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BOYNE CITY COMMISSION MEETING, APRIL 25, 2023

Commissioner Moody to the Rescue as Potential User Fee Increases Face Boyne City Residents

Earth Day must have influenced the attendees of Tuesday's City Commission Meeting in Boyne City. While many motions were passed and topics debated, the ones at the greatest length were over the trees and water.

As many motions passed in agreement, there were many postponed, debated, and motions altered to come one step closer in hopes of continuing Boyne City's success.

The first motion to pass was on the consideration to adopt the budget amendments for the fiscal year budget. The memo presented at the meeting stated,

"The overall revenue projects are expected to be \$14,238,441, and the overall expenditure projections are expected to be \$13,270,065. An overall positive position of \$968,376."

The next motion to pass was approving the request made by Scouting's Michigan Crossroads Council. The request was to allow dockage of their 52' sailboat, the Retriever, in the Boyne City Marina at no cost. Bob Pawlus, a community member and boat Captain for Scouting's, presented the information that was unanimously well received.

Even Commissioner George Lasater shares fond memories of seeing their work in Mackinaw City. The time the slip would be occupied during the prime season, but supports Sea Scouts, and Boy Scouts, and offer scholarship programs for those who seek to join their adventures.

Another motion that was

agreed upon by commissioners and even community members was the motion to dissolve the Pearl Street Historic District. An idea that began in 1993 and was created in 2003, the Historic District was created, with the adoption of the ordinance that the properties were to maintain and meet requirements and standards set by the district. However, the dream remains unattainable as Boyne City moves into the early stages of creating a committee to begin the dissolution of the Pearl Street Historic District.

As a Boyne City citizen notes, "If you have deep pockets, maybe it's okay. We have some people on our street that don't have deep pockets who can afford to do things in ordinance with the Historic District."

The last motion to pass with ease was the motion to renew the collection services agreement with American Waste, maintaining two curbside pick-

ups for the 2023 year.

One of the motions that needed adjustment, was the motion to purchase two Ford F-350 cab and chassis trucks for \$100,717.60 from local Bob Mathers Ford.

City Commissioner Marty Moody sharing the thought that The City tends to run before crawling or walking, voices support for one truck rather than the proposed two. He suggests the benefit to alternating purchases between vehicles as it is not prudent to replace both vehicles at the same time.

Commissioner Lasater agreed that one truck rather than two is money saved. The new motion was made, to purchase one vehicle for \$50,358.80, and table the other truck until another meeting was unanimously agreed upon.

During the public hearing and motions of the proposed Sanitary Sewer System and Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements and the Clean Water State Revolving Fund Application is where Commis-

sioner Moody stepped in to seek more information.

Assuming the spending to be unnecessary and needing a closer look, his major concern was the citizens of Boyne City. His concern was the worst-case scenario presented as it would double what residents currently pay with an increase of \$39 to each user.

The money will be used to maintain rather than grow, however, Moody found it "disconcerting" saying,

"That's pretty much what they pay now, you'll double. If nothing else happens you'll double every person in this city's user fees, and I have a real problem with that."

Hoping for the plans in much more detail, Moody voted against the motion.

Another motion to be tabled for a later date was the formation of a council for the trees. The motion was made to for the creation of a Boyne City Tree

East Jordan School Gun Threat Prompts Investigation

At the end of the school day on Friday April 21, 2023 the East Jordan Police Department responded to the East Jordan Middle-High School for a report of a student making threats of using a firearm against other students. Multiple students had reported hearing another student making the threats which were reported to the school administration. The school then contacted East Jordan Police Department School Resource Officer James Schlappi. The threats were investigated by School Resource Officer Schlappi and Officer Seese. The student was located at the school, but was not in possession of any firearms. A search warrant was executed at the student's residence and evidence was seized. The East Jordan Police Department and the school continue to investigate to ensure the safety of all the students. The name of the student is being withheld at this time. The report will be forwarded to the Prosecuting Attorney for review once completed. Police Chief George Lasater wishes to praise the students who had the courage and integrity to report this threat to their safety and the safety of all students and staff. Chief Lasater would also like to praise the quick and thorough investigation carried out by School Resource Officer Schlappi and Officer Seese. The student will be out of school while the investigation continues.

Her four children traveled from as far away as California the day before to gather at her bedside at The Brook assisted living center in Boyne City. Marie would have celebrated her 98th birthday on June 23rd. She was born in 1925, the third child of Charles and Osee Koteskey, on their (Bay Township) Camp Daggett Road farm. She walked 2 miles every day to attend North Bay School, where her future husband, Robert Stolt, also was a student. She graduated from Boyne City High School in 1943. During World War II, Marie was one of the thousands of women serving the Allied forces by working at an ammunition factory in Lansing.

After the war, Marie and Robert renewed their acquaintance and married June 30, 1949. They built their home up the hill from her parents' farm where their four children carved a permanent path through a field between the two houses.

She loved tending to her roses, feeding the birds, and baking pies. A favorite story told was of Marie's first attempt at making a pie on her own (a lemon meringue) could have been used as a spare tire for their Buick. However, she learned quickly, so her children remember her lemon meringue pie as awesome along with all her other fruit pies.

Her firstborn child, Linda, was born August 4, 1951, while the nation was battling the polio epidemic, while there was no cure, no treatment, and no vaccine. In August 1952, Linda contracted the virus one week after her first birthday. The poliovirus causes severe disability or death. During her grief over first thinking Linda would die, then learning she would live but with a disability, Marie's life was transformed by Linda's hospitalizations, leg braces, crutches, and physical therapy.

She is survived by her children Linda Stolt of Dearborn, MI, Don (Julie) Stolt of Belleville, MI, Carol (Tim) Higley of Manhattan, KS, Dale (Martha) Stolt of Boyne City, MI. She also has 6 grandchildren, and 8 great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Robert, and sister Evelyn Hickman and brother Eugene Koteskey.

During her life, she experienced the Great Depression, a World War, a pandemic, and worked hard so her children could live and thrive. She was part of the Greatest Generation.

Service took place at Stackus Funeral Home in Boyne City on Sunday, April 23.

Marie will be laid to rest next to Robert at the Dyer Cemetery in Bay Township.

Kecia Freed is a very special, dedicated community leader in Boyne City. She grew up in Fargo, North Dakota, the youngest of five daughters. Her parents were of Scandinavian descent and were role models for helping out in their community. They had an enormous influence on their girls and their memory still does to this day. Kecia is nonstop in her volunteering and commitment to do all she can for the Boyne City community and its people.

Kecia attended schools in Fargo, then on to a technical college. She began her career in graphic design in Fargo advertising agencies, then on to a package design firm in Minneapolis with clients including General Mills, Hasbro and Cracker Jack. In 1994, she started her own design firm there, and then in 1996 she and her family moved to northern Michigan. Upon looking for a house in this area, they visited Boyne City and immediately felt "this is home".

To Kecia, volunteering offers the opportunity to work with extraordinary people rolling up their sleeves on extraordinary projects, to be part of creating something larger and getting things done for the better.

Following their move, Kecia quickly became involved with the schools, the high school drama program, and subsequently with the City, Main Street, the Chamber and historical activities – and her volunteering only grew.

The Boyne Heritage Center <https://www.boyne-heritage.org/> is a particular passion. It is a nonprofit created to share the fascinating stories of the larger Boyne area and how the natural gifts of land and water have attracted people here for centuries. The exhibits will immerse visitors through time — from glaciers and pristine forests

through the lumber and industrial boom, to the rise of the resort era and finally to our eventual return to the conservation of those natural gifts. The interpretive center is still under development and in need of passionate support and funding.

The idea for the Heritage Center initiated with Kecia and several others. Although the learning curve of starting a new heritage center was steep, they recognized the passion our community has for its heritage and were determined to help build the expressive living voice and collective memory of those who came before us and those who will come after us. 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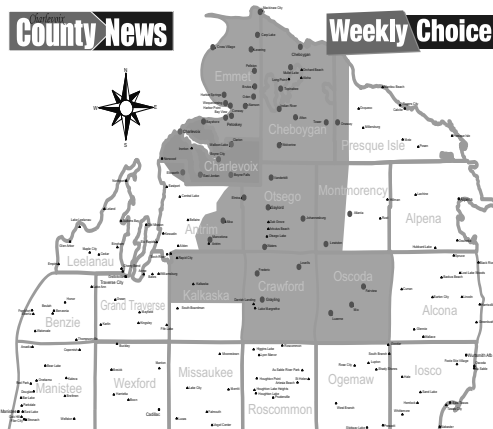

Gennett also plans to re-appoint Danielle Scheller, Paul Silva, and Sam Bingham to the Downtown Development Authority Board of Directors for terms expiring in April of 2027.

Shelley Boehmer is a retired educator, curriculum coordinator, grant writer, and class placement counselor in the middle and high school setting. Her reason for serving is her love for positive changes and the challenges that come with change.

In facilitating a 360 leadership assessment for a fine leader, I was told that she has a wonderful attitude, always wants to be helpful, yet at times is not as quick as we would like. She has so much on her mind, and if she were more organized her willingness and desire

to help and her responses would be more timely.

Her team members believe that being better organized would take her mind off so many things and enable her attention to focus on what is truly important, including the success of her those with whom she works.

Being organized sends a positive image, which is so important, as leaders are signal senders! We want to send an image that we have it all together, that we can and will focus on what is most important, not things that keep us busy and may not have the most beneficial impact.

Fact is, being organized enables us to be more productive, set an example for

Grants for Arts & Culture, Environment Awarded

The Charlevoix County Community Foundation (C3F) hosted two grant cycles in March, responding to requests from local non-profit organizations for environment and land use needs, as well as arts and culture needs. Thanks to donors who look to the Community Foundation to make a difference close to home, a total of \$73,092 in grants have been awarded to nonprofits between the two cycles.

The Arts & Culture grant cycle is a new addition to the variety of grant cycles hosted by the Community Foundation each year. A total of \$30,000 was awarded to organizations who will bring arts, music, history, and cultural programs and projects to Charlevoix County residents.

Our region is in for some great musical programs and performances this year. The Great Lakes Chamber Orchestra will host Women Composers Night in September, honoring the often-overlooked history of women composers. Great Lakes Center for the Arts will receive support for the Dorothy Gerber Strings program in Charlevoix County, helping children learn to play string instruments. The Baroque on Beaver festival, hosted by the Beaver Island Performing Arts Alliance, will receive support to bring choral scholars to perform along with the orchestra in this year's festi-

val, held at the end of July.

Culturally, Tara's Meadow Education and Retreat Center will collaborate with others on Beaver Island to host an Anishinaabe water ceremony, Celtic blessing, and Strawberry Moon feast in late June. This annual event brings people together to share in traditions from both Anishinaabe/Ojibwa and Irish/Celtic heritage; two important influences on Beaver Island.

Additionally, the Charlevoix Circle of Arts will receive support for their community arts programs, Raven Hill Discovery Center will use funds to help bring students to their Smithsonian exhibit in the fall, and the Charlevoix Historical Society will use their grant to work on creating a new maritime exhibit. East Jordan Public Schools and Crooked Tree Arts Center will use funding to help with improvements to their respective theaters in East Jordan and Petoskey.

Environment and Land Use grants total \$43,092 and include projects that address environmental protection, restoration, and sustainability initiatives, as well as environmental education.

Three organizations will work on preventing or managing invasive species in Charlevoix County. Little Traverse Conservancy will address invasive species at the DeNardis preserve, located just south of

Charlevoix. CAKE CISMA will purchase an official truck for their organization, allowing summer field work addressing invasive species all over the County to become more streamlined and efficient. And Walloon Lake Association and Conservancy will focus on aquatic invasive species by installing a solar boat washing station at a boat launch in Charlevoix County.

On Beaver Island, the Beaver Island Rural Health Center will convert all of the Center's lighting to LED, improving energy efficiency. Tara's Meadow Education and Retreat Center will continue their work researching sustainable energy initiatives on the Island. Additionally, the Beaver Island Historical Society, along with a gardening group on the Island, will work on installing a pollinator garden behind the Print Shop Museum.

East Jordan Public Schools will focus on environmental education by making improvements to the Brown's Creek trail, used regularly by students and teachers for outdoor education.

Finally, Camp Daggett will work on protecting the lakeshore by repairing an old retaining wall that has fallen into disrepair. Similarly, Friends of the Jordan River Watershed will make improvements to the exterior of the Watershed Center building in East Jordan, which will soon be part of

the Don & Eileen Klein Nature Trail connecting downtown East Jordan to the Rogers Family Homestead Nature Preserve, owned by Little Traverse Conservancy.

Advisory Board as The City received the title of Tree City for 2022. The Committee will specialize in the planting, upkeep, and research of the trees.

Commissioner Tom Neidhamer believes, "We're going to be making better decisions based on better

information."

However, Commissioner Moody respectfully points out, he is not against the trees, but rather against the confusion, this will create. Suggesting a subcommittee of an existing department to save confusion between the existing layers of The City, Parks, and Recreation and the Main Street Board.

Mayor Hugh Conklin suggests postponing until

August, but Moody optimistically shared the belief in a faster turnaround. In support of the group, just not the appointment of a new committee, the motion to table the topic to be picked back up was made. On June 13th, Mayor Conklin plans to have prepared information to help the decision move forward.

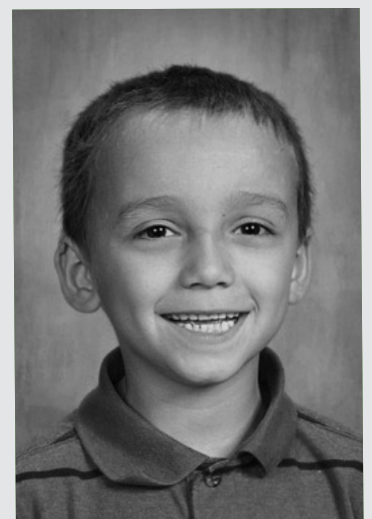

This award recognizes individuals and organizations across the state working tirelessly to maintain and improve the health of the local communities.

Joyce Fetrow, CPRM, CPRM-M, CHW, Project Director, received the award on behalf of NMORC. A ceremony and reception were held on April 11 in the new Heritage Hall of the Michigan State Capitol.

The Hometown Health Hero award is presented

each year to individuals and/or organizations that have made significant and measurable contributions to preserve and improve their community's health. Awardees are selected solely from nominations received. Denise Bryan,

District Health Department No. 4's Health Officer, nominated NMORC for their accomplishments and dedication to the community's health and well-being through the consortium's activities to abate the opioid epidemic in northern Lower Michigan.

NMORC brings together many partners to address the opioid epidemic across a 25-county region in

northern Lower Michigan. Partners include health-care facilities (hospitals, hospital affiliated clinics, Rural Health Clinics, and Federally Qualified Health Centers), Community Mental Health agencies, Local Public Health agencies, prevention and harm reduction organizations, counseling centers, treatment centers, recovery community resources, law enforcement, and EMS. They work to build a better living environment for people affected by opioid and substance use disorder. The NMORC's focus is on the following core activities:

1. Stigma reduction

2. Naloxone distribution, training & expansion of access

3. Harm reduction activities

4. Behavioral Health integration

5. Provider trainings

6. Workforce

7. Building recovery capital

"This work is innovative and has never been undertaken with this extensive geography," said Bryan, "and most importantly the work includes the voice of people with lived experiences."

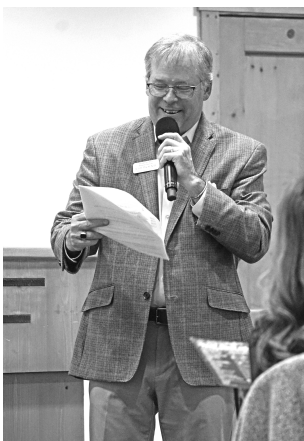

This proposal will allow the school district to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18 mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for

the school district to receive its revenue per pupil foundation allowance.

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, in Vanderbilt Area Schools, Otsego, Charlevoix and Cheboygan Counties, Michigan, be increased by 1 mill (\$1.00 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for the year 2023 and 19 mills (\$19.00 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 5 years, 2024 to 2028, inclusive, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and 1 mill is levied in 2023 is approximately \$53,000 and 18 mills are levied in 2024 is approximately \$972,000?

EAST JORDAN CITY COMMISSION MEETING, APRIL 11, 2023

Guy Vallance recognized for 48 years of service; City budget approved

The two regularly scheduled City Commission meetings were combined into one for April. East Jordan City Commissioners had plenty to discuss as big changes are ahead.

Honoring Guy Vallance for his 48 years of service to the city through the East Jordan Fire Department, and the East Jordan EMS

while extending heartfelt thanks from the City Commission and the entire community.

The new business quickly prompted attention as the Proposed budget for the fiscal year of 2023-2024 was approved to be introduced under Ordinance 268. While work on Sportsman's Park began back in 2019, the commissioners shared the local work that could be done to ease the overall cost for the

project while accepting Harbor Springs Excavating and Reese Riley's bid.

As Tom Cannon explains the trajectory of the Sportsman's Park Project, City Commissioner, Phil Hofweber, questions the smaller trail. His mind is put to ease when explained that it will always be natural, never paved, and the overlook will be a viewing platform close to the river. The size of the platform will about around

six feet with railings, Cannon estimates.

To aid in housing solutions, The City has hired a part-time employee – Zachary Sompels. He was most recently a city planner for The City of Petoskey and before working for Manistee County Visitors Bureau and Genesee County as a city planner. He holds a Master's of Urban and Regional Planning from Michigan State University.

Cannon says, "He's got serious planning background, so hopefully he sticks around."

Lastly, the City Commission addressed the friction between the Library Board and The City. With miscommunication being a leading factor, The City suggested addressing the Library Board with a presentation to help them understand and no longer view the misconception as the end goal

and relationship.

"We've made significant strides over the last ten years in developing and fundraising for a new facility and we've chosen not to pull the trigger on that yet.

Number one is because it's expensive to build a school. Secondly, we've got all this inflation that's happened over the last few years and it just didn't make good economical sense. So we have that money put aside earning interest for us and we're going to continue to raise money for that. It's not at the top of our list."

As donors' money is still in the fund, the school

looks to find future students to continue the school. The event was not only to raise funds but to raise awareness. Godwin continues to say,

"Top of our list is to get students in the door. Without students, what's the point of having a new building?"

The school is non-denominational, all are welcome, and for those struggling with the tuition they offer tuition assistance scholarships.

One major strength presented was the ability to offer a preschool program after being unable to do so in prior years. Godwin exclaimed,

"Our preschool is back up and running and we're just so thankful that it is and we're just expecting great things from our preschool going forward. Hopefully filling seats with more little ones next year, but it's great to have it back, the doors back open on those little kids at the preschool."

As many families are concerned about the health of their children as they send them to school, Godwin shares the hard work that goes into keeping the school ready for its students.

"Everybody knows, especially post-COVID, how these schools need to be cleaned and sanitized. It's just such a blessing to have such dedicated folks that come in, in the evenings and on weekends, to get our schools ready for our students and keeping them healthy and the staff and teachers healthy as well."

This is just the tip of the iceberg when it comes to what the volunteers do to keep the school up and running –

Reinforcing the importance of support, Godwin says "Volunteers are integral to what we do in serving our children and making sure that we educate them in the light of the Lord."

Ebenezer Christian School offers preschool through 8th grade and is solely run on donations. Even with all the amazing volunteers, and epic plans, it cannot continue to positively impact the children and communities they live in.

They seek the communities of Northern Michigan to understand their mission and struggles so they may work together to address current issues. Looking to connect with business, church, and community leaders of the Christian faith; Ebenezer continually advances aspects in the executive world where they may lack. Law Enforcement Conducting Training Exercise on Beaver Island

CHARLEVOIX COUNTY, MI. The Michigan State Police, United States Coast Guard, and local agencies will be conducting an emergency response training exercise on Beaver Island in Charlevoix County on April 28th and 29th.

Local residents on Beaver Island will see an increase in emergency response activities as multiple agencies will be testing response and law enforcement capabilities between Charlevoix and Beaver Island on April 28th and 29th. The operation titled Maritime Resolve, will bring together multiple U.S. Coast Guard units, Michigan State Police (MSP), Charlevoix Emergency Management, the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office, the Little Traverse Bay Band of Ottawa Indians, and other government and civil emergency response agencies in Northern Michigan to confirm and test response capabilities. The focus of this exercise is to confirm the ability to respond to multiple hypothetical emergencies in a remote location like Beaver Island.

The MSP will be providing multiple resources including troopers and command staff from the MSP Gaylord Post, MSP Emergency Support Team, MSP Aviation Unit, MSP Marine Services Team, and MSP Canine units.

The U.S. Coast Guard regularly partners with state and local agencies to train, prepare, and equip for emergencies.

HDNW's Jane Sundmacher helps turn vision into life-changing results

On April 11, Jane Sundmacher stood in Heritage Hall of the State Capitol in Lansing to receive the coveted Jean Chabot Health Policy Champion Award. To her surprise, she was also presented with the State of Michigan Special Tribute signed by Gov. Gretchen Whitmer, Lt. Gov. Garlin Gilchrist II, and Sen. Michele Hoytenga.

Immediately following the first presentation and photos, Sundmacher accepted a similar Michigan-shaped Jean Chabot award and a framed Special Tribute on behalf of the Northern Michigan Community Health Innovation Region (CHIR). The CHIR represents a 31-county collaboration that supports health and wellbeing of more than 800,000 residents by engaging residents, local health departments, healthcare providers, insurers, community organizations, and local government agencies to come together to identify and implement strategies that address community health priorities.

Sundmacher is the Health Department of Northwest Michigan (HDNW) Director of Regional Planning and the Executive Director of the CHIR. Both sets of awards

recognize a seven-year commitment to establishing and expanding the group.

The CHIR's results include improved health and safety, as well as lower healthcare costs regionally, which includes residents in Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties.

One example of how the organization helps is shown when members began to

notice a trend where people with established homes when entering a recovery program were homeless when released, creating stress at a vulnerable time. CHIR staff convened key partners and discovered that the organization providing rent assistance was not notified when the tenant entered treatment. A change in intake procedures created the key con-

nection.

"It is with deep appreciation for the important work performed by the Northern Michigan Community Health Innovation Region that we join in celebrating its accomplishments by commemorating the organization's receipt of the Michigan Jean Chabot Health Policy Champion Award," the state tribute says. "The Northern Michi-

gan CHIR's nomination is a testament to the impactful work it performs on behalf of Michiganders across Northern Michigan."

The Jean Chabot Health Policy Champion Award is a major part of Public Health Week in Michigan, which was celebrated April 9-15. This award is presented to individuals and/or organizations that have made significant contributions toward the health and well-being of Michigan citizens in the policy arena at the local and/or state level.

"I was not expecting to receive a Special Tribute signed by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and Senator Hoytenga at the MALPH Day at the Capitol," Sundmacher says, noting to coworkers that she will bring the award and the tribute to an upcoming meeting to acknowledge their role in the CHIR's outcomes. "We are so grateful for your vision and support of the CHIR. I share this award with all of you as well as the hundreds of residents and partners engaged in the CHIR."

Challenge Grant Offered to Raise Final Funding for Trail Construction

Community Support Needed to Meet Challenge Grant

A brand new universally accessible trail is coming to East Jordan...as soon as the final fundraising can be completed!

“We are so close to the home stretch for this project and a new \$30,000 challenge grant offered by Hank and Liesel Meijer will greatly help us get there,” said Kieran Fleming, Executive Director of Little Traverse Conservancy. The Conservancy has helped coordinate fundraising for the new trail which crosses nature preserves owned by the organization.

The new Don & Eileen Klein Nature Trail will run from East Jordan’s Sportsman’s Park on the edge of the Jordan River. From there, it will travel a short distance to the Friends of the Jordan River Watershed building. From there

it will veer across the wetlands along the edge of the river, returning at the northern trailhead of the Rogers Family Homestead Nature Preserve at Echo Street. The new boardwalk will be a comfortable place where wheelchairs, strollers, walkers, and joggers are all welcome.

“We are just under \$100,000 shy of the total goal,” Fleming said. He explained that this project has been an incredible partnership between the Conservancy, the City of East Jordan, the lead donor - Don Klein - and all other donors to the project.

“If you can raise the final funds, the City is hopeful trail construction can begin in late summer/early fall and be completed before snowfall.

Carey picked up the win in the second game, pitching four and one-third innings and giving up two runs on three hits, 10 strikeouts and two walks.

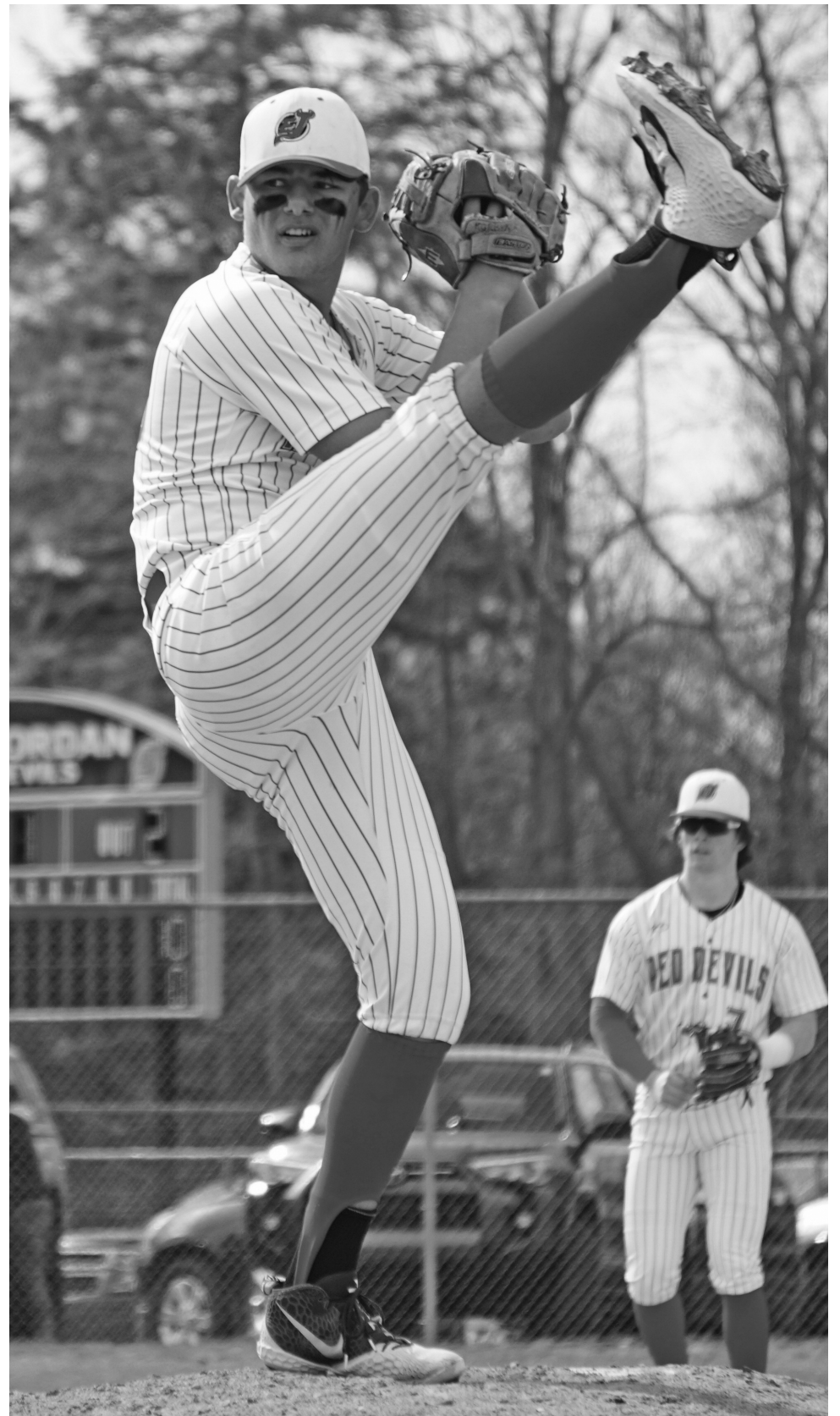

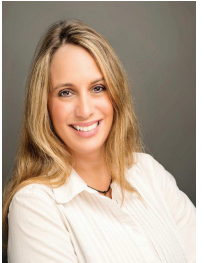
