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Out of more than 50 applications, Boots for Kids, Homestretch Nonprofit Housing Corporation, Hand2Hand, Cheboygan County Habitat for Humanity, and Northern Michigan Equine Therapy came out on top as the 2022 4Front Foundation grant recipients.

"It's an honor to be able to give back to the community and to receive so many grant applications for our first grant cycle," said 4Front Foundation Executive Director, Rachel Hunter. "Our committee had some tough decisions to make but feel very fortu-



nate to be able to help these five recipients continue their missions in our communities.

Boots for Kids received \$5.500. The funds will assist with continuing their mission of providing children of families who struggle economically throughout the Greater Grand Traverse area with winter boots and clothing.

Homestretch Nonprofit Housing Corporation received \$9,000. They provide affordable housing options for persons of low and moderate income and will be using the money to purchase and renovate new office space so they can expand their team and in return expand outreach.

Hand2Hand received \$5,000 and will also be using the money toward their overall mission that delivers nutritious food to students when they are not in school.

Cheboygan County Habitat for Humanity received \$2,500 and will be using their grant toward new, reusable hospice ramps that will, in part, be built by high school students.

Northern Michigan Equine Therapy received \$3,000 and will use these funds to continue their mission of improving the lives of those impacted by physical disabilities and mental health needs through the healing power of horses.

four-county board of health. The final vote took place during the Dec. 6 public meeting. "I am excited to add Dan

Thorell as our new health officer and department administrator for the HDNW," said Scott Hankins, Board of Health Chair. "Dan is a calm, responsible, 'common sense' director, and we look forward to a long relationship with him as our director. Dan is being promoted from within the HDNW and is well known by the employees. This should make for a smooth transition for everyone, and I believe Dan is the right person for this position."

Prior to becoming interim health officer, Thorell served as the agency's deputy health officer. He succeeded Lisa Peacock, whose resignation took effect the day Thorell moved into the top spot. The temporary appointment allowed the board time to work with Thorell and consider their approach to permanently filling the position.

Over the months, the board members initiated discussions with Thorell on whether there was shared interest in making his leadership more permanent. Since September, the board has performed a background check, interviewed Thorell, and negotiated a contract.


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Lee M (Antaya) Cloyd, 66

SNOW REMOVAL PROGRAM FOR SENIORS

This program provides limited support for Snow Removal though an income qualifying voucher system only for seniors, 60 years of age and older, who are fulltime Charlevoix County residents/homeowners. Seniors 60 years or older who are full-time Charlevoix County residents/homeowners must complete the Snow Removal Self Declaration Form, return it to the Charlevoix County COA along with the latest Income Tax Reporting Form 1040 or 1040A as proof of total household income and proof of residency in the form of a copy of property taxes or rental agreement.

First, some background. Scott grew up in Flint, went to schools there, then on to Lansing Community College, then Western Michigan, focusing on elementary education, with history and communications majors

 $Out \ of \ college \ Scott \ and$ his wife, Jane, initially moved to Greensboro, N.C.,

and he was employed at Elon College Home for Boys and Girls, then began as Program Director of the Boys and Girls Club and helping inner-city kids, with life skills, social and educational opportunities. These "kids" are now in their 30s and 40s and some still remain in touch with Scott.

In time, Scott purchased an antique shop and also became a licensed auctioneer, which as mentioned above, he still does, especially assisting nonprofits to raise critically needed funds.

An very helpful book is Dale Carnegie's enduring classic, How to Win Friends and

People, which was written in 1936 and still holds true. It is a valuable classic.

Like most people, I love the theory that simple is sensible. That's exactly what How to Win Friends is, the basics of leadership, and it makes so much sense. Actually, it makes even more sense today than when it was written more than 80 years ago.

I'll mention below some of the "Golden Rules" that are Carnegie's principles. These were keys to success then, always have been, and just think how vital they are now in our crazy-busy world when so many of us have unending info coming at us via our smart-phone,

computer, TV and radio news, and work. What would I like to see?

I'd like us taking the time to have regular conversations with our customers and, equally important, with our team members. Our team members are our colleagues and are our internal clients.

To be successful consistently, year after year, we must make conversations with our team members a top priority - quality twoway conversations that show a genuine appreciation for and interest in their ideas and success.

Think about these Golden Rules offered by Dale Carnegie, and these are just some, in random order, as each is important:

- Begin in a friendly way
- Be encouraging
- Smile
- Use a person's name

· Give honest, sincere appreciation

- · Be genuinely interested in other people
- · Ask good questions and

be an attentive listener • Encourage others to

share about themselves and their thoughts and feelings · Help others feel impor-

tant, and do it sincerely · Show respect for an-

other person's opinions

· Let others do a great deal of the talking

• Let people feel the ideas are theirs

 Commit to understand what others think and their reasoning

To me, these are the ABCs of leadership, the fundamentals. If we abide by these rules, with sincerity, because we genuinely care about our team members and are not self-focused, those on our team will very likely look up to us and be motivated to do their very best work, going the extra mile when needed.

We must bear in mind the importance of asking open-ended questions, asking our team members for their ideas, opinions, input, and feedback. We'll learn a wealth of valuable information and our colleagues will feel appreciated.

There is the very effective approach of leadership by questioning. For exam ple, when someone asks what action should be taken, ask that person what she feels are the options and what she recommends and why. Leadership by questioning helps others learn and grow, which is our responsibility as a leader.

While business is complicated, and managing our time and attention are challenging, I believe that leadership is basic, it's common sense: it's about our earning the respect, trust and appreciation of our team members.

Two key principles: A manager likes to talk, a leader likes to listen, and

A manager thinks first about numbers, while a leader thinks first about peo ple

I hope these "Golden Rules" ring true to you, as they do for me, even more so in today's world.

Youth Grants Awarded, Mental Health Focus

The Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) of the Charlevoix County Community Foundation responded to requests from nonprofit partners in November. Thanks to donors who look to the Community Foundation to make a difference close to home. grants have been awarded primarily to nonprofits who will focus in the areas of youth mental health and school atmosphere. In all, \$78,263 was awarded during the Youth Needs grant cycle.

Earlier this year, the YAC conducted their Youth Needs Assessment, which they update every 3 years by surveying their peers in grades 7 through 12 about their top concerns and stressors, their top positive influences, and about their school environments. This year's top concerns included many, like anxiety, depression, self-esteem, peer pressure, eating disorders, family issues, and excessive social media, that fit into the broad category of youth mental health. These and other top concerns also point to a need for improvement of the school atmosphere.

Results from the Youth Needs Assessment led the YAC to identify their priorities for grant funding in the areas of youth mental health and school atmosphere. This year, they were also able to be more specific about what types of projects and programs they were seeking to fund. Their goals are to specifically decrease stigma and increase education around youth mental health, while also increasing access to direct mental health services for youth. Additionally, they seek to impact their school atmosphere by spending grant dollars to

help increase acceptance and belonging at school, and/or decreasing schoolrelated stress.

The YAC was pleased to see an increase in the number of proposals overall and those specifically addressing priority areas. Mailev Hamilton, YAC President and senior at East Jordan High School, stated, "It was reassuring to see so many organizations in the community also see the need for youth mental health services and have programs established to respond to that need. Some of the organizations doing that work are familiar to us, but we were also able to see proposals and fund newer organizations focused on youth. We are excited to see how the grants we've made this cycle will positively impact youth in our county.

Megan Havrilla DeHoog, C3F's new Youth Advancement staff person, remarked on her first experience facilitating the Youth Needs grant cycle, saying, "I'm consistently inspired by the work that gets done when we center the voices of young people. The YAC is a shining example of such an opportunity. It was a privilege to watch the YAC advocate for their peers and make grant awards that will create ripples of change in

their communities.' Through this cycle, the YAC funded projects like the Family Dinner Book Club at the Boyne District Library, which will allow families to read and learn together about mental health topics such as anxiety, bullying, the bodyemotion connection, and mindfulness. They also supported the Charlevoix Kiwanis Youth Foundation's book vending machine in Charlevoix Elementary school, which improves school atmosphere by encouraging and rewarding kindness, helpfulness, and camaraderie among students.

Other school programs include the WAI-IAM, Inc. STR8TALK presentations that teach students about decision-making, and Great Lakes Center for the Arts' Human[kind] Cinema Series that will show a film and coordinate discussion around the topics presented in the film.

Youth mental health will also get a boost, with grants being awarded to Northern Michigan Equine Therapy for technology and software upgrades that will enable them to undertake a mental health awareness campaign, to Child and Family Services for mental health support for youth in foster care, to Planned Parenthood for their IN*clued Project to empower LGBTQ+ youth in advocating for themselves and their health and mental health, and to the Women's Resource Center for support of their counseling services. These grants help the organizations to build capacity to expand their programming to reach more people.

While the primary focus of this cycle was on the two priority areas, other grants were also awarded including to the Beaver Island Historical Society for their summer Kid's Camp program, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Northwestern Michigan to help them create an Advocacy Specialist position, and to Girl Scouts of Michigan Shore to Shore to expand the program in Charlevoix County as well as conduct some troop leader training

around mental health first aid.

Finally, outdoor recreation is getting a boost with grants to Camp Daggett for new campout equipment, to the Baseball-Softball Fields of Boyne for a pitcher's mound and bases for the waterfront field in Boyne City, and to Boyne Area Skate Park for the design phase.

A charitable organization dedicated to improving and enriching life in the area, the Charlevoix County Community Foundation accepts gifts from individuals, families, businesses and civic groups and manages them as permanent endowments. While a portion of the funds are utilized to support grantmaking, the principal of the endowment continues to grow, providing ongoing charitable capital to benefit Charlevoix County's residents-now and in the future.

The next grant cycle will focus on Environment, Land Use, and Recreation projects. Applications will become available in early January and will be due by Wednesday, March 1, 2023. Why do we hang stockings by the fireplace?

Some Christmas traditions date back many centuries

The Christmas tree is a longstanding tradition that goes back many centuries. Christmas trees are known to have been popular in Germany as far back as the sixteenth century, in fact. The tree's association with Christmas seems to have evolved from the late Middle Ages when Germans and Scandinavians placed evergreens inside their homes to show their hope in the forthcoming spring.

Evergreens, since they remained green during the long winters, had long represented the idea of long life or eternal life, and it's easy to see how that symbol translated to Christianity and the promise of eternal life through Jesus the Son of God.

There is historical evidence to support the belief that it was Protestant reformer Martin Luther who first added lighted candles to the Christmas tree. According to legend, he was walking toward home one winter evening preparing a sermon in his head when he was awed by the brilliance of stars twinkling amid the ubiquitous evergreens. To recapture the scene for his family, he cut down an evergreen and brought it into the main room of his house and placed lighted candles on the tree. Soon, others were doing the same during subsequent Christmas seasons and the tradition spread throughout Germany and Europe.

The tradition of Christmas trees in the U.S. can likely be traced to the German immigrants who came to Pennsylvania. Christmas trees have been sold commercially in the U.S. since

trees each year; 25 percent of them are from the nation's 5,000 choose-and-cut farms.

• America's official national Christmas tree is located in King's Canyon National Park in California. The tree, a giant sequoia called the "General Grant Tree," is over 300 feet high. It was made the official Christmas tree in 1925.

The first commercial Christmas card sold was designed by London artist John Calcott Horsley in December of 1842. He was hired by Sir Henry Cole, a wealthy British businessman, to design a card that showed people feeding and clothing the poor with another picture of a Christmas party. The first Christmas card said, "Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to you." Of the original 1,000 cards he printed for Sir Henry Cole, only one exists today.

• An average household in America will mail out 28 Christmas cards each year and see 28 eight cards return in their place.

Christmas caroling began as an old English custom called Wassailing toasting neighbors to a long and healthy life. Some famous people who were born on Christmas day: Sir Isaac Newton (1642); Humphrey Bogart (1899); Rod Serling (1924); Little Richard (1932); Ken Stabler (1945); Jimmy Buffet (1946); Larry Csonka (1946); Sissy Spacek (1949); Ricky Henderson (1958). Isabella Whitcomb of Lake City isn't famous but she was also born on Christmas day in 2006 and her parents Dane and Amanda certainly believe she's special. Ironically, it's nearly certain Jesus himself was not born on Dec. 25. That date for the celebration of the birth of the Savior was chosen by the **Emperor Constantine** around the year 335 A.D. because on that same day the pagan festival Saturnalia revolving around the Winter Solstice and the start of a new year was held. Jesus was likely born in the spring, sometime between March 21 and May 20 by our calendar. During the Christmas buying season, Visa cards alone are used an average of 5,340 times every minute in the United States. Although many believe the Friday after Thanksgiving is the busiest shopping day of the year, it is not. It is the fifth to tenth busiest day. The Friday and Saturday before Christmas are the two busiest shopping days of the year.

The story goes that Saint Nicholas threw three bags of gold into the fireplace chimney one Christmas Eve and the gold landed into the stockings drying by the fire. Thus began the tradition of putting presents into Christmas stockings.

• If you love Dickens' classic "A Christmas Carol," you'll find this interesting. Before settling on the name of Tiny Tim for his character, three other alliterative names were considered by the author: Little Larry, Puny Pete, and Small Sam.

• According to the National Christmas Tree Association, Americans buy 37.1 million real Christmas • During the Christmas/Hanukkah season, more than 1.76 billion candy canes will be made.

• A traditional Christmas dinner in early England was the head of a pig prepared with mustard.

• The tradition of Christmas lights dates back to when Christians were persecuted for saying Mass. A simple candle in the window meant that Mass would be celebrated there that night. remarks can be viewed here and read below:

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



Ramblers open season with 1-1 record




