

While significantly lower than the alarming pandemic peak of 14.7% experienced in April 2020, unemployment rates remain a subject of concern, though experts' views on a potential recession are mixed. The last economic recession-the Great Recession of 2007-2009—sent rates up to 10% as of October 2009. It was not until the spring of 2019 that unemployment finally went down to the same level it sits at

As of May 2023, national unemployment is at 3.4%. with little change from April. Seasonally adjusted unemployment rates by state demonstrate a rather sizable spectrum, ranging from just 1.9% in South Dakota to 5.4% in Nevada.

Stacker compiled a list of counties with the highest unemployment rates in Michigan using Bureau of Labor Statistics data. Counties are ranked by their preliminary unemployment



Flying discs, Woods, and Water:

Northern Michigan's Alternative Golf Courses

BY ERIN FANNING

Red, orange, yellow, green, and purple discs flew through the air, practically a rainbow against the cloudless sky. One disc bounced off the basket while another skimmed across a pond. The others disappeared into the woods. Finally, the clanging of a disc hitting the basket broke the silence, music to a disc golfer's ears.

Disc golf's popularity has grown over the years with, according to UDisc, 4.3 courses installed per day in $2022. \ The \ sport \ resembles$ traditional golf but uses discs (think small Frisbees) rather than clubs and a ball, and like all sports, features an array of equipment options with a disc for almost every situation.

For me, though, disc golf has primarily become another avenue to the outdoors. It enhances a simple walk and is an excellent lure for pulling children away from screens and into

With kids, I've found success by keeping equipment to a minimum, following the rules but not overly emphasizing them, and making scorekeeping optional. We maintain a brisk pace, stressing movement and

For anyone who gets serious, however, there are plenty of opportunities to improve skills and engage in competition. Check out Northern Michigan Disc Golf at https://www.facebook.com/groups/nomidg or the Professional Disc Golf Association at https://www.pdga.com/.

Luckily for Michiganders, courses stretch across the state, but, unfortunately, their maintenance

greatly varies. The courses recommended below are typically well-maintained and are either kid-friendly or offer an actual hike, featuring Northern Michigan's famous rolling hills.

Gaylord Disc Golf Course, Gaylord (https://www.facebook.com /gaylorddiscgolfcourse/)

This course is actually two: an easy 9 holes in an open field, perfect for children or beginners, and 18 holes that rambles through woods and gentle hills. Adjacent to Aspen Park, it features Northern Michigan's trademark obstacles from bouncing discs off trees to losing one in the under-

Avalanche Preserve Recreation Area, Boyne City (http://www.cityofboynecity.com/**disc-golfcourse-190/)

Located next to a mountain bike trail, this 18-hole course climbs to the top of Avalanche Preserve, rewarding disc golfers with views of Boyne City and Lake Charlevoix. Deep forest and the occasional meadow provide constant challenges as the trail twists up and up, giving golfers a true hike.

Log Lake County Park, Kalkaska

(https://www.facebook.com /groups/278988280306872)

This 18-hole course lends itself to family play with its flat terrain. Tight trees and a pond provide some difficulties, but the shorter holes keep it kid-friendly.

Kenwood Heritage Park,

Cadillac (https://cadillacmichigan.com/project/d isc-golf/)

Another two-course area, this park provides an easy 9-hole course next to Lake Cadillac. Obstacles include trees and water, but the terrain is mostly open. An 18hole course sits on the other side of the road, and

although flat, a pond runs through it and soaring trees never allow golfers to relax.

Hanson Hills Recreation Area, Grayling (https://hansonhills.org/di sc-golf)

With a total of 42 holes divided between two courses, Hanson Hills unfolds in layers from flat and open to

hilly and woodsy. The only thing missing is a water feature. The 18-hole Pine Knoll Course ambles along the base of the ski and tubing area, while the 24-hole PDGA Course constantly climbs up and down with views of undulating forest.

For me, Hanson represents the best of disc golf. It blends the challenge of throwing a disc with the exertion and exhilaration of a long hike in deep woods and steep hills. It's also where my husband and I introduced our nieces and nephews to the sport more than a decade ago.

Ultimately, Hanson symbolizes the value of Michigan's disc golf courses. They complement what makes the state remarkable: great outdoors and endless recreational opportunities, bringing families together.

MHSAA Member Schools Continue Rebound in Sports Participation with 2022-23 Climb

EAST LANSING, Mich. -July 14 – Participation in Michigan High School Athletic Association-sponsored sports increased for the second-straight school year in 2022-23, continuing its recovery from a COVID-related decline and despite another decrease in school enrollment among the MHSAA's 750 member high schools.

A total of 268,071 participants were counted across the 28 sports for which the MHSAA sponsors postseason tournaments - a 2.7-percent increase from 2021-22 as participation has grown a combined 9.9 percent from a drastic downturn in 2020-21 during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The 2022-23 increase of 2.7 percent also came as enrollment at MHSAA member schools fell 3.2 percent from the previous year. More specifically, boys participation rose 3.4 percent to 156,501 participants, despite a 2.9-percent decrease in

boys enrollment. Girls participation rose 1.7 percent to 111,570 participants despite a 3.4-percent enrollment dip. MHSAA participation totals count students once for each sport in which they participate, meaning students who are multiplesport athletes are counted more than once.

A total of 18 sports saw increases in participation in 2022-23 compared to 2021-22, with wrestling the largest gainer by 15.7 percent to 10,477 athletes – a rise in part attributable to a 41-percent increase in girls participation to 874 wrestlers which coincided with the second year of the MHSAA sponsoring a girls-only division at its Individual Finals. This year's wrestling total was the sport's highest since 2012-13.

Boys bowling enjoyed the next largest increase at 8.1 percent to 4,417 participants. Five more sports saw increases in participation by at least five percent over

the previous school year girls track & field (5.6 percent to 16,470 participants), boys lacrosse (5.6 percent to 5,038), girls lacrosse (5.3 percent to 3,215), girls bowling (5.3 percent to 2,826) and football (5.2 percent to

34,997). Also enjoying increases in participation during the 2022-23 school year were boys track & field (up 4.9 percent from 2021-22), girls competitive cheer (3.5 percent), boys basketball (3.2), girls tennis (2.9), girls volleyball (2.5), girls skiing (2.0), girls basketball (1.4), boys golf (1.3), boys soccer (0.9), baseball (0.8) and girls soccer (0.3). Of the eight sports that did see declines in 2022-23, four experienced decreases in participation that were lower than the 3.2-percent decrease in enrollment at MHSAA member schools - boys ice hockey (-1.4 percent), boys cross country and boys tennis (both -0.9 percent) and softball (-0.7).

Football, with a combined 34,997 participants over the 11 and 8-player formats, remained the most-played sport during the 2022-23 school year in posting its highest total of athletes since 2018-19. Boys track & field (23,211) and boys basketball (20,663) were next for total participants, followed by girls volleyball (19,270) - which remained the most popular girls sport - and then baseball (16,663) and girls track & field (16,470).

For the second-straight year, girls skiing (854 athletes) posted its highest participation total since 1998-99. Boys golf (6,916) joined wrestling in posting its highest total since 2012-13, and girls volleyball enjoyed its highest participation since 2017-18. Boys track & field, girls track & field and baseball all posted their highest participation totals since 2018-

The participation figures

are gathered annually from MHSAA member schools to submit to the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) for compiling of its national participation survey. (B) The second number indicates the number of additional girls playing on teams consisting primarily of boys and entered in boys competition. The MHSAA is a private,

not-for-profit corporation of voluntary membership by more than 1,500 public and private senior high schools and junior high/middle schools which exists to develop common rules for athletic eligibility and competition. No government funds or tax dollars support the MHSAA, which was the first such association nationally to not accept membership dues or tournament entry fees from schools. Member schools which enforce these rules are permitted to participate in MHSAA tournaments, which attract more than 1.3 million spectators each

OUT FOR TROUT

Fishing creates family bonds that last a lifetime

With the hot afternoon sun finally beginning to sink toward the western horizon, my brother Jimmy and I were headed into the woods to do a little trout fishing before darkness ar-

rived. For me, there are several types of trout fishing, and each has its own appeal, while differing greatly in its feel and approach.

There's trout fishing by myself, which usually offers great moments of intro-

spection, solace and peace. I experience all the various stimuli nature has to offer - from the touch of cold waters to the smell of summer blossoms, the ebullient and delightful songs of the river and the birds to the sights and tastes of the seasons, like blueberries, blackberries and apples.

There's also hitting the stream banks with my longtime brook trout fishing buddy, the Coaster King. The camaraderie we share is truly special to me, as we continue to pursue our childhood-borne pursuit of small-creek brook trout

Another, rarer pleasure is fishing with the Queen of Sheba, my lovely wife. While she is often too busy to follow this trout bum out into the woods, when we do get to arrange a day on the water together, we have a wonderful time.

She often catches more fish than I do, and I am happy to clean them.

Still rarer these days is the opportunity to trout fish with my boys, who live out

west with wives of their own. We only get to fish together every few years, but it's a tremendous thing when it happens.

I taught them how to fish when they were very young, like my dad and mom taught me. It's very rewarding to know that they still love to fish themselves and do so often, chasing fish like cutthroat trout that I've never seen in real life, much less caught.

I recall one summer when they came here to Michigan for a visit, we spent a few days in the western part of the peninsula, fishing for trout and spending evenings at a cabin we'd

On that trip, I taught the boys how to pan-fry their brook trout and how to debone the fish once they were cooked. They helped clean up afterwards and participated in the whole process, from tying on and baiting their own hooks to giving the countertop a last


I was proud of them then, and I am proud of and impressed with the men they have become. I just wish we lived a little closer to each other. I hope to get to help teach my grandchildren to

fish too. I used to love to fish with my dad, but those days are gone. He's now leaving me a spot next to him along the big trout waters in the sky. I wonder who he's getting to clean his fish for him now that I'm not around.

Finally, there's fishing with my brother. Fishing with him is kind of like a mixture of some of all the other types of trout fishing I just talked about, with a few more ingredients folded in.

We used to fish together all the time when we were young boys. He is four years younger than me. Our boyhood fishing ended abruptly when our parents got divorced when I was 13.

He moved to Canada with my mom and my two sisters, and I stayed in Michigan with my dad, the only child old enough to decide. Though we did fish a couple of times during those "missing years," it wasn't

four bites from small trout. Just as I was realizing that there was nothing of any real size biting in this hole, my brother called out to me from the road beyond a big green wall of trees.

'Are you there?" "Yeah, what are you doing?'

"There's a couple of nicesized fish over here that I can't reach with my lure. I thought you might be able to get them with a worm."

I followed him back downstream, and with two casts, I had both fish in my bag. I was obviously pleased with the beautiful catch, and he was happy to have been my guide to the fish.

"The roles have been reversed for once," he said. In a few more minutes, I landed another nice trout, and he hadn't caught any

I told him that it looked like a night for crawlers, and he should consider switching up his offering to

the brookie trout gods. He put a worm on his hook and was soon catching

fish and catching up to me. By the time we had moved to a couple more

places on the creek, I had caught my limit of five

trout. My brother had two. I was now in guide mode once again, putting my fishing pole away in the Jeep.

I suggested he get down very low to the ground to be able to sneak a cast over some branches and into a deep hole.

When he said he didn't think he could get his line in there without snagging it, I offered to cast it for him. I was surprised he accepted the offer. I casted and then quickly handed the rod off.

On that first cast, a fish hit, but got off the hook on the retrieval.

A few more casts led to a few more hits, but no trout landed. We moved on to the next hole, where Jimmy put another fish in his basket. With the nighttime approaching, he said we could quit now, and he'd be fine with that.

I urged him to continue. I said we could pass a few less-than-premier holes to get to one that I often had great luck with, especially as night was falling.

He agreed to follow me

through the brush. Arriving at the hole, he took one cast and then another. I think it was the first or second cast that he got his first bite. He then

snagged his line on a submerged log.

He tried to pull the hook free, and his line snapped loudly, the concussion rippled through the warm night air. Again, he was ready to call it quits, as it was getting darker, but I told him I could see just fine and would tie another hook on for him.

I baited that hook and he casted his line into the hole. Within a few short minutes, he had landed two more beautiful trout. The last one was our biggest fish of the

We both had caught our brook trout limit. I led us back through the woods to the Jeep, my brother trailing me with a flashlight.

It was great fun and reminded me so much of the times I would fish as a kid along the creek banks near our house, with my little brother tagging along.

On the drive home, several woodcocks flew up off the dirt road, and a great horned owl afforded us a chance to see it with a flash-

light trained on it. At home, my brother headed for the shower and left me to clean our sink full

"Like father, like son," I mumbled as I got my fillet knife out of the drawer.

But I didn't really mind. It's been about a week since that night, and time has since enveloped the entire evening within a memory packed away tightly
