Chip Hansen Announces Retirement from Charlevoix County Community Foundation



Chip Hansen has served as the President of the Charlevoix County Community Foundation since July 2010. He has announced that he will retire at the end

After serving as the Community Foundation's President for the past 13 years, Chip Hansen has announced that he will retire at the end of April 2023.

During Hansen's tenure as President, the assets of the Community Foundation grew from \$19.4 million in July 2010 to more than \$55 million today. The number of charitable funds has grown to 330. Total grants and scholarships have increased from \$1 million to more than \$2.5 million annually. More than 80 Legacy Society members have been added as well, and these future gifts will ensure that the Community Foundation will continue to work at the intersection of resources and opportunity well into the future. He has expanded the role of the Community Foundation as a visible and engaged leader in the community locally, while also enriching the field of philanthropy regionally and statewide. Along with others, Hansen

organized a group of regional community foundation leaders who meet quarterly to share resources and ideas. He has served on several Council of Michigan Foundation (CMF) planning committees and is currently serving as one of four co-chairs of CMF's 50th Anniversary Committee. "Chip has been a dedicated and faithful advocate for all of us in Charlevoix County. His tire-

Dr. John James Karkosak, 82

(FEB. 13, 1940 - FEB. 10, 2023)



Dr. John James ("Jack") Karkosak of Boyne City passed away peacefully at his home on February 10, 2023 surrounded by his family, after an 11 year battle with lung cancer. He could not have been more loved.

Jack was born February 13, 1940 in Cleveland, Ohio to John Joseph and Mary (Sidor) Karkosak. He had a natural curiosity and love of learning that began in the woods surrounding his home, where he first learned to identify over 400 species of birds and their songs, a skill that continued to impress his children and grandchildren decades later. He had a quirky and quick wit, was the master of puns, and had a long line of obscure accomplishments to his credit, including earning the highest score in the Midwest Region on the National Latin Exam, winning road rally races in New England, and working on the Atlas missile program with early champions and developers of the American space program such as Kraft Ehricke.

Jack graduated from the University of Detroit, earning his bachelor's degree in Aeronautical Engineering. While there, he was a member of the St. Francis Club, the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences and the Society of American Military Engineers, and served on the Student Council of Engineering and Architecture. He earned his Masters in Aeronautical Engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. At MIT, he was research assistant for Professor Myron Hoffman, and conducted research on nuclear fusion that was sponsored by NASA. He later co-authored a paper with Prof. Hoffman on magnetohydrodynamics that appeared in the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Journal, and was cited at an international symposium in Salzburg, Austria, jointly hosted by the International Atomic Energy Agency and the European Nuclear En-

ergy Agency. Post-graduation, Jack served as a Lieutenant and then Captain in the United States Army, specializing in Ordnance and participating in the Aviation Laboratory at Fort Lee, Virginia. He later served in Vietnam, assuming command of the 19th Maintenance Company and overseeing logistics. He consistently credited the Army with instilling him with duty, respect, honor, discipline and timeliness.

Upon returning from Vietnam, Jack made the decision that would change his life: he married our mother, Rosemary Swartz, on April 12, 1969. Although they shared a dislike of the word "soulmate," together they modeled what a relationship should be: committed, caring, challenging each other, and always pursuing the road less traveled. For their entire marriage, they shared faith and adventures, and taught each of their children that the journey is more im-

portant than the destination. Jack later returned to school to study medicine, graduating from Michigan State University with a Doctor of Osteopathy Degree. From there, he began his medical practice in Boyne City, retiring in 2008. Jack appreciated the years of service he was able to provide to his patients, and kept in touch with many of them after retirement. He also greatly appreciated the many years that he worked with Mrs. Norma Doyal.

Jack is survived by his wife of 53 years, Rosemary, children Julie (Will Polleys), John (Nathalie Sirois), Susan, Jim, Jill (Aaron Taylor), and Beth (Kyle Lieberman); grandchildren Madelyn, Bailey, Jack, John James, Madison, Mikaëlle, Manuel, Noah, Ben, Grace, Annabelle, and Hunter; niece Laurel Jernigan, and nephews Ron, Scott, and Dean Perreman, and Ken and Tim Waggoner. He is preceded in death by his son. John James, and his son-inlaw Scott Wickiser (husband of Susan). He will be missed beyond measure, but will live on in every funny story that we tell.

HENRY "THE DOG" BACHMEYER

On Friday, January 13, we lost Henry the dog.

He had lymphoma for 3 months and succumbed to it as predicted by his vet. He was 15. We tried to ease his pain with medication prescribed by his special friend Dr. S.

However, soon it became time to call in the special doctor here in Florida. She sent him peacefully to the next life. I asked him to wait for me.

Henry will be remembered with special stories. He was a star. I found him on YouTube looking like a good dog. He was ready to find a new home. The rescue in Indiana called him 'Red'. My 8 year old granddaughter changed it to Henry and said his name had to have 2 syllables. The lady who ran the rescue center told me she found Henry running down the middle of I-65 in Indiana. He must have been trying to find me. Running was Henry's mantra. Not really good but always ready

to go. He followed his nose as his guide to where ever he traveled. The poor guy unfortunately was neutered before I picked him up to bring him home. He would have made beautiful puppies.

Henry was an escape artist with at least nine lives. He was always looking for a human that would contact me when he was lost. He had an ID tag with my phone number. He could eat a car bumper and loved Oreos and chicken wings. He had a big appetite. Once he ate 16 brats and was hospitalized for 3 days in Traverse City. He was famous for opening glass doors at Target and walking in to find a friend to help. He could be heard in the manager's office howling for me. One time he was found by the police who put him in the drunk tank and contacted me to pick him up. Jehovah Witness churches were convenient places to find nice people who called me. He never forgot where his last bowl of food was and always came back to it even if he was gone overnight. Any backyard was a magnet if it had cats or chickens or raccoons or dogs.

The people who found Henry and called me I called rescue angels. They all had love at first sight for him. Henry had a long life of meeting many, many people while trying to find his way back to me. He knew many people and dogs in Leland, Cincinnati and Vero Beach. He loved running golf courses and neighborhood streets. He was a cool dog.

Char-Em ISD's Jim Rummer named Michigan's 2023 Career Tech Administrator of the Year

When Jim Rummer began his career as Director of Career and Technical Education for Char-Em ISD 15 years ago, there were a handful of vocational education programs spread around the ISD's 11 public school districts. 

Kieran Fleming – Protecting the North Country We All Love

BY JOHN KEYSER

On the encouragement of Chip Hansen, I met with Kieran Fleming, Executive Director of Little Traverse Conservancy, to learn more about the work of the 50year old land trust that serves our region.

Kieran grew up in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin where he developed passions for fishing, hunting, and birding. He studied wildlife biology and had opportunities to do research in the Apostle Islands National Lakeshore and the Chaquamegon National Forest in northern Wisconsin where he studied ducks, black bears, whitetail deer, and elk. This fascination with wildlife eventually led him to a career that focused on protecting the habitats that all species need for survival.

So many people love "Up North" Michigan because this region is absolutely blessed with beautiful natural resources. Our land, lakes, rivers and streams all offer us opportunities for wonderful outdoor recreation all year round, as well as beautiful landscapes that soothe our souls.

The Little Traverse Conservancy was formed to create voluntary ways that landowners could protect their land in perpetuity. Over the years, a handful of conservation tools have been developed by land trust organizations across our country, and LTC was one of the first in the Midwest to begin using and refining them. To date, the organization has worked with individuals, families, and local units of government to help them protect more than 68,500 acres including frontage on 168 miles of lakes, rivers, and streams. More than 100 miles of trails are maintained on their preserves and working forest reserves.

Today, Kieran and his team remain focused on this mission through three primary programs: land conservation, land stewardship, and environmental ed-

Over the years, the Little Traverse Conservancy has sustained continued growth in its work, a direct reflection of how much people care for this region. "To put it simply, this organization is a reflection of how much people love it up here and want the character to stay the same for them and for those who come after them," Kieran says. "This is a place where many people experience the calm and peace that they so often



seek in their busy lives, and many have been doing so for generations and want the same for their children and grandchildren. The neat part is that the protec-

tion benefits everyone!" Kieran also points out that while approximately 23.000 acres are owned as nature preserves or working forest reserves, almost the same amount has been protected on privately owned lands using the tool known as a conservation easement. "The conservation easement is perfect for the landowner who wants to ensure their land remains protected regardless of future ownership," Kieran explained. "It has been around since the 1980s and gives landowners great peace of mind."

To help them understand

trail usage, the Conservancy rotates trail cameras around to their most popular preserve and volunteers help them count the number of visitors. The results for 2022 indicated that more than 86,000 user visits occurred at the hundreds of preserves and reserves owned by the organization. "The part of our program that will continue to grow is our land stewardship because the more lands we own, the more we have to care for," Kieran added. He also pointed out that the organization is devoting more resources to community assets such as biking trails, to removing invasive species, and to ecological inventories of all the lands. "We want to get to know our lands at a deeper level to

care for them going forward."

Today, there are more 4,000 members of the Little Traverse Conservancy. Annual dues are whatever one can afford, and the organization greatly appreciates every single member at every giving level. "We love the personal feel of being a membership-based organization," Kieran explains. "It creates the direct feeling that we are all in this for the same reason, working together on something we all care so much about." Continued member support is critical for the organization's ability to annually care for the growing number of lands under their protection, a number that grows bigger every year. "We have made a commitment of 'forever' and our promise to uphold that is something we take very seriously." It is also important to note that the organization receives no government funding for its annual

LTC also provides environmental protection programs at no cost to thousands of school children throughout the year. This is unique in the land trust world, and is something the board prioritized for the organization more than 30 years ago. The programs allow children to learn about the outdoors in the outdoors and quarterly field trips are offered for adult audiences interested in learning more about our valuable natural spaces. In addition, the organization offers community field trips each season that are open to

operations.

all ages and held at various trails.

Kieran has a wonderful and devoted staff of 17, which includes his wife, Anne, and literally hundreds of volunteers, who share their love for the work of protecting and enjoying the outdoors. "We so often stop and thank our founders and predecessors for the groundwork they laid that allows us to keep going today," Fleming notes. "It is clear that this work has struck a chord in our communities and it is such a gift to be able to work with the incredible people who come to us year after year. There are so many forward thinking people in our communities who think well beyond them-

Let's all try to learn more about Little Traverse Conservatory. I believe it will only deepen our love of our resources and our appreciation of Kieran and his team's commitment to helping us realize just how fortunate we are to be here with our beautiful land and wildlife.

The "Stay Interview" is Highly Effective Leadership

I came across a term that I love: the "stay interview". The stay interview is designed for us as business owners and managers to have with our good performers, asking them purposeful questions to assure that they are happy and wish to stay with us.

I guess a stay interview could be considered preventive medicine, and it surely is a great idea.

If we are effective leader-

ship as a business owners and managers, our people will be motivated and ener-

Turnover is costly. It's actually way more than the salaries involved. Just think, it involves the exit costs, recruiting, orientation and training, lost productivity, often customer disappointment, and sometimes the adverse effects of negative energy and talk internally.

The point is, turnover is expensive.

We want to keep our best, our "A" performers, for sure, and also invest in our next level, our "B" performers, who we can develop into significant contribu-

Here's where the stay interview becomes very helpful. Asking our people such questions as:

What do you like about being a member of our team? Our business?

What gives you a sense of satisfaction? Of signifi-

What could we do to enable you to better use your skills? To feel fulfilled?

How could we improve our productivity? Our communication?

What ideas would you like to offer us?

What questions would you like to ask us?

These are simply sample questions. Each business can determine their own, though I think they should be along these lines, and definitely focus on What? How? and Why?

It is important is that we have these conversations with our people. Conversations are how we develop trusting relationships. Just make sure our conversations are frequent, sincere and that we are focused on our team members and their ideas, asking purposeful questions and listening to understand and learn. They need not be long conversations.

Let's be sure to realize, a short conversation is better than no conversation.

No matter how busy we are, this is important and we must make the time. Our people have to know we care about them, we appreciate them, that they are important members of our team and business, and that their ideas matter and are heard.

The outcomes of this leadership practice will be increased retention of our good people, improved productivity, and very likely, significantly improved financial results!

Gov. Whitmer Signs Legislation to Build Affordable Housing, Revitalize Communities, and Support Small Businesses

New law invests \$150 million in Housing and Community Development Fund, \$100 million in Revitalization and Placemaking Grants, \$75 million in SmartZones, expands apprenticeships

LANSING, Mich-Today, Governor Gretchen Whitmer joined Lieutenant Governor Garlin Gilchrist II, Senate Majority Leader Winnie Brinks, Speaker of the House Joe Tate, and members of the Michigan Legislature to sign a bill into law that will invest in building affordable housing, revitalizing communities, and supporting small businesses and entrepreneurs. This signing marks the earliest a bill has been signed in a new term since 1947.

"Today, Michigan is taking a step forward to grow our economy, invest in our communities, and build a bright future," said Governor Whitmer. "This supplemental bill will build thousands more affordable housing units across the state, revitalize our communities, empower entrepreneurs, and support workers. I'm proud of my partners in the Michigan Legislature for getting this done, and I look forward to seeing what else we ac-

complish this year." "I'm thrilled that this supplemental will lower costs and make a real difference for Michigan families, communities, and small businesses," said Lieutenant Governor Gilchrist II. "This funding will help us revitalize communities where people want to live and work, remove barriers for people looking for a job, and lower start-up costs for entrepreneurs as they build and grow high-tech businesses here in Michigan. Let's keep working together to make a difference for Michiganders."

"Today, we're making meaningful investments in housing, veterans services, water shutoff prevention, small business supports and apprenticeship programs, food assistance, behavioral health, and more. If these issues sound familiar, they should: We've been calling for more focused investment in efforts that get roofs over heads, meals on tables, and workers in jobs for years. By coming together and keeping Michigan families at the center of our conversations, we've delivered a bill that's going to make a real impact in people's lives, said Senate Majority Leader Winnie Brinks. "Michiganders can expect similar pragmatic, solu-

tions-oriented, and swift

and months ahead. We're



just getting started." "Increased funding for

affordable housing helps support diverse and thriving communities and is necessary to help achieve economic stability. Whether you live in Metro Detroit, Up North or in the U.P., housing and community development are priorities for the people of Michigan. Michigan cannot attract and retain a highly skilled and talented workforce without affordable living options for workers to raise their families. And we know that housing is necessary to help parents provide a stable home for their children," said House Speaker Joe Tate. "The investment we make today has generational impact. The more we can do to help support our workers, the greater the potential for economic development and expansion in our communities. It's not only our current workforce that benefits. Generations of Michiganders will thrive because of this investment.'

The supplemental invests \$150 million in the Housing and Community Development Fund to build and refurbish housing and revitalize downtown areas across the state. This funding will allow Michigan to build or refurbish 2.000 housing units, house 6,000 Michiganders, and create 1,600 good-paying construction jobs. It will also fund the Missing Middle Housing Program which specifically aims to build and rehabilitate properties for middle class families.

This bill will provide \$100 million in Revitalization and Placemaking Grants to turn underutilized office, commercial, and community space into places for people to enjoy, including affordable housing, outdoor dining areas, or other place-based spaces. The supplemental delivers \$75 million to

SmartZones, 20 regions across our state where technology companies, entrepreneurs, and researchers are in close proximity to one another and organizations that help them succeed.

"As the sponsor of SB 7, I am proud that Governor Whitmer has signed this bipartisan law as the first public act of the new legislative session," said Senate Appropriations Chair Sarah Anthony, "For years, we have heard from Michiganders that there hasn't been nearly enough action at the state level to address the housing crisis, invest in our small businesses, and support workers—today that changes. These investments are just the beginning of creating a better future for all Michiganders, and I look forward to continue working with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to get things done for Michi-

"Economic development and job growth is about attracting investment. By leveraging available resources, we are better able to compete for the companies and capital that our state needs to grow, diversify and thrive. We want Michigan to be a top contender for business investment opportunities because it is our residents who reap the benefits of that growth," said House Appropriations Chair Angela Witwer. This legislation is a thoughtful plan to use available dollars to support local businesses and provide workforce development services, while at the same time making clear that Michigan is open for business and ready to get to work.

This supplemental addresses proposals that Governor Whitmer laid out in her State of the State address by removing barriers for workers like access to child care, transportation, and other basic

career services and providing \$25 million for apprenticeships.

The bill will also fund training for law enforcement to keep our communities safe and \$75 million in grants for blight removal.

The Escanaba paper mill will receive \$200 million to expand production and retain hundreds of jobs in the Upper Peninsula. The transformation of the mill is planned to be the cornerstone of Billerud's expansion into North America. The project is expected to support hundreds of high paying jobs and require a significant number of contractors during the

construction period. Dear Steven, There are a couple hundred thousand dollars in equity involved here. The fact that the will is handwritten doesn't necessarily invalidate it, but it does increase the possibility of encountering some bumps down the road.

I'm not a lawyer, so the first thing I'd do is talk to a couple of probate attorneys in your county. Find out what they'd charge to handle things. I wouldn't spend thousands of dollars to get this done, but I would pay \$500, maybe \$1,000, to let someone who knows what they're doing handle things. If your county affairs people are right and everything's easy and straightforward, it's not a lot of legal work for an attornev.

On top of that, if the attorney you work with knows folks at the courthouse and is familiar with how things work there, then it's kind of like traffic court, you know? It's almost automatic. I mean, we're only talking about three assets here—a bank account that's already been handed off, a car and a house that's mortgaged. For me, it'd be worth a little money to have someone on my side who knows the path through the woods.



Black Lake sturgeon limit hit in 65 minutes

Harvest guota of six reached in that time period

After only 65 minutes of fishing, this year's sturgeon season on Black Lake (in Cheboygan and Presque Isle counties) ended at 9:05 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 4. The season, which included spearing and hook-and-line fishing, was scheduled to run Feb. 4-8, or until the harvest quota of six lake sturgeon had been reached.

Anglers initially were allocated a season quota of seven sturgeon, but the Michigan Department of Natural Resources set the harvest limit at six fish. This action helps accommodate the expected number of anglers and anticipates the possibility of near-simultaneous harvest of more than one fish.

There were 630 registered anglers this year, including a good number of supervised youth.

According to the DNR, the harvested sturgeon ranged in size from 32 inches to 55.5 inches long and 6.4 pounds to 35.5 pounds.

had a fin clip. Participating anglers were notified of the season closure in a variety of ways, mainly from nearly instantaneous text alerts and ice shanty visits from DNR personnel. All methods were used to indicate

the season's end within minutes of the final fish being harvested. DNR law enforcement officials and other department personnel again were embedded in the on-ice fishing communities and were able to quickly and safely report harvested fish this year, as well as to quickly contact all lake sturgeon anglers on the ice and close the season.

Rehabilitation of lake sturgeon in the Cheboygan River watershed is a cooperative effort involving the DNR, the Black Lake Chapter of Sturgeon For Tomorrow, Michigan State University, Tower-Kleber Limited Partnership, the Bay Mills Indian Community, the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Little Traverse Bay Band of Odawa Indians and the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians.

Residents' Experiences, Research **Show Trails Can Boost Quality of Life**

There's a special kind of magic that tickles Jim and Rachel Votruba each summer in Petoskey.

It's not the azure lake or the soft sand beaches or the charming little towns. Those things play into their enchantment, to be certain. But, the Votrubas enjoy the fact that their seasonal home of 45 years is nestled neatly next to the Little Traverse Wheelway, the most popular paved recreational trail in the tip of the mitt.

Now retired, the couple spends five or six months a year in Petoskey, eschewing the humid, sweltering summers of southwestern Ohio at their main residence for this region's relatively dry, mild season.

With property so near the Wheelway, Jim said they've watched the 27mile multi-use trail go from concept to completion.

"We've seen the evolution of the Little Traverse Wheelway in a way that many people have not," Votruba said. "We use it constantly. We're bikers. We're hikers. We walk our dog. We ride to Alanson, Harbor Springs, and Charlevoix. Our grandchildren ride to Mackinac City. We're on the trail at least a

couple times a week." But, for the Votrubas like so many others who live near recreational trails, appreciation of the trail goes beyond personal recreational use. They say these trails enhance their lives in ways that can't be measured in sweat or dol-

"The Wheelway is just absolutely wonderful," generational. We can sit outside and we can hear young kids just learning to bike and older kids teaching the younger kids. We love the range of ages out there - not only seeing, but hearing the sounds of the

"The sound of laughter and families and individuals enjoying themselves close to our home is something that contributes to our quality of life in a very personal way," he continued. "What we enjoy is that the trail brings us in close proximity to the beautiful sights and sounds of a full range of ages. That just contributes to the full experience of living here."

Unlike the quantifiable economic impact of recreational trails, quality of life enhancement is more difficult to calculate. The Votrubas are just one familv whose lives near a trail that have benefited - and many times in ways that are practically immeasurable, but no less valid, they

trails. Some who live near trails fear vandalism by trail users and increased

But, another trailside resident who lives within earshot of the Little Traverse Wheelway, said his experience has been posi-

littering.

"When we walk it, we hear birds," said Fred Geuder, who lives here year-round. "We see things. We've seen eagles, birds, deer, porcupine. It's just a beautiful thing to be aware of these surroundings. A lot of people miss out on

Geuder said in spite of some people's fears of mischief along the trails his experience has been all positive.

"So many people worry about property value,' Geuder said. "Personally, I believe (trails) benefit property values. I think it's a more valuable property because of it, and I don't see a negative impact from people using it. People walking by can't see in our windows. They keep moving; they go by in seconds. Also, for the most part, people aren't throwing stuff away on the trail. There's really not much littering.'

A variety of research not only affirms Geuder's stance, but also supports the conclusion that people who live near recreational trails do enjoy more physical and mental health benefits than those who don't.

According to a 2016 report by Headwaters Economics, an independent research firm specializing in community development and land use trails can in fact, measurably improve a community's quality of life by providing opportunities

for social connection, and safe places for recreation

and commuting.

"Trails are an amenity that keeps existing residents and attracts new people; an asset that contributes to community identity," the report said. "When residents use trails frequently, they become an integral part of commu-

nity life. "These benefits focus on residents, rather than visitors. As such," the report continued, "the trails that can bring the greatest benefits to residents often are close to where people live and work, providing physical connections within a community."

The socialization and community development aspects of trails seem to occur in tandem with substantial health benefits, both personal and economic.

According to Michelle Archie of the Harbinger Consultancy, a California firm, research suggests a "predictable relationship between access to recreational facilities like trails and levels of physical activity, and also between levels of physical activity and overall health, and healthcare cost reductions over time."

Archie's 2022 report illuminated the health benefits of two trails in and near Morgantown, W. Va. (pop. 30,000). Her firm's study revealed that 25 percent of the community's population hadn't been physically active prior to trail construction, and they "reported large increases in physical activity" since they began using the trail.

"For most of these newly-active residents," the study said, "the trail

was the only place where they exercised and they report the trail's safety, paved and flat terrain, and convenience as the most important considerations in deciding to use the trail.'

Another Harbinger Consultancy study, this one done in 2017 in Brownsville, Tex., indicated that people who live near trails exercise 22 percent more than those who don't. Brownsville community leaders speculated that completing a proposed 93 miles of multi-use trail would boost physical activity, saving \$5.9-\$12.3 million in healthcare costs.

The evidence suggests that trails can not only help develop and maintain physical fitness, but also assist in people's recovery from injury or illness something of which Fred Geuder said he and his wife, Kay, have taken advantage.

"Both of us, over the last couple years, have had some health issues, especially with our backs,' Geuder said. "It's nice to be able to go walking on the Wheelway. We're right there beside it. It's just a nice walk. I think we both need exercise. It's a good place to walk, when you can do it."

Exercise is a primary part of life for Resort Township resident Kathy Godfrey, who lives less than a mile from East Park and the Little Traverse Wheelway.

She and her family have been using the Wheelway since it was a humble dirt path and East Park was but a gleam in the township's eye. Sometimes, the Godfrey family was forced to use the U.S. 31 shoulder to ride into town. Later, as the trail developed, they could easily access a much safer

"When the trail came, it was like a night and day difference," said Godfrey. "We were on it weekly with the kids. Obviously, in the summer months we were on it a lot more. And then, as our children grew, my husband and I started biking more for exercise and leisure and fun. We're a lot more serious about it now.'

Godfrey noted that her family's life experience, as well as the value of their home, improved as Northern Michigan trails continued to develop.

"Bay Harbor and the trail really added to our property value," she said. 'We considered moving. Our family grew, and we kind of outgrew our home. But, we decided to stay because we love our quality of life there."

Brent Bolin, executive director of Top of Michigan Trails Council (TOMTC), which oversees maintenance and development of over 325 miles of Northern Michigan trails, said trails' impact on residents' quality of life is as significant as the economic impact.

'There's little doubt that living near trails boosts a lot of people," he said. "Of course, not everyone takes advantage of their close proximity to the trails. But, those who do probably enjoy a healthier lifestyle, since a place to safely walk, run or bicycle is so invitingly close."

Bolin said he's heard positive feedback over and over from communities across the trail network regarding ease of access and their value of safe recreation.

"When it comes to trails, if you build it, they will come," he concluded.





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CLOSING COSTS

First, the responsibility of who pays for closing costs is always negotiable. Local custom may dictate which fees the buyer will pay and those the seller pays.

Typically, the buyer pays for home inspection services and escrow, deed preparation and recording fees, depending upon what is customary for the county the property is located in. He or she may also pay for title insurance, since this is required by the lender. The buyer is also responsible for any fees or costs associated with obtaining the purchase loan.

The seller customarily pays the real estate agent's commission, as well as costs associated with transferring an unencumbered title, such as a title search, recon-

veyance deed and documentary transfer tax.

Often, a seller will sweeten the deal by offering a one-year home warranty.

Who will pay for what closing costs customarily differs from county to county and should always be clearly spelled out in the purchase offer. A creative sales associate will consider the cash, income and tax situation of the home seller and the buyer when constructing an offer. For instance, if the buyer is short of cash, the agent may ask the seller to pay the buyer's loan points up front in exchange for some other concessions from the buyer. In this scenario, the buyer and seller benefit and both get what they want.

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


