

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

Housing North to Lead Regional Housing Partnership to Address Housing Needs in Northwest Michigan

Housing North is one of 25 housing agencies leading efforts in 15 regions around the state.

Traverse City, MICH. – The Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) recently announced Housing North to lead the Regional Housing Partnership (RHP) for Region D (Northwest Michigan). Housing North, selected by peers within the region, will partner with local governments, developers, nonprofits, businesses, local health departments, grassroots organizations,

philanthropic organizations, and other partners in Region D to address specific housing needs and implement strategies from the Statewide Housing Plan.

"We are excited to lead the Regional Housing Partnership for Region D in Northwest Michigan and are grateful for the trust placed in Housing North. Engaging with the community is paramount in addressing housing needs, and we are committed to working closely with the Michigan State Housing Development Authority and other stakeholders to make a meaningful difference in the implementation of the Statewide Housing Action Plan. Together, we look forward to developing a regional action plan that outlines strategies to

achieve the objectives of the plan to support the housing needs of our communities" said Yarrow Brown, executive director at Housing North. "With this task, Housing North is excited to continue to add value to our role established since our foundation in 2018 as the rural housing partnership

for Northwest Michigan".

Housing North will work
with community leaders
and housing developers to
address local and regional
barriers to affordable and
attainable housing, including communications, local
policy, equity, development
financing and more. These
collaborative efforts will result in a regional action
plan that outlines strategies
on how to address local
housing issues.

As part of the selection,

MSHDA will send \$175,000 in grant funding to Housing North to coordinate a regional action plan, identify its goals and name its objectives. The regional action plan will be shared with MSHDA by Fall 2023.

The Statewide Housing Plan, launched in 2022, is a strategic planning process aimed at increasing the accessibility of housing in Michigan by addressing racial housing disparities, increasing the stock of affordable housing, and more. The plan highlights the need to engage with local housing agencies to ensure all Michigan residents can secure safe and affordable housing.

"The Statewide Housing Plan is meant to make a difference for all Michiganders, and we're confident

that Housing North and partnerships with community leaders, nonprofits, and developers will help us better serve Region D," said Tiffany King, equity and inclusion officer at MSHDA. "By actively gathering insights and information from our regional housing partnership leads, we aim to ensure that every corner of the state receives the specific aid they require. Together, we can empower individuals in Region D with the housing support they deserve."

Founded in 2018, Housing North is a nonprofit organization that works to build awareness, influence policy, and grow capacity and resources for housing solutions in Antrim, Benzie, Charlevoix, Emmet, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, Leelanau, Manistee, Missaukee, and Wexford counties. Wilderness Trail Fire now fully contained

GRAYLING TOWN-SHIP – Fire crews continued putting out hot spots within the Wilderness Trail Fire burn area on Tuesday of this week as local roads reopened. The fire, estimated at 2,418 acres in size, was finally 100% contained.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources was asking people to stay away from the area in Crawford County's Grayling Township to give fire crews space to finish their work.

"We know it is interesting to see and that people are curious, but we want to make sure we have the room to get our work done safely," said Mike Janisse, commander of the DNR Incident Management Team that had been assisting with the

The fire started about 1 p.m. Saturday, June 3, near Staley Lake, escaping from a campfire on private property. The fire

quickly burned in a southwest direction through jack pine, mixed pine and oak in hilly, sandy terrain. The fire caused the evacuation of about 300 people until around 11 p.m. Saturday and closed I-75 in both directions Saturday afternoon and evening.

DNR ground crews working on the fire were assisted by many local agencies and air support including water-bearing planes and helicopters from the USDA Forest Service and the Michigan State Police.

Fire danger remains very high to extreme across the state. The DNR is not issuing permits for open burning at this time. If you must build a campfire or cooking fire, keep a close eye on it at all times and keep it small. Make sure you drench it with water, stir and drench again until it is cold to the touch before leaving it.

DNR firefighters statewide had fought more than two dozen fires in the week leading up to this writing on Tuesday, June 6.

David Roland Finley is president of North Central Michigan College, which is very much of a treasure for this area. A great many of our Charlevoix County residents have earned or are currently gaining a valuable education from NCMC.

The future is bright for the college. Finley and his team have exciting plans, and NCMC is committed to expanding offerings while maintaining high standards. Finley notes that the college is fortunate to have an exceptional board guiding these efforts.

By background, Finley grew up downstate, studied Atmospheric Science at U. Michigan, then earned his Master's and Ph.D. in Chemical Engineering at Wayne State.

Following a decade of teaching, Finley became VP of Academic Affairs at Trine University in Indiana, where he also served as Interim Dean of the Business School and the School of Arts and Sciences. There was signifi-

In time, Finley was offered the opportunity to become President at NCMC. He and his wife, Heidi, an accomplished artist, made the move five years ago. He says with a smile, "few people move south to Petoskey \boxtimes .

As stated above, NCMC has nearly 2,000 degree-seeking students and thousands more continuing education students from all over Northern Michigan. The college offers on-campus and online learning, with two-thirds of this year's grads transferring on to a university.

Providing lifelong learning opportunities is another important component of NCMC's mission, and this area of the college is highly-valued and growing. The college recently introduced Fast Track Career Programs to serve returning adult learners with education that is fast, flexible, and affordable.

Conversely, many of the younger students want the complete "college experience." NCMC has a 155-bed dormitory, with plans for a second. They have also recently begun intercollegiate athletics, with games played in the new Petoskey Plastics Arena.

NCMC is working to

build career ladders in several fields, including engineering, manufacturing, and public safety, with programs lasting a few weeks to four years. Nursing career ladder graduates quickly secure employment in healthcare facilities across Northern Michigan. The pending Career and Technical Education Enhancement (CATEE) building project will enable development of additional career ladders. Perhaps building trades, a key need in our area, can be offered

Time Tested Leadership Values

Influence is important, yet tricky, as it is something we should not inten-

tionally pursue.

Let's become one who can deliver, make things happen, get the job done – and be assured that there will be a demand for us.

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

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

Rural Health Center will purchase some items that will improve patient care and experience. The City of Charlevoix Recreation Department will use their grant to launch Charlevoix Fit, a new health and wellness initiative designed to increase physical activity outdoors. The City of Boyne City's EMS department will purchase a special basket for performing remote rescues on local bike trails, responding to the rising need as trail systems expand.

Mental health is big part of overall health and wellbeing, and it's getting a boost with two specific grants. Northern Michigan Equine Therapy uses the healing nature and movement of horses as a therapeutic tool to enhance independence, self-confidence, and quality of life for those living with physical and mental health needs. Their grant will help to support the therapy horses so that they can continue healing humans in Charlevoix County. Hospice of Michigan will use their grant toward their Grief Support Services, which are tailored to the unique, individual



needs of those who are

grieving. Education provides a strong foundation for a community, from early childhood to post-secondary, and provides people with the skills and knowledge they need to be successful. Char-Em ISD's Great Start Collaborative and PoWer! Book Bags will both address education for our youngest residents. Great Start Collaborative will provide scholarships to families left out of other funding programs to help ensure that as many children as possible can attend quality preschool programs. PoWer! Book Bags provides literacy materials for families to read, play, write, and learn to-

gether. Providing these materials early on gives kids a boost for starting school.

On the other end of the school pipeline, students who want to get on the fast track to getting local jobs that pay a stable, livable wage will get a boost with the grant to North Central Michigan College. NCMC's Fast Track programs are non-credit, short, intensive courses that are designed to get students the skills and knowledge they need, quickly, so that they can join the workforce. With course topics like healthcare, manufacturing, skilled trades, and business, students will be able to help with the labor shortage by filling local jobs and at the same

time earn a livable wage to support their families.

Protecting and caring for our area's natural resources is another important piece of a healthy and thriving community. Little Traverse Conservancy will use their grant to acquire 56 acres of pristine forest on Lake Michigan and to build a universally accessible trail for all to enjoy the beauty and peacefulness of nature. The Village of Boyne Falls is teaming up with Conservation Resource Alliance to determine the fate of a more than 100-year-old dam which is becoming unsafe. Their grant will help them develop educational materials about the dam, the problems, and possible solutions.

Public safety will get a boost with a grant to the City of Boyne City's Police Department for the purchase of drones to assist in protection of life and preservation of property. Local journalism will also get backing, with a grant to the Beaver Island Historical Society to purchase some equipment necessary for the production of the Northern Islander newspaper.

Arts and history will also be supported through the Charlevoix Circle of Arts's grant for arts programs, and the Northern Michigan Antique Fly Wheelers's grant to replace their commercial grill, hopefully in time for this year's festival at the end

Finally, recreation and community facilities will benefit from grants to Challenge Mountain for new ski instructor jackets, to the Charlevoix Area Community Pool for lifeguard training and equipment, to Crooked Tree Arts Center for renovations to the community theater, to East Jordan Public Schools for repairs and renovations to Boswell Stadium, and to the East Jordan Ambulance Association for building expansion designs.

In all, 21 organizations received grants through this year's Community Priorities grant cycle, totaling \$147,750. To see the full list

of grant awards from the 2023 Community Priorities grant cycle, visit c3f.org.

The next grant cycle at C3F is Geographic Enrichment. Applications will be available after August 1, 2023. This cycle will focus on requests from eligible nonprofit partners that serve the specific communities of Beaver Island, Boyne City, Charlevoix, and/or East Jordan. Rep. Cam Cavitt seeks clarity on record-high gas prices throughout Northern Michigan

BY STATE REP. CAM **CAVITT, OF CHEBOYGAN**

One question I frequently field when I connect with people in our community is: "Why are gas prices so high around here?" The 106th House District, which I represent, spans six Northern Michigan counties. We have a large supply of oil, close proximity to Line 5, and the City of Cheboygan even has its own fuel terminal. Local drivers would expect to benefit from lower gas prices. Unfortunately, that is not the case. The 106th has some of the highest gas prices in the state, with the average price per gallon often coming in about 20 to 30 cents higher than in nearby Gaylord or Clare. Why is that? Turns out, the answer is complex.

Let me start by explaining in brief how raw crude oil becomes fuel for your car. First, oil is pumped out of the ground by a producer. That oil is then sent usually by a pipeline – to a refinery that turns the mixture into gasoline. That gasoline is then sent to a wholesaler's terminal. which then sells it to your local gas station.

We are fortunate in the 106th to have an abundance of crude oil at our disposal in the Antrim Shale. The Antrim Shale is a geological formation that runs from Benzie County on Lake Michigan all the way over to Alcona County on Lake Huron. It is responsible for a large portion of the oil and natural gas production in the Midwest. Local oil fields pump their



oil by pipeline to refineries where it can be turned into a variety of products, like gasoline. The price that the refinery pays the producers per barrel is largely determined by outside entities such as the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC).

In the 106th, we may have plenty of raw crude oil, yet we lack any refineries. In fact, the closest refineries to the 106th are in Detroit, Michigan, and Superior, Wisconsin. The Cheboygan fuel terminal, where a large amount of our local gasoline comes from, is geographically quite far from both refineries. That means it costs a lot more for our fuel to be transported from the refinery to Cheboygan. Cities like Gaylord and Clare can get their gasoline from terminals in Bay City or Flint, which is cheaper since it is transported via pipeline. The Cheboygan terminal is the only terminal in the state that does not have its gasoline sent by pipeline from the refinery. Instead, our gasoline is shipped in

via barge from Wisconsin and Indiana. Therefore, our local gas stations pay more for their gas, which is then passed along to the con-


Another factor at play in the 106th is that we don't have any "discount areas" an industry term to describe an area of intense competition among gas stations. Nearby areas like Gaylord and Clare have a high amount of concentrated gas stations due to the amount of traffic on highways like I-75. The constant competition naturally keeps prices lower. For instance, in Gaylord, there are two big box stores that are constantly competing to have the lowest gas prices in town. Generally, big box stores have a contracted amount of gasoline they need to sell per month, so sometimes they will sell at a loss just to meet the quota. This constant undercutting keeps prices much lower in "discount areas."

In conclusion, there are many factors that influence our local gas prices at every level of production. There

is not one "bad actor," rather our area has a unique set of circumstances that leads to such high gas prices. As your state representative, I will continue to work in Lansing to reduce the costs of essentials and make sure your voice is heard. If you have concerns or questions, please feel free to contact my office.

MEA members forge family partnerships, help improve literacy in rural communities

CHARLEVOIX, Mich. — What started as a pilot program to engage families and communities in reading has created new bonds among students, parents and educators in rural communities across Northern Michigan.

Through the Family Literacy Projects, MEA members identified families in rural areas with higher rates of poverty to encourage students to read, and parents to read with their younger children. The program provided families with a collection of books to read and discuss at home, as well as web-based resources to inspire further

reading.

"Literacy isn't something that only takes place in the classroom between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m., and it requires working partnerships between educators and families," said MEA member Glen Young, a retired Petoskey High School English teacher and co-director of the Top of the Mitt Writing Project. "In order for literacy to thrive beyond the classroom, it has to involve the family — that could be parents, grandparents, siblings or other caretakers."

The project is part of a National Endowment for the Humanities grant awarded to the Top of the

Mitt Writing Project and brought together teachers, families and school administrators in the Boyne Falls, Pellston, Charlevoix, Alanson, and Grayling school districts. The books were geared primarily toward K-8 students, and the topics ranged from classic novels to more modern works.

While the grant funding is only for the current school year, some volunteer educators plan to continue their working relationships with the families.

"This project has been transformative for our parents and teachers," said Jane Garver, a Charlevoix Teacher Leader. "We have

formed new relationships and bonded with parents over our shared love for their children. It has been a terrific experience for each of the families that took the plunge and participated. What a joy to celebrate reading and writing each week with our families."

"This program helped our family grow together in making lasting connections to one another using our words in different ways by writing," said Jennifer Fruk, a Charlevoix parent. "They saw us, as parents, work on new styles of writing that challenged us and our children to talk together more easily about

their school experiences. We had fun and the skills we learned, the writing styles, and the books are still bringing joy to our fam-

"The Family Literacy Project was a great success for me, personally, because it allowed me to understand that reading is an easy way to connect with my kids," said Dave Grossi, also a Charlevoix parent. "It's made the one last thing we do before bedtime a fun thing for the kids to look forward to.'

"Learning doesn't stop at the end of the school day, and our dedicated educators work tirelessly to build partnerships with families to improve literacy in their communities," said Chandra Madafferi, Michigan Education Association president-elect. "We applaud these hard-working educators and are excited to see our students love for reading improve across Northern Michigan."

DNR moose survey shows stable population in U.P.

Moose numbers are about the same as 2019


In survey results reported to the Michigan Natural Resources Commission in Roscommon this week. the moose population estimate for the western Upper Peninsula was not statistically different from the last moose survey conducted in

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources has been surveying the western U.P.'s core moose population since 1997, typically every other winter. The 2023 survey marks the first survey completed since 2019 due to scheduling conflicts associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

"The 2023 moose survey estimate was 426 individuals, which is not statistically different from the 2019 estimate of 509 individuals," said Tyler Petroelje, northern Michigan wildlife research specialist with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources in Marquette. "This continues the trend of plateauing abundance where population growth over the last 12 years is now less than 1%."

Aerial moose surveys are conducted over core moose habitat areas during winter to identify and tally bulls, cows and calves. This past winter's survey was conducted by the DNR during portions of January and February.

The western U.P. moose

1,400 square miles in parts of Marquette, Baraga, and Iron counties. Moose were translocated there from Canada in two separate efforts in 1985 and 1987.

The remainder of the U.P. is not surveyed for moose but some pockets of higher quality habitat are occupied by lesser numbers of moose, as seen in the eastern U.P. region. Moose have been observed there since the 1950s.

During the 2023 winter survey, researchers tallied 212 individual moose, which was 20% fewer than the 266 moose observed on the 2019 survey. A point estimate indicated a 16% decline in moose abundance.

"Looking at demographic data, with respect to previous surveys, we observed a

comparable - but low - cowto-calf ratio and percentage of calf numbers," Petroelje said. "A potentially concerning observation is the lesser percentage of twins seen during this survey (9%) compared to the 10year average of 15%."

Petroelje said fewer twins, in combination with a lesser bull-to-cow ratio could point to a recruitment issue, which is the number of individuals added to a population over a given time by either births or immigration.

DNR wildlife biologists will continue to monitor recruitment in the population in future surveys to determine whether a trend is developing or if 2023 was a poor calf year.



CYCLING

KIDS PEDALING WITH A PURPOSE INVOLVES **HUNDREDS OF STUDENTS AND VOLUNTEERS**

Cindy Okerlund was on her bicycle and she was at a crossroad - not the paved kind with stop signs, but the type many people encounter following retirement.

It was 2015 and she'd just ended her 27-year teaching career at Harbor Springs Public Schools. Feeling fulfilled, but exhausted, she and her husband, Matt Tamm, who also retired from teaching (Petoskey High School), knew it was time to step out of the class-

They were done with traditional school-based teaching; that much was certain. They needed to rest but weren't ready to shelve their love for working with

Their own children were closing in on adulthood and their rigorous years teaching were tapering off. How would the couple fill their free time with worthwhile activities that might also generate income?

Okerlund continued to pedal her bike on a local trail, which was and continues to be a beloved yearslong family pastime they'd enjoyed locally and in their summer travels.

"I had such a passion for teaching, but I was just tired," Okerlund, who'd taught health education and biology, confided. "Let's just say, as I reflect back on my teaching career, I wouldn't hesitate to do it again; but it's totally OK that the traditional teaching chapter of my life has closed.

But for her, retiring - simply no longer going to work - was the easy part. Even in her self-described, postwork "recovery year" Okerlund wrestled with doubts about the practical effect, if any, she'd had on nearly three decades worth of students.

pretty disheartened about some things," she said. "You wonder, 'How much did you really touch these kids? How much impact did you have?""

One of Okerlund's sore spots was her perception of a rise in kids with sedentary lifestyles, worsened, she said, by the growing influence of electronic devices like smartphones, video games, and of course, television.

As time passed in her teaching years, she watched students gradually become less active and more overweight, changes seen in all ages across our country in recent decades.

She said she always tried to set a positive example for students by personally engaging in an active lifestyle. But, while her efforts may have inspired some, it didn't stop the sedentary trend, nor the corresponding rise in Type 1 (sometimes referred to as juvenile) dia-

As Okerlund's contemplative bike rides continued through her first year of retirement, the gears in her brain started clicking as she cranked out the miles.

She struck upon an idea that would allow her to continue working with kids in a physically active, educational way - but outdoors on a bike - not in a traditional classroom.

It's known as experiential education. Educators purposefully engage with learners in direct experience and focused reflection in order to increase knowledge, develop skills, clarify values, and develop people's capacity to contribute to their communities.

The concept of "Kids Pedaling with a Purpose" was born. Okerlund went on to serve as the idea's mother and midwife, not only conceiving the idea but willing it into existence using her knowledge, experience, and determination.

pragmatic, and with a keen eye for detail, Okerlund, known as Ms. O. to the kids and "Mother Bike" to her core volunteers, decided she could develop a field day for students that would see them, first and foremost, engage in significant exercise.

A lover of Northern Michigan's vast non-motorized trail system, she envisioned a bicycling-based experiential day outside the classroom for fourth graders in Emmet County and the city of Charlevoix.

A fleet of 30 bicycles and helmets would be needed, along with dozens of volunteers, and, crucially, finan-

cial support. Okerlund spent a year writing the curriculum. using her wealth of education experience to ensure the program gelled with Michigan's core educational standards. Lessons in fitness, health, science, social studies, math, map reading, native and invasive species and local Odawa history are all baked into this day-long bike riding field trip.

Offered at both public and private schools, Pedaling with a Purpose is a twopart program. Okerlund and her core volunteer team evaluate students' bike riding abilities in the winter, then lead them on all-day educational bike rides in the spring.

Not only would the program be educationally substantive, it also wouldn't cost the schools a dime - except their transport of students to and from Spring Lake Park, where the biking field trips in May and early June start and finish.

Finding the Funding For Okerlund, creating the program's curriculum was the least of her concerns. While the Trails Council acts as the program's fiduciary partner, it doesn't finance Pedaling with a Purpose. Okerlund had to find her own fund-

A \$10,000 grant from the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, along with \$13,500 in combined

grants from the Petoskey-Harbor Springs Community Foundation, and gifts

from other local businesses and community people,

launched

the program in 2017. It ran successfully for three years, then COVID hit.

The program's bike fleet sat idle in 2020 and 2021, but it was during this time that Walloon Lake residents John and Diane Harris stepped in. John said their family giving plan dovetailed nicely with Kids Pedaling with a Purpose.

An avid bike and ski racer, John's interest in physical fitness was the stimulus for two health and wellness companies he and Diane built and later sold.

"Spending time talking to Cindy, it was clear they were struggling with fundraising," John said. "Fundraising was taking them away from the things they should be doing. We decided to step up and make a matching gift offer enough money to make the program last five years. It's a good program and we wanted to help it be great."

In their businesses, John and Diane noted that their clients were mainly older people who hadn't learned the benefits of good diet and exercise.

"Through Pedaling with a Purpose," John, who has volunteered on the student rides and in the classroom, explained, "We're trying to impact kids' view of physical health by getting them on bikes. The idea of this had great appeal to us. The program's wellness component and introducing kids to it at a young age were two major factors for us."

News of this funding breakthrough elated Okerlund, someone in whom John and Diane have great faith.

Schools Embrace Program

At Sheridan Elementary School in Petoskey, Principal Mark Oberman said his students have fun pedaling and learning.

'Our kids really get excited about the opportunity to either hone their bicycling skills, or learn the basics of riding a bike," he said. "It is very special for them to do it in the safety of our schools, and they love being able to ride bikes in the gym! The trip itself is outstanding. Our students really enjoy the interac-

tions with all of the volunteers and Ms. O, and the ride on the North Western State Trail to Oden is truly a highlight of their fourth grade year.'

Popular and easy though it may be for some students, Oberman said not all his fourth graders possess the same cycling skills.

"A surprisingly high number of our students have minimal experience riding bicycles, especially around our amazing local Wheelway and trails," Oberman said.

This fact is supported by Okerlund's own numbers.

A fastidious data collector, Okerlund compiles statistics each year so she can chart progress. Her '22-'23 school year stats reveal that 86.4 percent of Emmet County (and the city of Charlevoix) fouth graders (319 of 360) were able to safely ride a bike. In all, 41 students (13.6 percent) couldn't ride a bike or

struggled with it and needed accommodation to join the spring field trip. In the winter months, Okerlund and her core team of volunteers visit every school, teaching in the classroom and testing every student's biking ability in their gyms. They then re-

turn to every school a sec-

ond time to work with

struggling riders.

She is quick to point out that students aren't forced to participate. Rather, the program is offered in a "challenge by choice" format, in which kids can decide for themselves whether or not they want to do it.

Students without bike riding skills are anything but left out. Okerlund has a variety of adaptive cycling equipment, including "tagalongs", tandem bikes, and a battery powered pedal-assist side-by-side bicycle. These options mean all students, regardless of their abilities, can participate, if they so choose.

"Kids Pedaling with a Purpose gives students the skills and confidence to explore something new," Oberman said, "And we see so much joy in so many of our students as their abilities on the bike grow.'

The humble Okerlund. whose work on the program won her the League of Michigan Bicyclists' 2018 Bicycle Educator Award, accepts some credit, but pours praise on her legions of loyal volunteers, most of them retired professionals who help her conduct the program.

Her list of volunteers has grown to over 100 since the program's inception. Her core volunteers, who have

each donated countless hours, include Kate Scollin, Patrick Affholter, Rob Monroe and Mike Skirvin.

"The blending of generations has really captured me," she said. "Here you have this generation of kids who I'm really worried about. Then there are these awesome retired people. They love the outdoors. They love to bike. And they love kids. That is special."

"I feel the Pedaling with a Purpose program is a winwin for everyone involved, the young and the young-atheart. Its success thus far can be witnessed in both age groups."

A DAY WITH KIDS PEDALING WITH A PURPOSE

Kids Pedaling with a Purpose is a day-long field trip for Emmet County and the city of Charlevoix fourth graders that's designed to engage kids in significant exercise in an experiential outdoor classroom.

This school year's program concluded June 7.

Each all-day educational bike ride starts at Spring Lake Park. Students arrive by school bus at 9 a.m., and after donning bicycle helmets and bright vests, they rotate through four 15minute classes: map reading, trail etiquette and riding safely with a group, a nature hike, and a practice ride on the bike that they will be riding that day with a volunteer.

A brief bicycle mechanics lesson is also taught.

Once the classes are complete, kids and volunteers mount their bikes and ride to the Hiawatha historical site on Round Lake, which is just off the North Western State Trail. At that site they have a history lesson on the Hiawatha pageants that were held there in the early 1900s.

Included in this storytelling lesson are the assimilation challenges that the Odawa people faced during that time. This history lesson is often taught by Eric Hemenway, the director of repatriation, archives and records for the Little Bay Bands of Odawa Indians.

This stop at Round Lake also includes another short history lesson, often presented by Lisa Loyd, daughter of the late Horace "Huffy" Huffman. Huffy was a retired bicycle maker and later executive of the Huffy Bicycle Corp., founded by his father, Horace Huffman Sr., in 1924.

Inspired by his love for northwest lower Michigan, Huffy devoted much of his retired life to establishing and growing Little Traverse Conservancy, Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council, and the Top of Michigan Trails Council. From Round Lake, the

fourth graders ride north to Oden State Fish Hatchery for a lunch picnic and a tour led by DNR Hatchery Interpreter Christine Steensma. Steensma teaches the hatchery's history, purpose and production of rainbow and brown trout that are raised to stock area lakes.

Students also learn about fish reproductive cycles and are shown giant tanks holding trout in various life stages. Not only do kids get to see large trout in crystal clear ponds, Steensma also lets them feed the fish, a delight for students.

Once the tour is complete, volunteers and students pedal back to Spring Lake Park.

In all, kids hike over a mile and ride bikes eight miles while absorbing ageappropriate lessons that conform to the state's core educational standards.

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



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Who Needs Title Insurance? You do, but make sure you know your options

When you buy a home you want to make sure that the people selling it actually have full and legal title. The party who conducts closing will check this out by going down to the local property records office to research the history of ownership.

But those records down at the property office may be official, but they may also be wrong. It's also possible that the person who does the title search can make a mistake and also that important information may simply not be recorded.

For instance, maybe a bill against the property was not recorded or some taxes were not been paid. Or, suppose that 40 years ago the property you want to purchase was owned by Smith. Let's also imagine that Smith was a bigamist with an extra spouse. Will this matter show up on the local property records? Not likely. Does the additional Smith spouse have an ownership claim against the property? That may only be clear after a lot of legal wrangling—and if you lose, you could lose the house.

There may be other odd and bizarre claims as well. Was an owner an alcoholic? Insane? A drug user? Is there a contractor with a claim against the property? Such issues can "cloud" titles and neither lenders nor owners want

One form of title insurance, "lenders" coverage, is designed to protect (who else?) your lender in case of title problems.

"Lenders" coverage is required and generally provides protection up to the original mortgage amount—if you buy a home for \$300,000 and get a \$250,000 mortgage, then \$250,000 is as much coverage as you can get with a lender's policy. If there's a claim, the title insurer will fight on your behalf and if there's a claim the policy will pay off the loan if necessary. This is good news for you because you

For instance, you can also get "owners" coverage. This will protect your equity—that \$50,000 in the example above not covered by the lender's policy. And you can often get an "inflation rider" with an owner's policy—as the value of your home goes up, so does the value of your title coverage.

While title insurance is required by virtually all lenders, there is one big exception: Loans made in Iowa. In Iowa, the state says that attorneys and others who do title work must participate in a title guarantee program. If there's a title error, the state fund provides cover-

SAFE DRINKING WATER ACT

The Safe Drinking Water Act requires all Public Water systems to issue an annual report to its customers telling them what substances and how much of each are in their water.

We invite the public to call with any questions they might have about this report.

We are pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets Federal and State requirements.

This report shows how our water supply is kept safe and will provide you with our monitoring information and testing results.

We want our valued customers to be informed about their Water Utility and encourage any questions about this report.

QUALITY ON TAP

We are very pleased to provide you with this year's Quality on Tap Water Report. We want to keep you informed about the water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water.

In its effort to supply you with the safest possible product, the City of East Jordan chlorinates the water supply against potential contamination from viruses and bacteria. The level of this additive is monitored daily to ensure proper dosages are being added. Iron is an abundant and widespread constituent of rocks and soil in Northern Michigan. At sufficient concentrations, iron can adversely affect the taste of water and beverages and can leave rust-colored stains on laundry, plumbing fixtures and porcelain.

Our water source is groundwater that is drawn from two different aquifers by three wells located in various parts of our City. The susceptibility of our wells ranges from moderately low to moderate.

MONITORING INFORMATION

The City of East Jordan routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The tables on the following pages show results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2022.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

EXPLANATION OF RESULTS

As you can see by the following tables, our system had no violations in 2022. We are proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements. We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some contaminants have been detected. The E.P.A. has determined that your water is safe at these levels.

Water Quality Data

The tables on the next page list all of the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the 2022 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in these tables is from testing done January 1st through December 31st, 2022. The State allows us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. All of the data is representative of the water quality, but some are more than one year old.

TERMS AND ABREVIATIONS

<u>Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG):</u> The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

<u>Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)</u>: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

<u>Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL):</u> The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that the addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

<u>Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG):</u> The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

ppb: parts per billion or micrograms per liter

ppm: parts per million or milligrams per liter

<u>Action Level:</u> The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

TOTAL COLIFORM RULE

The Total Coliform Rule requires water systems to meet a stricter limit for Coliform bacteria. Coliform bacteria are usually harmless, but its presence in water can be an indication of disease-causing bacteria. When Coliform bacteria are found, special follow-up tests are done to determine if harmful bacteria are present in the water supply. If this limit is exceeded, the water supplier must notify the public by newspaper, television or radio. To comply with the stricter regulation, we monitor our system monthly taking samples from different locations in the distribution system.

In Summary.....

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated contaminants, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

In our continuing efforts to maintain a safe and dependable water supply it may be necessary to make improvements in your water system. The costs of these improvements may be reflected in the rate structure. Rate adjustments may be necessary in order to address these improvements.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) News (Even if Lead is not detected....)

"If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The City of East Jordan is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Copper

"Copper is an essential nutrient, but some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over a relatively short amount of time could experience gastrointestinal distress. Some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over many years could suffer liver or kidney damage. People with Wilson's Disease should consult their personal doctor."

PFAS

Per-and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are a group of man-made chemicals that includes PFOA, PFOS, GenX, and many other chemicals. PFOA and PFOS have been the most extensively produced and studied of these chemicals. Both chemicals are very persistent in the environment and in the human body - meaning they don't break down and they can accumulate over time. There is evidence that exposure to PFAS can lead to adverse human health effects.

Studies indicate that PFOA and PFOS can cause reproductive and developmental, liver, and kidney, and immunological effects in laboratory animals. The most consistent findings from human epidemiology studies are increased cholesterol levels among exposed populations, with more limited findings related to infant birth weights, effects on the immune system, cancer (for PFOA), and thyroid hormone disruption (for PFOS).


