CHARLEVOIX – Charlevoix-Emmet Intermediate School District and the 7th Probate District Court serving Charlevoix and Emmet Counties have entered into a partnership for operating Round Lake Education Center, located in Charlevoix.

The school was originally established over 20 years ago for school-age, adjudicated youth from Charlevoix County. It is a court-ordered program for high school students involved in the court system. When a need arose for a new educational partner to operate the school earlier this calendar year, Probate Court Judge Valerie Snyder approached Char-Em ISD Superintendent Scott Koziol, inquiring about a partnership that would be modeled after Lakeview High School in Emmet County.

County, and given the ISD's expertise in education and availability of resources to address the needs of our students, they are a perfect partner for our program. We have also had the benefit of seeing first-hand the great results of the partnership between the ISD

all students in our 2.5-county coverage area and ensure that all are receiving a quality education."

Round Lake Education Center provides juveniles, under the court's jurisdiction, with a structured school setting and provides a centralized site from which to administer court programming. The school was designed with the goal of reducing juvenile delinquency and costly out-of-home placement for juveniles, while increasing the number of adjudicated juveniles becoming contributing members of the community. Students attending RLEC can earn academic credits to transfer back to their home district. Currently, RLEC employs program director Angie Novak, administrative assistant Kat

Fortune, and one full-time teacher, David Heinz, with additional support from the court administrator, Tim Smith. Academics are performance based, not based on seat time in the classroom, so credit recovery is an attainable goal.

"When the need arose for a new educational partner for our Charlevoix County court school program, Char-Em ISD was our first choice. Both the court and the ISD serve the students of Charlevoix and Lakeview Academy, the court's Emmet County school program."

Char-Em ISD Superintendent Scott Koziol said the ISD was pleased to consider the partnership with the court and to take the lead with the academic aspects of the program. "Lakeview High School in Petoskey is well-regarded and we knew we could use that as a model for developing Round Lake Education Center," said Koziol. "We are always interested in doing what we can to support vide an environment that supports all Round Lake students in achieving their academic potential, regardless of the barriers they've previously encountered," said Snyder.

Ali is survived by her loving parents, brother Lucas Patrick, as well as her grandparents James and Cheryl (Moores) Patrick and Caren (Grant) Wagoner. She is also survived by her aunts and uncles, Jennifer (Patrick) Lucas, Amy (Patrick) McAran, Wendy Wagoner, April (Robinson) Ball, and Harold Scott Wagoner, along with many loving cousins. She has now joined her grandparents, Walter Scott Wagoner and Mary Therese (Gadreault) Wagoner, in the afterlife. To spread awareness and honor Ali's memory, it's crucial to acknowledge that she unexpectedly faced the challenges of mental illness for only a short time, starting in April 2023 when she was diagnosed with Bipolar I. Ali faced these difficulties with incredible courage and strength. On October 3, 2023, she made an impulsive and quick decision to end her own life. Mental illness is a very real struggle, and Ali would want us to come together to end the stigma and shame surrounding it. In Ali, we found not just a freestyle skiing enthusiast, but a beacon of light and an embodiment of the beauty of genuine human connection. Her spirit will forever inspire us to live life to the fullest, to dance

away in his home on Beaver Island at the age of 73.

Joe was born August 10, 1950. Despite hardships in his home, Joe was able to work during his high school years while attending night school. His remarkable efforts led him to graduate a year before his class. Joe received scholarships to attend college based on his musical abilities, specifically the violin. One of his college professors mentored Joe on a trip to Europe where Joe was able to play viola in the places where the great classical composers had their pieces first performed. His love of music never diminished.

After college, Joe and his wife Phyllis moved to Beaver Island. Here, Joe would become a school teacher, and guide many students to gain both confidence and achievement.

Realizing the serious need for emergency medicine on Beaver Island, Joe was instrumental in forming BIEMS (Beaver Island Emergency Medical Services). This entity, and Joe specifically, have saved a staggering number of lives. As part of his work in growing BIEMS, Joe worked with his team to gain Advanced Life Support and air ambulance options for residents and visitors to the Island. As the organization continued to grow nearer to the needs of those on the Island, Joe personally trained and mentored many residents to assist their community. He trained generations of volunteers that would save many more lives after his retirement from emergency medicine as a paramedic. While teaching full time, and being on call for those on Beaver Island, Joe made time to provide music for several Island churches each week. Joe also worked to maintain a website that streamed events, and provided needed local news for those away from the Island. As we look back on the life of this true servant of the community, we can truly see a selfless individual. Joe is survived by his son and two daughters -Phillip Moore, Courtney Moore, and Andrea Moore (Tyler Miller); his daughterin-law Jessica Moore and two granddaughters, Lily and Katie Moore; as well as several brothers and sisters. Next Gen at the Center Presents: Mussorgsky in Miniature

BAY HARBOR - On Monday, October 30, at 10AM, in partnership with Traverse Symphony Orchestra (TSO) and Interlochen Public Radio (IPR), Great Lakes Center for the Arts (GLCFA) will host its first Next Gen event of the 2023/24 school year entitled "Mussorgsky in Miniature: Pictures at an Exhibition – A Masterpiece in Narrative Style."

Written by Russian composer Modest Mussorgsky in 1874, "Pictures at an Exhibition" is a ten-piece piano suite based on works by Russian architect and painter Viktor Hartmann.

Ideal for students in Grades 3-8, "Mussorgsky in Miniature: Pictures at an Exhibition - A Masterpiece in Narrative Style" combines music, storytelling, and visual art! A TSO octet will perform on stage with images of Hartmann's visual art that inspired Mussorgsky projected behind the



musicians, and Kate Botello of IPR's "Kids Commute" program will narrate the event using storytelling and age-appropriate educational content that touches on musical composition, art, self-expression, empathy, and historical context. Through auditory and visual means, this multifaceted event has the potential to reach students in more ways than one.

This definitely benefits them. It's "Meet Up and Eat Up".

Thanks to Nathan's commitment to the children, the school has its own greenhouse and garden.

Hopefully, next will be chickens, which will mean a lot to Nathan as then they

can give away eggs to the families who may be short financially.

Interesting to note, that during COVID, when schools were shut down, the kitchen stayed open every day cooking and bring foods out to the cars to help the Boyne Falls residential community stay nourished.

They did not miss a single weekday, not one. Nathan emphasizes

that he is so very fortunate that so many in the Boyne Falls and Boyne City are dedicated to help. He says it is such a great community, with people that truly care about each other.

When doing something

worthy, e.g., helping children eat healthy food, the people in the community are quick to join in, help out. He is also very appre-

ciative of the enlightened school administration, starting with Cindy Pineda, Superintendent, and her dedicated team of teachers, administrators, and volunteers. Nathan feels blessed to be a member of this exceptional team.

Nathan knows the importance of feeding children individually, not simply they stand in line and food is put on their plate as they pass by. At Boyne Falls, each student is served individually. 



Dear Dave,

I read where you recommend saving 15% of your income for retirement. Should I count my employer's contribution to my retirement plan as part of that 15%?

-Carlotta

Dear Carlotta,

That's a great question. Employer contributions do not count toward the 15 percent I recommend setting aside for retirement. It's great if you work for a company that offers perks like that, but I want you putting 15 percent of your money into retirement. Whatever your company matches, whatever its pension may be, or even having a military retirement package, none of that enters the equation. I want your money in your name.

Baby Step 4 of my plan says to put 15 percent of your income into retirement accounts. The first thing you should put money into is a matching retirement account. If you've got a 401(k), a Roth 401(k) or a 403(b) and your employer offers a match, you should do that up to the match before anything else. Let's say your employer will match three percent. Since the goal is 15 percent, that still leaves you with some work to do. You've got three percent of your own money already going into retirement, so then you could look at a Roth IRA.

If the Roth, plus what you invested previously to get the match doesn't equal 15 percent, then you could look at a 403(b), or go back to your 401(k) to hit the 15 percent mark.

And remember, if you're going to reach your retirement goals, you can't do it alone. King Solomon, one of the wisest men who ever lived, wrote: "Where there is no counsel, the people fall; But in the multitude of counselors there is safety" (Proverbs 11:14 NKJV). That's why you need a quality financial advisor—one with the heart of a teacher-to help you navigate complicated financial issues, and guide you toward the kind of retirement you want.

Do you see what I'm saying here, Carlotta? I want you-not the company you work for-to control your financial destiny. I want you to be able to retire with dignity, and enjoy life after working hard and saving. The responsibility for making that happens falls to you! —Dave

Lead poisoning can be prevented. And to help with this effort, the Health Department of Northwest Michigan (HDNW) and Northern Michigan Public Health Alliance are promoting National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week to highlight the importance of lead poisoning prevention-especially in children.

A blood test is the best way to determine if someone has been exposed to lead. The amount of lead in blood is referred to as the blood lead level, which is measured in micrograms of lead per deciliter of blood. The 2023 observance of

National Lead Poisoning Prevent Week's theme is "Together, we can prevent lead exposure!" Here are three steps we can take to help prevent lead poisoning: 1. Get the Facts

Residents may have their blood lead level tested at any HDNW clinic. If the lead level is found to be high, residents can partner with local and state experts to identify the source of the lead, stop the lead exposure, and determine any other tests or follow-up that might be needed.

"Lead can be found outside and inside the house, but good news, lead poisoning is 100% preventable," says Jeremy Fruk, HDNW Director of Environmental Health. "The best way to protect yourself and your family is to learn the facts, test your house if it was built before 1978, and follow the lead testing

pregnancy."

Protecting children from exposure to lead is important to lifelong good health. There is no safe blood lead level in children. Even low levels of lead in blood have been shown to affect learning, the ability to pay attention, and academic achievement. While the effects of lead exposure may be permanent, if caught early, parents can take steps to prevent further exposure and reduce the negative impact to their child's health.



MHSAA Announces 2023 Football Playoff Brackets, **11-Player Finals Schedule**

Here are the pairings for the 2023 MHSAA Football Playoffs, which begin Oct. 27-28 with District Semifinals in the 11-Player Playoffs and Regional Semifinals in the 8-Player Playoffs, and also an announcement of the schedule for the 11-Player Finals on Nov. 25-26 at Ford Field.

Teams were divided into divisions before the start of play this fall. The top 32 teams in each division in 11-player and top 16 per division in 8-player, based on playoff-point average, were selected to the field. For 11-player, qualifiers were then divided into four regions with eight teams apiece, and for 8-player qualifiers were divided into four regions with four teams in each.

Pairings for the first three weeks of the tournament are based on regular-season playoff point averages, with the highest-ranked team hosting, regardless of the distance between the two schools. For 11-Player District Semifinal and 8-Player Regional Semifinal play, the top-seeded team in each bracket will host the fourth-seeded team, and the second-seeded team will host the third-seeded team.

District Finals for 11-player and Regional Finals for 8-player will follow during the weekend of Nov. 3-4, and the weekend of Nov. 10-11 will have Regional Finals in the 11-Player Playoffs and Semifinals in the 8-Player Playoffs. The 8-Player Semifinals will pair the winners of Region 1 vs. Region 2 and the winners of

Region 3 vs. Region 4, at the **Sunday, Nov. 26**

the winners of Region 1 vs. Region 2 and the winners of Region 3 vs. Region 4. The MHSAA will assign 11-Player Semifinals at neutral sites. All playoff tickets

place Nov. 17-18, pairing

except for Finals (both 11 and 8-player) will be sold online only via GoFan at gofan.co/ to provide for a cashless and contactless purchasing process.

For 11-Player, tickets to District Semifinals and District Finals cost \$7, tickets to Regional Finals are \$9, and tickets to Semifinals cost \$10. For 8-player, tickets for Regional Semifinals are \$7, tickets for Regional Finals are \$9, and tickets for Semifinals cost \$10.

The 8-Player Finals will take place Nov. 18 at Northern Michigan University's Superior Dome in Marquette, and the 11-Player Finals will be played Nov. 25-26 at Ford Field in Detroit. An all-day ticket for 8-Player Finals costs \$10 and includes admission to both games, and an all-day ticket for the 11-Player Finals costs \$20 and includes admission to that day's four games.

The MHSAA also has announced its schedule for the 11-Player Finals weekend, which will be played on Saturday and Sunday this season to accommodate the Michigan State/Penn State football game on Friday, Nov. 24, at Ford Field. The Finals schedule will be as follows:





Top 6 Reasons Mortgage **Applications are Rejected**

PART 1 OF 2

Half of refinance applications are abandoned or rejected, as are 30 percent of purchase mortgage applications, according to the Mortgage Bankers Association. All told, the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council (FFIEC) says that well over 2 million mortgage applications were rejected last year.

Want to avoid falling into that number? It's tough especially in light of the fact that mortgage lenders have become increasingly restrictive in terms of their lending guidelines since the housing market crash.

Here, as a cautionary tale and primer on what to expect, are the top three reasons mortgage lenders reject applications.

1. Income issues. Most failed applications falling into this category have income too low for the mortgage amount they are seeking; often, a spouse's credit issues can create this problem, too, as the income the spouse plans to actually chip in toward the mortgage cannot be considered by a lender.

But increasingly, the recent vagaries of the job market are also causing this issue, as people who have changed their line of work or have changed from salaried employee to freelancer over

the last couple of years can also have their home loan applications rejected based on income.

2. Muddled money matters. If the mortgage for which you're applying plus your monthly payments on credit card, car and student loan debts will comprise more than 45 percent of your total income, you could have problems qualifying for a home loan. You might also run into problems if you rely too heavily on bonuses, overtime, cash wages or rental income — all of these can be difficult or impossible to get a mortgage bank to consider, and if they do, they might not take all of it into account.

3. Credit issues. Today, the mortgage-qualifying FICO score cutoff falls somewhere between 620 and 660, depending on which lender and which loan type you seek. More than one-third of Americans, by some numbers, have credit scores too low to qualify for a home loan. Even if your credit score is high enough to qualify, if you have any late mortgage payments, a short sale, a foreclosure or a bankruptcy in the last two years, loan qualifying could be difficult to impossible.

loved one about Power of Attorney (POA)

Power of Attorney (POA) is a legal document in which your loved one names who can help make decisions for them if they cannot. There are two power of attorney documents, one for healthcare decisions and one for financial decisions. Note, the document can be canceled or changed at any time.

Power of attorney documents are used if your loved one can't make or communicate a decision for themselves. For example, if they are unconscious or have a condition affecting their decision-making skills or ability to communicate.

If you are not sure how to talk about POA here are some tips that may help.

1. Start the Conversation Ask for help with the conversation. Include someone who your loved one respects but isn't the main caregiver. Sometimes the closest caregiver gets the most push back on this conversation. You can also ask your doctor or a trusted professional to start the conversation.

• Try not to force a decision.

• Remind them it is completely their choice.

2. Provide Information Explain that a power of attorney document:

• Gives them control while they can still make decisions.

• Prevents decisions from being made by someone they don't trust.

May help prevent family fighting in the future.
Makes it easier to care for them.

3. Support Them to Make

Decisions

• Start by asking what you can do to help with the decision. It may help to explain the documents in a different way.

• Ask if there's anyone else, they'd like to talk to about power of attorney, or what questions they have.

• Don't expect all decisions to be made during your first conversation. Give them extra time to make decisions.

• Deciding not to make a decision is still a decision.

Often, caregivers feel like they need to do everything right. That's a lot of pressure! Instead, remember your role is in supporting your care recipient to live their vision of the best life possible. It's not about what other people think is right, or even what you think is right. It's about the person you care for.

Expert Tip

Even if you don't agree with your loved one's decision, remember everyone has the right to make their own decisions in life. Think about times in your life you made a decision that your family didn't agree with. Would anything have changed your mind at the time? This can help reduce any feelings of frustration that may come up.
