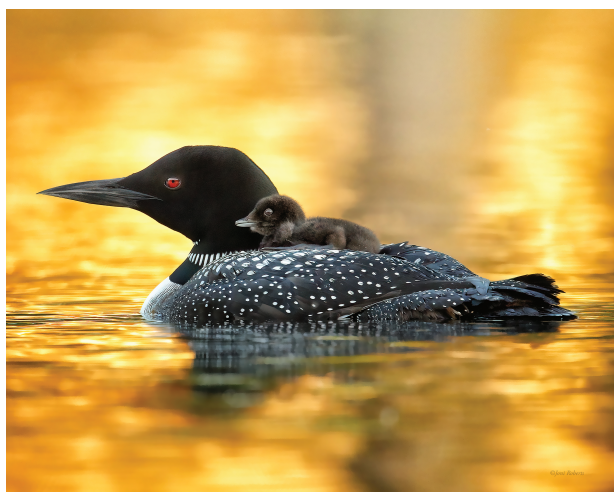
worldwide, all living above the equator, with the

common loon being by far the most frequent inhabitant of the Mitten State. A close relative, the red-throated loon, makes an occasional appearance in our area and can be identified by its burnt orange hued triangular throat patch, and small, narrow head.

Great Divers Indeed: When pursuing fish, a common loon can dart down to 200 foot-depths! They torpedo through the water with powerful thrusts of webbed feet and have solid bones which make them less buoyant than hollow-boned ducks. This skeleton contributes to common loons being

the heaviest of the *Gavia* species as they may tip the scales at over 13 pounds. Further, loons can spend an amazing eight minutes underwater, and rarely come to the surface without an aquatic animal in their beak.

Not So Ducky: Common loons resemble ducks in shape and behavior except for a very pointed bill that helps them to spear their prey and feet located further back on the body. They sport mostly black plumage with a grid-like pattern of white spots across the wings, a thick black necklace, smooth

Mysterious Disease Sickness, Kills Dogs in Northern Michigan

 GAYLORD - The Otsego County Animal Shelter animal shelter is warning of a canine disease spreading through the area, in which many dogs have become ill, and some have died.

Director of the Shelter, Melissa Fitzgerald, issued a public service announcement about a parvo-like disease that is making dogs sick in the area.

While the illness presents as parvo, Fitzgerald says. She posted this on Facebook.

There have been many dogs over the last month that have gotten sick with what appears to be parvo (throwing up, bloody stool). When taken to the vet the dogs are tested and the tests come back negative. Most of these dogs have passed within 3 days. These dogs are mostly under the age of 2. Some of the dogs were vaccinated.

The animal shelter has been in close contact with the vets in Gaylord, Traverse City, Grayling, Mancelona and Indian River trying to figure this out. We have also talked with the State Veterinarian, the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development and a necropsy was done at Michigan State University Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory in Lansing. No one has an answer. The best "guess" is that this is a strain of parvo.

These dogs are not in any one area of Otsego County. We have had reports from Vanderbilt, City of Gaylord, west of Gaylord and south of Gaylord.

We have not spoken to this until now because we really don't know anything. The only thing is to make sure your pets are vaccinated and at the first sign of illness get to the veterinarian.

What is Parvo?
 According to the Baker Institute for Animal Health, Canine parvovirus (CPV) is a highly contagious viral disease of dogs that commonly causes acute gastrointestinal illness in puppies. The disease most often strikes in

He was honored with the Petoskey Regional Chamber of Commerce's Community Enthusiast award in 2017.

Marty was a member of the Northern Michigan Ottawa Association and the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians.

Marty loved people dearly and people loved him dearly. He always had a smile on his face and had kind words for everyone. His positive outlook on life was infectious and he could always make you laugh. He was compassionate and caring and always willing to help anyone. He left this world a better

place and touched so many lives in a positive way.

Marty enjoyed life, attending tribal and non-tribal events, dining with the "Old Broads Club," golfing, watching sports, keeping the tribal community informed through Facebook, sharing his humor on Facebook, attending powwows, doing medical transportation for his family members and spending time with his family, friends and "work wives."

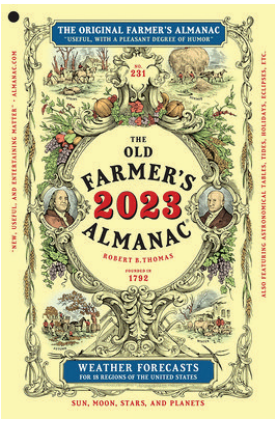

The Farmers' Almanac releases its winter predictions for this year

Summer is winding down and many people are excited about fall activities. However, some are also wondering what this winter will bring. Will it be snowy and cold? Or relatively dry and mild? The Farmers' Almanac just released its predictions for the 2022/2023 winter season. The editors claim they have been making accurate predictions since 1818 and many people trust their formula.



For those in the eastern and southern states, the Farmers' Almanac warns it will be a cold December and January. Luckily, February should see milder temperatures after a frigid January. They added, "Winter will feel unreasonably cold for readers in the Great Lakes region, especially in January. The north central states are forecast to experience extremely cold temperatures during mid-January; possibly 40 degrees below zero!"

2022-2023 WINTER PREDICTIONS

Those in the southern Plains may also see temperatures colder than what they're used to. However, if you live in

the Pacific Northwest or southwest, you will likely see normal temperatures and have a mild winter.

The Farmers' Almanac also predicts how much snow will arrive in the United States. In the first week of January, many states will see heavy snow especially the Rockies, across the Plains, and even as far south as Texas and Oklahoma.

In the East, heavy rain and snow are predicted during January 16-23, and may see those really cold temperatures. How do you feel about the upcoming snow and cold? Does your state usually get hit pretty hard in the winter months?

Gov. Whitmer Reminds Parents There is Still Time to Enroll Four-Year-Old Kids in Free Preschool Program

LANSING, Mich. – Governor Gretchen Whitmer and the Michigan Department of Education are encouraging parents of four-year-old children across Michigan to contact their local school districts or visit GreatStart-toQuality.org to explore about getting their children enrolled in a Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP)—Michigan's nationally recognized, state-funded preschool for four-year-olds.

"Every kid deserves a great start to get on track for long-term success, and that starts with preschool," said Governor Whitmer. "Access to high-quality preschool makes a huge difference for kids, increasing their kindergarten readiness, putting them on track for 3rd grade reading proficiency, and boosting eventual high school graduation rates. Since I took office, I am proud to have made bold, bipartisan investments in the Great Start Readiness Program, Michigan's free preschool program for four-year-olds, expanding it to serve 22,000 more kids by eliminating waiting lists. Getting this done will help kids in every region of our state, and I encourage parents to sign up for free preschool by visiting greatstarttoquality.org."

In 2021, Governor Whitmer announced a bold plan to expand GSRP to ensure more Michigan children

could get a great start to a quality education. Last summer, she signed into law the largest expansion of GSRP in the state's history—allowing Michigan to eliminate waiting lists and serve 22,000 more four-year-olds. This year, the governor continued to work with the legislature to take the next step in expansion and help recruit enough teachers and classrooms to serve all eligible children.

The expansion of GSRP increases the opportunity for more families to enroll their children in programs that will better prepare the youngsters for kindergarten. Children that attend GSRP are more likely to enter school ready to learn, read by third grade, and graduate from high school on time.

"Preschool helps develop children academically, physically, and socially," said State Superintendent Dr. Michael Rice. "A high-quality early education program like GSRP helps children prepare for kindergarten and success later in school and in adulthood. I strongly encourage local and intermediate school leaders to work with their communities to expand GSRP preschool to the maximum extent possible. An additional year of education at four years old is a research-based way to improve literacy, numeracy, and a wide range of outcomes for stu-

dents."

"We are excited that there was a bipartisan budget to support GSRP expansion across the state," said Rebecca Josephson-Gorinac, Director of Early Childhood Services, St. Clair County RESA. "The increase in funding provides access to more resources to help reach families, support staffing of classrooms, and teacher compensation. We are seeing an increase in parent interest in preschool. Parents value preschool. We're looking to expand and add three new programs in our community this year based on the number of applications we received."

The GSRP program meets all 10 quality benchmarks recommended by the National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER)—quality benchmarks such as having teacher credentials; low staff-child ratios; smaller class sizes; and a research-based curriculum.

Parents can apply for GSRP's 2022-2023 program year now! Parents can search for local GSRP programs through Michigan's Great Start to Quality website or apply directly through their local intermediate school district at <https://www.michigan.gov/mde/services/early-learners-and-care/gsrp/intermediate-school-district-search-tool>.

GSRP eligibility is primarily determined based on family household income (a family of four earning up to \$69,375 a year is eligible). However, other factors such as a diagnosed disability, parent education, and primary home language other than English may also be considered. The program is offered as part-day and full-day with child care before and after school available in many areas. Some programs also offer transportation to families.

"We want all families to have experiences in the highest quality programs available," said Cari O'Connor, Director of Early Childhood and Parent Programming, Montcalm Area Intermediate School District. "Through GSRP, we offer a high-quality experience and work to support healthy children in a whole child way. It's more than a program; it creates a community that wraps around the child and the family."

MDE worked with the advertising agency The Yaffe Group and DPTV to produce 30-second and 15-second public service announcement (PSA) videos to heighten awareness for the program. The videos are airing on Detroit PBS KIDS channel and The Michigan Learning Channel statewide.

pups between six and 20 weeks old, but older animals are sometimes also affected.

Symptoms can include lethargy, depression, and lack of appetite, followed by a sudden onset of high fever, vomiting, and diarrhea.

Treatment for parvo can vary and focuses on supportive care and management of symptoms. Often, hospitalization is necessary to receive IV fluids. Blood transfusions and antibiotics are also used in the treatment of parvo.

2022 Annual Labor Day Mackinac Bridge Walk - Monday, September 5

The Annual Labor Day Bridge Walk is BACK and a great tradition to close out the end of the summer of 2022! This popular annual event brings an influx of participation and excitement from guests who travel near and far to visit Mackinaw City and walk the Mackinac Bridge. We look forward to this annual state-wide tradition in the Straits of Mackinac and have included valuable information for you to better plan your bridge walk experience.

The Annual Mackinac Bridge Walk begins at 7:00 am from either the north end of the Bridge in St. Ignace or from the south end of the bridge in Mackinac City. The governor's party will start the walk. The bridge will be closed to public traffic from 6:30 am-noon on Labor Day, Monday, September 5th to accommodate the bridge walk.

This year we are thrilled to have local Cheboygan resident, Roger Kopernik, as our emcee in Mackinaw

City. Make sure to let him know if you have a birthday, anniversary, or another milestone that you are celebrating. Just before we count down to start the walk, we are fortunate to have vocalist, Sharolyn Matterink, a local Mackinaw City resident sing the National Anthem.

Participants will have three options to cross, outlined below:

Labor Day Bridge Walk Crossing Options

1. Starting from either end of the bridge and walking toward the center, turning around at the midpoint, and returning to the city they started from, where their transportation is located. The turnaround points will move toward the ends of the bridge beginning at 10 am, but walkers can walk at least a portion of the bridge if they start by 11:30 am. Walkers must be on the side of the bridge they wish to return to before 10 am.

2. Walking the entire length of the bridge start-

ing from either end. Those who choose this option must reach the midpoint before 10 am or they will be turned back. Anyone who walks the entire bridge must arrange their own transportation back to the side they started once the bridge reopens to public traffic at noon.

3. Crossing the bridge, starting from either end and then turning around and walking back to the side they started from. In this option, walkers will need to cross the midpoint on their return trip by 10 am or they will be turned back and need to find their own transportation back across the bridge after it reopens at noon.

Lake trout are important sports species

They prefer colder waters in summer; trolling anglers use spoons, flashers and flies

Prior to the introduction of salmon and non-native trout into the Great Lakes, lake trout were the alpha predators. Although they were once heavily parasitized by sea lampreys and have been supplanted in places by salmon, lake trout continue to be one the most important sport species in the Great Lakes, particularly in Superior and Huron.

Lake trout prefer cold water and are often found at significant depths, though they can be taken in relatively shallow water in spring and fall. For the most part, lakers are caught by trolling anglers using spoons, flashers and flies or cowbells and minnows, often near bottom. The establishment of zebra mussels in the Great Lakes and the subsequent water clarity has changed lake trout behavior and they are now being taken well up in the water column, often just subsurface. Reefs that extend high in

the water column in otherwise deep water - such as Standard Rock or areas around Isle Royal – produce well for jig fishermen.

Lake trout spawn in the fall, often on shoals and reefs but some migrate upstream creating angling opportunities on

piers, where anglers fishing with spawn, smelt or minnows on the bottom or casting with spoons can sometimes connect. Similarly, short-term fisheries are created in the drowned river mouths just inshore of the Great Lakes and in rivers, where lake trout often are caught incidentally by steelhead fishermen. In the winter months, anglers fishing deep water in Great Lakes bays – Grand Traverse Bay, for instance, or Keweenaw Bay – with spoons or jigs tipped with cut bait take lake trout through the ice.

A number of inland lakes have been stocked with lake trout or have natural populations that produce excellent fishing all year long, typically for those who are adept at Great Lakes tactics. Higgins, Elk, Torch and Crystal Lakes are among of the better-known inland lake trout waters.

Additional site restoration will continue the following week.

head, small ruby colored eyes, and a white underbelly. There is no sexual dimorphism as male and female loons look similar to one another except males are sometimes slightly larger. The common loon's feathers change dramatically between the breeding and non-breeding seasons. As a matter of fact, you probably wouldn't recognize the understated non-breeding version with its drab brown body and white face and neck.

Still Not Too Common: Although population numbers appear to be rising slightly, common loons still carry the conservation status of threatened in the Great Lakes State. Threatened species are defined as those that may become endangered if conservation efforts are not increased. Indeed, in Michigan it is estimated that we have only 500-700 nesting pairs of loons. Please do not disturb them by getting too close, especially when they are nesting.

Loon Rangers: To monitor populations, Michigan has an ongoing Natural Features Study on these birds and specially assigned citizens are known as Loon Rangers! Can I get a, "High-Ho-Silver, Away!" for them?

Loquacious Loons: Loons emit some of the most distinctive and recog-

nizable calls of all North American wildlife, and feature a variety of vocalizations. In fact, they produce four distinct calls (wail, yodel, hoot, and tremolo). The iconic wail is associated most with loons, and is a prolonged, haunting bellow that is used to signal their whereabouts to faraway mates. The yodel is an undulating shriek uttered by males only and means, "stay out of my territory!". The hoot is used to occasionally signal nearby family members. Finally, the tremolo, is a cackling sound uttered when they feel threatened.

Summer Love: Loons generally mate for life but will take another partner if one dies. In Michigan loons usually arrive in April and begin preparing their nest in May. Nests are constructed of contoured marsh vegetation in sheltered areas and the clutch size is one or two large brown eggs with black splotches. Males and females take turns incubating the eggs which hatch in 26-29 days. The adorable, fully-feathered, brownish gray puffballs begin swimming within hours of hatching.

Thanks for the Ride, Mom! One of the most unusual behaviors of common loons is that the chicks ride on their parents' backs. Two reasons for this piggy-back behavior are that it keeps the chicks warm and decreases predation from underwater hunters like snapping turtles and northern pike, and terrestrial predators like mink and fox. During the first week after hatching a

chick may spend up to 50% of its time getting chauffeured with a sharp decline of back-riding thereafter. However, we have observed chicks over half the size of the parent sneaking a lift if they can get away with it!

Bye, Bye Baby: It's quite ironic, however, that such nurturing parents often leave their chicks "in the dust" near the end of their first summer of existence. During September the loon parents fly off to separate parts of the country-usually the warmer areas of the Atlantic Ocean or Gulf of Mexico-with nary a thought for what might happen to the now three-month old chicks. The good news is that the youngsters, who have grown like weeds and are now almost the size of the parents, instinctively know to fly for warmer climes as well.

Long-in-the-Tooth Loons: As bird species go loons live a relatively long life. Indeed, Michigan boasts the oldest known loon pair in the world! The couple, named "ABJ" and "Fe," have nested in the U.P.'s Seney National Wildlife Refuge since 1997. Having been banded much earlier, the male, "ABJ," is 34-years-old while "Fe," the female, reaches a remarkable 35-years-old this summer! Close eyes are kept on this couple as each year Michigan conservationists celebrate their return. It's estimated that this dynamic duo has produced up to 40 "Yooper" loon chicks over their lifetime!

Piscatorial Palette: Loons have a somewhat

specialized diet including gobbling up crayfish and aquatic insects but definitely consume more fish than anything else. While teaching them how to hunt, parents feed the chicks for many weeks of their young lives.

Like a Drunken Sailor: Because their legs are further back than any other type of water bird, loons have a distinct disadvantage on land. They are incapable of walking upright and instead stagger and crawl on their bellies until they can reach water again. That explains why loons nest on vegetation very close to the water's edge in case they have to make a quick getaway in the presence of predators. Therefore, *Gavia* species spend their entire lives paddling, fishing, and loving, in the water. Their weight, however, makes it difficult for them to take flight and the birds often have to frantically run on the water's surface for up to 600 yards to accomplish that feat. Accordingly, you won't find loons nesting in small bodies of water.

Flying Phenom's: Once airborne, loons can fly up to 75 miles per hour and can amass hundreds of miles of flying distance without rest!

Ever-Changing Eyes: Interestingly, the common loons' eye color changes dramatically from a dull gray during winter to a piercing crimson in spring and summer. Ornithologists hypothesize that this may be for attracting mates or for better underwater vision in fresh water.

Looney Tunes: Although

the popular cartoon borrowed their name for the series, a loon character never appeared. Instead, a rabbit, duck, pig, cat, parakeet, and even a bumbling hunter graced the screen with names like Bugs, Daffy, Porky, Sylvester, Tweety, and Elmer. The goal was to, of course, have the viewer, "laughing like a loon!"

Legendary Loon Literature: A delightful children's book was written and illustrated by Michigan artists Kathy-jo Wargin and Gijsbert van Frankenhuyzen, respectively. It's titled, "The Legend of the Loon" with a theme of a grandmother's love for her grandchildren. It was published by popular Michigan-based book creators Sleeping Bear Press (sleepingbearpress.com).

An Avian Accident: A funny story comes our way from our Canadian cousins up north (but aren't most stories humorous from those crazy Canucks?).

Seems that their beloved dollar coin that was first minted in 1986, and sports a loon picture on the tail-side, was never meant to be. The initial intent for these coins, affectionately known as "loonies," was to have two voyagers in a canoe opposite Queen Elizabeth's' face. But the die for that design went missing at the last minute and the mint decided to slap on a picture of a loon instead. Today, many people—particularly hockey players—consider loonies to be good luck.

Those are some common loon characteristics about these not so common creatures. With good fortune you'll encounter one or more on the wonderful waters of the Wolverine State!

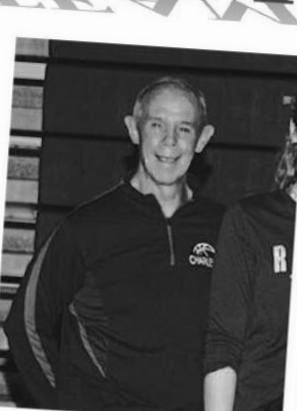

City votes to Temporarily Suspend Short Term Rental Operations

The Charlevoix City Council held a special meeting last Friday, April 3rd, to consider an ordinance restricting the use, operation and licensing of lodging establishments within the City. The virtual meeting was held online and by phone via Zoom with approximately 40 people participating. City Manager Mark Heydlauff and City Attorney Scott Howard first presented the emergency ordinance to council members to "Temporarily Suspend Short Term Rental Operations during the State of Emergency" in an effort to limit the spread of COVID-19. After much discussion, Council members directed the City Attorney to make

some changes to the proposed ordinance as initially presented, causing the Council to hold a second meeting the following day, Saturday, April 4th. The revisions included restricting the use of hotels and motels, and ensures travelers staying at these establishments are there for essential services. Further, the ordinance requires all essential businesses comply with health and sanitation practices outlined by the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. City Mayor Luther Kurtz pointed out that Charlevoix values its seasonal residents, and the city is trying to keep everyone safe. The City Attorney informed Council members that the city has

both the right and obligation to protect the health, safety, and welfare of its citizenry and the ordinance is absolutely an important step towards protecting its residents. Excepted from the ban are rental units used to house economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals, individuals who need assistance as a result of the emergency, and people with disabilities. Rentals may also be used to house persons working in COVID-19 mitigation and containment efforts and critical infrastructure workers so long as they comply with the Governor's executive orders relating to COVID-19. The Charlevoix City Council feels that continu-

ing to allow short term rentals would promote the movement of people, exacerbating the spread of COVID-19. And adoption of the Emergency Ordinance was necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens. While several meeting attendees voiced concern over enforcement of the ordinance, it ultimately was approved with a lone dissenting vote cast by Councilman Greg Bryan. The ordinance aligns with Governor Whitmer's executive order issued on March 23rd and will be in effect for 61 days or until the governor's executive order, or subsequent orders, is lifted, whichever comes first.

All staff of the Belleaire and East Jordan Family Health Centers will continue to strictly adhere to PPE, social distancing and handwashing guidelines, both at work and home, to mitigate the spread of the COVID-19 virus. 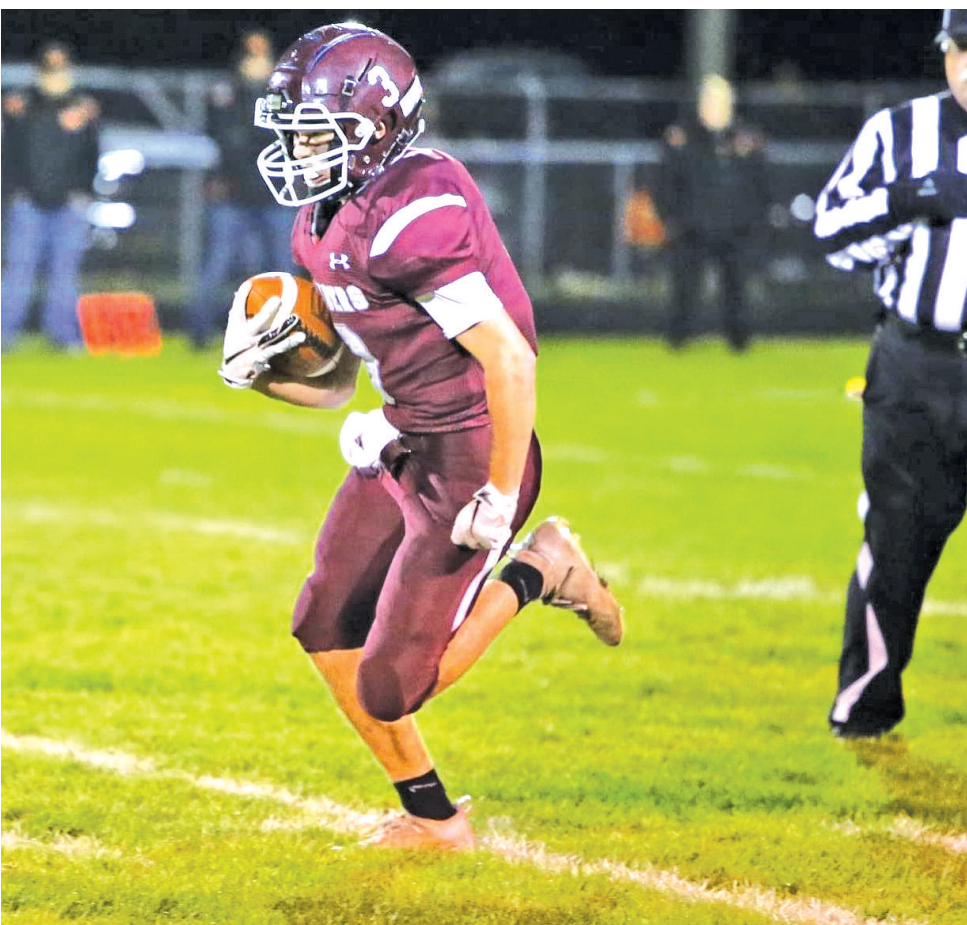

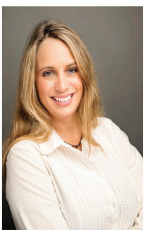
