

Gov. Whitmer Signs Bill Restoring Parents' Rights in Children's Education

LANSING, Mich. – Today, Governor Gretchen Whitmer signed a bill that restores parents' rights in deciding what's best for their child's education. Senate Bill 12 repeals a section of law that inserted government into students' education by preventing students from being promoted if they did not meet one specific benchmark.

benchmark.

"Today, we are taking action to put power back into parents' hands so they can work with their child's teachers and make decisions that are best for their family," said Governor Whitmer. "Getting this done will offer parents more flexibility and ensure educators can focus on doing what they do best—helping students reach their full poten-

tial."

"I want to thank Gov.

Whitmer for signing this important legislation. Parents and schools should be trusted to make decisions about grade retention—the state shouldn't mass-flunk 3rd graders without parent input based on one test," said State Senator Dayna Polehanki (D-Livonia). "It's a great day for educational freedom for Michigan's parents and students."

"I om happy to see the

"I am happy to see the Governor sign Senate Bill 12 to finally repeal the harmful retention aspect of the Read by Grade Three Law," said State Representative Nate Shannon (D-Sterling Heights). "Rather than being reactive, let's be proactive in our approach to kids and literacy. Retention has been a constant threat hanging over our students' heads. We could use the re-

sources that are spent on retaining students and put that towards more literacy coaches, reading intervention specialists, and provide afterschool and summer school programs to address the issue."

"Getting held back while

your friends move on to the next grade can be a traumatic experience — and, if not done for the right reasons the negative effects can last a lifetime. Instead of punishing children who struggle with reading, we must provide them with the positive support they need to achieve their full potential," said Paula Herbart, a longtime teacher from Macomb County and president of the Michigan Education Association. "Thanks to Governor Whitmer and the new legislative majority particularly former educators Sen. Dayna Polehanki and Rep. Nate Shannon who sponsored this legislation we've prioritized our students' academic and emotional needs by removing the punitive retention requirement from the thirdgrade reading law. Moving ahead, we look forward to further efforts at ensuring we have a preK-12 literacy support system that helps educators support every student in becoming an excellent reader and a lifelong learner.'

"All of us at MEMSPA are thrilled with the repeal of the retention portion of the 3rd-grade reading law. While the additional focus on literacy and support has been needed, retention and the threat of retention is not an intervention. The retention portion of this law has

disproportionately affected students of color and students of poverty across our state. We are excited to continue to focus on increasing literacy training and support in our lower elementary levels to ensure all students become proficient readers. We appreciate the hard work of our legislators and Governor Whitmer in making this possible." David Simpson, Ph.D., Principal at Northern Hills Middle School, Forest Hills Public Schools and State and Federal Relations Coordinator at MEMSPA

"Retention can be counterproductive to student success and is not supported by research," said Dr. Kyle Mayer, Superintendent at the Ottawa Area ISD and member of the Governor's PreK-12 Literacy Commission since 2016. "It is a decision that should only be made on a case-by-case basis, after careful consideration in partnership with parents, teachers and school

administrators. Thank you to our legislature and to Governor Whitmer for repealing this component of the law in the best interest of Michigan children."

Since taking office, Governor Whitmer has worked with legislators to make the largest investments in pre-K-12 education four years in a row without raising taxes, close the funding gap between schools, create more paths for future educators, and she established the Michigan Parent's Council to ensure parents have a seat at the policymaking table. Her most recent budget recommendation reflects parent's priorities for their children's education including funding for literacy coaches and tutoring, and Governor Whitmer will continue working to put parents at the forefront of decision-making.

Spring Fun Facts

'Spring Fever' is more than just a myth

Daffodils are among the first flowers of spring

Are you in a better mood when spring arrives? Many people are. If you're wondering why, it's really no great mystery. It's just spring fever.

The term "spring fever" is more than a myth. It refers to both psychological and physiological symptoms typically associated with the arrival of spring, including extra energy, better moods, and change in appetite, among other symptoms. While the exact cause is unclear, scientists believe that increased light, more exercise, and more bare skin influence hormone lev-

While the vernal equinox occurs nearly always on March 20 or 21, the meteorological spring actually begins on March 1 each year, a month when the average temperatures typically increase by 10 degrees in the Northern Hemisphere.

Did you know that couples are more likely to break up in the spring than at any other season of the year? Or that children typically grow faster in the spring than other times of the year? Or that studies show people born during the spring tend to be night owls and optimistic? Or that spring is the most popular time to buy or sell a house?

In any case, here are some surprising, interesting facts about spring:

• March is named after Mars, the Roman god of war. In ancient Rome, this month signaled the beginning of warfare season.

 Tornadoes are most common in the spring and least common in winter. Hurricane season begins in late spring.

• The first spring flowers are usually daffodils, dandelions, lilies, tulips, iris and lilacs. The birth flower for March is also the daffodil.

• There's more daylight during spring because the earth's axis tilts toward the sun at this time of the year.

• Benjamin Franklin was the first to propose daylight savings time in 1784. It wasn't fully implemented until the end of the Second World War.

• Every year, allergies constitute over 17 million outpatient office visits, mostly in the spring and fall.

• According to the National Association of Realtors, spring is the most popular season to sell/buy a house. Buyers are usually hesitant to move during the winter

when the weather is colder and kids are in school. So, while there are lots of houses to choose from in the spring, property prices are at their highest then.

• The myth that it is possible to balance an egg on its end on the spring equinox is just that: a myth. Trying to balance an oval-shaped object on its end is no easier on the spring equinox than on any other day.

• Honeybees are more likely to swarm during the spring. They swarm as a way to start new colonies from successful ones. Surprisingly, swarming honeybees are very docile and the most friendly they will ever be all year.

• The earliest known use of the term "spring cleaning" was in 1857.

• The first day of spring is called the vernal equinox. The term vernal is Latin for "spring" and equinox is Latin for "equal night."

• According to a Facebook study, couples are most likely to break up in the spring and two weeks before Christmas. The lowest breakup time was Christmas Day and from August through October.

• The fall and spring equinoxes are the only two times during the year when the sun rises due east and sets due west.

• On the first day of spring, a person at the North Pole would see the sun skimming across the horizon, beginning six months of uninterrupted daylight. A person at the South Pole would see the sun skimming across the horizon, signaling the start of six months of darkness.

• If Pope Gregory XIII would not have established the Gregorian calendar, which most of the world now observes, in 1582, then every 128 years the vernal equinox would have come a full calendar day earlier, eventually putting Easter in midwinter.

• The first day of spring in the Southern Hemisphere is the first day of fall in the Northern Hemisphere.

• If Earth rotated on an axis perpendicular to the plane of its orbit around the sun rather than on a 23.4° tilt, there would be no variation in day lengths and no variation in seasons.

• Easter always falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox.

• In the Southern Hemisphere, springtime lasts from August until November.

• During the spring, birds are more vocal as they sing to attract mates and warn away ri-

vals.
• The early Egyptians built the Great Sphinx so that it points directly toward the rising sun on the spring equinox.

their seventies. They have been healthy and active all their lives, but in spite of them both having good jobs they neglected to plan and save for retirement. Is it my responsibility now to provide them with financial help in their old age?

Dear Reagan,

It sounds like you might be a little irritated that your parents haven't been responsible with their money. The way you described the circumstances, it's understandable—to a point. But in my mind, there's a bigger question when it comes to helping your folks. How big is the burden?

Let me ask you a few things. Do you have the money to help? Now, can you provide this help without your own family suffering or going without? If both answers are yes, I think your question may be a little more about your own aggravation with your folks than any ethical or moral obligation.

A few years ago I spoke with a guy who was in really good shape financially. He made over \$1 million a year, and he had plenty set aside in savings and retirement accounts. His father was in poor health and had never handled his money wisely. The son asked me if he should help out his dad by giving him some money every month.

In my mind, there's no question the right answer was yes. And that's what I told him. If you're making millions, but don't want to help out your sick dad, there's something wrong with you. There's something missing inside you that money just won't fix. However, if you and your family are barely getting by—let's say you bring home \$3,000 a monthyou're not morally required to help a parent who was irresponsible with money their entire life.

I'm not sure what your situation is, Reagan, but I hope you'll look at things with a little grace and reason. It's a tough situation to be in, because it sounds like your heart is being pulled in different directions. My advice, above all else, is to pray about it. And, if you have a spouse, talk to them about everything, and make sure the two of you are in agreement on what should be done before moving for-

The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) announces \$250,000 in available funding for Rural Electronics Grants. The deadline for grant applications is May 12, 2023.

This grant opportunity will support ongoing access to proper electronics recycling in the rural areas of the state. These two-year grants can be used for the following:

Support electronics collection events.

Establish new permanent collection loca-

Support the collection, handling, and proper recycling of consumer electronics from operating collection locations in defined rural areas of the state.

Establish hub and spoke collection programs from small collection loca-

Regional efforts are highly encouraged.

The funding is made available through the Renew Michigan Fund. Eligible entities include cities, villages, townships, charter townships, counties, tribal

governments, conservation districts, municipal solid waste or resource recovery authorities, nonprofit organizations, health departments, colleges or universities, and regional planning agencies. The maximum request for operations grants is \$10,000, and collection event grants are \$15,000 per location. Applicants are required to discuss their proposal with the EGLE-Materials Management Division Electronics Program staff prior to submittal. Funds are available on a first come, first served



Bedrooms and **Bathrooms**

The Kitchen Family activity centers



MHSAA, MHSFCA to Provide Spring Evaluation Camps for College Football Hopefuls

The Michigan High School Athletic Association, in partnership with the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association (MHSFCA), will be hosting first-ever Spring Evaluation Camps to provide athletes with aspirations of playing college football opportunities to show their skills and abilities to college coaches at one of five locations.

The one-day camps will take place between May 16-19 at Jenison High School, DeWitt High School, Jackson High School and Detroit Country Day High School. The MHSAA's involvement will allow for the opportunity for Division I college

coaches to attend, and representatives from college football programs at all levels are expected.

Athletes who will be juniors or seniors in Fall 2023 may register to participate via a link on the Football page of the MHSAA Website at

https://www.mhsaa.com/s ports/football.

"This is an attempt by the MHSAA to help our athletes get exposure during the spring evaluation period in a way that does not intrude on spring sports," said Brad Bush, an MHSAA assistant director and past high school and college football coach. "We are working with the MHSFCA to help put together a first-

class experience for the athletes and college coaches."

Cost is \$20 per player, and each registrant will receive a shirt to wear based on the athlete's graduation year and registration number so college coaches in attendance can monitor their camp performance. College coaches also will receive registration information for each athlete in attendance.

All athletes must have a coach from the athlete's school staff present at the camp, and that coach must be a member of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association.

MHSFCA executive director Andrew Pratley called the Spring Evaluation Camps a tremendous op-

portunity for high school athletes in Michigan.

'We are very excited with the partnership with the MHSAA that allows our kids the opportunity to wear a helmet and do drills in front of college coaches in the spring at a minimal cost," Pratley said. "College coaches are thrilled, and it's a unique opportunity to have the rules waived by the MHSAA at these events only in order to showcase the tremendous talent all over the great state of Michigan."

The Michigan High School Football Coaches Association (MHSFCA) has been devoted to the promotion of high school football since its inception in March

1972. The MHSFCA has more than 2,500 members and provides several educational and development opportunities for members and their athletes, including an annual coaching clinic, an annual leadership conference for coaches and potential team captains, and the annual summer East-West All-Star Game for graduated seniors. Additionally, the MHSFCA's Leadership Development Alliance is in its third year of training coaches and offering veteran members of the association as mentors.

The MHSAA is a private, not-for-profit corporation of voluntary membership by more than 1,500 public and private senior high schools

and junior high/middle schools which exists to develop common rules for athletic eligibility and competition. No government funds or tax dollars support the MHSAA, which was the first such association nationally to not accept membership dues or tournament entry fees from schools. Member schools which enforce these rules are permitted to participate in MHSAA tournaments, which attract more than 1.3 million spectators each

MICHIGAN'S AMAZING ANIMALS

Striped Skunks

Maybe the most maligned and misunderstood mammals in the Mitten State are those secretive, sweet, and sometimes stinky striped skunks. Time to tackle some terrific tidbits about these memorable, mischievous, and malleable mammals:

The Name Game: The scientific name of the skunk is ratner redundant in that the genus and species name are the same. Thus, these animals carry the taxonomic moniker of Mephitis mephitis. This type of name is known as a tautonym; other examples of tautonyms are found in wolverines (Gulo gulo),red fox (Vulpes vulpes), and moose (Alces alces). The word Mephitis derives from the Latin meaning, "a foulsmelling gas." In Greek mythology there was even a goddess named Mefītis who personified the poisonous gases emitted from swamps and volcanoes. There are four species of skunksstriped, spotted (also a Michigan animal but less prevalent than striped skunks), hooded, and hognose-in North America. The two skunk species that live in Asia are called,

"stink badgers." Distribution Data: Striped skunks are considered a Least Concern animal in terms of their status on the endangered species list. These adaptable animals are native to North America and Canada, and reside in every Michigan county. Striped skunks are our most common skunk species, sharing some habitats with their less abundant cousins, the spotted skunks. Most often active at night, many folks have not encountered them in the wild.

Striped Suits: Easily identifiable, most striped skunks have two thick white stripes along the back and tail that sharply contrast with their otherwise

black fur. The specific pattern of the stripes on the head, body and tail can vary among individuals, and is accompanied by a thin, white stripe running from the snout to the forehead. But other characteristics occur in nature, especially among skunks that are bred by humans, and can include brown and white, all white, and a light blue/gray and white color variation known as, "lavender."

Chemical Concoctions: The defensive discharge of striped skunks is a yellowish, oily, nauseating, sulfuralcohol liquid secreted from two anal scent glands. But, they don't spray this substance, "willy-nilly," as skunks only do so when they feel seriously attacked or threatened by a larger animal. Skunks also give you a "heads up," performing a warning display which often involves stomping its feet, hissing, and arching its back while raising its tail. If the predator doesn't "get the message" they are remarkably accurate with their lazar shot at

up to 10 feet (the odor can be detected up to 1.5 miles away)!

Musky Mutts: Most human's experience with skunks is often when their pet-with a vast majority being dogs-go after a striped friend and get sprayed. The humanesociety.org website has specifics on how to rid your pet of the skunky smell. The process they recommend is bathing your pooch in a concoction of 1 quart 3% hydrogen peroxide, ¼ cup baking soda, and 1 teaspoon of liquid dishwashing soap. After working the mixture well into their fur and letting it sit for five minutes thoroughly rinse your pup. Next, wash your dog with pet shampoo and rinse thoroughly. Fido should then be de-skunked and smelling sweet!

Short-Lived Stinkers: In the wild, striped skunks rarely survive beyond three years, but can possibly attain an age of, "six trips around the sun." Under human care, they may live to the ripe-old-age of 12-years. Because they are so

short-lived, skunks become sexually mature at only 10months of age.

Deer-like Descriptors:
Like a favorite Michigan
mammal-the white-tailed
deer-male striped skunks
are known as, "bucks"
while females are called,
"does." But, like red foxes,
young are dubbed, "kits."
Here's one for your scrabble game-a group of skunks
is called a. "surfeit!"

is called a, "surfeit!"
Bringing Up Babies:
Striped skunks have a gestation period ranging from 59 to 77 days depending on external temperatures. The birth of two to 10 kits usually takes place in May or June, seven to 10 weeks after mating. The lil' stinkers are born helpless and only weigh 1.2 ounces. The kits will not open their eyes until about 3-weeks and wean at 6- to-7 weeks.

I had the pleasure of being around some kits that were being raised by a rehabber in Ohio, where it's legal. The young were playful, gregarious, and delightful to watch as they wrestled, did handstands, and feigned spraying at their siblings.

described as being about
the same size as an adult
house cat. They tip the
scales at up to 12-pounds
and measure in length as
long as 32-inches.

Disney Darlings: Skunks play key roles in popular films including Bambi's sweet friend's Flower and Bluebelle. Of course, the most famous thespian skunk was that ever-pleasant Pepe' La Pugh who first blossomed on the big screen in the Looney Tunes in 1945 (the first episode was called Odor-able Kitty!).

Silly Stooges: Skunks have also made their way into one of my favorite comedy crews as the Three Stooges had lines including, "I'm so hungry I could eat a skunk, RAW" and, "What's that terrible cologne you're wearing? I think it's called, "Oda-De-Skunky!"

Perfect Pets: Skunks can be legally owned in Michigan with the right permits and mentorship, but not rehabbed because they are considered a Rabies Vector Animal (RVA). This is despite the fact that only an extremely small percentage of their population carries the disease (bats and raccoons have a much higher incidence rate). For those that do raise them they have the anal glands removed usually at about four months of age. A friend, Cheryl, who is legally caring for three skunks, characterized them as wonderful pets and companions, who eat well, have a lot of personality, and are fun to watch. Closer to home I remember my late father speaking quite fondly of a pet skunk they had as kids that was perfectly comfortable walking around on a leash!

Opportunistic Omnivores: Striped skunks have a distinctively diverse diet including heavy predation

of insects as well as small rodents, reptiles and amphibians, berries, fruit, leafy plants, roots, eggs, and carrion. They are also immune to snake venom, and will therefore eat poisonous snakes! Higher up the food chain only a few animals are brave enough to feed on skunks but occasionally hungry covotes. foxes, bobcats and cougars will prey on them. Large owls are their most prolific predators due to the fact that the birds have little sense of smell.

Farmers Friends: Striped skunks are beneficial to crop-growers because they feed on copious amounts of agricultural and garden pest insects and rodents.

Adaptable Animals:
Striped skunks can adapt to a variety of habitats including forests, grassy meadows, farmlands, fencerows, and even suburban backyards. They possess large claws and are exemplary diggers, and have a keen sense of smell and hearing. Contrastingly, skunks have very poor eyesight and, therefore, are easily startled.

Mascot Mantra: A peculiar, yet perfect, college mascot belongs to a school in Oklahoma called Phillips University. Their unofficial costume belongs to a skunk named, "Little Hay" that symbolizes the University's initials-P.U! The legend tells of students, who in the 1940's, came up with the idea after a line in a cartoon clip they watched that said, "Roses are read, violets are blue: If skunks had a color, they'd call it PU!"

Those are some bountiful blurbs about those silent, silly, and stupendous striped skunks. I'm hoping that, with good fortune, you will happen across one in the wonderful woods of the Wolverine State!




