John and Kathleen attended Belltower Reformed Church in Ellsworth for many years. He loved meeting new people and hearing the different stories everyone had to tell. Over the years he enjoyed wood carving, fishing, swimming, and playing chess and rook. He will be remembered for his outgoing personality and his humor, which was quick-witted until the very end.

Upon returning home, Alfred went back to school and graduated from Charlevoix High School. Alfred worked as a lineman for the City of Charlevoix for 36 years and served his community as a volunteer fireman and EMT for many years.

Arthur James Ruis of Ellsworth died on November 8, 2023. He was the son of James and Alice Ruis of Ellsworth. Born March 13, 1927, he graduated from Ellsworth Public Schools where he met the love of his life, Maxine Ruth Somerville. Art worked with his father, James, in his auto mechanic garage in downtown Ellsworth during high school, and immediately upon turning 18 he enrolled in the Navy

to serve his country during World War II. He attended training in Chicago and then spent a year working in the engine rooms on Navy ships in the Pacific theater before being honorably discharged in July 1946. Upon returning to Ellsworth, he immediately went looking for Max, and he was thrilled (and perhaps relieved) to find her in town waiting for him. They married on November 13, 1947.

Art continued working with his father as an auto mechanic after returning to Ellsworth, and he built his family a home on Main Street in Ellsworth over the next several years, working on the house late into the night most nights after working in the garage all day. It was truly a labor of love.

Eventually Art took over the garage from his father, operating it until his retirement in 1991, and he continued to do small engine repair from his home shop for many years thereafter. Known affectionately by many in the community as "Smart" Ruis, Art could fix any machine or engine he ever laid hands on, and built plenty of them from scratch as well. His mechanic skills were legendary, but so were his generosity and strength of character. He earned the respect of every person who knew him, but particularly that of his family, who thought the world of him.

In retirement, he enjoyed camping in Sault Ste. Marie, where he spent countless hours logging the ships that passed through the Soo Locks. He remained fascinated by ships and mechanical wonders for all of his days. Even after his camping days were behind him. Art enjoyed watching ships during day trips to the Locks, or even just to Charlevoix to watch the ships docking at St. Mary's Cement Plant.

Art dotingly cared for Max in her later years as she suffered from dementia, and she preceded him in death in 2010. He has missed her terribly, but he is now rejoicing at being reunited with her in Heaven.

Increasing Our Self-Confidence

We all know that we communicate and influence others through our body language. But did you know that we also influence and communicate subconsciously to ourselves through our own body language? In a TED talk by Amy Cuddy, she talks about how "Your Body Language May Shape Who You Are."

When your body language is closed and constricted it communicates to our self and to others a self-protection and lacking self-confidence. (Examples are crossing your arms, slouching, or putting your hand on your chin/ face.) Whereas when our body language is open and expanded, it communicates strength and confidence. (Examples are standing with your arms straight up in the air, sitting back with your arms crossed behind your head, or standing with your hands on your hips.)

Now we obviously don't want to pose like Wonder Woman or a winning athlete in the middle of a business meeting. However, practicing these power poses for 2 minutes in private before going into a stressful situation (giving a presentation, holding a tough conversation, going to a job interview, etc.) will actually cause us to feel and appear more confident. This is an easy technique that anyone can use to feel and come across as more self-assured and poised. Fake it until we make it really works.

Here are some more tips to increase our self-confidence:

☐ Develop a list of past successes, strengths, positive attributes, praise, accolades, etc. and refer to this list whenever we doubt our self or face a daunting challenge. ☐ In times of self-doubt and uncertainty, talk with others

progress. ☐ Take on and learn a new skill such as dancing, painting, a foreign language, or playing an instrument. Be sure to acknowledge each step of our development.

☐ Do something that scares us or makes us nervous. (Speak at a conference, attend a networking event, hold a difficult conversation, etc.) Reward our self for following through on a difficult and challenging

☐ Find a mentor or a coach to help work to build our self-confidence and hold our self accountable for taking action.

Many people mistakenly believe they have to stop being afraid of something before they can do it, when in fact the opposite is true. Once we do something that scares us, we will not be as afraid of it, and our self-confidence increases. This courage will transfer over to new things that we have never done before. We fear what we think we can't handle. Once we prove to ourselves that we can handle it, our fear diminishes and

They subsequently were able to find an affordable house in Charlevoix, which was more convenient as Annie now owned Bywater Café at Michigan Beach. This is a popular seasonal restaurant, which requires like 90 hours a week from Annie. Also, as a side note, Annie says she does not agree that our younger generation does not have good work ethic. She employs up to 8 young people and

has nothing but admiration at how hard they work, the hours they put in, and their reliability.

As personally experienced in the leadership field, I know exactly why Annie gets such fine work from these young employees. She works alongside them, encourages them to contribute their ideas, and she lets them do their job without micro-managing and looking over their shoulders. They are appreciative and feel a sense of ownership in the Bywater Café business. This is a lesson for all of us in our work! Annie is also a writer.

Her fourth book should

be published by the time this article appears. Also, Annie is an artist, especially during winter months, using vibrant colors and strokes to convey her feelings.

Annie has also created a Haunted History Tour. She loves the history of our area, Up North Michigan.

While Jack Jr. and Lisa were in school, Annie helped with a great many activities, e.g., set designs for plays and shows, bake sales, Girl Scout Leader, and whatever was needed. She loves helping children! Annie quietly, without desired recognition, is continually helping single moms find housing, and clothing for children in school whose families are in need.

Annie knows that there are so many families here that struggle, that are one unfortunate event from poverty. She cares and she wants to do what she can to help, and to help make people happy.



Protecting Public Health

We all can thank the Health Department of Northwest Michigan for its outstanding job of protecting the overall health of the public within the counties it serves.

Guidance of the agency by the eight-member board of health made up of two county commissioners each from Emmet, Charlevoix, Otsego and Antrim counties can be a slightly different matter.

Near the end of an otherwise routine monthly meeting on November 7, Commissioner Jaris Rubingh of Antrim County offered a surprise, verbal motion not published in advance to immediately end a public health program.

His focus was the agency's participation in an innovative nationwide program to monitor the presence of Covid virus by sampling wastewater to help prevent future, larger outbreaks.

Rubingh called it "a phenomenal waste of taxpayer money." He cited his experience taking fecal samples from his large herd of dairy cows and what he said was its lack of value in preventing disease.

In coordination with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, The Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy and Michigan State University, health department staff take samples from 18 sites including wastewater treatment plants in Gaylord, Charlevoix, East Jordan and Petoskey, multiple schools, and four congregate care facilities.

Written documentation provided by staff said that wastewater monitoring can provide an early indicator for the presence of disease in our community and track trends over time. After a spike in virus was discovered at Mancelona High School, school staff requested additional home test kits. A spike at a long-term care facility prompted staff to get all residents tested. Those who tested positive were isolated, which prevented the possibility of a much larger outbreak.

The board of health was reminded by staff that the \$700,000 state-funded program was approved in September as part of the budgeting process and cancellation would be very disruptive.

Dan Thorell, the agency's health officer, said that the program has opened a new door for public health surveillance and is part of a national project related to Covid. He noted that our communities are not doing as much Covid testing as was the case during the pandemic. He said abruptly ending it doesn't make sense. He noted it can be expanded to test for other diseases.

Before calling a vote, Chairman Hankins said, "I trust Dan. When he says something is valuable, I am going to defer to his judgement."

Rubingh's surprise motion failed on a 4-4 vote with both Emmet County commissioners, Hankins and one Antrim County commissioner voting against it; both Otsego County commissioners, Rubingh and a Charlevoix County commissioner voted for it.

The meeting was shorter than some in recent months, with fewer people in the audience.

New Family Resource Guide, Family Planning & Pregnancy Guide, and resource support phone line now available from the Great Start Collaborative

The Great Start Collaborative of Charlevoix, Emmet and Northern Antrim Counties has recently completed and released two online resources to help families, individuals and children throughout Northwest Michigan: The Family Resource Guide and the Family Planning & Pregnancy Guide. In addition, a new phone line is now active to help families connect with local resources.

The Family Resource Guide is intended to provide easy access to the many supports and services available in our community to support individuals in times of hardship. Users can find a range of resources, from child and parenting resources to counseling and crisis services, food assistance, housing, and utility assistance. It is intended for use by individuals of all ages, including families with young children, veter-

ans, and resources for the elderly.

The GSC has also completed and released the first ever Family Planning & Pregnancy Guide, in collaboration with the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. This guide is intended to be a source of education and resource connection for individuals and families who are no longer actively taking steps to prevent pregnancy and who are of childbearing age.

"These two guides will help families and individuals in our region with finding critical resources and support in times of need or significant transition," said Savanah Cool, Great Start Collaborative Director.

of the Family Resource Guide, the Great Start Collaborative is also now operating the "Help Me Grow Char-Em" phone line, with a Family Resource Coordinator available who can assist families with children prenatal to age 8 in navigating local resources and supports. 



Go into Debt for a Wedding? Nope!

Our daughter's college education is pretty much paid for already through grants and scholarships, and my wife and I make good money. We just started your plan, so when we get to Baby Step 5, saving for college, can we substitute that with saving for a wedding?

Dear Benton,

I'm glad you're thinking ahead, buddy. And I don't have a problem with your idea. It's always a good plan to save for a wedding, if you have the financial resources to do so.

Did you know the average wedding in America this year, according to Zola.com, ran around \$29,000?

Of course, you don't have to pay anything close to that amount to make a wedding a beautiful and memorable occasion. Your household income, debt, savings and other factors will all play a part in how much you can legitimately afford.

Sit down with your wife, crunch some numbers and see what makes sense in your situation. Just remember to pay cash for the wedding. If you have to go into debt to make it happen, you're spending way too much!

My husband and I have just \$12,000 to pay off before we're debt-free. We've paid off almost \$70,000 in debt in the last two years, and we both just turned 50. We would like to buy a house soon, but we know we need an emergency fund. It would take us over a year to build up an emergency fund, so since we're getting older, should we make adjustments to the Baby Steps?



Record Number of Boyne City Children are "Dressed for Chill" by Local Non-Profit

Boyne Eta Nu Charities is a nonprofit organization that has served the Boyne City community for nearly 60 years. The 48-member ladies group works across many different committees to support vulnerable Boyne City residents as well as to help celebrate the "Best Fourth in the North" by raising funds for the annual fireworks show. One of the most intensive projects, "Dress for Chill" just wrapped a record 221 early childhood and elementary children in warm outwear for the upcoming cold-weather. Charlotte Battjes, Dress for Chill (DFC) committee chair for the past five years provides this perspective, "Each year we see the need grow in our early learning and elementary needs, last year we dressed 203 children. We

work closely with designated school personnel to identify and coordinate the efforts with the parents and gain accurate information on sizing and then we go to work!"

This past October 12, twenty-nine ladies dressed 136 children at the Boyne City Elementary School. A week later, the team was back in action at the Early Learners program where another 85 children received their bundles of warmth to face the winter ahead. Though it may seem this project is limited to the fall season, it is a massive lift all year. The Dress for Chill team shops all year for deals and bargains, taking advantage of endof-season sales and close outs. We buy, sort, catalog and store all the purchases throughout the year

until September, when we begin working with school administrators to coordinate sizing information from parents. Simultaneously, the team starts coordinating ensembles for each child, which are then assembled and tagged for delivery to the school. In mid-October, we meet with the children at school to try on their new clothes, making sure of fit. We bring totes of inventory in case we need to switch out sizes, and make sure everything fits just right. Each article is then labeled with their name, signifying ownership of their items. It is truly a labor of love.

Each year we also need to resupply our inventory and are at the mercy of fundraising through grants and donations from individuals and organizations in the area and beyond. One

of these standout supporters has been Pat O'Brien & Associates Real Estate who on November 6, made another very generous donation to the effort. The organization has been a long-time supporter of DFC and Eta Nu is honored by their continued support for this project. "We couldn't do this without the strong community business and individual support," says Battjes.

DEER HUNTING PREVIEW

Deer herds plentiful in Nothern Lower Peninsula

The 2023 Michigan firearm deer hunting season is underway, and archery season is completed. As hundreds of thousands of deer hunters prepare to head to the state's fields and forests in pursuit of whitetails, here's a look at what they can expect to find in each region.

UPPER PENINSULA

The winter of 2022-2023 was again severe, with several impactful snowfalls late in the winter, raising fears about a significant mortality event across much of the Upper Peninsula. While there was some adult and fawn mortality reported in select areas, major dieoffs from the hard winter were again avoided.

Deer numbers remain low in many locations, especially along the Lake Superior shoreline and in the western counties and even some locations in the eastern U.P., which will again temper expectations of overall harvest in the U.P. The southern portions of the U.P., including parts of Menominee, Delta and even Dickinson counties, seem to have consistent deer numbers, and another good year is anticipated for those areas. But, to be clear, there will be places in the U.P. where deer densities remain low, and hunting efforts in some of these locations will prove extremely challenging.

Where oaks are present, acorn production looks good for this year, and bowhunters may find added success in emphasizing these areas early in the season.

The big news in the Upper Peninsula this year is that the Chronic Wasting Disease Surveillance Zone, surrounding the lone detection of a deer with CWD, was lifted. After testing nearly 2,100 deer since 2018, we identified no other CWD-positive animals. This led the DNR to recommend, and the Michigan Natural Resources Commission to approve, the removal of this zone. Of course, hunters who still want to get their deer head tested can do so. The best way to understand your testing options is to visit Michigan.gov/CWD to see what options are available in the area you are hunting. Hunters in the previously defined CWD Surveillance Zone can resume baiting, which had been prohibited since the establishment of the zone.

Also returning will be the "hunter's choice" deer regulations. This allows any legal buck (one with one antler 3 inches or longer) to be harvested on a single deer license, but hunters purchasing a deer combo license must hunt under an antler point restriction, using the regular tag to take a buck with at least three points on one side and the restricted tag to take a buck with at least four points on one side. The entire area of the former CWD Surveillance Zone will have these regulations, consistent with the surrounding units, which should simplify the regulations.

tion about U.P. antler point restrictions in the 2023 Michigan Hunting Regulations Summary.

NORTHERN LOWER PENINSULA

The winter appeared to be mild across much of the northern Lower Peninsula, and the deer herd didn't appear to have any negative impacts coming into the spring. This has been a common trend in recent years, with typically minimal, if any, winter loss reported across the region.

Hard mast seems to be plentiful and widely distributed. It's shaping up to be a good, and potentially great, year for both red oak and white oak acorns. Preseason scouting can definitely pay off in identifying these areas of abundance ahead of time. It's important to note that some areas have been affected by spongy moth in recent years, and those areas still might be on the lower end of mast production.

Deer numbers can vary depending on where you are in the region, but numbers are plentiful in many locations. With time in the field, most hunters should have opportunities to be successful this year. Antler growth seems to be good across the region compared to previous years, so while there are some great bucks to be had, if one doesn't present itself while you are hunting, consider harvesting a doe and passing on younger bucks to try and help manage the deer herd. Your choices will pay off in the future.

If you're able, don't hesitate to take advantage of the venison donation program through Michigan Sportsmen Against Hunger. It's a great program that allows you to donate the meat from your deer at a registered processor to be distributed to those in need.

No regulatory changes for the northern Lower Peninsula this year, so what you experienced last year should hold true for this coming year as well. It's worth noting that we still require online harvest reporting, so make sure to record your harvest within 72 hours of tagging your deer to help us with data collection and deer harvest tracking.

One big change hunters will notice this year will be to the online reporting map. Last year, hunters were asked to identify a location where the deer was harvested. After feedback from this past season, we shifted this map to the township level, giving hunters greater confidence in reporting their harvest knowing that the specific location of the deer will no longer be collected.

To record your deer harvest, visit Michigan. gov/DNRHarvestReport or download the Michigan DNR Hunt Fish mobile app, where you can purchase licenses, track your lottery points and record your harvest all in one location.

For 2023, CWD testing will be focused on the northwestern Lower Peninsula and in a few counties in other areas where additional information is still needed. The counties for CWD testing in 2023 include Antrim, Benzie, Charlevoix, Emmet, Grand Traverse, Hillsdale, Isabella, Kalkaska, Lake, Leelanau, Manistee, Missaukee, Osceola and Wexford. In these counties, there will be drop boxes, staffed submission sites, and partner processors and taxidermists to assist with collection efforts.

SOUTHERN LOWER PENINSULA

Deer remain abundant throughout much of the region. The winter of 2022 was relatively mild and once again didn't negatively affect deer in this region. In fact, the southern Lower Peninsula's deer herd is one that rarely experiences any overwinter mortality due to the abundance of summer food and the relatively mild winters.

The summer of 2023 started with droughtlike conditions throughout much of May and June.

The slow growing at the start of the planting season may translate into a later crop harvest, which typically reduces hunter success due to the availability of more standing cover for deer. This is always something worth monitoring as we approach harvest season.

The concern of epizootic hemorrhagic disease, which is often associated with droughtlike conditions, has been a discussion in deer circles for most of the summer. At the time of writing this report, EHD has only been identified in Washtenaw County, and with the peak time period coming to a close with the onset of colder temperatures, it appears we will not have a significant outbreak this One change many in the

southern Lower Peninsula will notice is the return of antler point restrictions on the second tag of the deer combo license. Data from last year's online harvest reporting showed that the percentage of bucks killed with four points on one side didn't differ between southern Lower Peninsula counties with the four-point restriction on the second tag (68.1% of bucks harvested had a rack with four points on one side) and those counties without the four-point restriction on the second tag (69.4% of bucks harvested had a rack with four points on one side).

Essentially, we discovered that we had two regulations doing the same thing, so in the interest of simplicity, we placed the four-point restriction back on the second tag in 19 counties (Barry, Calhoun, Clinton, Eaton, Gratiot, Hillsdale, Ingham, Ionia, Isabella, Jackson, Kent, Lenawee, Mecosta, Midland, Montcalm, Muskegon, Newaygo, Ottawa and Shiawassee). Deer combo license buyers who hunt throughout the region will have an unrestricted first tag, with their second tag dedicated toward a buck with four points on one side. Of course, hunters can still harvest an antlerless deer on either of these tags during the archery, firearm or muzzleloader seasons.





Does Insurance Cover Roof Damage?

The easiest way to know what's covered or what's not, is to contact your insurance provider. Coverage will often depend on the age of your roof, the area you live in, and many other factors, so it's important to know the specifics of

your policy. Most homeowner insurance policies will provide coverage for roof damage caused by unpreventable reasons such as vandalism or fire. Disastrous "acts of God" such as hurricanes and tornadoes are also usually covered. Although wind, rain, and hail are covered by your home insurance policy, there are many factors that determine if your damage will be covered, and if so, how much you will be reimbursed. The same basics that apply to your roof, may apply to your exterior property as well. Exterior property is considered anything that is attached to the outside structure of your home, such as siding and gutters.

how much you will be reimbursed. Some policies take the age of your roof into account at the time it is damaged. For example, if your roof is under 10 years old, you may be covered for the full cost of repairing or replacing the damaged section of your roof at the time of the claim. If your roof is over 10 years old, you may only be reimbursed for the depreciated value of the damaged roof. The depreciated value takes the aging and wearing of your roof into account, meaning its value has decreased prior to any damage occurring. Depending on where you live, some policies will only offer roof damage coverage up to the depreciated value, regardless of the age of your roof. Other policies will cover the full cost of repairing or replacing the damaged section of your roof at the time of the claim, regardless of the age of your roof. In most cases, your insurance company will send an inspector to your home to investigate and verify your claim. If the damage is determined to be from aging, wear and tear, or poor condition of your roof, it will

typically be considered normal

maintenance, and will not be covered under your policy.

In some instances, water damage due to flooding or surface water, might have to be covered under an additional policy. Mold caused by continued water damage or leaking, for example, also may not be covered by your insurance policy. Preventing leaks and inspecting your property are crucial responsibilities of the homeowner and could help avoid unnecessary damage. If you are experiencing leaking due to a damaged roof, promptly remove any furniture or other belongings that could sustain

water damage. Replacing a roof or other exterior property can be a time consuming and expensive process. That's why it's important to take certain steps to prevent damage

from occurring. Get your roof inspected by a trained professional who can identify areas that may need immediate repair. Replace broken and worn shingles. Consider using impact-resistant shingles, which may be more expensive at first, but are designed to resist damage from hail, saving you money in the long run. Remove any dead trees from around your property that could

potentially fall onto your home. To ease the experience of the claims process and to help you receive proper settlement for your loss, take a set of "before" photos of your roof and exterior property. Update the photos whenever you have maintenance or repairs done. After damage occurs, take a set of "after" photos. Document and record the damage as well as any estimates, invoices and bills you receive. Having all of this information on file will help ensure a smooth and hassle-free claims process

Overall, it's important to remember that all insurance companies cover roof and exterior property damage differently. Even the same company can vary coverage drastically by state or the age of your roof or property. Policies also differ in coverage limits, deductibles and certain exclusions. The only way to be certain of what your policy covers, is to speak with your insurance provider about the details.
