




# Report poachers to protect wildlife and hunting

Poaching is a problem everywhere, including Michigan, and has its biggest impact on wildlife and game fish in the state and, subsequently, on honest hunters and anglers throughout the state. In Michigan, the DNR has set up an effective method of fighting back: the Report All Poaching program.

What is Poaching? Poaching is the illegal shooting, trapping, or taking of game, fish or other natural resources from private or public property. A poacher is someone who hunts, traps, or fishes illegally. This also includes someone who possesses or commercializes in wildlife resources contrary to Michigan or federal law.

Reporting a violation If you witness a natural resource violation, report it immediately. You can do this by texting or calling 800-292-7800, phone lines are open 24/7.

You can also use the online poaching complaint



# **News COMMUNITY LEADERS Hugh Conklin**

Hugh is Mayor of Boyne City. He has served on the city commission for 7-plus years, the last 16 months as mayor. His term ends in November and he is not seeking reelection.

Hugh has a varied background. He grew up downstate, went to Central Michigan for college, then relocated out West where his job as a geophysical technician required travel throughout the mountain west. After several years experiencing the beauty of the west, Hugh moved to Dillon, Mont., where he worked for The Tribune, the community newspaper for the ranching community of 3,000 residents. The newspaper was owned by Sage Publishing, which owned newspapers in Wyoming and Montana. After a couple of years in Dillon, he moved to Whitefish, Mont., where he worked for The Pilot.

Hugh met his wife, Susan, in Whitefish, and they were married in 1984. In the fall of 1985 Hugh was promoted to publisher of the Douglas (Wyo.) Budget, a newspaper serving a community of about 6,000 residents in the heart of ranch country in the central part of the state. Hugh and Susan were in Douglas for five years and their three boys were born there.

In 1990 Hugh and Susan returned to Whitefish where he was named publisher of The Pilot. They remained in Whitefish until the summer of 1994 when they purchased The Citizen, the Boyne City weekly newspaper founded in 1881. Five years later Hugh and Susan sold The Citizen to

Up North Publications, owners of the Antrim County News, Kalkaska Leader and Elk Rapids Town Meeting. Hugh served as publisher of the group until June 2005. Later he was hired as executive director of the Boyne City Downtown Development Authority/Main Street Program, a position he held until 2015.

Hugh has also been involved as a volunteer and former board member for Challenge Mountain, board member and volunteer mediator for Northern Community Mediation, board member for Unity Hall/Boyne Area Alano Club, and a volunteer for the Good Neighbors Food Pantry.

As a member of the city commission Hugh believes it is important to set aside personal agendas, be a good listener, try your best to understand all sides of an issue, be respectful, and build consensus. The city, he believes, has taken advantage of opportunities and met difficult challenges and will need to work together to move the community forward.



# Sleet, lack of speed likely caused 2021 plane crash

BOYNE CITY - Investigators say sleet and lack of speed likely caused a 2021 plane crash in northern Michigan that killed two men.

The Nov. 15, 2021, crash in a wooded area in Charlevoix County's Melrose Township killed nilot Kenneth Daniel Yott, 61, of Pontiac, and Corbin Dennis Kennedy, 21, of Howell. Kennedy was a student pilot. A National Transportation Safety Board investigation report released last week said the men flew out of Oakland County International Airport in Pontiac. headed for Boyne City Municipal Airport. The plane slowed gradually from 129 knots (238.9 nautical kilometers per hour) to 88 knots (162.9 kilometers per hour) as it approached the Boyne City

Lakeshore Drive. The man stopped following police and drove off route, creating several disturbances along Northbound Bridge Street before driving east on Antrim Street and into Round Lake.

Webster, the first emergency responder on scene, could see air bubbles coming out of the truck, which was on its side in about 9 feet of water. Before bystanders could confirm whether anyone was in the vehicle, Webster began preparing to enter the water.

With a personal floatation device, Webster walked along the vehicle and opened the driver's side door. The discolored, unconscious man and his personal belongings immediately floated out of the vehicle.

Two witnesses helped Webster pull the man onto a dock. Webster performed several rounds of abdominal compressions, pushing water out of the man's lungs until he started breathing on his own.

Charlevoix EMS transported the man to Charlevoix Hospital for further examination; EMS later reported that he was

stable and speaking. Webster has been a conservation officer since 2006 and is a DNR law enforcement supervisor for Antrim, Charlevoix and Emmett counties.

IN NEWAYGO COUNTY, **Conservation Officer James** Ginn received two Lifesaving Awards for separate incidents.

#### Unconscious woman

On July 1, Newaygo County Central Dispatch reported that a 46-year-old

Muskegon woman was found in a vehicle, not breathing due to a suspected drug overdose.

Conservation Officer Jeff Ginn arrived at the scene, located on 36th Street near Hardy Dam in White Cloud. **Emergency responders** from Big Prairie Township Fire Department and Chad Palmiter, undersheriff at Newaygo County Sheriff's Office, had already given the woman one dose of NARCAN and were performing CPR.

Ginn administered a second dose of NARCAN, which helped to restart the woman's heart. With the woman still unable to breathe, Ginn used a bag valve mask to deliver rescue breaths while emergency responders from Advanced EMS provided additional care and moved her into an ambulance. Ginn continued using the bag valve mask while transitioning into the ambulance, and saw the woman open her eyes and begin looking around.

She was transported to Gerber Memorial Hospital in Fremont for additional care.

#### **Newaygo State** Park boat launch

Oct. 4, Ginn was returning to the Newaygo State

Park boat launch after patrolling on Hardy Dam Pond. As Ginn neared the launch, a 56-year-old man, from Wayland, approached and said that his friend was not breathing and needed help.

Ginn contacted Newaygo Central Dispatch and requested an ambulance as he followed the man to a nearby boat.

On the boat, Ginn found an unconscious 55-year-old man, from Jenison, lying face down in a puddle of vomit, and a woman who was trying to help. The group told Ginn that their friend had consumed a lot of alcohol and they returned to shore when he became unconscious and ill.

Ginn noticed the man had an obstructed airway and his skin was changing color. Ginn turned the man to his side and cleared his airway by administering back blows, followed by chest compressions. With the man still struggling to breathe on his own, Ginn used a bag valve mask to help him breathe until EMS arrived.

The man was transported by EMS to a nearby hospital, where he later was treated and released for an aspirated airway.

Ginn has been a conservation officer since 2006 and patrols Newaygo County.

# **CHAR-EM HALF-TIME REPORT:** Regional Enhancement Millage has made meaningful impacts on local school districts over the past five years

CHARLEVOIX - Revival of a dormant library. Fresh life breathed into a band program. High-quality, nocost preschool helping working parents support their families. The start of a new garden to grow food for students.

In 2017, these initiatives were just hopes of local school district leaders who were asking voters in Charlevoix Emmet and northern Antrim counties to support a Regional Enhancement Millage, which is the only way districts can raise additional operational dollars. That fall, the 11 local superintendents representing Char-Em ISD districts and their respective school boards collectively agreed to seek voter approval of a 1.0-mill, 10year levy that would generate over \$60 million in total over the decade.

In outlining needs at the time, each superintendent shared their vision for how the additional funding would benefit their own districts.

"One of the biggest benefits of a Regional Enhancement Millage is that each district is able to determine how to spend the money they receive," said Scott Koziol, Char-Em ISD Su-

perintendent. "That was one key point that really resonated with voters: district independence."

In November 2017, 57 percent of voters approved the proposal. The first levy was collected in 2018 - \$5.3 million, which equated to about \$615 per pupil. This school year, 2022-23, the millage generated \$6.3 million, for a per pupil amount of \$824. The amount received each year will vary, depending on the fluctuating regional taxable value.

Now at the five-year mark of the 10-year collection, district superintendents are sharing how the money has impacted their districts. It's important to note that due to the flexibility of the millage, how districts report spending the money varies greatly, Koziol noted.

"It is important to not compare one district to another as doing 'more' or 'less' in a certain area or overall. Each one has been able to truly identify their own needs and utilize the funding to fill them," said Koziol.

While each district has their own priorities, several common themes emerged among them all: Early childhood/preschool, career and college readiness, technology, school safety, staffing, extracurriculars, facility updates, curriculum and instructional supplies, and athletics.

"The power and impact that the Regional Enhancement Millage has had on Pellston Public Schools is extremely difficult to capture," said Pellston Public Schools Superintendent Stephen Seelye. "Updating and renovation of our athletic facilities and auditorium, free preschool to all our families, and bringing back a K-12 music program to our district have had such an incredible impact on our students. The ability to purchase school buses, playground equipment, and a school van has allowed us to keep other funding in the classroom touching all of our students and allowing our district to not just survive but thrive, even during a pandemic."

In the Petoskey school district, superintendent Jeff Leslie emphasized the addition of activities for students, elimination of extracurricular fees, and establishment of the new Little Northmen Preschool, which provides 32 students access to high-quality preschool.

"The Regional Enhancement Millage has provided the Public Schools of Petoskey much-needed revenue for programming that could not exist otherwise due to state funding restrictions," said Leslie. "With the aid of this voterapproved funding source, PSP was able to eliminate 'pay to play' for extracurricular activities, increase the number of clubs, and implement additional affordable preschool options for our families.'

On Beaver Island in Charlevoix County, district superintendent Wil Cwikiel echoed the theme of the importance of quality early childhood programming.

"With this new stable source of revenue, Beaver Island has been able to offer developmental preschool five days a week for 3-year olds and older at no cost at all to parents and families, as well as provide additional support for students with special needs in the early elementary program," said Cwikiel. "Investments in early childhood education pay dividends throughout the lifetime of children."

District-by-district flexibility in identifying needs has been key, according to the superintendents. In

Alanson, for example, a long-shuttered library is now back serving students thanks to the REM, according to superintendent Rachelle Cook.

"After 10-plus years of our library being closed, we were able to hire a media specialist, reopen the library, as well as update the library with new books and furniture," said Cook. "PE was also cut many years ago, and we were able to hire a K-12 PE teacher for the district. These are huge benefits to our students that we could not have accomplished without the Regional Enhancement Millage. We are so grateful to voters for their support.'

A number of district leaders said they've been able to update facilities and offer new programs they otherwise likely could not have been added. In East Jordan, the REM has allowed for free preschool to all 3- and 4-year students, helping prepare the littlest learners for kindergarten. The millage has also allowed for a new STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) teacher and programs, and an outdoor/garden learning coordinator in East Jordan.

"Our Outdoor/Garden Learning Coordinator has integrated a new hoop house into our already productive garden area to provide a new learning environment that all students can engage in and enhance the classroom experience by extending the learning and integrating nature," said East Jordan Superintendent Matt Stevenson. "With this added funding, EJPS has been able to provide increased opportunities for our students, much-needed materials for our classrooms, teachers, and athletic coaches, as well as provide support for our parents."

In Boyne City, superintendent Pat Little noted how the REM has impacted students across all grades, pre-K through high school.

"The REM has opened doors for students to become more prepared for next steps in life," Little said. "For preschoolers, they are more prepared for kindergarten. For 8th graders, they are wiser about career opportunities and for our high school students, they have hands on experience with both dual enrollment courses and career readiness courses thanks to the REM funds.'

District leaders are enthusiastic about the impact of the Regional Enhancement Millage on their ability to provide more opportunities for students, and so are some parents and community members.

East Jordan mom of four, Shannell Lapeer, has relied on the 3- and 4-yearold preschool programs offered in her district and lauds their availability.

"I think that providing free preschool is a great thing. All my kids have attended and I have seen a tremendous amount of growth in each," said Lapeer. "My two youngest are twins and were premature, which put them behind the other kids a little bit. This year, they are in the 3-year-old preschool and are making huge gains."

Seelye, the Pellston superintendent, thanked voters for supporting the REM.

"That is an incredible investment by our residents in the education of our region's vouth," said Seelve. "I know I speak for all our local administrators when I say 'Thank you' again to voters for supporting our schools with the enhancement millage." Each local superintendent provided detailed highlights of how the REM dollars have impacted their district. and they would not only stop talking timidly and vaguely but they would speak clearly and concisely. It became somewhat normal to go late into the night, with many nights not ending until 2am . We all wanted it, God is just that good. He knew that we needed something, and He would move in such a way that He met each of us in our need. He broke my heart and allowed me to feel his love and Holy Spirit for the first time ever. I had been raised in the church, as a pastor's kid, and I had all of the head knowledge and belief, but I had never accepted God's love in my heart and I had never become vulnerable to Him. 

The Student Advisory Council meets six times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues

A fifth S – student leadership – is also a common topic. Members contribute to the planning of Sportsmanship Summits, Captains Clinics and other student leadership events, and assist with medal ceremonies at MHSAA championship events




