

#### Jack Costolo, 90 (SEPT. 2, 1932 - AUG. 16, 2023) **CHARLEVOIX**



tal in Charlevoix, where he had been a patient for three days. Jack was born at home in Ferndale, MI, a son of the late Raymond F. and Rose LeFevre Costolo. On November 24, 1962, he married Josette F. Corteggiano of Birmingham, MI. The couple moved to Troy, MI where they resided until moving to Norwood in 2001. An early pioneer in Information Technology, he was employed at General Motors from 1963 until his retirement in 1996.

Jack was a Marine sergeant in the Korean War and a Wayne State University graduate. He was Norwood Historical Society Chairman from 2006-2007. He was a grouse hunter and angler with a strong, broad knowledge of natural sciences. He was your man if you had a question about anything from geology to history to why Easter fell on different dates.

Jack's intelligent, honest, kind manner was obvious to the many that loved him

ran a sawmill and rented out cottages for summer visitors. His early life was marked by tragedy when at the age of nine he lost his father in a catastrophic fuel salvaging accident in northern Lake Michigan. Afterward he spent the remainder of his childhood years in Charlevoix, St. James, and again at Nomad, an idyllic refuge that would hold some of the most precious memories of his long

life.

In the years immediately following World War II he served in the US Army stationed in Kitzingen, Germany, acting as a courier for military intelligence, part of which included his presence at the historic Nuremberg Trials. Following military service he returned to Beaver Island and worked at a number of jobs before marrying his island sweetheart Lillian Connaghan, a nurse. They spent two years in Detroit before moving back to Beaver Island in the mid-1950's and raising nine children. In the decades that followed he worked for over thirty years on the island as a road engineer for the Charlevoix County Road Commission, as well as operating a family-run commercial fishing business for twenty-five years. Throughout his life he

was active in civic affairs both publicly and behind the scenes. He and the handful of Beaver Island families who remained onisle after WW II collaborated to keep their hometown intact at its lowest point, when the yearround population numbered under two hundred souls and the fate of their community hung in the balance. Their efforts succeeded over time but he didn't stop his efforts to help others, often quietly assisting those in need one

# **FOREVER SEGER TO HEADLINE 6TH ANNUAL B3 FESTIVAL AT TREETOPS**

GAYLORD, Michigan -- It promises to be a great day at the base of the slopes of the Treetops Resort, outside Gaylord, when the 6th Annual B3 Festival, gets underway, Sunday, September 3rd.

B3 -- short for beer, blues and barbecue - is an afternoon of Michigan craft beers, a pig roast, and plenty of live music. ## **COMMUNITY LEADERS MITCHELL KLOOSTER** - WE CARE VERY MUCH ABOUT YOU AND OUR RELATIONSHIP

Mitchell Klooster grew up in Norwood, just outside Charlevoix, and had a wonderful childhood. His parents worked in education, his dad in Boyne City, where he also coached football, and his mom in Charlevoix, where she served as the school secretary. They were very involved with his activities as he was growing up. Mitchell was active in sports, and he does not remember his parents ever missing a game or any of his other activities. His parent's commitment continues to mean a great deal to him, and now in his role as an educator, he highly encourages parental involvement.

After graduating from Charlevoix High School, Mitchell moved to Jamaica, where he sought a different experience with the underlying purpose of helping others. While there, he helped teach computer skills at a local primary school and created many worthwhile relationships. Upon moving back to Michigan, Mitchell enrolled in North Central Michigan College and then Grand Rapids Community College earning an associate degree in child development. He had the good fortune of two professors sensing his passion and encouraging him to pursue work in early education as a career. He subsequently earned a degree in Early Childhood Education from Lake Superior State University.

Mitchell and his wife Carly, who grew up in Boyne City, briefly lived in Petoskey. Carly was offered a job teaching Kindergarten at Boyne City Elementary, where she still works today, and Mitchell worked for Char-Em ISD as an assistant teacher in their Boyne City preschool classroom. They quickly moved from Petoskey to Boyne City rather than commuting, and they are

to rise.

In time, an opportunity opened for Mitchell to become the Program Director and Teacher at Boyne Falls Preschool, just a year after Cindy Pineda had become **Boyne Falls Public Schools** superintendent. This role is absolutely right up his alley. He loves the school and connecting with the students and their families, and he continues these relationships as they progress through preschool, K-12, and thereafter. In fact, Mitchell and I were meeting at Lake Charlevoix Coffee Company, and person after person coming in saw him and came by to say hi. I loved seeing this.

Mitchell greatly appreciates his school team, his school district's support of the preschool program, and his relationship with coaches and mentors from Char-Em ISD and other local organizations. Together with his co-teachers, they share ideas to improve the quality of care offered to their students and take advantage of professional development opportunities, e.g., learning to nurture positive relationships with their students and their families. Mitchell and his team members also conduct home visits and parent meetings for their student's families to help parents feel more comfortable talking with the teachers throughout the year. Engaging the children with the community around them is also emphasized at Boyne Falls Preschool, with partnerships and visits from local organizations, musicians, and even yearly groomer rides for the students at Boyne Mountain Resort.

Mitchell was proud to discuss a twice-a-month family ran coffee hour that he played a role in implementing at BFPS. These coffee hours allow parents and caregivers time to take a break. encourage parents to get to know each other, and lean into each other for support. School counselors and other individuals from

times swing by and participate in very worthwhile conversations. Another valuable resource at the school is a washer and dryer in Mitchell's classroom's closet, which are often utilized to support students of all ages in the district and are just one more way the students at BFPS are shown that they are cared for.

In addition to teaching, Mitchell also works parttime for NOS Parts NOW, an e-commerce business that sells vintage motorcycle parts out of Boyne City. In this work, he values the focus on customer service and the challenge of making processes in the business more efficient.

Just some of Mitchell's community activities include serving as a Trustee of the Boyne District Library (he truly values what the library means to the community), he is a participant in the Great Start Collaborative's Parent Coalition, he is a member of his school's Parent Teacher Organization, having previously served as vice-president; and he has a leadership role with the school's Wellness Committee. Mitchell also participates in Char-EM ISD's School Readiness Advisory Committee, where he works with other educators, community members, and ISD staff to dive into what is working locally in early childhood education.

Every morning at Boyne Falls Public School, you can find Superintendent Cindy Pineda and "Mr. Mitchell" standing at the front and back entrances greeting each child with a smile, letting each child know that they are important and cared for.

Mitchell has great humility, is a lifelong learner, and cares very much about others and how he can help them. Our children, families, schools, and all of us are fortunate to have Mitchell as a member of our community.

## Gov. Whitmer Announces Increased Funding for Parents Fostering Children

#### New funding supports administration's commitment to helping families at each stage of their life

LANSING, Mich. - Today, Governor Gretchen Whitmer announced the new state budget will help the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) improve and increase support for foster parents.

"The bipartisan budget I signed a few weeks ago will put more money in the pockets of foster parents so they can pay the bills and put food on the table while caring for their foster kids," said Governor Whitmer. "Foster families work hard to care for their children and we must have their backs. The budget boosts the resources they receive so we can keep children safe and healthy."

The funding is part of MDHHS' overall effort to address the shortage of foster parents in Michigan and provide additional support for foster youth with higher behavioral health needs.

"Right now, about twothirds of foster parents quit fostering within one to two years, a fact that places new stress on a system that already badly needs more loving, caring foster parents," said MDHHS Director Elizabeth Hertel. "Through providing more money to foster parents while also giving them a break, we continue to do everything in our power to make Michigan the safest place in America to raise kids and nurture families."

Respite care services can vary depending on the unique needs of the foster

parent and child and are used to provide short-term relief to primary caregivers of children while they are cared for by respite care families. Instead of foster parents needing to use their daily board and care rate per diem to go toward the cost of respite care, this new program will have an annual budget allocation of \$10 million annually to go directly to respite care providers and gives foster families additional support.

"Unfortunately, money and time are, too often, the biggest barriers to loving and caring families welcoming children into their homes. This funding increase and respite care program address both of those issues," said Lara Bouse, executive director of Fostering Forward Michigan, a coalition that represents foster, kinship and adoptive parents in Michigan. "Foster parents are heroic, and right now, we simply don't have enough people willing to change lives with this commitment. We are so grateful to the state legislature and governor for supporting the MDHHS's goals of keeping kids safe and keeping families together."

Foster parent Sarah Bacheller of Livingston County said the additional financial support will help her make sure the boys in her care can have the same experiences as other children - whether it's trips to Detroit, West Michigan or up north, or buying school pictures or yearbooks.

"Any increase helps go toward providing a similar level of normalcy that their peers get on a normal basis," said Bacheller, who has fostered more than 30 boys. "You don't do it for the money. You do it to help these kids out. But any increase helps take the financial burden of all the extras - beyond food and clothing off of the foster parents. I think if the burden is reduced and eliminated, you might get more people willing to get licensed and open their homes for these amazing kids."

As one of the most requested forms of support from foster families, the department will focus on contracting and building agencies that recruit and fill the need for respite care providers across the state, offering a half-day rate for providing care for 12 hours or less and a full-day rate with an overnight option.

· As part of the department's work to address the shortage of foster parents by decreasing stress and increasing support, the budget allocation for daily payments to foster parents was raised for the second consecutive year, this time by 8% bringing the rate for caregivers of youth up to age 12, approximately \$670.00 a month, for youth age 13 and older, \$800.00 a month and for youth living independently (age 18 or older who still receive foster care assistance), \$825.00 a month. This expanded allocation is in addition to the 20% increase in

rates paid to foster parents, independent living providers, relatives, and adoptive parents and guardians in 2022.

Marquette County Probate Court Judge Cheryl L. Hill played a critical role in advocating for MDHHS' request for additional funding to keep Michigan competitive with other states' budget allocations.

"The additional funds in the fiscal year 2024 budget along with increases approved last year help our foster families continue to provide loving homes to our most vulnerable and precious resource - the children of Michigan," Judge Hill said. "We still have a critical need for loving foster homes in Michigan. Being a foster parent is rewarding, but it is hard work. Any support we can provide to these special families who give so much of themselves should be encouraged. The money allocated in the budget is truly an investment in the future success of the children of the State of Michigan."


## News **Comedy Comes to Petoskey:** We All Need a Little Laughter



Michigan small businesses thrive in these counties

In 2021, the IRS received a whopping 5.4 million business applications—an all-time high since the U.S. government began tracking this data in 2004. The year with the second-highest number of new business applications? 2020. Today, small businesses employ nearly half of the nation's workers, according to a Chamber of Commerce report.

It's fair to say that the past few years have been banner years for small businesses, but what about regional differences? The business climate in a small town in Texas is likely not the same as a small town in Connecticut. The Chamber of Commerce report found that the Midwest was the most businessfriendly region, thanks to the relatively low cost of living, well-educated workforce, and regulations lowering taxes and easing zoning restrictions for businesses.

Of course, the East and West coasts also have plenty to offer, from California's Silicon Valley and Hollywood studios to New York's financial hub to Massachusetts' prominence in the aerospace, defense, and information technology industries. A few states—including Delaware, Wyoming, and Nevada—even allow you to incorporate your business within their borders without ever setting foot there.

For even more specific data, let's take it a step further by analyzing counties. Are certain counties more friendly to small businesses than others? To pinpoint the areas where small businesses abound, altLINE used Census Bureau data to find the counties in Michigan with the highest concentration of small businesses in 2021, calculated as small establishments per 1,000 residents. Small

establishments are defined as those with fewer than 500 employees. Counties with fewer than 1,000 residents were excluded from the analysis, as well as counties for which the Census Bureau didn't have population estimates.

Another important factor to consider: States where nonresidents are allowed to incorporate businesses will also have a higher ratio of small businesses to residents since not all small businesses are actually operated by people living in that state.

Taking a close look at the type of counties that topped the list in each state also reveals some interesting trends. World-class vacation destinations are well represented on the lists of each state, perhaps because tourists are looking to get a sense of how the locals live through small businesses like restaurants, bakeries, bars, and boutiques.

While the top counties in each state do include a few major cities, less populated counties with smaller towns are much more common. Although most of the nation's small businesses are located in major metropolitan areas, those that are located in rural areas tend to be more stable possibly due to loyalty from local residents or the absence of competition from large corporations.

Keep reading to discover the counties in Michigan with the highest concentration of small businesses, and see how it compares across 50 states. It just might give you inspiration for your next endeavor.

(Sistrurus catenatus catenatus)

#### **BY JACOB VANHOUTEN**

"Yes, Michigan has a 'rattler'... that is, a rattlesnake" I answered my inquisitive student taking her first introductory biology course. She had been telling me about an argument with her friend (via text messaging I'm sure) about the existence of "poisonous snakes" in Michigan. What she was questioning me about is a very common issue raised by Michigan residents... "Do we have rattlesnakes?" Quite simply, we do... one.

A member of the viper family (Viperidae), our relatively diminutive (about 18.5 to 30 inches and thick bodied) is gray to light brown with large, lightedged chocolate-brown (often saddle-shaped) blotches on it's back. It will have small dark spots along it's side. The tail appears blunt (stubby looking!) with a small, segmented rattle at the end. The small rattle will make bee-like buzzing sounds when rapidly vibrated on the tail ... only if the snake wants it to! (When it feels threatened).

Although not listed on the state endangered or threatened species lists, this rattlesnake is not commonly observed by most Michigan residents. The snake is listed as "a species of special concern" in Michigan and it is also protected

under a special Director of Natural Resources Order. Therefore, it is unlawful to kill, harm, or take an eastern massasauga from the wild in Michigan. It has also been designated as a federal candidate species. This means the species

warrants federal listing but has not yet gone through the formal listing process. So don't mess with our only rattlesnake!

"Do we have any around here?" was my student's follow-up question. "Why, yes we do" was my answer. Don't look now, but this is NOT a rattlesnake. It's a harmless hognose.

She immediately took on the worried "there's one under every bush" look and actually glanced around the surrounding cover as if expecting a giant rattlesnake to suddenly appear on cue.

Although observations have been recorded in 58 counties within Michigan (all in the Lower Peninsula and one island in northern

Lake Huron), most people would be hard pressed to say they've actually seen one. As an example, while in graduate School, my herpetology class from CMU spent considerable time searching prime habitat for a 15-week semester and never found one. In other words, you really have to want to find these snakes. As a matter of fact, most reported sightings of massasauga turn out to be "look-alikes" ... as in northern water snakes, eastern hognose, fox and milk snakes. It doesn't help that some of these harmless snakes use a defense mechanism of "rattling" (vibrating) their tails in the dry leaves to mimic the sound of the "buzz" from the venomous rattlesnake. Some of these snakes are frequently brought in (more likely dead than alive) for "verification" as rattlesnakes.

Michigan is home to 18 species of snakes with the massasauga being the only venomous species. Being venomous does not mean this snake will use it's venom. As a matter of fact, it is usually fairly reluctant to strike and use it's venom... rather it uses it's cryptic coloration to hide from potential predators. It will also usually flee an area to avoid interactions with humans. The massasauga also "hangs out" in it's preferred habitat ... wetlands of many types such as fens, bogs, marshes, wet prairies, sedge meadows, swamps and forested wetlands. These are areas generally not visited by most people. During some part of it's life (moving on a seasonal basis) they also utilize the adjacent uplands including prairies, meadows, old fields, savannas and forest openings. Over wintering sites for eastern massasaugas include old crayfish and small mammal burrows, where the snakes lay partially to completely submerged in water.

While attending a meeting of the Michigan Outdoor Writers Association convened in Cadillac. Michigan, several of us were treated to an eastern massasauga "quest" led by Rebecca Christoffel, a PhD candidate conducting research on these snakes. We were not lucky enough to locate any wild snakes, however we were not denied the treat of observing one. Rebecca brought along several "friends"... live specimens of the common snakes mentioned earlier, as well as one young eastern massasauga rattlesnake. Observing the commonly misidentified snakes along side a "real live" Michigan rattlesnake made differentiating them quite simple. Doing so in the wild with no other snakes right next door can be a little more difficult.

So what should you do to avoid getting bitten by a Michigan rattlesnake? First, learn to identify the

massasauga as well as the commonly misidentified non-venomous snakes found in Michigan. Also, you may want to know that it is VERY rare for anyone to get bitten by a massasauga and most humans are bitten as a result of "risky behavior" such as attempting to capture or pick up a snake. So don't do it! The safest action you can take (for yourself and the snake!) if you encounter a rattlesnake (or what you think might be one) is to simply give the snake a wide berth and leave it alone! (good advice all around). According to most reports, from 1999 to 2005, 3-8 massasauga bites per year were turned in to the MI Poison Control Center. These included bites to animals as well as humans and were not confirmed massasauga bites (the person reporting thought it might be a massasauga bite). No fatalities were reported. So don't panic... you're not going to suddenly be attacked and killed by a Michigan rattlesnake. What ever you do, don't simply try to kill the snake. Not only is this illegal, its not very smart behavior. Michigan is considered to be the "stronghold" for this species (it is listed as endangered or threatened in every other state and/or province in which it resides) so let's protect this species, not contribute to it's decline.

"So what do I do if I do get bitten by a massasauga?" was my student's last question. "Well, you probably never will, but if you do, I'll give you a list of things you can do".

· Don't panic! (Yeah, right)... but not all bites result in venom being injected (remember what was indicated earlier). About 25% (plus or minus a bunch!) of all rattlesnake bites are "dry"... as in not injected with venom. But if you are unlucky, then the site of the bite will usually develop discoloration, swelling and pain within 15 minutes or so... you will know!

•. Move away from the snake and don't attempt to pick it up, chase or threaten it again (you don't want to get bitten again... now you're just asking for it).

•. Stay calm if you can and reduce movement. If

possible, sit down and wait for help if you can call someone or send for help. The spread of venom, development of shock and other medical reactions

will be slower. •. Wash and cleanse the wound if possible.

•. Remove any jewelry (rings, bracelets, watches) from the bitten limb in case of swelling.

•. Splint the limb to reduce movement.

. Go to the nearest hospital immediately (if you can't wait for help to take you there as in above). Give the doctors detailed description of the snake (they will need to know about antivenom treatments).

. DO NOT apply ice.

•. DO NOT apply a tourniquet

•. DO NOT cut or apply suction to the bit area.

. There have been NO recorded deaths from a Michigan eastern massasauga rattlesnake in the past 40 years. Think about how many people are injured or die from dog, bee, hornet, wasp and other organism bites! I think you'll probably be OK!

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) and Michigan Natural Features Inventory (MNFI), a program of Michigan State University Extension, are interested in eastern massasauga rattlesnake sightings. So if you spot one, repot your sightings by submitting an online form at: www.dnr.state.mi.us/wildli fe/pubs/massasaugaobsreport.asp.



### TOP 6 REASONS MORTGAGE APPLICATIONS ARE REJECTED

#### PART 1 OF 2

Half of refinance applications are abandoned or rejected, as are 30 percent of purchase mortgage applications, according to the Mortgage Bankers Association. All told, the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council (FFIEC) says that well over 2 million mortgage applications were rejected last year.

Want to avoid falling into that number? It's tough — especially in light of the fact that mortgage lenders have become increasingly restrictive in terms of their lending guidelines since the housing market crash.

Here, as a cautionary tale and primer on what to expect, are the top three reasons mortgage lenders reject applications.

1. Income issues. Most failed applications falling into this category have income too low for the mortgage amount they are seeking; often, a spouse's credit issues can create this problem, too, as the income the spouse plans to actually chip in toward the mortgage cannot be considered by a lender.

But increasingly, the recent vagaries of the job market are also causing this issue, as people who have changed their line of work or have changed from salaried employee to freelancer over the last couple of years can also have their home loan applications rejected based on income.

2. Muddled money matters. If the mortgage for which you're applying plus your monthly payments on credit card, car and student loan debts will comprise more than 45 percent of your total income, you could have problems qualifying for a home loan. You might also run into problems if you rely too heavily on bonuses, overtime, cash wages or rental income all of these can be difficult or impossible to get a mortgage bank to consider, and if they do, they might not take all of it into account.

3. Credit issues. Today, the mortgage-qualifying FICO score cutoff falls somewhere between 620 and 660, depending on which lender and which loan type you seek. More than one-third of Americans, by some numbers, have credit scores too low to qualify for a home loan. Even if your credit score is high enough to qualify, if you have any late mortgage payments, a short sale, a foreclosure or a bankruptcy in the last two years, loan qualifying could be difficult to impossible.
