Plane Crash Near **Beaver Island**

On June 23, 2023, The United States Coast Guard Air Station Traverse City helicopter diverted from a training mission to an overdue airplane call. While searching for the overdue airplane, they located the airplane upside down with one subject in the water. Upon the Coast Guard locating the male subject, the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office responded to the scene. The airplane was located between Whiskey Island and Beaver Island.

The male subject in the water was identified as Randy F. Seaman, 70, from Lowell, Michigan. Mr. Seamon was airlifted by the Coast Guard Helicopter to Charlevoix Airport where he was transported by Lake Charlevoix EMS to McLaren Hospital in Petoskey for treatment. Mr. Seamon's injuries are unknown at this time.

Also in the airplane was Beverly Jean Anderson, 65, also from Lowell, Michigan. Unfortunately, Mrs. Anderson did not survive the plane accident.

Several other people were present and got between the victim and Bruchu. Bruchu then left the residence. Bruchu was interviewed at the Crawford County Sheriff's Office and turned the knife over to deputies there. Troopers lodged Bruchu in the Crawford County Jail.

Bruchu was arraigned in the 46th District Court in Crawford County on one count Witness Retaliating Against, and one count Assault with a Dangerous Weapon. His next court appearance is on August 1, 2023, at 2:00 p.m.

On this day in 1776, the Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress, starting the 13 colonies on the road to freedom as a sovereign nation. The stars on the original American flag were arranged in a circle to ensure that all colonies were represented

equally. As always, this most American of holidays will be marked by parades, fireworks and backyard picnics and barbecues across the country. Americans will spend more than \$1 billion on fireworks again this year to celebrate the Fourth.

More than 150 million hot dogs will be consumed on July 4. That's roughly one hot dog for every two people in the U.S. A portion of those will be eaten during the famed hot dog eating contest held every Fourth at Coney Island, New York. Multiple champ Joey Chestnut holds the record of 76 hot dogs consumed in 10 minutes. Wow!

Here are some interesting facts and trivia about Independence Day:

Benjamin Franklin wanted the turkey to be the national animal but was out-voted when John Adams and Thomas Jefferson chose the bald eagle.

Independence Day was first celebrated in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776. The Liberty Bell rang out from Independence Hall in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776. It was sounded to bring the people out to the first public reading of the Declaration of Independ-

ence. It was read by Colonel John Nixon.

Ironically, three U.S. presidents have died on July 4: Thomas Jefferson and John Adams died on July 4, 1826, the fiftieth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence; five years later, James Monroe died on July 4, 1831.

Calvin Coolidge is the only U.S. president born on the Fourth of July in 1872.

The first two Liberty Bells were defective, so the third Liberty Bell was rung every

Fourth of July from 1778 on, until it cracked in 1835. It has been silent since

In 1777, Bristol, Rhode Island celebrated July 4th by firing 13 gunshots, once in the morning and once again in the evening. Philadelphia, Pennsylvania commemorated our independence with an official Continental Congress dinner, parades, prayers, music, fireworks, speeches,

13 gun salutes, and more. In 1778, General George Washington celebrating by giving his soldiers a double ration of rum and having an artillery salute. Benjamin Franklin and John Adams were in Paris. France, and held a dinner

for other Americans there. 1791 was the year that

the name "Independence Day" was used for the first time. It may have been used before then, but that was the first time it was recorded.

1801 was the first time a July 4 party was held at the White House.

In 1805, Lewis and Clark celebrated the first July 4 celebration west of the Mississippi, at Independence Creek.

There were 2.5 million people living in the United States in July of 1776.

There are 56 signatures on the Declaration of Independence. They did not all sign at the same time because some were not present. Most historians agree that they all signed by August 2, 1776.

The major reason for the U.S. to declare independence was taxation without representation.

The Star Spangled Banner became the U.S. national anthem in 1931. The first Fourth of July

There are 31 places nationwide with the "liberty" in their name. The most populous one is Liberty, Missouri (29,149). Iowa has more of these places than any other state: four (Libertyville, New Liberty, North Liberty and West Liberty).


Eleven places have "independence" in their name. The most populous of these is Independence, Missouri, with 116,830 residents.

Five places adopted the name "freedom." New Freedom, Pennsylvania with 4,464 residents, has the largest population among these.

And what could be more fitting than spending the day in a place called "America"? There are five such places in the country, with the most populous being American Fork, Utah, with 26,263 residents.

I read a quote Timeliness is best in all matters, which is very true, more so than many of us understand.

In my leadership consulting and coaching work, I spoke with literally hundreds of business people every year and am compelled to write about a very important theme, as I heard it often.

'My boss seldom responds quickly to me. He seems me take me for granted."

"I have to follow up, often repeatedly."

"I do not feel appreciated or valued. Does he think what I do is not important?"

Rep. Borton votes against sales tax hike on food, drink

State Rep. Ken Borton, R-Gaylord, on Thursday opposed legislation to tax more food and drink sales in Michigan.

Under Michigan law, food and nonalcoholic drinks are exempt from sales and use taxes, except for prepared products intended for immediate consumption. In a party-line vote, the House on Thursday passed House Bills 4377 and 4378, which would create a complicated, expanded definition of "prepared food" to tax more prepackaged foods and beverages.

"Lansing Democrats have found a sneaky and convoluted way to force Michigan families to hand over more of their hardearned money to the government by taxing more foods and beverages," Borton said, adding that the complex, multi-factor metric for determining what items are taxed would impose burdens on small businesses like coffee shops and movie theaters. "The burden of navigating this confusing new tax policy will fall on local small business owners, who will have to navigate more red tape while they try to figure out which food and drink items are supposed to be taxed. All of this will undoubtedly leave a sour taste in the mouths of Northern Michiganders."

The new requirements

proposed under the bills would set many arbitrary distinctions between taxable and untaxable goods: how utensils or napkins are made available to customers: whether a bottled soft drink is sweetened or contains milk or juice; how much of a business's total food sales are prepared food; and other criteria.

HBs 4377 and 4378 now advance to the Senate for consideration.

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

How to scout out the best place to call home

The neighborhood in which you live will heavily dictate your whole way of life—things like walking to a nearby park with your kids, knowing your kids are attending good schools, feeling safe when your children play outdoors, being close to restaurants and shopping, enjoying a short commute, and knowing your home will appreciate at a healthy rate.

CRIME STATISTICS

No one wants to live in a neighborhood where break-ins and burglary are the norm. There are web sites that can provide you with statistics on crime and other information pertinent to your search.

In addition to school information, Homestore lets you enter a city or zip code and provides you with crime data for the area you choose. It also compares crime statistics with other cities (such as the city from which you are moving).

In researching a neighborhood, you must first determine your area. The suburbs may have lower crime statistics, but may be farther from your work. Cities may have more crime, but may have other qualities that you consider more attractive, such as convenience and cultural activities.

Use the following tips to help you learn about crime statistics in a neighborhood:

Talk to neighbors. Take note if there are bars on the windows and doors of homes.

Talk to the police or sheriff's department.

Check for gang graffiti on walls and walkways.

Keep in mind that if you're looking in-town, you may not be able to get away from everything you consider unappealing (such as noise and traffic).

KEEP YOUR FAMILY IN MIND

A home isn't just an investment when you have a family to think of. You'll need to consider more than just the number of bedrooms or whether it has an attached garage.

You'll need to consider the community first and foremost. Do you want schools that are in walking distance? Do you want to be close to your place of employment? Do you want to be close to shopping, restaurants, and other services?

HDNW Releases Information for Public Reaction to Air Quality Issues

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan (HDNW) is asking residents with sensitive breathing conditions to take precautions based on current air conditions. The Michigan Department of Environmental, Great Lakes, and Energy has issued an air quality alert for the entire state today, Tuesday, June

Currently air quality in Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties is rated as "Very Unhealthy for Everyone," with a couple of locations reaching "Hazardous for Everyone." Widespread wildfires in Canada continue to burn and create smoke plums that contain small particles which are moving through the atmosphere.

"The visible haze and smell of smoke is evidence of the current condition," savs Dan Thorell, Health Officer for HDNW. "While the current situation does not warrant panic, it is important that we inform

Northwest Michigan residents to take precautions, especially older adults, children, and people who are pregnant or have lung and heart conditions."

Anyone can get sick from exposure to enough wildfire smoke. HDNW advises all residents to:

•. Stay inside. The best action people can take to protect their health from wildfire smoke is to stay inside with the doors and windows closed using good air filtration (MERV-13 or better) for vents and cooling systems.

. Use air filters to improve indoor air quality. Whether you have a central air conditioning system or a portable room unit, use high efficiency filters to capture fine particles from smoke.

"Conditions can shift frequently," says Dr. Joshua Meverson, HDNW Medical Director. "It's important that we take these air quality issues seriously while the plume moves through

our region. It's the best way to avoid emergent breathing complications as a result."

Here is how AirNow determines the region's current air quality:

Very Unhealthy for Everyone air quality for PM 2.5 index of 201 - 300

All people should avoid long or intense outdoor activities. People with heart or lung disease, older adults, children and teenagers, minority populations, and outdoor workers should avoid all physical outdoor activities. Reschedule outdoor activities or move them indoors. Watch for symptoms such as coughing or shortness of breath. For people with asthma, follow your action plan and keep quick relief medicine handy. For people with heart disease, symptoms such as palpitations, shortness of breath, or unusual fatigue may indicate a serious problem. If you have any of these, contact your healthcare provider.

Hazardous for Everyone

air quality for PM 2.5 index of 301 - 500

All people should avoid all physical activities outdoors. People with heart or lung disease, older adults, children and teenagers, minority populations, and outdoor workers should remain indoors and keep activity levels low. Watch for symptoms such as coughing or shortness of breath. For people with asthma, follow your action plan and keep quick relief medicine handy. For people with heart disease, symptoms such as palpitations, shortness of breath, or unusual fatigue may indicate a serious problem. If you have any of these, contact your health care provider.

LESSER LEVELS AND THEIR DEFINITIONS:

Moderate air quality for particulate matter (PM) 2.5 Index of 51-100

Those who are unusually sensitive to particle pollution should consider making outdoor activities shorter and less intense. Watch for symptoms such as coughing or shortness of breath. These are signs to take it easier. For everyone else, it's a good day to be outside.

UNHEALTHY FOR SENSITIVE GROUPS AIR QUALITY FOR PM 2.5 INDEX OF 101 - 150

People with heart or lung disease, older adults, children and teenagers, minority populations, and outdoor workers should make outdoor activities shorter and less intense. It's okay to be active outdoors but take more breaks. Watch for symptoms such as coughing or shortness of breath. For people with asthma, follow your action plan and keep quick relief medicine handy. For people with heart disease, symptoms such as palpitations, shortness of breath, or unusual fatigue may indicate a serious problem. If you have any of these, contact

your health care provider.

UNHEALTHY FOR EVERYONE AIR QUALITY FOR PM 2.5 INDEX OF 151 - 200

All people should reduce long or intense outdoor activities and take more breaks. People with heart or lung disease, older adults, children and teenagers, minority populations, and outdoor workers should avoid long or intense outdoor activities. Consider rescheduling or moving activities indoors. Watch for symptoms such as coughing or shortness of breath. For people with asthma, follow vour action plan and keep quick relief medicine handy. For people with heart disease, symptoms such as palpitations, shortness of breath, or unusual fatigue may indicate a serious problem. If you have any of these, contact your health care provider.

It is a crisis, adversely affecting our hospital, school, businesses, shop owners, and city staff. Too many simply cannot afford to live in the area.

Charlevoix High School is down to about 280 students, yet Boyne City has grown to about 470 students.

How do we light a fire under those in key positions?

I write this not to be critical, rather to incent people to make things happen. Leaders make things hap-

This is what we need. Not bureaucratic approaches. In a successful business, if there is a major problem, we are told to solve it, ASAP! This is the attitude and determination we need from those with leadership responsibility in Charlevoix.

Can our city council members come together, sitting in a circle, not in a straight line, to discuss, really brainstorm, how to move ahead with a true sense of urgency?

I hope and pray they will.

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

Area family celebrates graduating from Healthy Families

When Erin Hay found herself a new mother finishing high school, she welcomed Kristin Kays into her life. As a nurse and family support specialist with HDNW's Healthy Families Northern Michigan program, Kristin began meeting with Erin and her six-week-old son.

Together, they got to know each other and set goals to build the life Erin wanted for herself and her son. Each month, Kristin would do home visitstimes that young Jeremiah began to cherish.

"My favorite part of the program was the visits and how Kristin bonded with Jeremiah so well." Erin says. "Jeremiah loved the visits so much that he would wait by the window or door for Kristin to come." On June 13, Erin, Jere-

miah, and father figure, Keegan, graduated from Healthy Families. The diploma includes a list of accomplishments like:

- I am able to help my child manage feelings and frustrations
- · I know what causes stress for myself and my family, and I have a plan to get help and support if this happens
- I have a safe and stable place to live
- I have and can access at least one positive support person or community resource in addition to my



home visitor

· I take my child to the doctor as needed to stay

"This family has had so many successes since I have been working with them," Kristin says. "I have watched Erin blossom into an amazing young woman

and mother. They are a true success story for the mission of Healthy Families."

Healthy Families is an intensive home visiting program from Prevent Child Abuse America. The focus is on the parent-child relationship and their bonding by providing resources, activities, and education to allow the parent to be their child's first teacher and to create a secure attachment. Healthy Families also monitors child development and provides tailored resources to meet the family's needs.

Step by Step Although motherhood

was unexpected, Erin and Kristin established a plan for her to finish high school, get her driver's license and obtain employment. In

these goals were met. Next,

ber's home to her own

apartment in the Oden area.

"Erin did all of this while also creating a very special bond with Jeremiah and supporting his growth and development," Kristin says. "When we discovered a delay in his gross motor and speech development,

Erin balanced extra appointments with Early On to support Jeremiah's speech, which really paid off! Jeremiah is no longer experiencing any sort of delay. He is not only speaking in full sentences and showing everyone just how funny his little personality is, but he is also counting and working on his ABCs!"

Jeremiah will turn four in September. Erin and Keegan are engaged and expecting a baby. As they move forward as a family, planning to purchase their first home, Erin says she's grateful to have picked up parenting skills like how to cope with tantrums and how to calm Jeremiah when he has fits.

"The graduation means everything to me because it showed me how far Jeremiah has come and has grown from beginning to end," Erin says.

Gov. Whitmer Encourages Michigan Communities to Apply for a Grant from the MI Fire Equipment Grant Program

\$12 million Available for Firefighter Equipment Purchases

LANSING, Mich. - Today, Governor Gretchen Whitmer announced that Michigan communities with part-time, on-call or volunteer firefighters have two weeks remaining to apply for a grant to purchase fire equipment through the MI Fire Equipment Grant Program before the July 10 deadline.

"We must ensure our firefighters have the safety equipment they need to do their jobs effectively," said Governor Whitmer. "The MI Fire Equipment Grant Program provides up to \$10,000 for communities to purchase fire equipment like turnout gear, hard suction hoses, or first aid supplies. I encourage all eligible communities to take advantage of this opportunity and support their first responders.

Under the State of Michigan's Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget, \$12 million was appropriated to the Michigan Department of Treasury to establish and operate the MI Fire Equipment Grant Program. Grant awards of up to \$10,000 are available for local units of government for eligible fire equipment purchases made

between Aug. 1, 2022, and Sept. 30, 2023.

Local communities with fire departments that are predominately on-call, parttime or volunteer in cities. villages, townships, tribal governments, or authorities or commissions are eligible to apply for a grant award.

Applications must be received by the Michigan Department of Treasury before July 10, 2023. Grant awards are anticipated to be announced in August 2023.

"Our team is ready to receive and review MI Fire **Equipment Grant Program** applications from Michigan's communities," said State Treasurer Rachael Eubanks. "Please follow the instructions carefully and submit a complete and accurate application before the beginning of July. Individuals with questions should not hesitate to contact us for assistance."

Ranking top patriotic movies no easy task

When I went searching for the most popular patriotic movies, I was expecting to find various lists from which to glean the movies most commonly named. I anticipated classic movies like The Longest Day, Patton, and Sergeant York to be listed along with Saving Private

The lists turned out to be a lot more diverse than expected, though. A movie which is ranked very highly in one list may not be named at all in another list. One list, for example, started with Yankee Doodle Dandy starring James Cagney (1942) at the top and that certainly seemed like an appropriate choice. But the next three or four lists I checked didn't even mention that particular

I drew a few conclusions. There are a lot of outstanding movies to choose from some perhaps not as overtly patriotic as they are realistic, and there are many different criteria for choosing which movies should be ranked near the

That said, there was somewhat of a consensus in the searches I made regarding which patriotic movies did it better than most of the others.

The aforementioned Saving Private Ryan star-

ring Tom Hanks (1998) appears on nearly every list and always near the top. If I had to pick one movie to rank No. 1 based on the research I did, it would be this one and understandably so. Those who actually stormed the beaches of Normandy on D-Day in June of 1941 and saw the movie after its release in 1998 said it was simply unmatched in its realism.

In nearly all the lists, Patton starring George C. Scott (1970) is ranked near the top as well. And why not? An old-time classic I hadn't considered, Mr. Smith Goes to Washington starring Jimmy Stewart (1939), was listed somewhere among the best in about every list I checked. Another excellent patriotic movie that I hadn't considered was Miracle, starring

Kurt Russell (2004), about the U.S. Hockey Team's upset victory over the Soviet Union in the 1980 Olympics in Lake Placid, N.Y. Hard to get more patriotic than that.

The original Top Gun. starring Tom Cruise (1986) was a popular selection too along with Independence Day starring Will Smith (1996). Probably the most recent patriotic movie that was mentioned multiple times was Hacksaw Ridge starring Andrew Garfield (2016), the inspiring story of World War II Medal of Honor winner Desmond Doss.

Daniel Day-Lewis's excellent portrayal in the movie Lincoln (2012) was mentioned multiple times. Glory starring Morgan Freeman (1989) and Lone Survivor starring Mark

Wahlberg were also listed multiple times.

Movies I thought would be mentioned more frequently were Sergeant York starring Gary Cooper (1941), Sands of Iwo Jima starring John Wayne (1949), and The Longest Day starring John Wayne, Sean Connery, and a host of others (1962). The classic Casablanca starring Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman (1942) made some lists but not others.

The top five patriotic movies based on the searches I made look something like this: 1. Saving Private Ryan (1998); 2. Patton (1970); 3. Miracle (2004); 4. Glory (1989); and Top Gun (1986).

high and Gaylord St. Mary. If you were at the tournament you probably noticed 7 foot Chris Kaman walking around. Kaman is a former CMU basketball star and drafted sixth overall in the 2003 NBA draft. Kaman played in the NBA for 13 years. His team won the Top Men's bracket this year at Gavlord Gus Macker. He

playing for CMU with then CMU teammate and Gaylord High all-time leading

scorer, Luke Johnson. Gaylord Gus Macker Tournament Director, James Vanderveer said, "This was our second year of the return on Gus Macker to Gaylord. We saw a lot of players return from last year thanks in large part to the quality of the Gus Busters." Gus Busters are the on court referee on courts with players under 18 years of age. On courts 18 and over players call their own fouls and the Gus Busters are there to just settle disputes.

Gus Macker tournament is determined by the quality of the Gus Busters. 50% of the fans are going to agree with each call and the other 50% are going to disagree (because many parents watch a game with their heart instead of their eyes).

When my son, Ben, was young we traveled to Gus Macker tournaments all over the state. Most of the tournaments had a good group of Gus Busters and we returned to those tournaments each year. Traverse City hosted Gus Macker for a few years. In one game my son Ben was driving in for a lay-up. As he jumped into the air a player from the other team jumped into him knocking him down and taking his feet out from under him. Ben landed on the pavement flat on his back and had to be transported to Munson Medical Center by ambulance. To add insult to injury the Gus Buster didn't call a foul because he said the defensive player didn't hit his arm. Even in the NBA that would have been a flagrant foul. The Gus Buster obviously didn't understand. We never returned to the Traverse City tournament and a couple years later they stopped hosting the tournament.

Vanderveer is a seasoned high school and college basketball referee and understands the importance of good quality Gus Busters for continued success of Gus Macker in Gaylord. This is a great event for





Gaylord to host and I look forward to it returning to

the Alpine Village for years to come.

2022 Water Quality Report for City of Boyne City

This report covers the drinking water quality for City of Boyne City for the 2022 calendar year. This information is a snapshot of the quality of the water that we provided to you in 2022. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) and state standards.

Your water comes from two groundwater wells on Division and three wells on Addis Street The wells on Division are over 100 feet deep and the ones on Addis are over 200 feet deep. The State performed an assessment of our source water to determine the susceptibility or the relative potential of contamination. The susceptibility rating is on a seven-tiered scale from "very-low" to "very-high" based on geologic sensitivity, well construction, water chemistry and contamination sources. The susceptibility of our Division Street source is rated high. The susceptibility of our Addis Street source is rated moderate.

There are no significant sources of contamination in our water supply. We are making efforts to protect our sources. The City has completed a Well Field Delineation and developed a Wellhead Protection Program. A copy of the full report and Wellhead Protection Program can be obtained at City Hall at 319 North Lake St., Boyne City.

Contaminants and their presence in water: Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the U.S. EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Vulnerability of sub-populations: Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. Sources of drinking water: The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. Our water comes from wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturallyoccurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:


Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.



In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the U.S. EPA prescribes regulations that limit the levels of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Federal Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which provide the same protection for public health.

Water Quality Data

The table below lists all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the 2022 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1 through December 31, 2022. The State allows us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. All the data is representative of the water quality, but some are more than one year old.

Terms and abbreviations used below:

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

ORDINANCE 272 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER I, ARTICLE II. **CIVIL INFRACTIONS SECTIONS 1-34 OF THE CODE OF** ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN

THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN ORDAINS:

Chapter I, Article II, Section 1-34 of the City of East Jordan Code of Ordinances entitled "Definitions" is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

Section 1-34. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Authorized city official means a police officer or other personnel of the city authorized by this Code or any ordinance to issue municipal civil infraction citations or municipal civil infraction violation notices.

Municipal civil infraction includes the following offenses set forth in this Code:

Chapter 42, Article IV

Chapter 14, Article II, Section 14-19 to Section 14-29

Chapter 14, Article III, Section 14-47 to Section 14-49

Chapter 46, article I to Article X

Upon enactment of the ordinance from which this article is derived, said civil infraction offenses shall no longer constitute misdemeanor criminal offenses.

Municipal civil infraction violation notice means a written notice prepared by an authorized city official, directing a person to appear in district court and to pay the fine and costs, if any, prescribed for the violation by the schedule of civil fines under state law.

State law means the revised judicature act of 1961 (MCL 600.101 et seq.). (Code 2009, Section 26-221; Ord. no. 209, Section 1, 9-22-2009)
