

Front Porch Ministries is not an ordinary restaurant. We are a "pay as you can" restaurant whose mission is to nourish our community and those who visit us.



Dear Dave, My wife and I have been very fortunate in our careers. We both have six-figure incomes, and as a result we have a little over \$2 million in savings and investments. With this in mind, do you have any advice on how to make sure your kids aren't spoiled as they grow up in a family that's doing well financially?

Gary

Dear Gary, First, don't spoil them! Teach them to work, and teach them to be givers. Oh, and gently remind them every so often that it's you and your wife who are wealthy—not them. Yeah, I know. This probably sounds mean to some folks, but I'm talking about simply explaining to them how you and their mom have worked hard, been smart with your money, and that's why you're in the position you're in.

We taught all our kids, from a very young age, just how important it is to

work. Work equals money. When you do that, and kids see it in their parents' attitudes and actions, it makes a big impression. With little kids, it can start with simple things like cleaning up their rooms or clearing the table after dinner. And it should carry over into their teenage years, as well. Every able-bodied child should be working and earning money, whether it's their own entrepreneurial idea, at a fast food joint or babysitting.

Another thing we did was based in our faith. As Christians, we taught our kids that we don't really own anything. 

Quadruple Match Offered to Raise Final Funding for "The Place of Peacefulness"

First Quadruple Match in LTC's History

Little Traverse Conservancy announces the final fundraising stages to protect 56 acres of pristine forest along the shores of Lake Michigan in Charlevoix County. This is the largest remaining unprotected and undeveloped shoreline from the Mackinac Bridge to Charlevoix with 1/4 mile on Lake Michigan. It will also be the Little Traverse Conservancy's largest investment in a preserve to date.

The nature preserve will be called Enji-minozhiiyaamigak, an Anishinaabemowin word for "The Place of Peacefulness." This is an inclusive term meaning a place of serenity and calmness for all living things: people, animals, trees, plants, and everything there and passing through. When this land is protected, anyone driving along US-31 will see the sign for this preserve and know that it is a place for all. From the shore, you can see all of Little Traverse Bay and the land that surrounds it: Bay Harbor, Petoskey, Harbor

Springs, and northward.
Not only will this land be protected forever, but it will also be accessible to all with a universally accessible trail. By supporting this project, gifts will help to

 1/2 mile of universally accessible (UA) trail. This will be LTC's first owned and cared for UA trail.

- Trail that combines crushed stone paths and

winding boardwalks for the steeper grades.

 A viewing platform just above the rocky shoreline of Little Traverse Bay.


With support from the community to complete this effort, this land will be open to all people to come and enjoy the peace of the woods and beauty of the water.

Thanks to LTC members Brynne and Bob Coletti, gifts to Enji-minozhiiyaamigak will be quadrupled! That means that a gift of \$1 becomes a gift of \$4, or a gift of \$5,000 becomes \$20,000.

Worthy of mention, this is the first quadruple match in LTC's history, and we are grateful for the Colettis' generous ingenuity in offering it.



U. S. MILITARY **VETERAN**

OF THE MONTH

The Veteran of the month of September 2023 is Glen Ray Gee Sr.

Born October 8, 1919 to parents Ray and Nora Hayes Gee. Glen grew up in East Jordan, attended East Jordan Schools with the exception of a year from 1930-31 when he resided in Sand River in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Returning to East Jordan he graduated High School in the class of 1940. During High School he played football and was Captain of the 1938 team, and also participated in Basketball and Baseball. Glen worked at the local

canning company helping his father, and later was employed as a plumber for Bill Porter Plumbing. On September 28, 1940 in East Jordan, he married Lillian Bricker of which nine children were born. June 6, 1944 at Ft. Sheridan, Illinois he was inducted into the United States Army. After receiving Basic and Advanced Infantry training at Fort Sheridan, Virginia and Florida, he left: the United States on November 21, 1944 for the European Theater of Operations arriving in country November 27, 1944. Assigned as a rifleman to Company K, 318th Infantry Division, 3rd Army he would participate in battles and campaigns through Ardennes, Battle of the Bulge, Rhineland, and Central Europe and was also assigned guard duty guarding prison-



Glen left the European The ater on November 3, 1945 arriving back to the States on November 14, 1945 having served 11 months 24 days overseas duty. On November 19, 1945 at the Separation Center, Ft. Sheridan Illinois he was given an Honorable Discharge and awarded these decorations: Victory Medal; European African Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with 3 Bronze Battle Stars; 2 Overseas Bars; Bronze Star Medal; Good Conduct Medal, and the rank of Staff Sergeant. Returning back to home, he would again be employed by Bill Porter Plumbing, and later would be employed as a molder, Fire Hydrant assembler and tester for the East Jordan Iron Works, now known as EJ. Glen worked at EJ for 43 years retiring in 1986. He



was a hard worker his whole life. He enjoyed watching all sports, playing ball with his kids, attending sporting events, and spending quality time with friends and family. He was also an avid gardener, sharing vegetables from his garden. Glen was a lifetime member of the American Legion Post #227 in East Jordan, and spent many hours maintaining the Legion facilities. On July 10, 2020 at the age of 100 years, Staff Sergeant Glen Ray Gee Sr. answered the final call and is being honored by his wife Lillian and family.

I attended a reception for the dean of a prominent university.

Listening to the dean speak, what struck me was that he routinely asks students purposeful questions during the dinners that he and his wife regularly host for them. He'll ask them, "What do you think about the education you're receiving here? What is your opinion on the courses that are available?" And then he will ask for their suggestions.

As a result of these conversations, the dean has made significant changes, such as creating new majors and minors.

This is very impressive to me. Hosting regular opportunities for students to speak up, and then really listening to them and making changes.

This is one of the most competitive colleges in the country!

The same is true in business, certainly! If we want something improved, ask the people who are doing that work. The best ideas are bottom up ideas - our people know what needs to be improved and, most likely, how best to accomplish that.

I also heard some great stories at this reception. A successful businesswoman shared that her father had advised her to work in retail, a service industry, during the summer when

she was a teenager. She told me that what she gained from retail work has served her well in her business and in living her life. She learned the importance of being humble, of smiling and being likeable, of asking questions to learn what people want and then listening attentively and with an openmind before responding. These qualities matter greatly!

She specifically mentioned that the experience of serving others has ingrained in her a respect for those who may now serve her, whether in a store, a restaurant and certainly in her everyday business life.

The Mackinac Bridge opened to traffic in 1957 to connect Michigan's Upper and Lower peninsulas. In 1923, the State Highway Department started a ferry service in response to demand for transportation between the two peninsulas. After their launch, the ferries became popular and eventually could not keep up with demand. The Mackinac Bridge Authority was appointed in 1950 to explore methods of constructing a bridge. At nearly 5 miles long, the Mighty Mac is the longest suspension bridge in the western hemisphere and the fifth longest suspension bridge in the world.

Communities In Schools of Northwest Michigan Kicks Off Back-to-School Effort with Scaling Initiative Expanding Resources and Supports to More Students

Additional services are scheduled begin at the start of the 2023-2024 school year

Mancelona, Kalkaska and East Jordan, MI-Communities In Schools of Northwest Michigan has been awarded funding to expand their integrated student supports model into three more schools across Northwest Michi-

The first round of funding distributed to affiliates totals \$13 million of the \$165 million Ballmer investment. The funding is designed to catalyze local public and private investment in the model through a 1:1 match requirement over the first three years and commitments to sustain the work long-term.

This investment enables Communities In Schools in partnership with school districts and local schools to provide critical coordinated resources to students through a trained profes-

sional who can help connect them to supports and services needed to succeed in school.

In the 1980s Intel transferred Michael to Detroit, where he led the introduction of voice recognition



Another goal put that to 9-2 and the final goal of the night came from Tosch scoring on an assist by Snyder


The Ramblers fired 16 shots on target in the contest, while Felix Bair was in

On Thursday Boyne City played its Lake Michigan Conference opener, against visiting Kalkaska. The Ramblers lost this contest 4-






