NLEA Urges Area to Challenge FCC and State Broadband Maps through Interactive Portal

Challenges must be submitted by January 13

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has released a new National Broadband Map. Since highspeed internet is not accessible to many rural businesses and homes in Antrim, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, and Emmet Counties, the Northern Lakes Economic Alliance (NLEA) is urging residents in its four counties to check their home and/or business

addresses on the preliminary broadband map (see following) to ensure it accurately reflects their level of internet access as well as local units of government to coordinate activities with their county administrative and GIS team to review and file bulk challenges to the map.

The NLEA office and Michigan High-Speed Internet Office personnel are working to challenge the map too, but it's important for everyone across our re-

gion to know how to view and challenge the map to possibly secure future Federal funding for high-speed Internet. To ensure an accurate

map is used for funding decisions, all challenges must be submitted by January 13, "The lack of FAST Inter-

net services is a steep challenge confronting businesses, residents, and students in Northern Michigan. The devastating COVID-19 pandemic demon-

strated to Northern Michiganders that having fast Internet access helped maintain our economy, helped to continue family and school-to-home communications, and helped life in our region to achieve as near a sense of normalcy as possible," said Eric Grandstaff, NLEA Broadband Consortium Staff Specialist and Consultant

What has been discovered during and after the pandemic is that the development of the region's

mostly-rural broadband ("Internet") infrastructure still lags behind not only more-populated areas of Michigan, but that Michigan itself is in the bottom 15% of states with rural Internet access. Maps that have been drawn were assembled by a group under contract to the Michigan State Government, but those maps are far from accurate. Therefore, the FCC is providing residents and businesses with an opportu-





COVERT PRESERVE INVASIVE SPECIES WORKDAY

Saturday, January 14/ 10:00 - 2:00pm with a carpool leaving the Viewlands at 9:15

Help us remove invasive shrubs from the Covert Nature Preserve near Walloon Lake in Resort Township. An ornamental shrub turned invasive species has gotten out of control and spread into the nature preserve, choking out native vegetation and reducing biodiversity. We will be cutting the barberry bushes down and applying herbicide to their stumps so that they don't grow back. We will work if there is snow on the ground, but not if it is snowing or raining. Come prepared for the weather with work gloves and snow pants, and boots that can handle a few inches of soggy terrain. Barberry bushes have small, needle like spines so gloves are essential to prevent splinters. Terrain is hilly and there are no trails so if there is snow on the ground, we will be hiking through it.

LSSU's 2023 List of Banished Words

We Kid You Not: GOAT Tops Inflection Point, Quiet Quitting, and Gaslighting As Greatest of All Time Words and Terms That Lake Superior State University Banishes for 2023

Sault Ste. Marie, MI — Stop resorting to imprecise, trite, and meaningless words and terms of seeming convenience! You're taking the lazy way out and only confusing matters by over-relying on inexact, stale, and inane communication!

Language monitors across the country and around the world decried the decrepitude and futility of basic methods to impart information in their mockserious entries for Lake Superior State University's annual tongue-in-cheek Banished Words List. LSSU announces the results of the yearly compendium on Dec. 31 to start the New Year on the right foot, er, tongue.

The vast majority of the 1,500-plus nominations of words and terms for banishment for misuse, overuse, and uselessness for 2023 reveled and wallowed in the erosion of fundamental expression.

Ranked No. 1 as the best of the worst: GOAT, acronym for Greatest of All Time. The many nominators didn't have to be physicists or grammarians to determine the literal impossibility and technical vagueness of this wannabe superlative. Yet it's bestowed on everyone from Olympic gold medalists to Jeopardy! champions, as one muckraker playfully deplored. Meanwhile, other naysayers remarked on social media posts that brandish a photo of, for instance, multiple cricket players or soccer stars with a caption about several GOATs in one frame.

"Words and terms matter. Or at least they should. Especially those that stem from the casual or causal. That's what nominators near and far noticed, and our contest judges from the LSSU School of Arts and Letters agreed," said Peter Szatmary, executive director of marketing and communications at Lake State.

"They veritably bleated their disapproval about the attempted nonpareil of GOAT because the supposed designation becomes an actual misnomer. The singularity of 'greatest of all time' cannot happen, no way, no how. And instead of

being selectively administered, it's readily conferred. Remember Groucho Marx's line about not wanting to join a club that would accept him as member?

"The nine additional words and terms banished for 2023—from new no-nos 'inflection point' at No. 2 and 'gaslighting' at No. 4 to repeat offenders 'amazing' at No. 6 and 'It is what it is' at No. 10-also fall somewhere on the spectrum between specious and tired. They're empty as balderdash or diluted through oversaturation. Be careful be more careful—with buzzwords and jargon."

LSSU has compiled an annual Banished Words List since 1976, and later copyrighted the concept, to uphold, protect, and support excellence in language by encouraging avoidance of words and terms that are overworked, redundant, oxymoronic, clichéd, illogical, nonsensical-and otherwise ineffective, baffling, or irritating.

Over the decades, Lake State has received tens of thousands of nominations for the list, which now totals more than 1,000 entries. Examples of the winners (or should that be losers?) to make the yearly compilation: "detente," "surely," "classic," "bromance," and "COVID-19," plus "wrap my head around," "user friendly," "at this point in time," "not so much," and "viable alternative." The Banished Words List has become such a cultural phenomenon that comedian George Carlin submitted an entry that made the annals in 1994: "baddaboom, baddabing.

This year, nominations came from most major U.S. cities and many U.S. states, plus Australia, New Zealand, France, Italy, Portugal, England, Northern Ireland, Scotland, the Netherlands, Belgium, the Czech Republic, India, China, Namibia, South Africa, Nigeria, American Samoa, Malaysia, the British Virgin Islands, Trinidad and Tobago, and throughout Canada.

Here are the list of the banished words and terms for 2023 and the reasons for their banishment:

1. GOAT

TIONS

The acronym for Greatest of All Time gets the goat of petitioners and judges for overuse, misuse, and uselessness. "Applied to everyone and everything from athletes to chicken wings," an objector declared. "How can anyone or anything be the GOAT, anyway?" Records fall; time continues. Some sprinkle GOAT like table salt on "anyone who's really good." Another wordsmith: ironically, "goat" once suggested something unsuccessful; now, GOAT is an indiscriminate flaunt.

2. Inflection point Mathematical term that entered everyday parlance and lost its original meaning. This year's version of "pivot," banished in 2021. "Chronic throat-clearing from historians, journalists, scientists, or politicians. Its ubiquity has driven me to an inflection point of throwing soft objects about whenever I hear it," a quipster recounted. "Inflection point has reached its saturation point and point of departure," proclaimed another. "Pretentious way to say turning point." Overuse

and misuse. 3. Quiet quitting

Trendy but inaccurate. Not an employee who inconspicuously resigns. Instead, an employee who completes the minimum requirements for a position. Some nominator reasons: "normal job performance," "fancy way of saying 'work to rule," "nothing more than companies complaining about workers refusing to be exploited," "it's not a new phenomenon; it's burnout, ennui, boredom, disengagement." On the precipice for next year's Banished Words List as well for ongoing misuse and overuse.

4. Gaslighting

Nominators are not crazy by arguing that overuse disconnects the term from the real concern it has identified in the past: dangerous psychological manipulation that causes victims to distrust their thoughts, feelings, memories, or perception of reality. Others cited misuse: an incorrect catchall to refer generally to conflict or disagreement. It's too obscure of a reference to begin with, avowed sundry critics, alluding to the 1938 play and 1940/44 movies.

5. Moving forward Misuse, overuse, and uselessness. "Where else would we go?" wondered a sagesince we can't, in fact, travel backward in time. "May also refer to 'get my way,' as in, 'How can we move forward?' Well, guess what? Sometimes you can't," another wit stated. Politicians and bosses often wield it for "semantic legitimacy" of self-interest, evasion, or disingenuousness. Its next of kin, "going forward,"

ceived votes. 6. Amazing

"Not everything is amazing; and when you think about it, very little is," a dissenter explained. "This glorious word should be reserved for that which is dazzling, moving, or awe-inspiring," to paraphrase another, "like the divine face of a newborn." Initially banished for misuse, overuse, and uselessness in 2012. Its cyclical return mandates further nixing of the "generic," "banal and hollow" modifier—a "worn-out adjective from people short on vocabulary."

7. Does that make sense? Submitters rejected the desire, perhaps demand, for clarification or affirmation as filler, insecurity, and passive aggression. "Why say it, if you must ask? It just doesn't make sense!" tsktsked one. In this call for reassurance or act of false modesty, enquirers warp respondents into "co-conspirators." deduced another. Needy, scheming, and/or cynical. Let me be clear, judges opined: Always make sense; don't think aloud or play games! Misuse, overuse, and uselessness 8. Irregardless

Sleuth confession: "It makes my hair hurt." As well it should—because it's not a word. At most, it's a nonstandard word, per some dictionaries. "Regardless" suffices. Opponents disqualified it as a double negative. One conveyed that the prefix "ir" + "regardless" = redundancy. "Take 'regardless' and dress it up for emphasis, showcasing your command of nonexistent words," excoriated an exasperated correspondent,

adding, "Why isn't this on your list?" Misuse. 9. Absolutely

Banished in 1996, but deserves a repeat nope given its overuse. Usurped the simple "yes," laments a contributor. Another condemned it as "the current default to express agreement, endemically present on TV in one-on-one interviews." Frequently "said too loudly by annoying people who think they're better than you," bemoaned an aggrieved observer. "Sounds like it comes with a guarantee when that may not be the case," cautioned a wary watchdog.

10. It is what it is Banished in 2008 for overuse, misuse, and uselessness: "pointless," "cop-out," "Only Yogi Berra should be allowed to utter such a circumlocution." Its resurgence prompted these insights: "Well, duh." "No kidding." "Of course it is what it is! What else would it be? It would be weird if it wasn't what it wasn't.' "Tautology." "Adds no value." "Verbal crutch." "Excuse not to deal with reality or accept responsibility." "Dismissive, borderline rude."

"Our linguists, editors, and philosophers, comics, gatekeepers, and pundits didn't succumb to quiet quitting when laboring over rife miscommunication. Rather, they turned in discerning opinions about rampant verbal and written blunders with equal parts amusement, despair, and outrage. But our nominators insisted, and our Arts and Letters faculty judges concurred, that to decree the Banished Words List 2023 as the GOAT is tantamount to gaslighting. Does that make sense?" said LSSU President Dr. Rodney S. Hanley. "Irregardless, moving forward, it is what it is: an absolutely amazing inflection point of purposeless and ineptitude that overtakes so many mouths and fingers.

nity to "challenge" the maps.

Once maps are successfully challenged and "corrected," the amended areas can become eligible for federal funding given to the states to construct or upgrade new areas of Internet service.

The Broadband Maps assembled by the FCC and the Michigan High-Speed Internet Office can be challenged in two ways:

Individual residents, home-based businesses, and businesses located in Northern Michigan can file an individual "challenge"

through an FCC Website. Local Units of Government (Townships, Villages, Tribal authorities, and Counties) may challenge large tract swathes of the FCC maps. While these maps purportedly show some level of Internet services, in many cases, no services (or no fast services) are available. A process for these units to declare a challenge follows in this story.

RESIDENTIAL, HOME-

BASED BUSINESSES, AND BUSINESS LOCA-

With few exceptions that exist in cities and villages of Northern Michigan, large numbers of homes, home-based businesses, and brick-and-mortar businesses are without adequate, AFFORDABLE broadband services.

The FCC and the State of Michigan have map-surveyed the entire state of Michigan and have drawn source maps of where highspeed services exist. In reviewing the maps, many residents, businesses, and others have found that no adequate, affordable options are actually available. The NLEA has found, additionally, that while many companies have claimed to currently provide Internet residential services, the facts are that residential Internet service for the home for many is non-existent. Furthermore, those services that may claim to be available via cellular towers, fiber optic cable services and satellite companies have tied high monthly costs and marginal speeds to them (especially in "sending" or "up linking" large amounts of information, including home video

services, video meetings, or remote learning classes for area K-12 and college stu-

WHAT YOU CAN DO Here's how residents and business owners can access the FCC broadband map:

Visit broadbandmap.fcc.gov/ho me, type in an address, and see if the reported coverage is accurate. You can access the site from a computer or a mobile device.

Residents can submit a challenge by clicking "Location Challenge" if the location of their home or business is missing or incorrect, or "Availability Challenge" if the internet service information is incorrect.

Residents should visit the website of any internet service provider that claims to serve their location and use the website's "Check Availability" or similar tool to determine if the provider can serve their location.

If the provider does not service the location, a screenshot of their website can be submitted to the FCC as evidence for an Availability Challenge.

If you have contacted an internet service provider and have been told that

service is not available to your location or at a cost beyond their standard service activation fees, you should consider an "Availability Challenge" and provide any supporting information you may have.

For more detailed instructions, consumers can find directions on how to file an availability challenge using the new map here.

WHAT LOCAL UNITS OF GOVERNMENT CAN DO

The FCC allows local governments, tribal governments, and other stakeholders to file bulk challenges for multiple locations on behalf of their communities. Governmental entities can access the underlying broadband serviceable location fabric that forms the foundation for the address locations on the map. Data can be downloaded here for various geographies by speed for comparison.

The Michigan High-Speed Internet Office is developing several methodologies that it will use to identify errors on the FCC map and file bulk challenges. Those methodologies will be applied statewide to ensure we are

able to find all potential issues with the map and make these known to the

Additionally, the NLEA is encouraging consumers, communities, and any others with a stake in broadband availability to submit challenges to the FCC map if a discrepancy is found. Having an accurate FCC map will ensure that Michigan receives its equitable share of federal funding to achieve broadband availability for all Michiganders.

To ensure an accurate map is used for funding decisions, all challenges must be submitted by January 13, 2023.

The NLEA urgently requests all Northern Michigan residents and businesses go to the FCC webpage to view purported Internet services. If residents do not have access to Internet, the NLEA encourages them to utilize local libraries and their public-use computers to file a possible challenge. 


GAYLORD ST. MARY

The Ramblers traveled to take on Kalkaska on Friday, January 6. The Ramblers played in their first game since their Upper Peninsula road trip before the New Year.



MHSAA prepares schools for medical emergencies

When Buffalo Bills safety Damar Hamlin went into cardiac arrest and had to be resuscitated in the midst of a nationally televised football game it shook up athletes and their families throughout the nation.

It was a routine tackle, one that occurs regularly on football fields in Michigan and throughout the country that led to the lifethreatening medical emergency. The outcome was anything but routine, fueling discussions nationwide about the risks associated with sports, as

well as reminders about the importance of emergency preparation for competitions and training "It's important that fam-

ilies know schools are certainly doing the things necessary to prepare for those kinds of events," said Geoff Kimmerly, communications director for the Michigan High School Athletic Association. "I think what (Monday) showed is why the prep we

have is so important." Varsity high school coaches in Michigan have been required to have a

current CPR certification since 2015. At the beginning of the 2022-23 academic year, MHSAA extended the requirement for freshman and junior varsity head coaches as Automated external de-

fibrillators, or AEDs, which use an electrical current to help the heart return to a normal rhythm, are not required. but more and more schools have added one or more devices to their emergency plans in recent years. Coaches aren't required to undergo AED

training, but it's often part of CPR training and the devices themselves offer step-by-step instructions.

"A lot of schools never take the AED off the wall before needing a new one; they never have to put that training into place, but for those instances, those people will be ready," Kimmerly said.

Beyond trained coaches, most school districts employ or contract athletic trainers through local health systems. They help come up with and practice emergency action plans, and are typically on hand

during games and training sessions.

While rare, a handful of medical emergencies have occurred in Michigan in recent years. One is 2018 and another last year. An emergency physician watching the game from crowd provided aid to the student, while the athletic director grabbed one of the school's AEDs.

HOW CAN TWO SIMILAR HOMES VARY IN PRICE BY MORE THAN \$10,000?

Forgetting, for a moment, the interior improvements that set one home apart from another, there are exterior factors that also influence price. For instance, homes on primary ingress and egress streets-(that is, the main streets that lead in and out of a tract)-generally appreciate more slowly than those within the tract that are not on primary streets.

Primary ingress/egress streets generate more traffic and are therefore, generally less desirable. Thus, they have lower prices.

Within a tract, a home on a cul-de-sac may generate a higher price for the same reason-less traffic. Cul-de-sacs are frequently like a maze and they discourage drive-throughs, which is, of course, a definite benefit to residential pri-

Even properties on one side of a street can be worth more than a similar property across from it. Why? Certain communities, because of their name, are more prestigious than others. Beverly Hills, California, of course, is one. It is known worldwide for its high-end shopping, expensive housing and impeccable name. In sections where Beverly Hills is divided from other cities and/or communities by a street, the homes on the Beverly Hills side of the avenue

command a higher price than those in the non-Beverly Hills city across from it.

Existing homes may differ radically in price for another reason-one homeowner wants to sell, and the other has to sell. The motivation for each is quite different, and so may be the pricing strategies.

Some other factors that influence price: What commercial developments are adjacent to the tract? How (un)desirable are they? And, don't forget supply and demand.

The wise buyer checks one other thing-a community's master plan. This is a must, especially if a tract (or home) is surrounded by vacant land. Most communities have one. It is usually drawn up by planners within the city of county and approved by a local planning commission. Find out what is going to be built nearby and determine how it might impact the value of the tract. All this, of course, takes time and homework. But, it is well worth it, especially when you consider that the purchase of a home is usually going to be the largest, single financial investment most people make

in a lifetime.
