A crying baby? Don't worry, Mom can soothe them back to sleep.

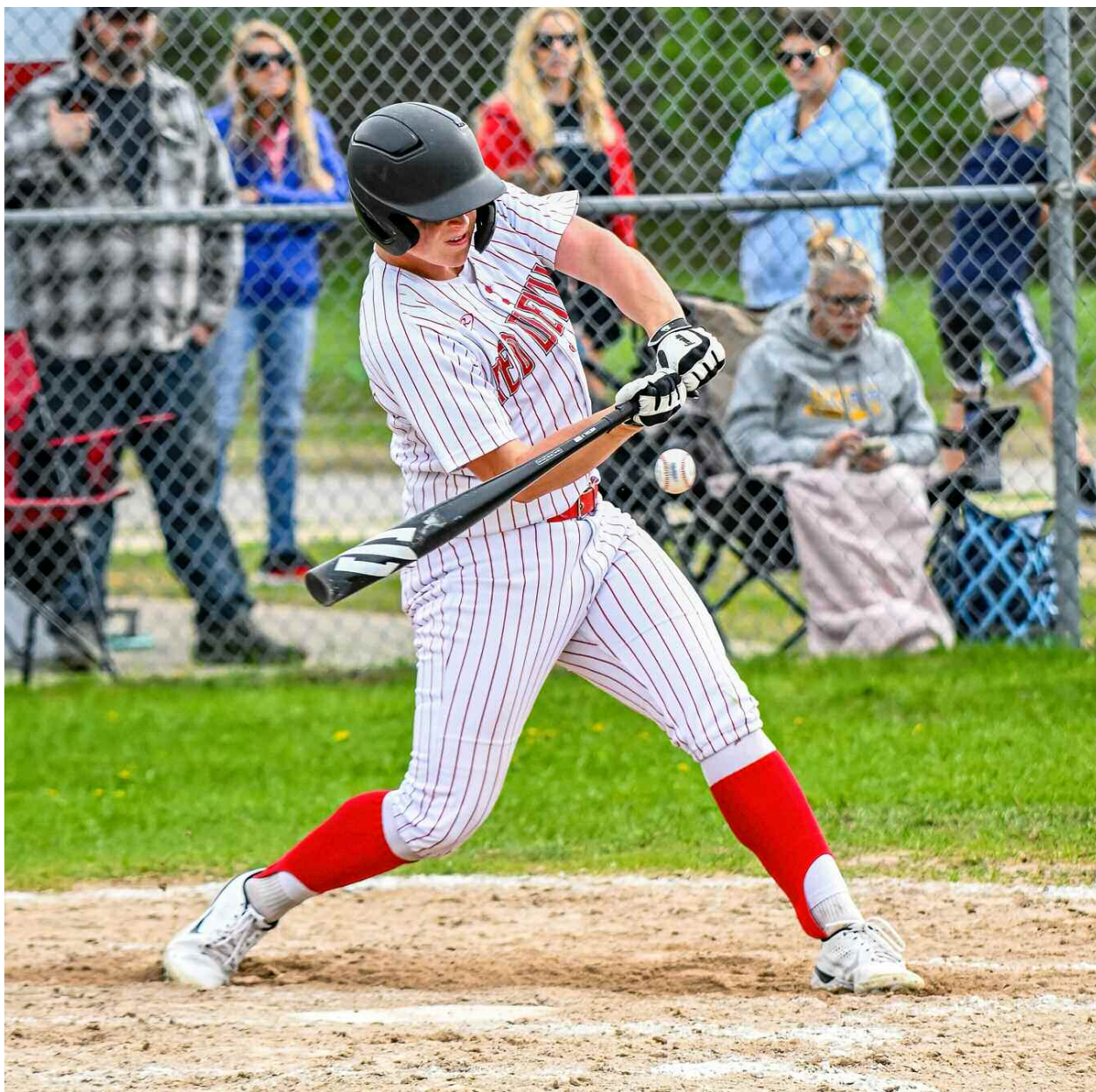

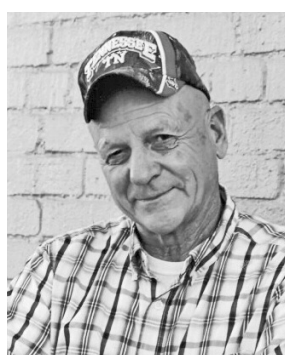

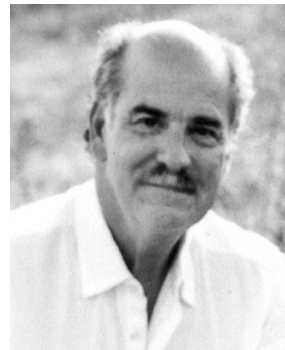

## Leaders Have The Difficult Conversations

A problem discussed is a problem half-solved

As leaders, we have an obligation to our team members and our business to do all that we can to assure a positive working environment. This means addressing problems on a timely basis – and that invariably means stepping up and having a conversation(s) with the person(s) who may be the root of the problem.

When we step up to the problem and the challenges it may involve, we are sending an important message to our team, that we care about them and our culture.

To address a problem or a badly-behaved team member, it may mean we will have a conversation(s) that could be considered difficult. It means discussing the problem and how it affects others. It can mean offering constructive feedback, entering a situation where there is obvious conflict to help achieve resolution, or other corrective conversa-

tions.

We must understand that anxiety, angst, and stress do not come from a problem, they come from not addressing the problem – and the problem will surely grow worse.

Think of the conversation as helpful rather than difficult.

When a manager ignores a problem, incivility, or a difficult team member who is bad for team morale and teamwork, this is frustrating for those who are dedicated and want to do great work, individually and as a

team. It very likely leads to undue stress.

Not addressing a problem is letting our team members down. It decreases productivity, creativity and morale. It is shirking our responsibility as a leader.

## RUBBISH PICKUP

City wide rubbish pickup will be Saturday, May 20. Place materials on the street after 5 p.m. Friday and it must be out no later than 7 a.m. Saturday. This is for larger items that cannot be disposed of with your household trash - such as mattresses, furniture and light construction debris. This is available for residential properties of 3 units or less (not commercial properties) within the city limits. The total volume of all items that may be placed out for collection per house is limited to two cubic yards, about the size of a regular pick-up truck bed. This link has complete details and acceptable / non-acceptable items.

#### City of Boyne City Residential Rubbish-Collection Program (Services provided to residences with 3 or less residential units)

- The total volume of all items is limited to two cubic yards per week (volume of a regular pickup bed)
- Furniture and household furnishing, such as sofas, chairs, mattresses, tables, lamps, floor coverings, and carpeting (carpeting must be rolled and secured in diameters of no greater than two feet and in lengths of no greater than four feet)
- Appliances, such as, but not limited to, stoves, refrigerators, freezers, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioners, vacuum cleaners and dehumidifiers (Freon **must** be removed from all refrigerators, air conditioners, freezers and dehumidifiers by a licensed contractor and **removal certifications** must be attached)
- Toys, bicycles, sporting goods, hoses, rakes, shovels and outdoor furniture
- Clothing and similar materials
- Remodeling and construction debris generated by the resident; roofing shingles must be placed within containers weighing less than 50 pounds
- Boards up to four feet in length and secured in bundles; weighing less than 50 pounds
- **NOTE:** Do not put any items in any dark plastic garbage bags, as they will not be picked up

#### Material excluded from collection:

- No televisions, computers or microwave ovens will be picked up
- Household garbage (residents must make arrangements with private refuse-disposal firms)
- Scrap metal
- Trees, brush and grass clippings (these items may be dropped off at the North Boyne Compost Yard located at the end of Robinson Street, but commercial contractors are excluded from using this drop off area unless they have paid the commercial disposal fee) **NOTE:** stumps are not accepted.
- Vehicle parts including tires
- Manufacturing or construction trade wastes
- Remodeling and construction debris not generated by the resident
- Earth and sod. Limited amounts of these can be taken up to North Boyne Compost Yard
- Rocks, brick and concrete
- Containers weighing more than 50 pounds (except for furniture and appliances)
- Any item that will be accepted for recycling such as newspapers, magazines, cardboard, plastic, glass, etc. The recycling drop off point is located in the rear of the Road Commission garage on Boyne Avenue.
- Tires, electronics including televisions, computers and microwave ovens, along with hazardous products, such as paints, chemicals, solvents, motor oil, and batteries can be disposed of at Charlevoix County's Household Hazardous Waste collection dates of June 9<sup>th</sup> & 10<sup>th</sup> and September 8<sup>th</sup> & 9<sup>th</sup>. # TOVA ROGERS, MD

## ASSURING HER PATIENTS KNOW SHE GENUINELY CARES

I write each week about community leaders. These people are exceptional and committed to serving our community. Getting to know them has been a privilege and an inspiration. After a meeting, I invariably call my wife and say, "I was just with such an outstanding person."

It is a privilege to write about Dr. Tova Rogers, a dermatologist who is new to our area. She is the only dermatologist in all of Charlevoix County. In fact, she may be the only dermatologist practicing medical dermatology for a 50-mile radius, even more from various Northern Michigan towns. Dr. Rogers opened her practice on March first of this year. Her decision to branch out on her own reflects her commitment to placing patient care ahead of finances. Physician owned practices are a dying breed as venture capitalist firms continue to acquire large numbers of privately-owned practices, with increased pressure for physicians to see more and more patients at the expense of quality care and, at times, patient safety.

Dr. Rogers grew up in Detroit and attended a small all-girls high school. There were 24 students in her graduating class. As she looks back on her time there, she feels the school seemed to be preparing students for

marriage and child rearing, as opposed to attending college and developing careers. Not many of Dr. Rogers' classmates went on to college. At the time, she felt ill prepared to pursue a career in medicine and instead focused on art, which she had a natural gift for, although medicine remained on her mind. She graduated from the College for Creative Studies in Detroit and went on to earn her masters of fine arts in sculpture at Cranbrook Academy of Art, one of the most prestigious programs in the country. Her work was exhibited at regional and national galleries, and she was finalist for a Fulbright

Scholar Grant.

After eight years of art training, Dr. Rogers realized that she could not ignore her continued dream to practice medicine. She was accepted into Columbia University to study premedical sciences, and then received her medical doctorate at Tel Aviv University. Between her third and fourth years of medical school Dr. Rogers was selected for a medical student research fellowship at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York City and received a research award for her work on early skin cancer detection. 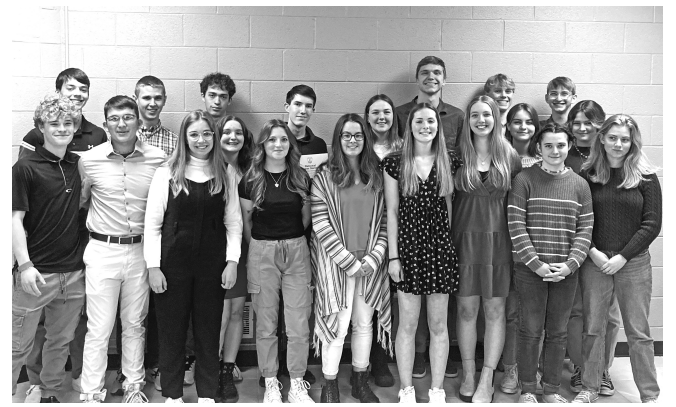
As her parents are aging, and because of our love of Michigan and her people, she moved back

It was never between you and them anyway. -Mother Teresa

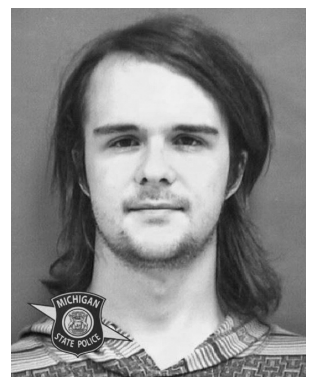

## Charlevoix Man Arrested for Two Counts Criminal Sexual Conduct Second Degree

CHARLEVOIX COUNTY, MI. In February 2023, the Michigan State Police (MSP) Gaylord Post received a referral from the Michigan Children's Protective Services of a sexual assault that allegedly occurred in 2020. The victim was interviewed at the Children's Advocacy Center in Roscommon. The victim identified the suspect as 25-year-old Cedar Moon Watchmaker-Strzyzewski from Charlevoix. Watchmaker-Strzyzewski declined an interview.

A report was turned over to the Charlevoix County Prosecutor's Office and an arrest warrant was authorized on May 1, 2023. Watchmaker-Strzyzewski was arrested at his residence in Charlevoix on May 2, 2023, and lodged in the Charlevoix County Jail.

## Seasonal Swing Begins: Summer Labor Force Expectations

It is May in Northern Michigan! College students and seasonal residents are returning, and local students are tantalizingly close to summer break. That means that our regional economy is about to kick into overdrive. Every year, youth employment plays a vital role in meeting demand, but regional trends show that the regional labor force is still below its pre-pandemic levels.

While everyone is personally familiar with the swell of people coming to Northern Michigan in the summer, Networks Northwest published a seasonal population study in the fall of 2022. Table 1 shows the results of that study for the NLEA service area.

According to these estimates, Antrim County’s population change is driven by almost 15,000 part-time residents and over 21,000 overnight visitors. Charlevoix County’s

11,000 part-time residents and over 22,000 overnight visitors. Emmet County’s increase is driven by over 10,000 part-time residents and over 30,000 overnight visitors. These visitors fill our local hotels, restaurants, marinas, shops, and festivals.

To meet the demand caused by the annual influx of consumers, the regional business community turns to youth workers. Young workers are integral to businesses that are seasonal in nature such as accommodation and food services; retail trade; and arts, entertainment, and recreation. Michigan’s Department of Technology, Management, and Budget

market forecast for Michigan teens ages 16-19. The release explains that the state’s population of teens ages 16 to 19 has been steadily declining over the past decade meaning that the number of available workers has declined too, a trend that is apparent in Northern Lower Michigan. The release goes on to state that, “there are just over 500,000 teens in this age group in Michigan, and roughly 235,000 (46.6 percent) plan on seeking or holding a job this summer.” Wayne Rourke, labor market information director of the Michigan Center for Data and Analytics asserts that “Teen participation in the state’s workforce is ex-

pandemic levels this summer.” If teen labor force participation is returning to pre-pandemic levels, does that mean our total labor force is doing the same?

Each summer, the NLEA service area adds thousands of workers to its labor force, driven primarily by high school and college students entering the workforce over break but also seasonal residents and adults who choose to enter the labor force during a time of increased demand.

Every year between January and July, Emmet County’s labor force increases by approximately 2,000 workers; Antrim County’s by approximately 1,500; Charlevoix County’s

viduals; and Cheboygan County’s by approximately 1,000. Despite a decrease in the month-to-month labor force, the magnitude of the seasonal swing remains. The new, smaller labor force can be partially attributed to trends seen across the country: older workers exiting the labor force earlier than expected, parents—disproportionately women—exiting the labor force due to childcare demands, and people reevaluating their professional lives.

Much like the young workers looking forward to a break from school, we are all looking forward to summer. However, data indicates that the labor force

constraints of the past few years will continue. Consumers should still expect longer wait times, restricted business hours, and other challenges. The region will still experience an influx of seasonal workers, predominantly high school and college students, but our total labor force is still below pre-pandemic levels. The NLEA is taking several steps to begin to address the challenge of a shrinking labor force. The 2023 Northern Lakes Economic Symposium and Showcase will focus on this issue, bringing in academics and professionals to discuss talent issues through the lenses of different business types, communities, and age groups. Additionally, the 2023 NLEA/DTE Energy Foundation Intern Project will focus on developing social media content to better market the region, its businesses, and its communities to working-age individuals around the country.



Mason Wilcox, Gavin Hewitt and Conner Rajkovich all doubled. Rajkovich also singled and Chas Stanek had two hits as well.

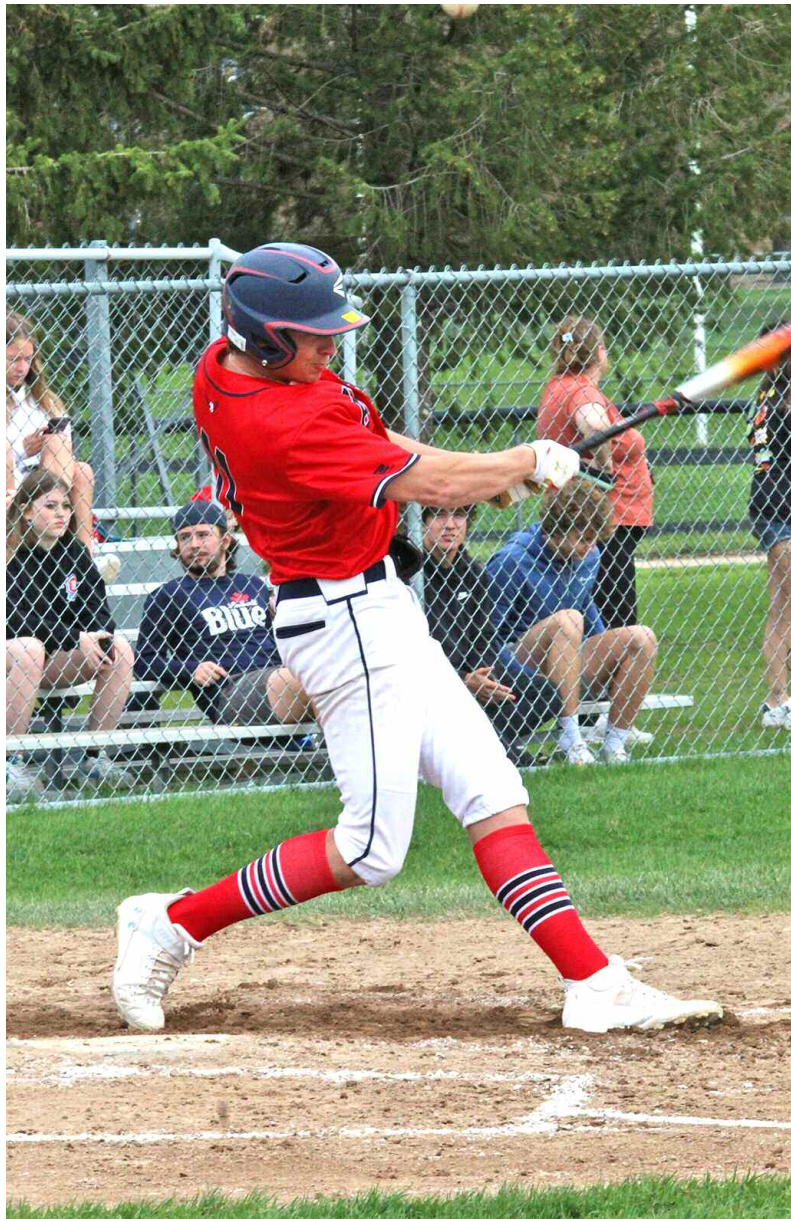

Mackinaw City scored 2 runs in the inning to break the 0-0 tie and win the game.

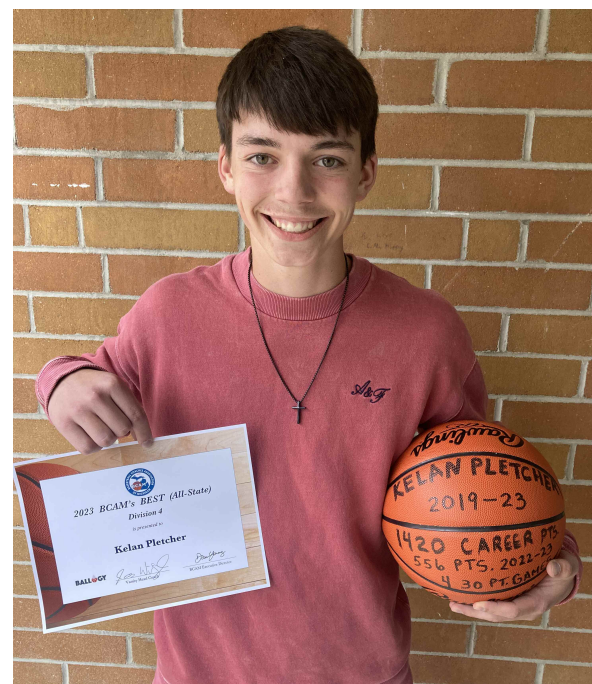

## MHSAA Spring Tournaments Soon to Begin as Calendar Turns to May

The wintery weather inevitably will loosen its grip across Michigan, and perhaps just in time with the first Michigan High School Athletic Association post-season events for this Spring 2023 season only a few weeks away and seeding for three of those tournaments soon to be announced.

Slightly more than 100,000 Michigan high school student-athletes participated in 2022 in spring sports for which the MHSAA sponsors postsea-

son competition – baseball, girls and boys lacrosse, girls soccer, softball, girls and boys track & field, boys golf (Lower and Upper Peninsula) and girls golf (UP), and girls (LP) and boys (UP) tennis.

This spring's tournaments will incorporate a few changes, with the most notable in girls lacrosse as the top two teams in every Girls Lacrosse Regional will be seeded and placed on opposite sides of the bracket for the first time. Seeds will be determined by using the

MHSAA's Michigan Power Ratings (MPR) formula, which takes into account success and strength of schedule and also is used currently to provide seeding information in boys lacrosse, girls and boys basketball, girls and boys soccer, and ice hockey. Only the top two teams in girls lacrosse will be seeded and separated; the other teams in each Regional will be placed on their brackets by random draw. Seeds and full brackets will be posted Sunday, May 7, on the girls

soccer page of the MHSAA Website at <https://www.mhsaa.com/sports/girls-soccer>.

Golf, tennis and girls soccer also have changes that will be noticeable over these next seven weeks.

In golf, the maximum number of strokes allowed per hole during MHSAA Tournament play has been reduced from 12 to 10. Also, teams will be allowed two school-approved coaches to be present and actively coaching during postseason rounds.

In tennis, the number of players who may be seeded at No. 1 singles has been increased to seven if there are between 21-23 players in the field, and eight if the field includes 24 or more players at that flight. The No. 1 singles flight is the only flight that allows for individual qualifiers from Regional play, often making it larger than the other seven flights at the Finals.

In girls soccer, the two seeded teams at the District level will host their games if those games are not scheduled to be played at a prearranged host site. For these Districts, the No. 1 seed gets hosting priority, followed by the No. 2 seed, followed by the team on the top line of the bracket. Girls Soccer District brackets, with seeds, will be posted May 14 on the MHSAA Website at <https://www.mhsaa.com/sports/girls-lacrosse>.

Boys Lacrosse Regional brackets, which also are seeded, will be posted May 10 to the MHSAA Website at <https://www.mhsaa.com/sports/boys-lacrosse>.

The 2022-23 Spring campaign culminates with post-season tournaments, as the championship schedule begins with the Upper Peninsula Girls & Boys Golf and Boys Tennis Finals on May 31 and June 1 and wraps up with Girls Soccer, Baseball and Softball Finals on June 17.
