



News **PETOSKEY STONES:** They are where you find them!

You've probably seen them in tourist and gift shops. Petoskey stones. I have been fascinated by them since childhood, and have found hundreds. There have been so many times my friends and family have asked me "How do you find so many Petoskey stones? You don't live near Petoskey and you don't go to lake Michigan to look for them." The answer is pretty easy. My wife and I walk "the circle"... the gravel road in front of our home. Yup. It's that easy. Just look down!

So, let's cover some basics.

HOW MICHIGANS STATE STONE GOT **ITS NAME:**

Quoting from an article by Emily Teske, "Actually, in this case, legend, geology, and history are intertwined to give the definition of what the Petoskev stone actually is. The study of the geology of the Petoskey stone also gives one quite an idea of how life was in Michigan during the Devonian time.

The name Petoskey appears to have originated late in the 18th century. Its roots stem from an Ottawa (or Odawa) Indian legend. According to the legend, a descendant of French nobility named Antoine Carre visited what is now the Petoskey area and became a fur trader with the John Jacob Astor Fur Company. In time, he met and married an Odawa Indian princess. Carre became known to the Indians as Neaatooshing. He was eventually adopted by the tribe and made chief. A son was born to the Chief. As the sun rose, its rays fell on the face of the new baby. Seeing the sunshine on his son's face, the Chief proclaimed, "His name shall be Petosegay. He shall become an important person. "The translation of the name is "rising sun," "rays of dawn," or "sunbeams of promise". In the summer of 1873, just a few years before

the death of Petosegay, a

Petoskey, an English adaptation of Petosegay. Thus, they honored someone who gave his land, name, and the heritage of sunbeams of promise."

So, what is a Petoskey stone? It is a fossil colonial coral that lived in the warm Michigan seas during the Devonian Age around 350 million years ago. The name Hexagonaria (meaning six sides)

percarinata was designated by Dr. Edwin Stumm in 1969. This type of fossil is found only in rock strata called the Gravel Point Formation. This formation is part of the Traverse Group of the Devonian Age. During this time a warm shallow sea covered the State. This warm sea was an ideal habitat for marine life A Devonian reef sheltered clams, cephalopods, corals, crinoids, trilobites, fish, and many other life forms.

The soft living tissue of coral is called a polyp. The center of the polyp contained an area where food was taken in (the mouth). The dark spot, or eye, was filled with muddy silt that

petrified after falling into the openings. Surrounding the openings were tentacles that were used for gathering food and drawing it into the mouth. The living coral that turned into the Petoskey stone thrived on plankton that lived in the warm sea prior to its death.

Calcite, silica and other minerals have replaced the first elements of each cell within the body of the coral. Each separate chamber on each Petoskev stone was a member of a thriving colony of living corals. For that reason, the Petoskev stone is called a colony coral

WHERE CAN YOU FIND PETOSKEY **STONES?**

Petoskev stones can be found anywhere in the state from the Traverse City area across to Alpena. Pleistocene glaciers (about two million years ago) plucked Petoskey stones from the bedrock and spread them over Michigan and suralong beaches far from the Petoskey area. Most of mine are found well inland from Lake Michigan and I have fond memories of my Aunt Jean and Uncle Jack taking me to look in a small roadside gravel pit near Vanderbilt. But currently I only have to walk out the door and look down! Remember, they're like morel mushrooms... they are where you find them! If looking along Lake

Michigan shore, the best time to find Petoskey stones is early spring after the ice on Grand Traverse Bay has melted. Each year as the ice is broken up and the winds push the ice in different directions, it pushes a new crop of Petoskey stones towards the shores. The best time in summer is after or during a misty rain, when the wetness will make the fossil pattern of the

a good when the dirt/gravel roads have been brined for dust control... it gives the rough stones a nice sheen that lasts longer than the wetness from rain. Remember, they won't look like the polished stones you see in gift shops! They can be very hard to recognize when "in the rough".

HOW TO POLISH **PETOSKEY STONES**

First thing: DO NOT use a rock tumbler to polish your Petoskey stones. You'll end up with "chalky" water and a tiny raison sized stone. They are too soft for this and will literally disintegrate into a pile of mush. Very disappointing! The easiest thing to do is to bring you stones to a professional/rock shop. If you can't locate one, I recommend bringing your best ones to: "The Petoskey Peddler". Actually, two people, Karen and C. Curly LaMotte of Grayling. They show up to many area farm markets and other shows during the summer. They can be reached at: www.the petoskeypeddler.com; Petoskeypeddler@gmail.co m and 989-390-8585. They sell stones and "artisan" Petoskey stone products as well. Great people!

But let's say you are a "do it yourselfer". Here's how you can do it "by hand".

Petoskey stones are made up of calcite, and therefore are a good candidate for hand polishing. Calcite is soft enough so that it can be easily worked, but dense enough to take a nice polish (remember, don't use a tumbler with grit!).

WHAT YOU NEED **TO POLISH THE STONES:**

- · Petoskey stone
- Sandpaper
- (220, 400, or 600 grit)
- A thick towel or newspaper
- A piece of corduroy or velvet
- Polishing powder
- Once you have found the

stone you want to polish, sand it down with 220 sandpaper. After rubbing, rinse the stone down and dry it off. Examine the stone for scratch marks, and if there are any, keep on sanding! All scratch marks should be removed. Next, sand again with 400 grit sandpaper. This should remove any coarse spots. Once again, rinse, dry and check. Now sand with the 600 grit to make sure that the stone is smooth and scratch free. When you think it looks perfect, continue sanding for another 10 minutes, just to make sure. At this point, it is time for the final polish. Sprinkle the damp corduroy or velvet with polishing powder. A short, rotating rubbing will polish the stone. However, if scratches appear, start from the beginning with the 220grit paper to remove them. When you're finished with the polishing, simply rinse the stone off in clean water, and dry. Done!

Have fun searching and polishing your Petoskey stones. Also remember they come in all shapes and sizes "in the raw". My wife found the biggest (and best she savs!) which was about the size of a large pear, right in front of our driveway... "It was just laying there!". I have one at home that is the size of a football but it is uncut and unpolished at this point. When polished, they make great gifts, especially for "out-ofstaters", or better yet, people from other countries. I have given them as gifts to friends and colleagues in several countries and they are quite fascinated with a former living organism, which has become a collectable! Provide them with information, websites (or copies of this article) to make it more interesting for them. Good luck in your search!*

The tradition of the art fair continues this year with over 100 artists from all over the country exhibiting painting, ceramics, jewelry, mixed media, photography, sculpture, wood, fiber, printmaking, drawing and glass.



History of the Charlevoix Waterfront Art Fair

In 1959, there were no galleries or museums in Charlevoix. Art was not part of the school curriculum, and young people with an interest in art found little encouragement.

 Determined to bring fine arts into the remote, northwestern area of Michigan's lower peninsula, a committee was formed to organize the first art fair in Charlevoix. Starting in 1952, the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts held the state's only outdoor art fairs. The Charlevoix Waterfront Art Fair for Artists and Craftsmen was to become the second. Collaborating with artists affiliated with art departments in major Michigan universities, the Detroit Institute of Arts, and the Detroit Center for Creative Studies, the founders established the tone for the fair.

Park. The exhibits were loaned from the collection of Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Cummings of Chicago and summer residents in Charlevoix. Numerous paintings and sculptures were featured at the fair. Masters like Henri Matisse, Georges Rouault, Alberto Giacometti, Edgar Degas, Marino Marini, Paul Signac, Bernard Buffet and Pablo Picasso. Artwork was also on loan from the Detroit and Flint Institutes of Art and the Muskegon Museum. The practice of featuring a Special Exhibit that had been a highlight of the previous shows ceased after the twentieth fair (1979). •. In 1972, the Charlevoix Waterfront Art Fair became the first art fair in the state to commit funds for art scholarships for young local artists. Since then, more than 100 scholarships have been awarded for students wanting to further their education.





Governor approves \$23.3 million in outdoor recreation development and acquisition grants

Gov. Gretchen Whitmer on Monday signed legislation creating more opportunities for quality outdoor recreation by authorizing \$23.3 million in Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund grants.

"From camping and kayaking to swimming and snowmobiling, Pure Michigan offers us world-class recreation right in our backyard," said Gov. Whitmer. "Since 1976, the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund has helped us protect our precious natural places and invested in accessible outdoor public recreation. Today's grants will fund 45 projects across the state, anchoring communities, spurring local economies and making our state a better place to live."

House Bill 4437 approves funding for the 45 recreation development projects and land purchases recommended by the board. It is now Public Act 119 of 2023.

The Trust Fund board recommends funding to both state and local agencies for development projects and land acquisitions that will increase the qual-

ity and quantity of public outdoor recreation opportunities. This round of grant funding reflects continued support of:

. Acquisitions of highquality, unique wildlife and fish habitat for conservation and public access.

•. Trail systems, specifically those - like the Riverwalk Trail and Crooked Bridge in Bay County that have broad impact.

•. An extensive range of development projects that expand opportunities across Michigan for outdoor recreation, including development of urban parks and playscapes, sports field enhancements and river access.

This year the board recommended \$15 million in acquisition grants and \$8.3 million in recreation development grants:

•. Of the \$15 million recommended to fund acquisition projects, \$4.3 million would be awarded to local units of government, while the remaining \$10.7 million would be awarded to the Department of Natural Resources for diverse projects such as land consolidation

at Jaxon Creek Headwaters in Grand Traverse County.

•. All of the \$8.3 million recommended to fund development grants would support 30 local government projects.

•. Collectively, the \$23.3 million of Trust Fund grants is matched with over \$15.8 million of additional funding for a total of \$39.1 million being invested in land acquisition and development projects across the state.

"Since its inception, the Trust Fund has awarded more than \$1.3 billion in grants to local governments and state agencies, greatly benefiting the quality of life for the people of Michigan," said acting DNR Director Shannon Lott. "By leveraging dollars from local government partners, the Trust Fund has dramatically influenced the quantity and quality of outdoor recreation opportunities available to residents and visitors of all ages and abilities while continuing to conserve our natural resources."

Resources Trust Fund is a restricted fund established in 1976 to provide funding for public acquisition of land for resource protection and outdoor recreation, as well as for public outdoor recreation development projects. It is funded through interest earned on funds derived from the development of publicly owned minerals, primarily oil and gas, and can only be used for public outdoor recreation. Over the past 45-plus years, the Trust Fund has granted more than \$1.3 billion to local units of government and the DNR to develop and improve public outdoor recreation opportunities in Michigan.

The Trust Fund board's recommendations go to the Michigan Legislature for review as part of the appropriation process. The Legislature then forwards a bill to the governor for approval.







OUTDOOR CHOICES

From Starry Nights to River Rambles: N. Michigan's Trekking Treasures

BY ERIN FANNING

"This might be the prettiest place in Michigan," I told my husband Keith the first time I hiked the Empire Bluff Trail in the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore. Looking out over Lake Michigan, I watched clouds settle in a blue sky as the sun brushed my bare arms, and, although many years have passed since I made that statement, my feelings remain the same.

Yet, when it comes to hiking in Northern Lower Michigan, the 1.5-mile Empire Bluff, just outside of Empire, is only one of a seemingly endless list of trekking destinations. The variety is stunning, an infinite catalogue for adventure, so abundant that it's impossible to select the best trails, but you can't go wrong with the following list, a sampler to inspire further exploration.

Great Lakes Views

Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore (Empire Bluff Trail)

Sleeping Bear Dunes, for me, encapsulates what make Northern Lower Michigan special: Great Lakes, dunes, and trails snaking through dense forest. But come off-season if you can, when crowds are scarce, and you can feel the stillness of the forest, the only sounds coming from Lake Michigan waves. Thompson's Harbor State Park

From the busy to the eepy, Thompson's Harbor State Park, south of Rogers City, offers 6 miles of mostly flat trails, twisting along Lake Huron's sand dunes and rocky beaches. The best times to visit the park are in May to view the threatened dwarf lake iris or mid-summer for a chance to see the elusive Hine's emerald dragonfly. Located just outside of Traverse City, it's a retreat from the city's bustle, a reminder of the need for solitude and the importance of preserving nature's wild places. River Rambles

North Country Trail

The NCT, a 4,700-mile trail, runs through eight states from North Dakota to Vermont with Michigan hosting more than 1,000 miles. Most of the NCT is out-and-back; however, a portion of the NCT connects with the Manistee River Trail, creating a 23mile loop. The trail, about 7 miles southwest of Mesick, hugs the hillside for endless views of uninterrupted forest and crosses a large suspension bridge. Postseason Qualification, Playing Rules Modifications Among Changes Taking Effect with Start of MHSAA Fall Practices

EAST LANSING - A series of changes, including adjustments to postseason qualification in multiple sports and several playing rules, will take effect Monday, Aug. 7, as more than 95,000 athletes statewide are anticipated to begin the Fall 2023 season across nine sports for which the Michigan High School Athletic Association sponsors postseason tournaments.

Teams in girls and boys cross country, football, Lower Peninsula girls golf, boys soccer, Lower Peninsula girls swimming & diving, Upper Peninsula girls tennis and Lower Peninsula boys tennis, and girls volleyball may begin practice Monday. Competition begins Aug. 14 for golf and tennis, Aug. 16 for cross country, soccer, swimming & diving and volleyball, and Aug. 24 for varsity football. Football teams at all levels must have 12 days of preseason practice – over a period of 16 calendar days – before their first game.

Qualification requirements for MHSAA Finals competition have been adjusted to provide more opportunities in two sports.

The Swimming & Diving Finals could enjoy larger fields this fall thanks to a change in the structuring of qualifying times. Moving forward, qualifying times will be determined based on the past five years of MHSAA race data, but also will account for past numbers of qualifiers in each swim race. This shift will allow for more athletes to advance to the Finals in events where fields have not been full over the previous five seasons.

In tennis, for the first time in Lower Peninsula play, a No. 1 doubles flight from a non-qualifying team will be able to advance from its Regional to Finals competition. To do so, that No. 1 doubles flight must finish first or second at its Regional, and the No. 1 singles player from that team also must have qualified for the Finals individually by finishing first or second in Regional play.

Also affecting MHSAA

Tournament play, golfers now are required to participate in at least four competitions for the high school team prior to representing that school team in an MHSAA Regional or Final. Those four regular-season competitions may be 9 or 18hole events.

A pair of significant changes have switched up the Finals schedules this fall in boys soccer and football. Instead of playing at multiple sites as in the past, all four Boys Soccer Finals will be played on the same day at the same site, Nov. 4 at Grand Ledge High School beginning with Division 4 and ending with Division 1. The 11-Player Football Fi-

nals will start and finish a

day later at Ford Field, concluding that sport's season Saturday, Nov. 25 and Sunday, Nov. 26, instead of with the traditional Friday/Saturday schedule. This oneyear adjustment is being made to accommodate the Michigan State/Penn State football game Friday, Nov. 24, at Ford Field.

Opportunities have been created as well beginning this fall for scheduling more out-of-state opponents in all sports, as teams are now able to play opponents from anywhere in the United States as long as those competitions are played in Michigan, contiguous states Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Minnesota or Wisconsin, or Ontario. All out-of-state opponents must be members in good standing of their respective high school athletic association, and any multi-team event including schools from outside of Michigan or those contiguous states/province must receive approval by the MHSAA and each state high school association with a team involved in order for MHSAA member schools to be allowed to participate.

Rules changes will be literally visible in two sports as more flexibility will be allowed by new wardrobe exceptions in cross country and girls volleyball. In volleyball, small, secured studs or posts now may be worn

above the chin. In cross country, athletes may now wear temporary body adornment (painted or fastened) during competition, and runners also may now wear any type of head attire during racing.

As is annually true, a series of playing rule changes also take effect with the new season. The following are among the most notable:

• The most significant in football changes how the ball is spotted after penalties by the offense that occur behind the line of scrimmage. Previously, those were marked from the spot of the foul; now those penalties will be marked from the previous spot - the line of scrimmage where that play

began. This change was made to eliminate excessive penalties on the offense when an infraction took place well behind the line of scrimmage.

• In volleyball, teams will stay on the same bench for the duration of a match unless officials determine a clear disadvantage exists for the bench on one side of the court. In that case, teams will exchange sides of the court after each set.

• Another pair of changes affect where volleyball coaches may be positioned during matches. Coaches may stand in a new coaching zone, now defined by the libero replacement zone extending beyond the end line and sideline extended. During dead-ball situations, one assistant coach also may stand within the coaching zone to provide instruction; only one assistant coach can stand at a time.



but the assistant coach who stands may change throughout the match.

· Two officiating-related changes will be especially noticeable on the soccer pitch. Officials now may stop the clock to check on an injured player without that player being required to leave the match previously that player would have to sub out. Also, categories for fouls have been redefined: careless (which is a foul but does not receive a card), reckless (a foul with a yellow card) and excessive force (foul with red card). 

CHAPTER 10 CEMETERIES

REMOVE THE FOLLOWING: Sec. 10-12. - Markers for the fifth addition in Sunset Hill Cemetery.

The fifth addition of Sunset Hill Cemetery is hereby designated as a flush marker area. All markers shall be set so that the top is flush or level with the ground. No memorial other than grave markers may be set on any portion of the fifth addition.

REMOVE THE FOLLOWING:

Amend Sec. 10-11. - Markers and monuments for the original, first, second, third and fourth additions in Sunset Hill Cemetery.

Not more than one monument shall be allowed on any one lot nor more than one marker or index stone on any one grave in Sunset Hill Cemetery. No lot or part thereof shall be enclosed by a fence, railing, cooping, hedge, embankment or ditch. Grave mounds shall not be allowed and no lot shall be raised above the grade established by the city.

ADD:

Section 10-11 Makers and Monuments in Sunset Hill Cemetery.

Not more than one monument shall be allowed on any one lot nor more than one marker or index stone on any one grave in Sunset Hill Cemetery unless it is s a military stone. No lot or part thereof shall be enclosed by a fence, railing, cooping, hedge, embankment or ditch. Grave mounds shall not be allowed and no lot shall be raised above the grade established by the city.

AMEND:

Sec. 10-10 Interment Regulations

Only one full body interment in any one grave shall be permitted, except that one container of cremated remains may be buried above or beside another grave with approval of the city. No more than two cremated remains may be buried in any one grave space. The city shall not be held responsible for errors in locations of graves on lots arising from improper instruction from lot owners or funeral directors. Under no circumstances shall the city assume responsibility for errors in opening graves when orders are given over the telephone. No grave shall be opened except under the direct supervision of the city administrator or the administrator's designee. Notice for opening a grave shall be given sufficiently early to allow at least eight regular working hours for the work to be completed.

REPLACE WITH:

Sec. 10-10. - Interment regulations.

Only one full body interment in any one grave shall be permitted, except that one container of cremated remains may be buried above or beside another grave with approval of the city. No more than two cremated remains may be buried in any one grave space. The city shall not be held responsible for errors in locations of graves on lots arising from improper instruction from lot owners or funeral directors. Under no circumstances shall the city assume responsibility for errors in opening graves when orders are given over the telephone. No grave shall be opened except under the direct supervision of the city administrator or the administrator's designee. Notice for opening a grave shall be given sufficiently early to allow at least cight. thirty six (36) regular working hours for the work to be completed. Arraignments contrary to this shall be made with the City Clerk, DPW Superintendent or Cemetery Sexton.

LATIONS, SECTION 44-145

REMOVE:

(d) Billing for sewage disposal rates shall be under the supervision of the city clerk and such rates shall be included as a separate item and collected quarterly at the same time and as a part of the water bill. All bills shall be due and payable within 30 days of the billing date and if not paid by the due date a penalty as established by commission resolution shall be added. Annual notification will be provided each user by the city which details OM&R costs and debt retirement costs for the sewage system. All sewer system services provided by the city shall be paid for by the user. There will be no free service provided. Irrespective of and in addition to the amount of sewerage use, each user will receive a minimum ready-to serve or flat bill amount representing readiness-to-serve charges for the system. The minimum flat rate shall be determined by city commission resolution. Within a reasonable time after receipt of its annual audit, the city commission will review the rates provided for in this article, in light of the audit, and will, if warranted, adjust the rates as necessary to meet the OM&R expense.

All bills shall be due and payable within 30 days of the billing date and if not paid by the due date a penalty as established by commission resolution shall be added. Annual notification will be provided each user by the city which details OM&R costs and debt retirement costs for the sewage system. All sewer system services provided by the city shall be paid for by the user. There will be no free service provided. Irrespective of and in addition to the amount of sewerage use, each user will receive a minimum ready-to serve or flat bill amount representing readiness-to-serve charges for the system. The minimum flat rate shall be determined by city commission resolution. Within a reasonable time after receipt of its annual audit, the city commission will review the rates as necessary to meet the OM&R expense.

ADD NEW SECTION 10-24:

SEC. 10-24 FOREFEITURE OF VACANT CEMETERY LOTS OR BURIAL SPACES

If a cemetery lot or burial space remains vacant for more than forty (40) years after the sale to an original purchaser or a qualified assignee, the City Clerk shall send by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the last owner of record a written notice informing him or her that the forty (40) year period has expired and that all rights in the cemetery lot or burial space shall be forfeited to the City if he or she fails within sixty (60) days of the date of the mailing the notice to affirmatively indicate in writing to the City Clerk his or her desire to retain the cemetery or burial space.

If the City Clerk receives no written response within sixty (60) days after mailing the notice required to be sent pursuant to subsection (a) above, the cemetery lot or burial space identified in the notice shall revert to the city free and clear from any claims of that original purchaser or qualified assignee. The City Clerk shall then cancel in the official cemetery records that the burial permit issued and indicate in those records that the cemetery lot or burial space is eligible for resale under the terms and conditions of this Ordinance.

Section 2. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall take effect seven (7) days following its enactment and publication as provided by the City Charter.


