

Boyne City Rubbish pickup

City-Wide Rubbish Pickup is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 16. Place materials on the street after 5 p.m. Friday, and it must be out no later than 7 a.m. Saturday. This is for larger items that cannot be disposed of with your household trash - such as mattresses, furniture and light construction debris. This is available for residential properties of 3 units or less (not commercial properties) within the city limits. The total volume of all items that may be placed out for collection per house is limited to two cubic yards, about the size of a regular pick-up truck bed.

Waterfowl hunting season begins in Michigan

It's time to dust off the decoys, practice your calls and round up the retriever; early teal and goose hunting seasons begin Sept 1.

Michigan has world-class waterfowl hunting opportunities on the lakes, marshes, rivers and ponds of the state. Enjoy an exciting hunt and put delicious, locally sourced food on your table this season.

"Michigan is known for some of the best waterfowl hunting in the nation, and we invite hunters to come and experience it," said Barbara Avers, DNR waterfowl and wetlands specialist.

Early teal season runs from Sept. 1-16. These fastflying ducks present a unique challenge to duck hunters. Blue-winged and green-winged teal are the only ducks that can be harvested during this season.

Goose season begins Sept. 1 in most of the state.

Canada geese, whitefronted geese or specklebellies, and brant are part of a dark goose aggregate daily

bag limit. New this year, during the entire goose season, the dark goose aggregate daily bag limit for Canada geese, white-fronted geese and brant is five, only

one of which can be a brant. An aggregate bag limit is also in place for light geese including snow, blue and Ross's geese. Hunters may harvest 20 light geese per day.

Michigan's Wetland Wonders are a great place to hunt during these seasons. They include the seven premier managed waterfowl areas in southern Michigan, which offer some of the best waterfowl hunting in the state.

When moving to a new body of water, make sure to remove plants and debris from boats and gear to prevent the spread of invasive species that affect waterfowl habitat.

Visit Michigan.gov/Waterfowl to purchase your license and federal duck stamp and brush up on hunting regulations.

SEARCHING FOR MICHIGAN'S GHOST CAT

Actual cougar sightings are rare in the state

You may have read the stories on Facebook or on other social media platforms.

Tantalizing and captivating claims from across Michigan: cougars seen wandering backyards in the suburbs around Detroit, black panthers skulking through farm fields and attacks all over the state o pets and livestock. But what's the truth about mountain lions in Michigan? How many are there? Where are they? And how worried should we be? Cougars, also called mountain lions or pumas, are native to Michigan and would have been found here prior to European colonization of the region. Early European settlers, however, saw the cat as a threat to them and their livestock, as well as a competitor for venison and other wild game.Consequently, by the late 1800s, cougars were almost eliminated from the eastern United States driven by these fears. Wholesale logging of the forests the cougars called home also played a role, as waves of settlement converted much of the state to farmland.Many states and the federal government created bounties, money paid to people to kill cougars and other predators, with the goal of erasing them from the landscape. These efforts worked so well that cougars were eliminated from Michigan by the early 20th century.While memories of these big cats persisted in communities across the state, trying to find physical evidence to support reported sightings proved to be a bit like chasing a ghost.When evidence was collected at the scene of a reported cougar sighting, like photographs, the culprit was often found to be something other than a

where they can find mates and establish their own territories, and they just keep moving when they don't find any female cougars," Sitar said.Should you be worried about seeing a mountain lion near your home?All but one of the verified cougar sightings the team has reviewed have been from the Upper Peninsula. Chances of seeing one in the Lower Peninsula are extremely low.Like with most wildlife, there are some simple preventative steps you can take to make your home less attractive to nugars Remove sources food, shelter and safety. For cougars, this means not letting pets roam outside alone, providing shelter for livestock, not feeding wildlife, removing landscaping that provides shrubby cover for animals to hide in near buildings and installing outside lighting with motion detectors.If you encounter a cougar when you're outdoors, your best bet is to try to appear too dangerous to tangle with: don't turn your back on the animal, look as large as you can by standing tall and waving your arms, and talk loudly.Never run from a cougar, though you can move away slowly. If you are attacked, fight back and never play dead. Remember that the likelihood that you'll ever see a cougar in Michigan is extremely low. and the likelihood of an attack is even lower."These cats are very rare in Michigan," said Pete Kailing, a DNR wildlife biologist in Paris. "Much of the data we've been able to gather so far is thanks to the willingness of Michiganders to share their photos and other evidence with us."If you're interested in learning more about cougars in Michigan, Kailing suggests starting at Michigan.gov/Cougars, where you can find tips on how to tell if the animal you've seen is a cougar, how to report a cougar sighting and the current status on where cougars have been confirmed in Michigan.

These wouldbe cougars were actually animals as mundane as a large housecat seen from an angle that made it appear much larger or as unusual and exotic as an escaped pet serval – a large wild cat from Africa that's definitely not legal to keep as a pet in Michigan.As reported sightings became more common, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources created a "cougar team" in 2008 to review reports of cougars and to try to verify them.Brian Roell, a DNR wildlife biologist at Marquette, takes the mission of the cougar team very seriously."The team is made up of wildlife biologists for the DNR who have received specialized training in how to identify cougars from photos, as well as from tracks, scat and other physical evidence they may leave behind," Roell said. "It's important that we're able to identify these animals correctly, not just for conservation purposes but also so that residents can be informed about the wildlife living around them and take commonsense precautions." Over the 13 years since the formation of the cougar team, its members have met weekly to review reports with supporting evidence submitted to the DNR.If the evidence appears to have come from a cougar, DNR staffers will follow up with a site visit. This helps the biologists verify that photos haven't

been faked or reported from false locations. The visits also let the biologists measure trees and other objects to help estimate the size of animals in photos submitted with reports.Sometimes, the team members even use a life-sized, cardboard cougar silhouette to try to recreate the photo to help arrive at a correct identification.So far, their hard work has verified 65 cougar reports in Michigan."We don't think these are all different cougars," Roell said. "Many of these reports include photos from trail cameras, and it's very likely that the same cat is being spotted in different places as it moves through the forest."What does this tell us about how many cougars are in Michigan?"There's no evidence of a breeding population here - no signs of kittens in any verified report, and all of the animals where we've been able to determine their sex have been male," said Kristie Sitar, DNR wildlife biologist at Newberry.Sitar said some DNA studies have been conducted on the cougars found here, using evidence collected from verified reports or a cougar poached in Schoolcraft County several years ago. This testing has shown the animals being reported in Michigan have traced back to a population found in South Dakota, Wyoming and Nebraska."These are likely young male cougars looking for areas far from home

Char-Em ISD Jobs for Michigan's Graduates program, staff receive state and national recognition for helping high school students prep for career and college

CHARLEVOIX - Behind the scenes at several local high schools, specialists work to help equip young adults with the skills they need to overcome barriers and find success in education, employment, and as community members. Jobs for Michigan's Graduates (JMG) specialists have been in place at many Michigan schools, including in Char-Em ISD at Crooked Tree High School, an alternative program, and Pellston and East Jordan High Schools during the 2022-23 school year - a number which will expand in 2023-24.

At the annual JMG National Training Seminar in July 2023, local staff and programs from last school year were recognized for their efforts with students, said Susan Ward, Youth Services Director for the JMG program, which is administered through Northwest Michigan Works!

"The Char-EM ISD JMG program earned six of six recognitions for exceeding the program's six key performance metrics at all three local programs," said Ward. "I was so proud to see our programs recognized at this level. It is a remarkable achievement."

The metrics for recognition include:

A 100 percent graduation rate

92 percent full-time positive outcomes for high school students (any combination of employment, education, and/or military service that equal 30+ hours per week)

75 percent employment rate

77 percent full-time employment rate

86 percent "further education rate" (includes credentials earned in high school, as well as 2- and 4year trade schools)

100 percent connectivity rate, gauged by the ability to connect meaningfully with youth each month

Tracy Beckley is one of the JMG specialists who serviced the three schools last school year as an employee of Michigan Works, in partnership with Char-Em ISD's Career and Technical Education Department. Beckley earned the "Living our Values Leadership Award," a recognition at the state and national levels.

"These results wouldn't be possible without the hard work and collaboration between all of the JMG staff, the Char-Em ISD and career and technical education team, our district educators, and the community," said Beckley.

"Plus, of course, the work

of our fantastic students. There is nothing better than seeing them reach their goals."

Jim Rummer, Director of Career and Technical Education for Char-Em ISD, was also recognized. He received both the High Performer and JMG Impact Awards for his work and dedication to expanding the JMG program. Starting this school year, 2023-24, Char-Em ISD's districts will be served by five additional JMG specialists, along with Beckley. All 11 local public school districts will have a specialist working with their students, said Rummer. Funding for these positions comes in part from the Career and Technical Education millage that has been approved by voters in fouryear increments since 1996.


"The expansion of JMG is going to provide incredible opportunities for our students, and in particular our students who need some extra support as they near graduation and that important life transition," said Rummer. "Our partnership with Northwest Michigan Works! is very much appreciated, as is the support of the Char-Em ISD Board of Education, ISD superintendent Scott Koziol, and the superintendents of

our 11 local public school districts. Their excitement and interest in expanding this program helped light the fire to make it happen.'

Rummer's JMG Impact Award reads, "To Jim Rummer for your unwavering dedication to expanding access to the Jobs for Michigan's Graduates program. Your advocacy led to the passage of a millage supporting JMG expansion, empowering more students with the vital career skills and experiences needed to achieve a future beyond imagination..."

In honoring Rummer with the High Performer Award, the national Jobs for America's (JAG) Board of Directors noted, "Jim Rummer is recognized for his unwavering commitment to expanding access to the JMG program within Char-Em ISD... (Helping Take Care of Mom)

Dear Dave,

My mother-in-law is 85, and she's had some health setbacks recently. The family got together with her, and as a group, we decided it was time to sell her property and move her into an apartment at a nice senior living facility. She should see a little over \$300,000 from the sale of her house. Aside from that, she has about \$10,000 in a savings account. The problem is, she'll only receive \$2,100 a month in Social Security, and rent at the facility is \$2,600 per month. Plus she loves making donations to charities. With interest rates where they are, is a CD ladder a good place to put the money to help her cash flow expenses in the future?

Dear Ed,

If this were my motherin-law, I'd want her to do better than a CD (certificate of deposit) ladder. Even with the deficit between her Social Security income and the cost of rent, she'll only need to see \$6,000 a year from the investment to make up the difference. And plus, she's 85. Even if she got nothing in terms of interest, the chances of her burning all the way through her nest egg before she dies are almost zero. I know the thought of her passing away isn't pleasant, but it's something you have to take into consideration.

As far as the charities go? Right now, she's the charity. Maybe not in the traditional sense of the word, but it's time for mom to come first. Only the strong can help the weak. I didn't let my toddlers carry our newborn. And when it comes to money, you've got to have the financial strength the free and clear assets to carry others. Take care of your own household first. That's her responsibility at this point.

Ed, you're not going to mess this up unless you put the money in crypto, or something stupid like that. If you want to do some high-yield savings as a part of it, that's fine. If it were me, I'd probably end up investing some of it too. Here's the thing: Overall, if you could make 8% on it, that's \$2,000 a month, and it lasts indefinitely. That's not even touching the principal. But like I said before, even if you make nothing on it, just divide \$6,000 into \$300,000. See what I mean? It's probably going to last as long as she does.

Of course, there may be some other medical bills, and you'd probably want her to have a life other than just paying bills. That's why I'd like to see that extra \$2,000 a month happening. It would provide a little cushion. And there may be a few other little things from time to time the family would have to pick up, but that's not unusual in a situation like this.

You all can make this work for her. Don't be super aggressive, but don't be super conservative either.

Building relationships is an important focus of laboration and the sharing of ideas from everyone involved, including ideas for improving how their services are provided. She welcomes constructive feedback and wants the community to know her door is always open.

Short term goals for Robyn currently are the improvement of signage for the Family Center and Food Pantry. The organization is currently looking to hire an administrative assistant for Gayle, to free her up to focus on the many vital responsibilities currently on her plate.

An upcoming event for community participation is the Moms & Tots fundraiser on October 12 in Charlevoix. Moms & Tots is very blessed to have Austin Hatch as the Fundraiser's keynote speaker. The theme of the event is "Claim Life!" and you do not want to miss it!

A video, posted on the MBA website at www.MackinacBridge.org/ Walk, explains the bridge walk schedule and the choices people will have whether they start from the north or south end of the

around at the midpoint and returning to the city they started from, where their transportation is located. The turnaround points will move toward the ends of the bridge beginning at 10 a.m., but walkers can walk at least a portion of the bridge if they start by 11:30 a.m. Walkers must be on the side of the bridge they wish to return to before 10 a.m.

Walking the entire length of the bridge starting from either end. Those who choose this option must reach the midpoint before 10 a.m. or they will be turned back. Anyone who walks the entire bridge must arrange their own transportation back to the side they started once the bridge reopens to public traffic at noon.

Thus, her team members were also comfortable sharing their own development goals and asking for timely and honest feedback, and they too were ready to offer feedback to others.

As a result, each team member developed into a leader as they each were encouraging, supporting, helping one another, and contributing ideas.





4. Property didn't appraise. Since the whole industry had its hand (among other things) smacked for allowing home values to skyrocket in a very short time, appraisal guidelines have tightened up — some would say, even more than overall mortgage guidelines. So, it is increasingly common to have the property appraise for a price lower than the sale price negotiated between the buyer and seller

This is especially common in the refinance realm, as well over a quarter of U.S. homes are now upside-down, meaning the mortgage balance owed is greater than the value of the home. (If you're trying to refinance an upside-down mortgage, consider the FHA Short Refi program contact your lender or get referrals to any mortgage broker who makes FHA details to apply.)

5. Condition problems. With all the distressed properties on the market, and with most non-distressed sellers barely breaking even, more home-sale transactions than ever are falling apart due to condition problems with the property. Many lenders will not extend financing on homes where the appraiser points out problems like cracked or broken windows, missing kitchen appliances, electrical problems, or wood rot.

And in the world of condos and other units that belong to a homeowners association, if more than 25 percent of units are rented (rather than owner-occupied) or more than 15 percent are delinquent on their HOA dues, new applications for refinance or purchase mortgages on units in the development are likely to be rejected.

6. Technical difficulties with application. The days when lenders just took your word for it are long, long gone. Applications with incomplete or unverifiable information are doomed.

If any of these mortgage loan application glitches arise in your home-buying or refinancing process, it's critical that you connect with your mortgage professional, be it your banker or mortgage broker, to determine what course of action to take.

In some cases, it might be as simple as buying a stove you find at Craigslist and installing it before escrow closes; but with income issues your mortgage pro will need to help you determine whether it makes sense to pay some bills down, get a co-signer, or even wait six months so your income documentation will qualify.

Charlevoix drops wild opener to St. Francis in overtime, 41-40

The highly anticipated showdown between Charlevoix and Traverse City St. Francis certainly lived up to expectations. On Friday, the Rayders hosted the Gladiators for both team's football season opener, and St. Francis had enough, although just barely, to outlast Charlevoix to earn a 41-40 overtime win.

"We were happy with our team's effort," head coach Don Jess said. "They showed a lot of grit and determination. Our kids played physical the entire game. Our Offensive line played really well and their offseason work showed. There's still some fundamental things we need to clean up this week before we play Oscoda." After trading blows throughout the night, the game went to overtime deadlocked at 34-apiece. St. Francis started the overtime and was able to cash in on their first possession, getting a one-yard touchdown run. Landon Swanson had the answer on Charlevoix's possession, getting in from two yards away. Charlevoix opted to go for a potential game-winning two-point conversion, but Swanson was held up short of the goal line by a pair of St. Francis tacklers, giving the Gladiators, who finished runner-up in Division 7 last year, the win.



St. Francis also scored the first touchdown of the game, on a halfback pass that went 75-yards. The Rayders were able to tie things up at 6-6 with a long touchdown of their own though, getting Logan Wadkins to race in from 72yards out. The Gladiators regained

the lead with about four minutes to go in the half on a short touchdown pass.

Swanson was able to answer with an eight yard touchdown run though, and Brady Jess ran in the ensuing two-point conversion to give Charlevoix a 14-12 lead.

Owen Waha made a big defensive play in the final stages of the opening half, hauling in an interception, keeping the Rayders ahead at the break.

St. Francis went back ahead at 18-14, though



Charlevoix opened the fourth quarter with a long drive, cashing it in with a Hudson Vollmer 22-yard touchdown run, making it 28-26.


St. Francis scored its final touchdown of regulation on a nine-vard touchdown run, giving them a 34-28 lead.

Section 1. Amendment of Section 4.02.


