SPORT SOCCER

Chris Krajewski of Petoskev will be honored with a 2023 Purple Ribbon Award for Lifetime Achievement through DomesticShelters.org; she is the Domestic Abuse and Sexual Assault Program Director with Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan (WRCNM). The national recognition program honors leaders and achievers in the domestic violence movement, including advocates, programs, shelters and survivors. The awards ceremony will be held virtually in May.

Since joining WRCNM in 1987, Krajewski has been dedicated to the work of supporting, respecting and empowering survivors. Much of her focus involves awareness-raising, educa-

tion and prevention of gender-based violence through community partners, task force groups, speaking engagements and professional training presentations for law enforcement, prosecutors and medical personnel.

Under her guidance, WRCNM expanded and enhanced numerous services that center on the unique needs of survivors while acknowledging the societal influences working against them. She currently oversees 25+ program staff providing 24-hour response, Safe Home temporary shelter, transitional supportive housing, therapeutic counseling, advocacy, violence prevention education and critical social change work. The program has become a model for other agencies in Michigan and nationwide.

Krajewski recognized with national Lifetime Achievement award

"I am filled with gratitude to be nominated for this award by my peers and so honored to receive it," Krajewski said after learning of the recognition. Throughout the past

three decades, Krajewski said there has been a societal awakening to the prevalence of gender-based violence, and more recently, an urgency by individuals, groups and businesses to take everyday actions to help create needed, positive change.

"During my career, it's been gratifying to live in a community that has been approachable and supportive of the work needing to be done in our rural area," Krajewski said. "It is a lifetime of work that needs to continue because this type of violence is preventable and as a strong, compassionate community we still have much to do."

WRCNM Executive Director Gail Kloss said, "Chris has a special combination

of gifts beyond her education and training. She is passionate about the work and also has a broad understanding of the complexities of gender-based violence and the ability to communicate it clearly to various individuals and groups."

In her 37 years of work, Krajewski has participated in countless national and state conferences, seminars and training sessions. For some of these, she was specifically chosen to represent Michigan by a governor-appointed board called the Domestic and Sexual Violence Prevention and Treatment Board, which oversees the state-funded programs in Michigan.

Don't trespass. There's plenty of public land that you can search on, so avoid private property.

Dress appropriately. If you're walking in the woods, boots are a musthave.

Carry a compass or GPS. It can be helpful in unfamiliar areas.

Know what to look for. False morels do exist, so



City of Boyne City Residential Rubbish-Collection Program (Services provided to residences with 3 or less residential units)

- The total volume of all items is limited to two cubic yards per week (volume of a regular pickup bed)
- Furniture and household furnishing, such as sofas, chairs, mattresses, tables, lamps, floor coverings, and carpeting (carpeting must be rolled and secured in diameters of no greater than two feet and in lengths of no greater than four feet)
- Appliances, such as, but not limited to, stoves, refrigerators, freezers, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioners, vacuum cleaners and dehumidifiers (Freon **must** be removed from all refrigerators, air conditioners, freezers and dehumidifiers by a licensed contractor and removal certifications must be attached)
- Toys, bicycles, sporting goods, hoses, rakes, shovels and outdoor furniture
- Clothing and similar materials
- Remodeling and construction debris generated by the resident; roofing shingles must be placed within containers weighing less than 50 pounds
- Boards up to four feet in length and secured in bundles; weighing less than 50 pounds
- NOTE: Do not put any items in any dark plastic garbage bags, as they will not be picked up

Material excluded from collection:

- No televisions, computers or microwave ovens will be picked up
- Household garbage (residents must make arrangements with private refuse-disposal firms)
- Scrap metal
- Trees, brush and grass clippings (these items may be dropped off at the North Boyne Compost Yard located at the end of Robinson Street, but commercial contractors are excluded from using this drop off area unless they have paid the commercial disposal fee) NOTE: stumps are not accepted.
- Vehicle parts including tires
- Manufacturing or construction trade wastes
- Remodeling and construction debris not generated by the resident
- Earth and sod. Limited amounts of these can be taken up to North Boyne Compost Yard
- Rocks, brick and concrete
- Containers weighing more than 50 pounds (except for furniture and appliances)
- Any item that will be accepted for recycling such as newspapers, magazines, cardboard, plastic, glass, etc. The recycling drop off point is located in the rear of the Road Commission garage on Boyne Avenue.
- Tires, electronics including televisions, computers and microwave ovens, along with hazardous products, such as paints, chemicals, solvents, motor oil, and batteries can be disposed of at Charlevoix County's Household Hazardous Waste collection dates of June 9^{th} & 10^{th} and September 8^{th} & 9th. November General Election Information

There are four (4) City Commission seats up for election in November. Completed nominating petitions for candidates were due on April 25th by 4 p.m. After official review of the submitted petitions, it has been determined that six (6) individuals were successfully nominated to run for election. With having only six (6) candidates, the City will not need to hold a primary election on Tuesday, August 8, 2023 but will just hold a General Election on November 7, 2023. The nominees who will be on the ballot are as follows:

gether a map of large burn areas that occurred within the past couple years.

When: Head out about six weeks after the snow has melted. Morels like things warm and moist (not soggy), so a day following a spring rain improves your odds. Hunt when daytime highs have hovered in the 60s and nights have gone no lower than the 40s.

How: Slowly, patiently and carefully. Pinch and twist the stem at ground level, leaving the roots and a few whole mushrooms to reproduce again next season.

Tip: Collect morels in a mesh or net sack—an onion bag is perfect. Not only will the holes allow your mushrooms to breathe and keep them from turning to mush, but they can cast their spores as you hike, hopefully inspiring growth in new spots.

Identification: Like many mushrooms, morels have lookalikes. Uncertain you've got the real McCoy? The Michigan DNR has a page to help you learn more about morels at

News 8th Annual Autism Acceptance Walk -Informing, Celebrating, and Supporting

The 8th Annual Walk for Autism Acceptance was held at Veterans Park in Boyne City. The walk is to raise understanding and acceptance, support screening and intervention, advance research, create breakthroughs, and help the transition into adulthood for those living with autism.

With the pandemic putting things on hold, it was the first year back in action walking for autism acceptance and the time away did not diminish the efforts of North Country Community Health. This vear was the largest turnout yet and with continued support from surrounding communities, future walks will grow in numbers.

Starting at the pavilion in Veterans Park, people of all ages and backgrounds walked along the

waterfront and looped back to the park. The event was hard to miss if you were driving on Lake Street as the stretch of supporters walking filled the entire sidewalk. Spanning from the Lake Street stoplight down to Veterans Park, the support for Autism acceptance could be seen.

Formerly called the Autism Awareness Walk, North Country Community Health decided to rename the walk, changing only one keyword -Awareness.

Not only to raise awareness, NCCH looks for the community to accept those with autism and their families - now named the Autism Acceptance Walk.

Acceptance comes in many forms, however, one of the most important ways is consideration. We must consider that people with autism have different needs. Not only to ac-

knowledge it, but act on it. Community members must consider altering an environment or experience to allow inclusion for all. This inclusion is important to ensure each individual living with autism knows they hold just as much importance and value as every other person.

A wonderful example of this inclusion is from the event itself. At each walk, there is a quiet space that can be used as a safe outlet for someone living with autism or their family. This space is vital when a person with autism gets overwhelmed or needs a secluded place to decompress.

If someone with autism can't manage the sensory overload, bolting is a scarv reality many families face. Nearly half of those living with autism will wander or bolt from safety. Bodies of water are a worry for any parent,

but according to autismspeaks.org, drowning is the leading cause of death for children with autism and accounts for 90 percent of deaths associated with wandering or bolting in ages 14 and younger. Living in a state with hundreds of inland lakes and the Great Lakes surrounding, it is important to be aware of this potential danger.

Early interventions are vital and lead to the best care for those living with autism as well as working toward a happy and fulfilled life. Interventions may include speech therapy, behavioral interventions, occupational therapy, and more.

Autism affects the entire body causing many struggles that are faced daily however with the trials come beautiful strengths. AutismBC shares the following positive aspects of living with autism or having a loved one diagnosed with autism- planning and sorting skills, pattern recognition, a strong sense of justice, hyperlexia, critical thinking skills, creative expression, and much more.

Autism is not limited to an ethnic or socioeconomic group so an active and ongoing process must happen in hopes of bridging the gap between the unknown and where you stand. To accept means to understand, and to understand means to learn. Learning takes time and work, so many are still uninformed on the topic. I urge you to educate yourself on Autism Spectrum Disorder and how you can be considerate of the needs others have.

Are you willing to do what it takes?

Dear Dave,

I'm an anesthesiologist, and I make between \$260,000 and \$270,000 a year. My wife is a stay-athome mom who takes care of our preschool-age kids. We have about \$50,000 in a retirement fund, \$50,000 in consumer debt, \$220,000 in student loan debt, and we owe \$280.000 on our house, which is worth around \$500,000. We're thinking about using our retirement fund to pay off credit cards and such. then selling the house and using the money to pay off the student loans. After that, we'd live in an apartment for a while, save up 20% or more for a down payment on the next home, and do things right financially moving forward. What do you think about this game plan?

Jake

Dear Jake,

Wow, I really appreciate your motivation, man. You're willing to do whatever it takes, and that's pretty cool. Not many people have the determination to do the kinds of things you're talking about.

I almost never tell people to sell their homes. If you actually can't afford it, that's one thing-and in that case, we'd sell the house. If it's the only way to avoid bankruptcy, we'd get rid of it in a heartbeat. But in your case, things are a little different. You're in a pretty deep hole, but your income as an anesthesiologist gives you a really big shovel you can use to carve out some steps, get up out of that hole, and fill it in so you never fall in again.

Now, this is going to mean some real lifestyle changes for a few years. I'm talking about beans and rice, and no vacations. There's no more living like a rich doctor, because you're not a rich doctor—you're a broke doctor. We're going to temporarily stop adding to your retirement fund, not cash it out, and we're going to start living on a written, monthly budget where every single dollar is given a name and a purpose.

Cleaning up \$270,000 of debt sounds scary. But with a \$260,000 income and the other changes we talked about, you could put \$90,000 a year toward all this and have it completely cleaned up in just three years. That's what I'd do if I woke up in your shoes. It will set you free for the rest of your lives to invest and save.

Get on it, doc. You can do this!

You'll still have your house. you'll just have more to do other things with.
